

Somoza resigns, flees to Florida

MANAGUA, Nicaragua (AP) — President Anastasio Somoza, toppled by revolution, resigned early today and flew in his private jet to exile in Florida, ending 42 years of dictatorship by his family.

Thousands of Nicaraguans in 26 guerrilla-held cities danced in the streets all night, drinking wine and rum as church bells pealed.

Somoza and dozens who fled with him landed at a U.S. air base in Florida, then went by motorcade to his palatial estate, were Somoza told a news conference: "I am a realist and I hope that the best thing for my people would be for me to resign...I am very happy to be in the United States of America as a political

Administration sources in Washington said a U.S. Navy amphibious assault ship carrying helicopters and 19 soldiers was off the east coast of Nicaragua - but beyond sight of land in case there was need to evacuate Americans.

Members of the Nicaraguan Congress elected the president of their lower house, Francisco Urcuyo, to succeed Somoza, but Urcuyo, 54, was expected to serve only until the arrival from neighboring Costa Rica of the provisional junta named by the Sandinista guerrillas.

The Sandinistas, in a successful, seven-week rebellion, fought Some za's national guard to a standstill and toppled the onetime strongman in the largest but most thinly populated

Central American state.

Somoza was still in the air en route to Florida when junta member Sergio Ramirez Mercado announced in Costa Rica that the new Nicaraguan government would ask the United States to extradite Somoza to stand tral for crimes against the Nicaraguan people, including corruption and human rights violations.

U.S. officials said Somoza landed at Homestead Air Force Base near Miami at 9:50 a.m. Defense Department spokesman Thomas Ross said an initial group of three planes brought in 70 Somoza aides and relatives. Administration sources said other planes were en route.

Base guards said the group left the air base by motorcade, escorted by the Florida Highway Patrol, and headed for Somoza's estate on Sunset Island. The motorcade brought with it crates of food, sacks of potatoes and cases of soft drinks, the guards said.

Nicaragua has more land area than Florida, but has a population of 2.5 million, little more than one-third that of Florida's 6.8 million. It has coasts on both the Atlantic and Pacific sides of Central America.

The Sandinistas began as a Marxist-Leninist movement and still have in their ranks pro-Cuban elements. But they have also split into three factions, promised free elections, appointed a cabinet representing a broad spectrum of opinion and indicated that U.S. business interests in Nicaragua will be allowed to continue

An aide reported the 53-year-old ex-president took a helicopter from downtown Managua to the international airport at 4 a.m. (6 a.m. EDT), then boarded his plane for Homestead Air Force Base, which the U.S. State Department ordered sealed off Monday night.

Hundreds of people in the rebel-held town of Jinotepe, 35 miles south of Managua, took to the streets in celebration as news of the resignation spread at 2: 30 a.m.

The Carter administration had been urging Somoza to quit for weeks, but the State Department had no immediate comment on his resignation.



Commissioners work out own county salary policy

A change in Midland County's policy concerning pay raises and salaries for county employees and elected officials may be forthcoming, but it won't be the change envisioned by the Midland County Salary Evaluation

County commissioners met Monday in a budget study that encompassed a discussion of the committee's salary recommendations and virtually rewrote the committee's

What commissioners did was restructure the county's policy on pay raises with an eye toward upgrading salaries and keeping qualified county employees. But most of the committee's recommendations fell by the

The committee, headed by Midland attorney Ted Kerr, criticized the county's salaries as too low and made sweeping recommendations for upgrading salaries to prevent turnover of qualified county employ-

The committee also recommended salaries of elected officials be raised.

Specifically, the committee suggested that an amount representing 6.26 percent of the total employee payroll be budgeted for individual salary adjustment in 1980, that salaries of elected officials be raised to 1971 levels of buying power and that a full-time personnel director-purchasing agent be employed by the county.

While no action was finalized Monday, commissioners essentially disagreed with those recommendations. Another suggestion from the committee - to provide salary increases more frequently for county employees - was viewed more favorably by the county

First item to go down the drain was employment of a purchasing agent-personnel director.

County Judge Bill Ahders seemed to favor the recommendation, saying, "We've had some qualified people consider this and I think we should give some serious thought to their recommendations."

But Commissioner Charlie Welch argued that he felt a personnel director would be of little benefit. Commissioner Durward Wright expressed :oncern over finding office space for a personnel director and

Carter makes appeal for bipartisan support

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Carter appealed today for bipartisan congressional support for his energy proposals, and said he wants enactment of his proposed 'windfall profits' tax before Congress begins its August

Carter's comments were reported by Democratic and Republican congressional leaders who attended a White House breakfast meeting with the president.

House Democratic Whip John Brademas of Indiana said there appeared to be "significant bipartisan support" for the president's energy proposals. Senate Democratic Leader Robert Byrd of West Virginia was quoted as telling Carter the mood of Congress and the country was

But Brademas said some Republicans were less than enthusiastic about parts of the president's program, including the windfall profits tax and a proposed Energy Security Corporation to spur the search for new energy sources.

Carter had "left the private sector out too much" from his

Brademas, however, predicted approval of oil taxes and a standby gasoline rationing plan before Congress re-

Assistant Senate Republican Leader Ted Stevens of Alaska said Carter wants Congress to give him "the broadest possible" authority to ration gasoline in the event of a national emergency, without provision for a congressional veto - a condition not likely to sit well with

The House already has approved the windfall profits tax Carter wants on the oil industry, but it is not clear how swiftly the Senate is prepared to act.

The House is expected to vote before the recess on gasoline rationing, which the Senate approved earlier this year. The original Carter rationing plan was defeated by the House in May.

The president also was reportedly planning to hold high-level talks on personnel changes that could find

Auto insurance

AUSTIN (AP) - The State Insurance Board is expected to receive astaff report Wednesday recommending a statewide average car insurance increase of between 10 percent

and 15 percent. But board member Lyndon Olson said Monday the board will closely examine the assumptions made by the rating formula before making a final decision.

The result could be a smaller increase than staff actuaries arrived at with their usual rating methods.

The staff recommendations will be presented at a conference Wednesday to set the ground rules for the Aug. 1 statewide car insurance hearing.

Rate proposals from the insurance industry are expected to be in the range of 20 percent to 25 percent. The board raised rates 3.2 percent

last November, the first statewide

incréase in two years. Olson said he and the board's new chairman, William Daves, "are taking a really hard look at the way we set insurance rates."

