

Operating Credit For Farms Is Increased

Dyer Building Construction Is Begun This Week

Construction of a new home for the Dyer Hardware and Furniture Company has been started. E. E. Dyer of the firm announced today. Workmen were pouring concrete for the foundation yesterday.

The building will be 50 by 140 feet in dimensions, of brick and tile construction. It will have an ornamental white brick and plate glass front.

Doc Wilhite is the contractor on the building, whose completion will require about three months working time, it was said. The building will be just north of the Cashway Grocery.

The Dyer store has been doing business in Muleshoe 13 years. The firm occupies a room of the Gupton building at the present time.

An old building which housed the first postoffice in Muleshoe was moved from the lots where the new building is going up.

Greater United Shows Coming Here For Week's Engagement

An increase in appropriations for farm operating credit for the fiscal year that began July 1, was announced today by L. J. Cappelman, State Director of the Farmers Home Administration, through Marvin C. Wilson, County Supervisor.

The amount for operating loans in Texas is 26,940,000,000, a 20 percent increase over last year's funds. "We expect to provide these loans to 2,500 more families this year than last," Mr. Cappelman said.

This agency is also authorized to insure farm real estate loans made by private lenders. For direct farm ownership loans in the State it has 3100,000.00 which is the same as last year.

Direct or insured farm purchase loans are available to qualified farmers tenants, sharecroppers, and veterans who find sound-value farms and who can't get the credit they need anywhere else. "Loans are made or insured only on farms that will pay out in terms of their long-range earning capacity," said Wilson, County Supervisor, said, "rather than at today's relatively high farm prices."

The Farmers Home Administration also has funds for water facility loans in the 17 Western States. Texas will participate in loans for water facilities in the amount of 3170,000.00.

Changes recently made in the insured mortgage program are designed to broaden opportunities for family-type farmers to become farm owners. Lenders now get 3 percent interest instead of 2 and one half percent. Borrowers pay 4 percent interest on both direct and insured loans, with the 1 percent difference in insured loans going to the Farmers Home Administration for insurance charges and administrative expenses. The agency services the loan without extra cost to the borrower or to the credit institution.

Lenders now have an assured market for the mortgages. From now on they may turn over the mortgages to the government after seven years, and be paid in full. It is felt that these revisions in the Bankhead-Jones Farm Tenact Act will provide a greater incentive to private lenders to help farmers buy farms.

As formerly, all types of loans will be accompanied by supervision in good farm practices, and veterans will continue to receive preference.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION
proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto another Section to be designated as "Section 69" to authorize counties of the State to provide insurance for county employees; providing for the Governor's proclamation, and submission to the electorate.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article III of the State Constitution be and the same is hereby amended by adding thereto another Section following Section 68, to be designated "Section 69" to read as follows:
"Section 69. The Legislature shall have the power to pass such laws as may be necessary to enable all counties of this State to provide Workman's Compensation Insurance, including the right to provide its own insurance risk, for all county employees as in its judgment is necessary or required; and the Legislature shall provide suitable laws for the administration of such insurance in the counties of this State and for the payment of the costs, charges and premiums on such policies of insurance and the benefits to be paid thereunder."
Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the date fixed by law for the General Election in November, A. D. 1948, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon "FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing Workman's Compensation Insurance for county employees," and "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing Workman's Compensation Insurance for county employees." Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter may vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.
Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

