





These yields can be materially increased through the proper us soil-improving legumes and mineral fertilizers. Alfalfa, hairy vetch, sweetclovers, and Austrian winter peas are recommended on irrigated land in this section of Texas.

Leading agronomists of the state have ge third year to prepare recommendations for the most practical use of legumes and fertilizers. Profitable increases in yields of crops that follow legumes justify their key position in soil ment programs. When good growths of legumes are secured, they furnish protection against erosion, add nitrogen, and physical condition of the soil. The loss from cotton root rot is decreased on land where the disease is present. Best results from the use of legumes occur when the crop is returned to the soll and when they are used in combination with needed co