"We want to know what that formula says. ... If we use investment income, we want to know how we use if. If not, we want to know if we should," Olson said.

For about a decade, the board has formally recognized that insurance company earnings consist not only of policyholders' premiums but also of income from investing those premi-


But the board has generally applied investment income merely to "test the adequacy of' the rates, which allow about 2.5 cents of the premium dollar for after-taxes profit. The board also held a hearing dur-

ing the spring on whether insurance companies' actual Texas expenses should be substituted in the rating formula for the nationwide expense estimates now used.

No action followed that hearing, but-Olson said he and Daves also wanted to consider changing the expense allowance in the formula. A reduced, expense allowance would have a tendency to cut rates.

Clint Dare, manager of the Texas office of the Insurance Information Institute, said he expected this year's rate recommendations by board actuaries to parallel the inflation rate.

The insurance industry's figures traditionally are higher because they make greater allowance for infla-



WASHINGTON (AP) - Richard M. Nixon will move back to New York at the end of the year, abandoning plans to buy a new home in California, according to a family friend.

Nixon and his wife, Pat, recently sold LaCasa Pacifica, their home in San Clemente, Calif. They had planned to move into a \$650,000 house in the nearby Cyprus Shores subdivision in late fall.

But the Cyprus Shores purchase won't be completed, the family friend said Monday, and Mrs. Nixon recently went home-shopping in the New York City area.

Nixon had a Fifth Avenue aprtment in the city when he made his successful run for pesident in 1968.

"They are moving in order to be near their children and grandchildren," said the friend, who asked not to be identified.

The Nixons' oldest daughter, Julie, and her husband David Eisenhower, live near San Juan Capistrano, Calif.,

Prosecutors to discuss NTSU case

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - Prosecutors from Austin and Denton have been invited to meet with a legislative committee investigating alleged mishandling of state funds at North Texas State University.

"The district attorneys are the ones to decide if criminal action will be taken," said Sterling Fulmore, general counsel of the House General Investigating Committee

Fulmore said the committee would offer two state auditors' reports and other results of its probe today to Denton District Attorney Jerry Cobb and a representative of the Travis

County district attorney's office. C.C. "Jitter" Nolen resigned as the Benton school's president in April hours before answering questions from the committee. Nolen down after state auditors discourred hat they considered unconstitutional transfers of public funds into a private

Acting university President John L. Carter has said auditors found more than 30 "questionable checks" made out to the university but allegedly altered to make them payable to the North Texas State University Educational Foundation Inc.

One of three other witnesses who testified in April before the committeee, James Reid, will resign as foundation executive director, effective

Fulmore, committee general counsel, said Monday the panel will review the auditor's reports. The studies also deal "in limited fashion" with the Texas College of Osteopathic Medicine and a foundation that supports the college, the lawyer added.

The osteopathic school is part of North Texas State but operates on a separate campus in Fort Worth. Committee members have been not

publicly released the reports because some sections dealt with actions subject to possible prosecution. The Denton prosecutor said his of-

fice has never been involved in the North Texas State investigation. "Nobody ever brought any of this to

us at all," Cobb said. "I am surprised - if there is any criminal conduct in Denton County they want us to prosecute - that they haven't told us by now."

Cobb said his office could not begin its own probe until the committee or a law enforcement agency wants to file criminal charges. Delmar Cain of the Travis County

district attorney's special crimes unit also will attend the committee meeting, said Steve Capelle, head of that division.

Capelle said his office is waiting to see what information the House committee discovers before deciding whether to send the case to the Austin grand jury.

"We have read the audit reports but they don't tell you everything," Capelle said. "They're so jumbled about whether the funds are state funds or

not state funds." If state funds are being illegally mishandled, the Travis County office

would handle the case. Fulmore said no witnesses were subpoenaed for the meeting.

"I don't know of anything sensational that is scheduled," the committee lawyer said.

Three deputies free on bond

CORPES CHRISTI, Texas (AP) -Three Nueces County sheriff's deputies are free on bond after being arrested on grand jury charges of official oppression, tampering with governmental documents and perju-

Sheriff Solomon Ortiz had suspended Capt. Florence Rendon and deputies Ronald G.Flores and Orlando Benevides without pay. Texas Rangers arrested the deputies Monday, they posted bond and were released a short time later.

Ortiz held a brief news conference Monday, announcing that he had suspended the men, but saying little else. *

A Nueces County grand jury named lawmen in indictments returned last Friday. The indictments charged all three with official oppression, a misdemeanor. Rendon and Flores also were charged with felony counts of tampering with a governmental record. Flores additionally was charged with perjury, also a misdemeanor.

are here now. He's got offices, desks.



POCATELLO, Idaho (AP) - Grain dealer Robert M. Johnson will be flown to Texas, where he is accused of swindling Colorado, Texas and Oklahoma farmers out of \$2 million worth of wheat, according to federal author-

Johnson waived extradition on federal fraud charges Monday. U.S. Attorney Karl Shurtliff said early today he did not know when Johnson would be transported to Texas.

In Texas, Assistant U.S. Attorney R.H. Wallace Jr. said Johnson would not be returned before Wednesay, and might be arraigned in Texas Thursday, "but we're not sure yet." He said Johnson would be returned to either Wichita Falls or Fort Worth, with the decision to be made by U.S. District Judge Eldon Mahon, but not until Johnson is in transit.

Johnson's arrest Saturday in Rexburg, Idaho, ended a two-year FBI search for him. He had disappeared from his boat in the Gulf of Mexico in 1977 and was reportedly drowned. But he was arrested after he ran a stop sign and a routine police check revealed he was wanted for the grain

Johnson disappeared Jan. 3, 1977, reportedly having drowned after falling off his cabin cruiser in the Gulf of Mexico. A short time later, 400,000 bushels of grain were reported missing from his elevator, Robert M. Johnson Grain and Molasses Co. of Iowa Park, near Wichita Falls.

About 300 Texas, Oklahoma and Colorado farmers claimed in federal bankruptcy court they lost nearly \$2 million in grain entrusted to the Johnson brothers.

His brother, Henry C. Johnson, was sentenced to 16 years in federal prison after being convicted of issuing false grain receipts in the same case.

Earlier, commissioners had talked at length with Sheriff Dallas Smith and tentatively agreed on a plan for his office which would incorporate pay increases based on a deputy's rank, education and state law enforcement certification.