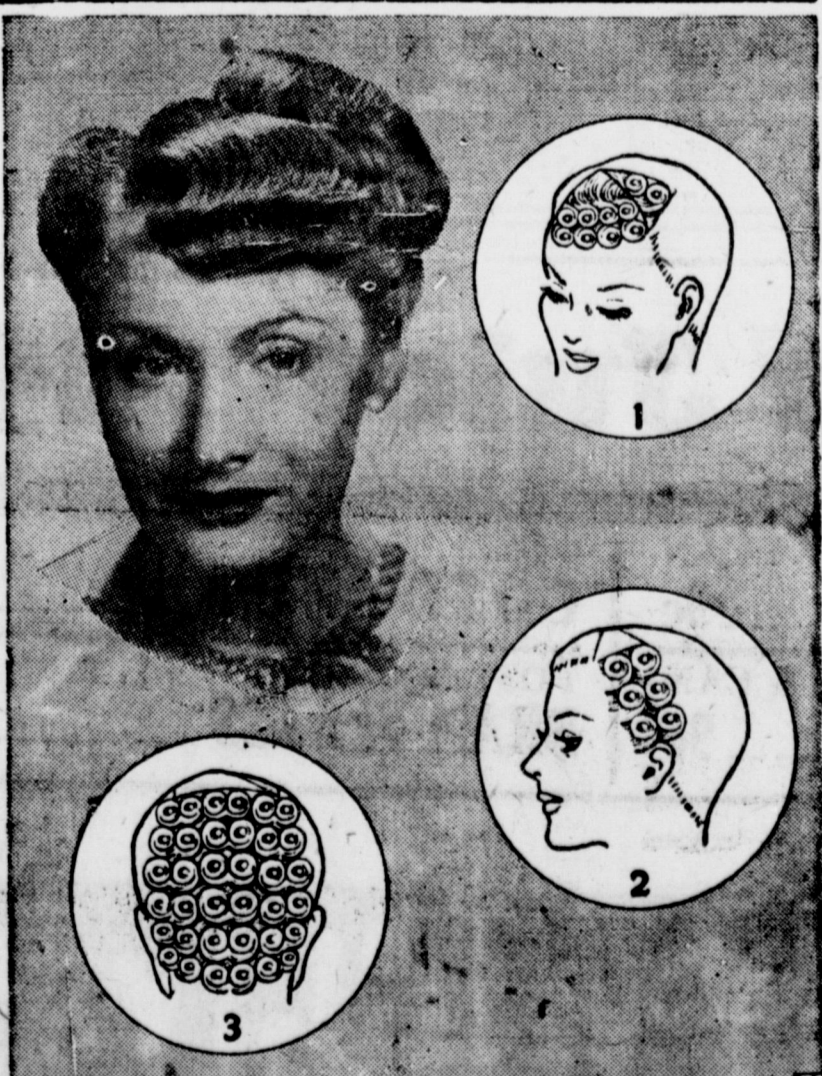

picture growing increasingly darker, according to George Clarke, managing director of the Texas Safety Association.

Most of the gloom is the result of an upsurge in the number of farm residents killed or injured in motor vehicle accidents, Clark said. The motor vehicle accident total for rural areas for the first five months of this year was 6,634, as compared with 3,852 for 1947, which showed a six per cent increase over the previous year.

"This indicates that farm people must be more careful on their way to and from markets, while pleasure riding, or while crossing the highways," said George Clarke. "It is true that more farmers are driving cars than ever before, but that only emphasizes the need of greater caution, courtesy, and common sense. Farm Safety Week should encourage farm people to brush up on their driving habits, as well as to check up on their own working and living habits and hazards around their farms."

Highlights of the Texas farm accident picture are:

If the present trend continues, 1,036 residents of Texas farms have or are slated for death as the result of accidents of all kinds during 1948. A disabling injury will strike some farm resident approximately every two hours in Texas during the balance of the year unless extra precautions are taken.

Inflationary-scarred Texans will dig deep into their pockets to pay \$35 per farm resident in the State for farm accidents this year, including fire, motor vehicle and property damage. This added cost will be reflected in increased insurance rates, extra taxes and in business lost because of death.

Cheese on the Shelf

Another entry to the handy shelf of ready-to-serve food in cans is processed cheese. Cheese packed in metal containers is not a new idea. Some was packaged this way before the war for export and domestic use. But the demand for cheese as a long-term shelf food is increasing. At present, the cheese is available in 14-ounce vacuum packed, key-opening cans. It requires no special refrigeration and may be stored on the food shelf with canned fruits and vegetables.