Following the initial discussion, Wright said he did not believe the county could set aside the 6.26 percent of employee salaries requested by the committee for individual raises, claiming that most of that figure had been incorporated into the commissioners' raise plan.

All of the discussion in Monday's budget study was only tentative and is subject to change. Commissioners agreed to meet again to continue the budget discussion following their regular meeting next Monday.



# Victims of A-bomb's fallout taking government to court

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) - Thirty-four years after the explosion of an atomic bomb, hundreds of angry cancer victims in the path of fallout from dozens of nuclear tests are taking the government to court.

Many of the victims believe the Atomic Energy Commission lied to them when it said during the 1950s that dirty clouds of fallout drifting eastward from Nevada would do them no harm.

Former Interior Secretary Stewart L. Udall, representing nearly 700 cancer victims or their heirs in Utah, Nevada and Arizona, said he plans to file federal court suits in the three states, possibly by the end of the month.

The lawsuits will seek federal compensation for residents downwind who allege radiation from atmospheric bomb tests between 1951 and 1962 caused

"There's no doubt in my mind that the best strategy is to pursue this aggressively in the courts at the same time members of Congress are pressing for action in Congress," Udall said.

Many of his clients are terminal patients, Udall said. "That to us is a very compelling argument that the government should not make us go to court for

A bill introduced last week by Rep. Gunn McKay, D-Utah, seeks to open the way for government compensation to alleged fallout victims by admitting government liability in certain kinds of cancer in the fallout area. It would permit compensation to be set by the federal courts.

McKay said he hopes the House Judiciary Committee will hold hearings on the bill this fall.

Those persons represented by Udall and two other attorneys have filed claims with the Department of Energy seeking hundreds of millions of dollars in damages. The agency has six months in which to respond before-lawsuits can be filed.

Udall said White House attorneys told him in June it would be several months before the matter could be adequately studied and presented to President Carter for a decision.







### KAMPALA, Uganda (AP) — More than 300 people have starved to death in northeast Uganda in recent months and tens of thousands are suffering from malnutrition, travelers arriving from there reported The sources said hungry Karamojong tribesmen are using hundreds of machine guns, bazookas and grenades looted from the army barracks at Moroto to raid herds of neighboring tribes. The Karamojong are the dominant cattle-raising tribe along the borders of Sudan and Kenya. # Alpine trading post fulfills man's dreams

chard Allen passed through Alpine on a family tour of Big Bend National

He was a kid from Houston.

The mountains, serenity, scarcity of people, comfortable climate and the freedom afforded by the spaciousness made him breathe easily and feel good; he was impressed.

"I fell in love with this area right quick," Allen, now 37, said in the comfort of his spacious log cabin on the outskirts of Alpine, near the foothills of Twin-Peaks Mountain. 'The whole family just fell in love

And so, about 20 years later, Allen gave up a successful printing business and clown act in Houston, designed and built a log cabin-trading post with the help of the bank, family and others, and settled down in Al-

That was about a year ago.

"WE FIGURED we'd retire in this place," Allen said of the 4,400-squarefoot log cabin, which he has dubbed "Apache Trading Post." The post represents his livelihood here. "So, we decided to do it right.'

He got beetle-kill spruce logs from Colorado to make the building's walls 51/2 inches thick, covered the roof with cedar and sheet metal and ended up with a three-bedroom rustic. Western-styled house, replete with living room, kitchen, baths, work room, office and a 1,600-square-foot showroom for his wares: turquoise and silver Indian jewelry, leather goods, paintings and pottery, tanned skins, etchings and sculptures, Black Hills gold jewelry, branding irons, spurs, scrimshaw, rocks and fossils, aeronautical charts and relief maps and souvenirs for "everyone."

It's commercial, naturally, and is designed with the tourist in mind. The showroom boasts a 16-foot high ceiling, old-fashioned ceiling fans and

a definite Old West aura. It's just part of the home place.

IN HOUSTON, the 6-foot-4 Allen did some clowning for McDonald's Restaurants.

"I'm a retired Ronald," he said. Before he sold his Houston printing business, Allen figured on making friendly inroads in Alpine by way of his father, Duncan G. Allen, a real estate appraiser, who already had settled down in Alpine.

His father started dropping around the name "Apache Trading Post" and opened a little shop just "to get the name established" and to get a reputation for fair dealings.

Coming down with Allen were his artist-wife, Peggy, and their children, Tami, 16, and Russell, 12. With Allen's father more or less

acting as the vanguard, Richard Allen found he had an "easier acceptance" in this town of 6,000 people. "People in a small town some-

times have a tendency to watch and wait and see what kind of person you are going to be." He got accepted by the townfolks, it

seems, and was well received by the "establishment," as evidenced in his being named co-chairman of the Al-





# First tornado hits Cheyenne

CHEYENNE, Wyo. (AP) — Stunned by Cheyenne's first tornado in history, residents today resume searching the rubble of more than 200 homes in affluent sections of the city.

The twister injured 37 persons, five of whom were hospitalized. A 14-month-old boy, David McKinnon, died of head injuries when his family's mobile home was torn apart, authorities said.

"No one ever thought we would ever have a tornado in Cheyenne, Wyoming," Mayor Don Erickson said, "but we had one.

The twister bounced across Cheyenne about 3:40 p.m. Monday, departing the city about half an hour later and leaving what Erickson estimated to be more than 200 damaged homes. The mayor said his estimate of the damage was "a very wild estimate. It's not scientific in any regard.

He said the funnel cut across a two-block wide area for four to five miles within the city limits. "It hit more than once," he said. "It might have hit half a

As the twister came close, Norma McClellan urged her two teen-age children to get in the car and outrun it, but her son disagreed. The family took shelter in their basement, and when the sound ended, came upstairs to find their home destroyed. Nearby, three children alone in their home took

the same action. "The Lord was good to us," said their mother,

Diana Coles. About a mile east of the McClelland and Coles homes, Joe Griego was searching through the rubble of his home. His wife was crawling across the debris. "I've got to go get my diamond earrings," she said. They're the only thing I have left."

Gov. Ed Herschler asked President Carter to declare the ravaged blocks disaster areas, qualifying residents for emergency federal relief, Erickson said.

About 300 National Guard troops were assigned to the area to help provide relief and prevent looting. Several Dallas retail

Earlier, Capt. Merv Mydland of the Wyoming
Disaster and Civil Defense Agency said 150 houses in
the expensive Buffalo Ridge area were heavily damaged and 45 to 50 were destroyed. He said the Buffalo Ridge Grade School was "almost gone," but no children were there.

At the Cheyenne trailer court only debris could be seen. In several blocks of Buffalo Ridge and the nearby Nimmo Addition, some homes were leveled and the walls of others stood shakily. Remnants of the neighborhood were strewn across the prairie north of Chevenne

Erickson said he had no damage estimate. "It's going to be very, very expensive," he said.

The tornado also struck the National Guard Armory at the northern end of the city airport and narrowly missed the governor's mansion.

# Dallas police comply by resetting thermostat

DALLAS (AP) — Perhaps it's only fitting, but the Dallas Police Headquarters Building might have been the only public place that complied Monday with President Carter's directive that thermostats be set at 78 degrees.

A spot check showed settings in the building at the proper mark, even though actual thermometer read-

ings generally registered 73 to 74 degrees.

At City Hall, readings were around 75 degrees, but cold air blowing from air conditioning outlets was

measured at 66 degrees.

Several retail store operators said they would eventually comply with Carter's directive, aimed at saving energy.

"It doesn't make that much difference," said David Gore, manager of the Old Spaghetti Ware-house restaurant. "Especially if you have fans."

hasn't been the least bit bashful in making known his oppostion to the SALT II treaty as presently written, believing that it favors the Soviet Union in virtually every provision.

Since initially making known his opposition, the senator has written for publication an article providing a candid assessment of the treaty, which now is being debated in the Senate.

In his article, Tower said the Vienna Summit of June 1979 brought forth a new Strategic Arms Limitation Treaty, "but little else - and certainly no surprises."

"Hailed amidst the nowaccustomed pomp and ceremony as ushering in a new era of peace and stability," Tower continued, 'SALT II is purported to have been carefully drawn over several years to meet, in every critical respect, the national security interests of the United States. It does not meet that objective. It merely creates a false and dangerous illusion of that accomplishment. Indeed, ratification of the agreement in its present form by the Senate of the United States would essentially codify a position of strategic inferiority for this nation vis-a-vis the Soviet Union.'

He said that although the treaty was only officially submitted to the Senate after Vienna, ample Administration revelation of its terms in advance of the signing produced significant opportunity for the study of its contents. The studies have brought many expressions of grave concern, he said. In apparent recognition of this concern, Tower continued, both Mr. Carter and the Soviet leaders have engaged in frequent rhetorical pressures of their own by presenting the treaty to the Senate on a take-it or leave-it basis .... "But, the Senate - each Senator — will fulfill its collective constitutional duty of advice and consent. In the debate on SALT II, we will not be threatened by ultimatums from whatever source."

Tower went on to say, "SALT II is seriously flawed. It is unequal in its levels of strategic capabilities; it does not constrain major Soviet programs; and it is unverifiable in many respects. Verification, which has been the subject of greatest public attention is only one of several critical shortcomings .....

WASHINGTON - Now and then, a brave soul will step out of the shadows of government, stand in the glare of publicity and declare the truth to all who will listen. This may lay him open to the most depressing harassments, for our society has not yet outgrown the hoodlum ethos, which honors the man who covers up his boss' deviousness above the employee who exposes it. Here is the story of two men who dared to speak up.

witnesses. He noted that the Office of Management and Budget had threatened several witnesses during the export hearings. Such threats, he warned, "could very well be the subject of separate hearings.'

Perhaps emboldened by this encouragement, Brady proceeded to speak frankly: The export control system, he said, "is a total shambles." Shortly after his heretical testimony, he was bounced from his job. Yet sources told our associate Dale Van Atta that Brady had been testified so forthrightly

Brady wasn't actually fired. He was given the post of deputy director of the export control unit — but only on condition that he not talk to Congress or the press without prior clearance from his higher-ups. Our sources say he hasn't yet agreed to this condition. When we contacted him, Brady said

he couldn't comment on either his secret congressional testimony or his present job situation. Dennis Bossard - He was a court

stenographer who refused to be bullied into lying to cover up an improper remark by U.S. District Judge John H. Pratt. For defying the judge and sticking to the truth, Bossard was fired. As we reported earlier, Judge

Pratt, aware of the impropriety of a remark he had made on the bench, sent his secretary to persuade Bossard to delete the remark from his transcript of the court proceedings. Destroying court records happens to be a felony, and Bossard quite rightly refused the request. Instead, he blew the whistle on Pratt.

During the subsequent FBI investigation of the incident, Pratt denied having an incriminating conversation with Bossard - unaware that the court reporter had secretly taped the conversation. Despite the damning evidence of the tape, both Pratt and his secretary got off scot

# **INSIDE REPORT:** Washington confidence drain felt in Moslem Mideast

By ROWLAND EVANS AND ROBERT NOVAK

ANKARA, Turkey — Turkey's feel-ing for the Soviet Union has switched from cold to warm during five years of fumbling American foreign policy, a sweetening up that is sour news for

The change is particularly disturbing because it coincides with growing hostility for the U.S. throughout the Moslem Middle East. It also underlines once again the lack of confidence in the U.S. that has shaken its allies

The switch was documented in an exclusive interview with Prime Minister Bulent Ecevit that was bluntly frank. The left-leaning head of government credited the "continuity and stability" of Soviet policy, not the punitive anti-Turkish measures of the U.S., for what he called the "different attitude" of Turkish public opinion toward the Soviet superpower along Turkey's 500-mile northern border.

"There has developed a lot of mutual confidence" between Moscow and Ankara, Ecevit told us over tea and cakes in his suburban, walk-up apartment. We now feel quite secure in this region, although it took long years of patience with the Soviet Union to convince our people that they (Moscow) have adopted a different atti-

Skeptics would never agree that the "different attitude" claimed by Ece-

vit is more than skin deep, if that. Indeed, illicit gunrunning from communist Bulgaria aimed at arming scores of radical-left terrorists and guerrilla groups points the other way: to the continuing, long-range Soviet objective here to replace American influence with its own.