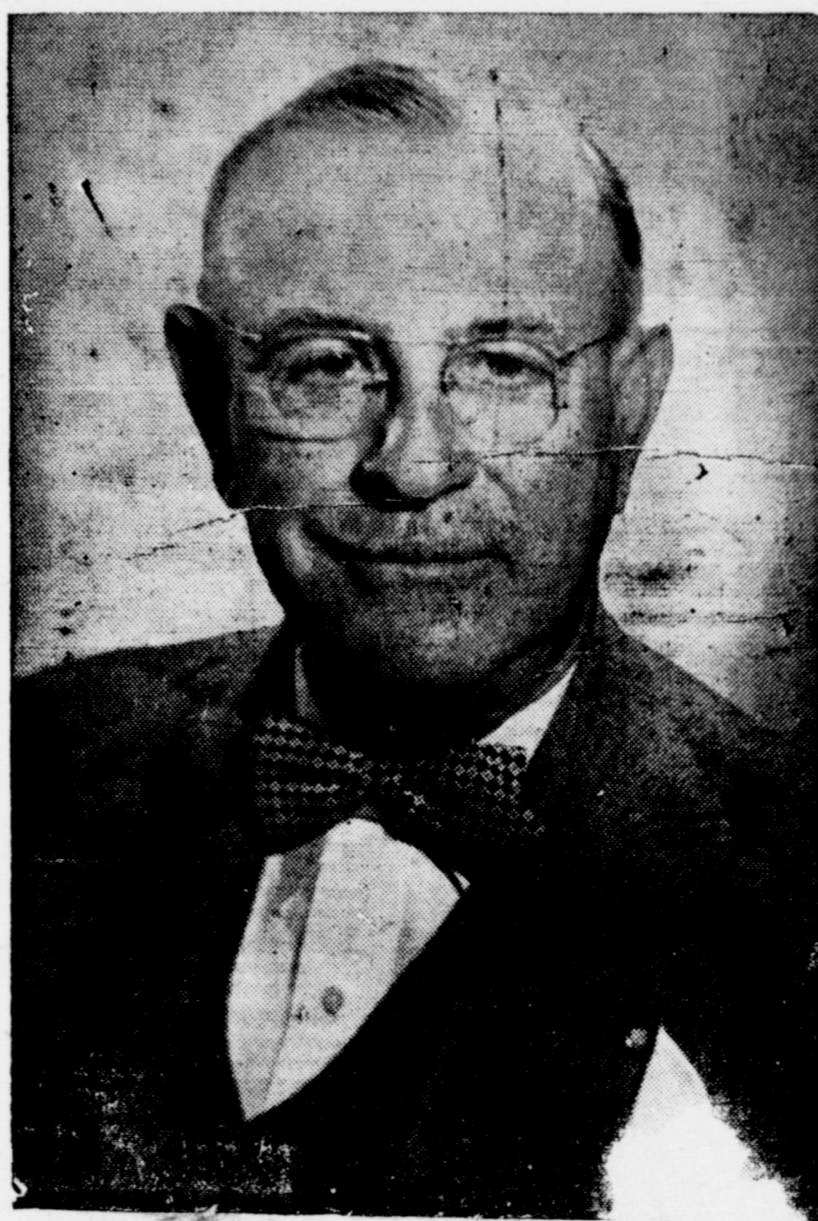

Big Loss From Pests

Losses in stored feed and grain will total 600 million dollars and the equivalent of 300 million bushels of grain unless control insecticides are sprayed or dusted, according to a department of agriculture report. Other insect losses cited include 150 million bushels of corn from the corn borer, 23 million dollars in cotton from the boll weevil. The annual loss from weeds has been placed at 3 billion dollars. Household pests, such as flies, mosquitoes, roaches, bedbugs and moths, cause inestimable loss in health and property damage.

One Smart Bird

The kiwi bird of New Zealand is a smart fellow. Knowing that worms come to the surface of the ground when it is raining, he imitates the sound of rain by stamping on the ground with his feet, thereby decoying up a meal.

Squash Lose Value
Squash lose about one-third of their carbohydrates in three months of storage and over 50 per cent when stored six months.

CROP ROTATION

Alternating production of various crops on a piece of land keeps the soil productive. In a good rotation, one crop or series of crops helps the next crop. For example, nitrogen, needed for plant growth, is added to the soil by legumes, such as clover, alfalfa, and cowpeas. These plants have the power to take nitrogen from the air and through their roots store it in the soil.

After they have rotted, the nitrogen can be used for growth by plants that do not have the power to fix nitrogen, such as corn, cotton, and potatoes.

Rotations are used with strip cropping by shifting the close growing strips and the tilled strips at fixed periods. In this way the soil is improved by the same cropping system used to stop erosion.

H. J. R. No. 3 A JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an amendment to Section 28 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to provide for a Board for apportioning the state into senatorial districts and representative districts in the event the Legislature fails to make such apportionment; providing for the issuance of the necessary proclamation by the Governor; and making an appropriation.