What has changed is Washington. On his recent tour of the U.S. to discuss modernizing the antiquated weapons of NATO's largest European army, Turkish Gen. Kenan Erven was not amused to see the M-48 tank of Korean War vintage on display in the famous museum for old, forgotten tanks at Fort Knox. The M-48 is still Turkey's main battle tank, and it is a tin toy compared to the dreadnaughts across the border in

Russia and Bulgaria. The tin toy that passes for a tank is not unique here. Turkey's air defense still depends on optically-targeted

anti-aircraft guns - there are no Hawks, Red Eyes or Vulcans here.

For defense against attacking tanks, the wire-guided TOW anti-tank missle, which the-U.S. gave to Israel over six years ago, has not been seen in Turkey. The air force here still flies the F-86 and F-100; the backbone of its navy is still the Fletcher-class destroyer, retired from the U.S. Navy many years ago.

Modernizing this force at huge but belated cost is a top priority of the U.S. embassy, but the Turkish government is losing confidence in President Carter's political follow through, both with Congress and his

own bureaucracy. This partly accounts for Ecevit's cautious reaction to Jimmy Carter's pressure for approval to fly the U-2 through Turkish air space to help the U.S. verify Moscow's compliance with SALT II. DR. NEIL SOLOMON Delaying hazardous

Dear Dr. Solomon: When I was married 35 years ago, most women I knew had their children while still in their twenties or early thirties. Among the young people today - my own children included - there appears to be a trend towards waiting longer before starting families. Isn't it hazardous for woman to delay having a child?-Mrs. E.W.

Dear Mrs. W.: The National Center for Health Statistics confirms your observation that many women are starting families later these days. According to their figures for 1976, the latest available, the birth rate for women 30 to 34 years of age who had their first child rose 21.9 percent over the 1973 rate; for women 35 to 39 years old having their first child, the birth rate rose 11.7 percent during the same period. By "birth rate," I'm referring to the number of live births per 1,000 women of a certain child-bearing age

Postponing pregnancy does have certain hazards. Prolonged use of birth control measures, for one thing, may mask a fertility problem. In addition, when the cervix has not been dilated by pregnancy, the menstrual flow can sometimes back up. This, in turn, may result in adhesions and blocking of the fallopian tubes. The condition generally can be corrected surgically or with drugs.

Other potential complications of late pregnancy include toxemia, high blood pressure, and kidney disorders. Moreover, for the baby there is the added risk of Down's syndrome (mongolism), which increases from one in 1,500 children born to women in their twenties, to one in 300 children for women 35 to 39 years of age. The figure jumps to one in 50 children for women who give birth after 40. Down's syndrome can now be detected during pregnancy-by means of amniocentesis, a process in which fluid is drawn from the womb and tested, and therapeutic abortion is possible if abnormalities are detected.

Women in increasing numbers apparently are deciding that the delay in starting families, which gives them time to establish themselves careerwise and helps them function more maturely as parents, is worth the





# Four areas gain drillsites for wildcats

# Banning of major firms meets with resistance

WASHINGTON (AP) - A renewed effort to restrict entry by major oil companies into the coal and uranium industries met with resistance in Congress today

Rep. Morris Udall, D-Ariz., leading advocate of the restriction, called a hearing of a House Interior subcommittee to consider his bill, but every other congressman present voiced either reservations or strong disapproval to the idea. One antitrust official of the Federal Trade Commission voiced qualified

support while another from the Justice Department opposed the bill. "The best way to develop our energy resources is to have vigorous competition in the energy industry," Udall said. "I would hope the pattern of more and more holdings by the Big Eight oil companies of federal coal and uranium leases would stop."

His bill, similar to one that died in the last Congress, would freeze the major oil companies' interests in coal and uranium reserves as of Dec. 31,

Rep. Mickey Edwards, R-Okla., called it "a non-solution to a non-prob-Edwards said restricting oil companies' entrance into coal and uranium production "would restrict efforts to achieve energy indepen-Rep. Ron Marlenee, R-Mont., expressed skepticism. "We should not

act on the basis of an anti-oil company feeling," he said. Udall did have the support of Alfred Dougherty, chief antitrust officer of the Federal Trade Commission. "The growth of a competitive energy market may be threatened by the leading oil companies' growing int5rest in non-petroleum energy industries," Dougherty testified.

He said major oil companies, which have been increasing their interests in coal and uranium development in recent years, might hold down production of these energy sources to avoid competition with their major petroleum holdings.

# Energy plan's future depends on profits tax

WASHINGTON (AP) - The future of President Carter's new energy program may well depend on what kind of windfall profits tax the Senate Finance Committee votes to impose on the nation's oil producers.

That tax would pay for most of the program, which, at a cost of \$142 billion over the next decade, is designed to reduce U.S. dependence on imported oil.

The tax plan recommended by the Carter administration would provide ample revenues for the program, as would a version passed by the House

But there is considerable doubt the Finance Committee, which traditionally has been friendly to the industry, will approve a large tax on oil revenues. The committee, which may begin voting on the tax next week, may instead opt for a program of its own emphasizing less government involvement in energy production.

If-upheld by Congress, such a move could force Carter to completely rethink his massive program, which includes government aid to produce 2.5 million barrels per day of substitutes for imported oil by 1990.

When Carter decided earlier this year to phase out federal price controls on U.S. crude oil, he proposed the windfall profits tax to soak up some of the billions of dollars that will flow to oil producers and owners as a result. That windfall will be created as the price of U.S. oil rises to world market levels.

The tax, which would take away a portion of future price increases that exceed the rate of inflation, is misnamed because it has nothing to do with profits. That point is not lost on opponents, who note an oil producer who made no profit at all during a given year still might have to pay the

Carter wants the tax to finance government assistance in development of oil from shale, tar sands and other exotic sources, and to help the poor pay their energy bills. The prevailing mood of the Finance Committee seems to be to allow the oil industry to keep a big chunk of the money if it uses it to produce more energy. The reasoning there is that the oil industry has the expertise to produce more energy and that a new government agency, such as proposed by Carter, does not. The windfall tax passed by the

House would produce an estimated \$69 billion from 1980 through 1984 for the "energy trust fund" proposed by Carter. In addition, removing price controls will result in sharply higher federal income taxes on oil producers and owners, but these taxes would go into the general treasury - not into the energy fund.

The Carter administration wants those increased income taxes - about \$25 billion over the five-year period to go into the trust fund to help pay for developing alternative fuels.

A second major change made by the House in Carter's bill also would significantly reduce revenues available for the energy trust fund by ending in 1990 the tax on newly discovered oil. Carter had recommended that portion be made permanent.

The House bill still would result in a permanent tax after 1990 on oil that is now subject to controls as well as to certain Alaska production and to "stripper" oil, which is from wells averaging 10 barrels a day or less.

In three days of hearings on the tax, members of the Finane Commitee have denounced it as more a revenuraising ill than as a solution to the nation's energy problem. But members have seemed unable to reach a consensus.

The chairman, Sen. Russell B. Long, D-La., insists that some sort of windfall tax will be enacted, if only as insurance against reimposing price controls on oil. But he doesn't necessarily mean the same tax Carter is talking about.

Long has not tipped his hand on what kind of a tax he wants, although he has said the basic 60 percent tax rate approved by the House should be cut back to the 50 percent level recommended by Carter.

# Many questions arise on Carter energy plan

WASHINGTON (AP) - If you thought President Carter could chase the energy problem away with a few magic words, forget it. High fuel prices and tight supplies are here to stay, Carter told the nation Sunday and Monday.

But he said his new energy program can reduce the dependence on imports that has exposed the United States to sudden shortages and drained its economy of some \$46 billion a year.

Carter's 10-year program would

cost about \$142 billion - money the public would pay in higher oil prices, siphoned back to the government through a proposed windfall profits tax on oil companies.

Here, in question-and-answer form, is an explanation of the main features

Q. Will it reduce energy prices? A. No. As Carter said Monday in Detroit, "No matter what I do, nomatter what Congress does, no matter what anybody does in the years ahead, the price of energy is going to go up." The main reason is that growing world economies continue to demand increasing amounts of limited supplies of oil.

Q. Then what good would the plan

A. If it is adopted by Congress and it works, the plan would improve the balance between U.S. energy supplies and demand. It would not reduce fuel prices, but it might limit hem as th nation relies increasingly on plentiful omestic eergy resource.

Q. What plentiful resources do we

have that we're not using? A. The United States has enough coal to serve its energy needs for centuries; large amounts of shale containing kerogen, a waxy material that converts into oil when heated; natural gas locked up in tight sands and other hard-to-produce formations; sunlight that can be converted into heat or electricity; land for crops that can be fermented to produce alcohol; and asphalt-like "heavy oil" that can be pumped out of the ground only if it is softened up by heating.

Q. Why haven't these resources been developed?

A. Partly because of technical problems, but mainly because they are more expensive to produce than

Q. How would Carter's plan change

that? A. It would accept the high cost of alternative energy sources and subsidize their development to protect the nation's economic independence.

Q. You mean some government agency would go into the energy business?

A. No. Carter proposed establishing an independent, government-chartered Energy Security Corporation to finance development of new energy sources. It would use about \$88 billion for development projects, investments, price supports, or guaranteed purchases. Heavy oil would not be financed through this corporation, but would be exempted from price controls and a proposed "windfall prof-

Q. Would the corporation subsidize

oil and gas production? A. No. Congress and the president already have begun the staged removal of price controls from oil and gas, and Carter thinks rising prices will provide incentive for continued production. In fact, he is urging passage of a "windfall profits tax" because he believes oil companies could make more money than they need. Q. Why doesn't he make the oil-

NEW ORLEANS (AP) - Current construction of the superport being built off Louisiana won't be affected by President Carter's pledge to freeze oil imports, but the need for some planned expansions might be eliminated, LOOP officials said Monday. The port is being built in deep water

south of New Orleans to accommodate huge tankers that are too big to come up the Mississippi River. Current plans call for finishing the

first phase - which would give the port the capacity to unload 1.4 million barrels of crude oil a day from supertankers - by the end of next year. The second and third phases bothwill add million barrels a day to the

# Thomas to present **Hearst Americanism** award in Houston

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind.-The William Randolph Hearst Americanism trophy will be presented for the 41st consecutive year at the 1979 American Legion National Convention Aug. 17-23 in Houston.

The trophy was established by the late newspaper publisher and approved by the American Legion's 1939 National Convention. It was first presented at that same national convention in Chicago, Ill.

The trophy will be presented by William C. Thomas, publisher of The Midland Reporter-Telegram, from the convention platform in Sam Houston Coliseum, at approximately 10 a.m., Aug. 22. The trophy will got to that department (state organization) of The American Legion judged by the Legion's National Americanism Commission to have done the best job of promoting and supporting the Legion's Americanism programs during the past year.

The winner will not be known until after the judging has been completed by the commission in the convention city.

During the first four decades of its existence, the trophy has been won by 11 different states, with the departement of Pennsylvania dominating the competition with 18 wins. For the past three years the trophy has gone to the American Legion of Maine.

# Florida governor inks death warrant

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) - Gov. Bob Graham today signed a death warrant ordering the execution of convicted murderer Howard Virgil Lee Douglas. His execution is scheduled to die at 7 a.m. July 26 at the Florida State Prison.

Douglas' lawyers promptly asked his Polk County sentencing judge to stay the execution so Douglas would have time to pursue his appeals. They claimed his trial did not follow constitutional guidelines. A hearing was set on the appeal for late today.

He was condemned to death by Circuit Judge William K. Love even though the trial jury recommended a life sentence. Love was not bound by state law to accept the jury's recommendation.

Douglas was condemned for the July 17, 1973 slaving of Jessie William Atkins Jr., who was abducted along with his wife at gunpoint. Atkins was struck in the head with the butt of a rifle and then shot at least once in the head.

Graham signed the death warrant at 8:09 a.m. today, according to his press secretary, Steve Hull. It was the fifth execution that Graham has ordered

So far, only convicted killer John A. Spenkelink has been put to death in Florida's electric chair under Graham's warrants.

Graham and the Cabinet heard Douglas' clemency plea earlier this year. The governor gave no indication at that time whether he would grant mercy or sign a death warrant

Douglas' mercy plea to Graham was the second time the 43-year-old convict had asked for commutation of his death sentence. He asked former Gov. Reubin Askew last year, before Askew left office, but Askew never indicated his decision. Graham and the abinet held another clemency hearing last sprin

Douglas was the eighth Death Row inmate con-demned by Graham. He signed Spenkelink's warrant last May along with one for Willie Jasper Darden Jr.,

whose execution was stayed by a sederal judge.

Last month, Graham ordered the executions of Robert A. Sullivan and Charles William Proffitt, but

# Census address records in bad form

WASHINGTON (AP) - Mailing questionnaires for the 1980 census may sound like a simple task for the Census Bureau, except for one problem: getting a list of 86 million current addresses.

Granted, once the forms are filled out and returned, they'll make a great list. But that's too late: The agency needs your address to send you the forms in the first place.

And there just isn't any up-to-date list of addresses for all 86 million American households. Other government lists are incomplete, bureau

officials say, noting that even the Internal Revenue Service doesn't hear from everybody.

The lists are extremely important to the census, explained Ray Bancroft of the bureau, because they will also be used to check on returns of the census forms. A few weeks after Census Day - next April 1 -

workers will be sent to homes that did not return the

forms in an effort to get the questions answered. Every 1 percent increase in returns saves the bureau \$2 million in follow-up costs, Bancroft said. In

1970 the return rate was 87 percent. "Anyone in direct mail will tell you that's amazing," he said. Based on test censuses earlier this year, Bancroft

said the bureau expects about an 80 percent return this time but hopes for more. Bancroft pointed out that the bureau pays the

postage for the forms to be returned, a \$31 million

The cities will be the easiest to deal with, officials say, because commercial mailing lists cover most major metropolitan areas.

The bureau has purchased 43 million addresses from commercial mailing lists at a cost of about \$500,000 and the Postal Service is checking these addresses for the bureau. About 6 million additions and corrections are expected. Each address is checked at least three times

before being used, said Bancroft. Such lists are expected to yield about 50 million addresses in 554 urban counties.

But the real problem will come in rural areas, the 2,488 counties that are simply too sparsely populated to be well-covered by commercial mailing lists.

So some 35,000 temporary employees are being hired to help compile these addresses and to visit many rural households to gather census informa-These workers have begun walking thousands of

miles of streets and roads asking each household for its mailing address. In urban areas, the census forms will carry only an

address, not a name. But names will be used in many rural areas because they are necessary to get the forms delivered on rural routes.

So once the bureau is done, it will have the ultimate in mailing lists. But thanks to the Privacy Act, it won't help anyone else, either direct mail firms or government agencies, because only the Census Bureau can use the information it collects.





New leader takes over Iraa

BAGHDAD, Iraq (AP) — President Ahmed Hassan al-Bakr resigned because of ill health and was replaced by Saddam Hussein, vice chairman of the Revolutionary Command Council, the govern-

Bakr, who is 67 and has heart trouble, announced his resignation Monday in a nationwide address marking the 12th anniversary of the coup by the Baath Socialist Party.

Hussein, 42, has been considered the strong man of the government in recent years.

Lebanese cabinet half and half

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) - Prime Minister Salim el Hoss has assembled a new 12-man Cabinet to try to stabilize the battered nation. Seven members of Parliament and five technocrats were selected, with six of them Christians and six Moslems.

It is the second cabinet headed by Hoss, 49, a Moslem. His previous cabinet had been in office since the Syrian army intervened and ended Lebanon's 19-month cive war in 1976. It resigned May

Influence becoming a threat

GAETA, Italy (AP) — The American commander of NATO forces in southern Europe says the Soviet Union's growing influence in Africa and the Middle East poses a serious threat to the West's oil sup-

Speaking aboard the cruiser Albany, the flagship of the U.S. 6th Fleet, Adm. Harold E. Shear

"Should Soviet successes continue, the future conflict we all are striving to deter may well be won without a shot being fired as NATO and its lifeblood oil and resources are effectively separated by Soviet strategies."

African summit should be routine

MONROVIA, Liberia (AP) - President Anwar Sadat and other African chiefs of state arrived in the Liberian capital for a semi-annual summit meeting that is expected to break no new ground.

They flew in Monday for the 16th summit of the Organization of African Unity that begins today and ends Thursday. Sadat was preceded by three Egyptian air force planes and a jetliner filled with

President William R. Tolbert of Liberia, who is presiding at the meeting, welcomed them at the airport, along with an honor guard and thousands of cheering schoolchildren waving paper flags.

Libya and Algeria led an unsuccessful effort to bar Sadat from the summit during a 10-day foreign ministers' meeting preceding the meeting.

They also tried to wring a denunciation of Sadat's peace treaty with Israel, calling the agreement "an obstacle to peace in the Middle East.

Moderate African delegates said they intend to reject any attempt to condemn the peace treaty during the summit, although the final communique probably will include a swipe at the pact's failure to guarantee "national rights" for the Palestinians.

Egyptian Minister of State Butros Ghali told the pre-summit meeting, "The eloquence of the Algerian delegation appears to be proportional to Algeria's distance from the fighting front in the Middle

Egypt has borne the brunt of the fighting with Israel in the past three decades, with the Algerians and other so-called hardliners doing nothing more than providing verbal artillery. There are three main power blocs in the OAU, and

the failure of the ministers to resolve any of Africa's most divisive problems during the 10-day pre-summit session underlined the sharpening confronta-

One bloc is made up of countries that get much of their arms, aid and ideological backing from the Soviet bloc. They include Libya, Algeria, Ethiopia, Madagascar, Angola and Mozambique. Another consists of states tied culturally, econom-

ically and militarily to former colonial masters. They include Morocco, Kenya, Senegal, Ivory Coast and most of the other former French colonies. The third is made up of so-called neutrals and is

led by Nigeria, Tanzania and Zambia Most neutrals sided with the pro-West group against the Libyan-Algerian effort to bar Sadat from

They also opposed the pro-Soviet group's insistence on recognition for the Patriotic Front guerrillas fighting the new black-led regime in Zimbabwe Rhodesia, and preferred the summit call on the Front to make a new effort to negotiate.

There was a similar division over supporting guerrilla war by the South-West African Reople's Organization against South Africa and calling for a new attempt to seek a negotiated settlement based

on a Western-backed plan. The pro-West group also objected to the pro-Soviet group's idea for creation of an "Inter-African Defense Force" to intervene in disputes and help liberate the white-dominated countries of southern Africa. The pro-West group said such a force could become an instrument of Soviet influence.





Carter to propose new wage-price guidelines

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Carter says he will propose revised voluntary wage-price guidelines this fall that will be fairer to workers who have been losing ground to soaring inflation under the current 7 percent pay standard.

"I'll work...to make sure that future wage and price guidelines are fair," Carter told a convention of the **Communication Workers of America** in Detroit.

But the president also told the CWA delegates Monday that a fair wage guideline for workers must be balanced against the national need to combat inflation.

"I don't want to punish any working people obviously, but it must be remembered that everybody has to take the best interests of our nation at heart," he said.

Carter also said for the first time that he might consider a tax cut to head off a serious recession if unemployment rises above levels now anti-

Carter, who fielded questions from the union officials, did not go into detail about plans to revise his anti-inflation guidelines. But he indicated the wage standard would be raised to reflect sharp increases in consumer prices led by a near doubling of oil

Carter's comments were in response to repeated questions from delegates asking if it was fair to hold wage increases to 7 percent a year while inflation is running at nearly twice that rate

Carter's advisers currently are drafting revised guidelines designed to make the nine-month-old program fairer to workers and thereby address

organized labor's main objection to the anti-inflaion effort.

Although the Teamsters union freed the dministration to stretch the current guidelines to allow wage settlements of more than 7 percent a year, most labor leaders have complained that the program is still too rigid. As a result, the more powerful unions have ignored the guidelines in bargaining.

The price guidelines originally called for smaller price hikes than during the previous two years, but exemptions have been allowed since the program was announced in Octo-

While the administration is still debating how to alter the guidelines, changes under discussion include raising the wage standard above 7 percent or adopting a floating pay figure that would rise or fall with the inflation rate.

A revised program is not expected to be completed until August at the

Carter told the delegates his aides have been consulting with labor and business "to try to set wage and price guidelines that will be fair and equita-

He said the 7 percent wage guideline was "a reasonable figure" when first proposed last year. At that time, Carter was forecasting a 6 percent inflation rate for 1979. Now, the administration predicts inflation will be 10.6 percent this year and 8.3 percent

"In the fall, with this new rise of inflation that's been brought about by a doubling, almost, of the price of oil, we'll have to accommodate some of the new circumstances," Carter

Stiffer restrictions proposed on basis of nuclear mishap

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Senate, reacting strongly to last spring's atomic scare at Three Mile Island, is calling for new restrictions on the nation's troubled nuclear industry.

Senators voted Monday to shut down, as of June 1, 1980, all nuclear power plants for which a state has no emergency evacuation plan approved by the federal government. As many as 39 of the nation's 70 licensed plants could be affected.

Sen. Gary Hart, D-Colo., chairman of a key nuclear energy subcommit-tee, hailed the vote as "the first major reform resulting from the Three Mile Island (nuclear reactor) accident."

"The Senate would have failed in its nstitutional duty to protect the pub lic welfare if it had not adopted this measure and another major nuclear accident had occurred in a state which was not prepared to act," said

The next showdown in a continuing series of tests on nuclear energy was a Senate vote, arranged for today, on a proposal to declare a six-month moratorium on new construction permits for nuclear power plants.

"We cannot pretend the Three Mile Island accident never happened," sald Sen. Edward Kennedy, D-Mass.,

sponsor of the moratorium proposal. We must learn from it."

Pressure for stronger federal controls over the nuclear industry has been building in Congress since the March 28 accident at Three Mile Island near Harrisburg, Pa., raised the possibility of evacuation of tens of thousands of people

Both houses of Congress, as well as the Carter administration, have begun investigations of the accident.

The House of Representatives earlier this year rejected restrictions similar to the ones approved by the Senate. But the matter is almost certain to reach the House floor again this year.

The Senate debated the new restrictions as President Carter declared Monday in a speech in Kansas City that nuclear power "must play an important role in the United States to insure our energy future. The new controls the Senate voted

on the nuclear industry are contained in legislation authorizing \$373 million for Nuclear Regulatory Commission programs for the next fiscal year.

The plan the Senate approved Monday on a vote of 63-20 would require states to draw up evacuation plans acceptable to the NRC for each of the country's 70 plants.

Until sentencing, Estes won't know status of his parole

DALLAS (AP) - Billie Sol Estes, Temaining nine years. convicted last week on fraud charges, may not know until after his Aug. 6 sentencing date if the U.S. Parole Commission will revoke his parole on an earlier, almost-identical convic-

case scheduled for today was indefinitely postponed at the request of Estes' attorney, G. Brockett Irwin. William E. Amos, chief officer of

the U.S. Parole Commission in Dallas, said the hearing would be rescheduled after U.S. District Judge Robert Hill sentences the con man Aug.

Estes was paroled in 1971 after serving six years of a 15-year sentence for fraud. Technically, the commission could find his conviction last week a violation of his parole, and send him back to prison to serve the

and a \$20,000 fine.

But some sources indicated the parole commission may postpone any action until Estes' parole is up in January, when they would be powerless to act.

Estes was convicted Wednesday in federal court on two of five indictments charging he masterminded a scheme to defraud investors and conceal assets from the Internal Revenue Service to avoid paying \$10 million in back taxes. The maximum sentence on those charges is 10 years in prison

In 1963, Estes was convicted of a similar deal that crumbled his multimillion dollar empire and rocked political and financial circles acros the naton. His fortune, investigators discovered, was bedrocked on mortgages on anhydrous ammonia tanks

depend on other countries for

about 45% of our total supply. This heavy dependence on other. countries means that even small interruptions in our imported supply can cause severe problems here at home.

"Sorry, no oil for a while, we're having a revolution."

The unexpected revolt in Iran cut the world's oil supply by about 5 million barrels daily. Almost immediately, a world-wide scramble for the limited supply of oil still available took place. In the months that followed, some oil exporting nations did boost production somewhat, but not enough to off-set the world-wide loss.

"And what about today?"

Though oil is once again coming out of Iran, they are exporting only about 3 million barrels daily, less than two-thirds the amount exported before the revolution. Making the current supply situation even more uncertain is the fact that, except for Saudi Arabia, most of the other CPEC countries are unable or unwilling to increase production to make up for the Iran shortfall.

Events in other countries are not the only reasons why the world is coming up short-and why Americans are experiencing shortages at the pumps. But these events are a significant part of

Factors like refining capacity, increased demand, government regulations, environmental restrictions, and different qualities of crude oil have all played a role and all will be discussed in future communications.

"... And what about tomorrow?"

The fact is, we are consuming energy at an alarming rate. U.S. oil consumption has jumped by over 16% during the last three years, while U.S. oil production, including Alaska, increased only 3%.

While we cannot control the availability of oil from foreign suppliers, we can and must begin developing more of our own domestic energy resources. We must, at the same time, do everything possible to conserve the energy we have now.