Section 28. The Legislature shall, at its first regular session after the publication of each United States decennial census, apportion the state into senatorial and representative districts, agreeable to the provisions of Sections 26, 26, and 26a of this Article. In the event the Legislature shall at any such first regular session following the publication of a United States decennial census, fail to make such apportionment, same shall be done by the Legislative Redistricting Board of Texas, which is hereby created, and shall be composed of five members, to-wit: the Governor, the Lieutenant Governor, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, the Attorney General, the Comptroller of Public Accounts, and the Commissioner of the General Land Office, a majority of whom shall constitute a quorum. Said Board shall assemble in the city of Austin within ninety (90) days after the final adjournment of such regular session. The Board shall, by a majority vote, apportion the state into senatorial and representative districts, as the failure of action of such Legislature may make necessary. Such apportionment shall be in writing and signed by three (3) or more of the members of the Board duly acknowledged as the act and deed of such Board, when so executed and filed with the Secretary of State, shall have force and effect of law. Such apportionment shall become effective at the next succeeding statewide general election. The Supreme Court of Texas shall have jurisdiction to compel such Commission to perform its duties in accordance with the provisions of this section. The Board shall receive necessary funds for clerical and technical aid and for other expenses incidental to the work of the Board, and the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall be entitled to receive per diem and travel expense during the Board's session in the same manner and amount as they would receive while attending a special session of the Legislature. This amendment shall become effective January 1, 1951.

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held throughout the state on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1948, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon: "For the amendment to Section 28, Article III of the Constitution of Texas providing for a Board for apportionment of the state into senatorial districts and representative districts in the event the Legislature fails to make such apportionment."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

Section 4. The sum of Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the treasury of this state not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

Each voter at such election shall mark out one of such clauses on the ballot, leaving the clause expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

No. 12 HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION amending Section 15 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto a provision that the husband and wife from time to time may in writing partition between themselves in severalty or into undivided interests all or any part of their community property, whereupon without prejudice to the rights of existing creditors the portion or interest set aside to each spouse shall be substituted a part of the separate property of such spouse; further providing that such Constitutional Amendment if adopted shall be self-operative and self-executing; providing for the submission of this Amendment to the voters of this State; prescribing the form of ballot; providing for the issuance of the necessary proclamation by the Governor; and making an appropriation.

Section 1. That Section 15 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows: "Section 15. All property, both real and personal, of the wife, owned or claimed by her before marriage, and that acquired by her after marriage, or that which she acquires by gift, devise or descent, shall be the separate property of the wife; and laws shall be passed more clearly defining the rights of the wife in relation to her separate property as that held in common with her husband; provided that husband and wife, without prejudice to the rights of existing creditors, may from time to time by written instrument as if the wife were a feme sole partition between themselves in severalty or into equal undivided interests all or any part of their existing community property, or exchange between themselves the community interest of one spouse in any property for the community interest of the other spouse in other community property, whereupon the portion or interest set aside to each spouse shall be and constitute a part of the separate property of such spouse. This Amendment is self-operative, but laws may be passed providing for the execution of such instruments, and providing for their recordation and for such other reasonable requirements not inconsistent herewith as the Legislature may from time to time consider proper. Should this Legislature pass an Act dealing with the subject of this Amendment, and prescribing requirements as to the form and manner of the execution of such instrument, such Act shall not be invalid by reason of this Amendment. HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION
proposing an amendment of section 1-a of Article VIII of the Constitution of Texas to provide that no ad valorem tax shall be levied for State general revenue purposes after January 1, 1951, and authorizing the several counties to levy additional ad valorem taxes for certain purposes, providing for a Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) residential homestead exemption, and providing for tax levies in counties having tax donations; providing for submission to the qualified electors and for the necessary proclamation by the Governor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 1-a of Article VIII of the Constitution be amended so as to be and read as follows:
"Section 1-a. From and after January 1, 1951, no State ad valorem tax shall be levied upon any property within this State for general revenue purposes. From and after January 1, 1951, the several counties of the State are authorized to levy ad valorem taxes upon all property within their respective boundaries for county purposes, except the first Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) value of residential homesteads, not to exceed thirty cents (30c) on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation, in addition to all other ad valorem taxes authorized by the Constitution of this State, provided the revenue derived therefrom shall be used for construction and maintenance of Farm to Market Roads or for Flood Control, except as herein otherwise provided.

Provided that in those counties or political subdivisions areas of the State from which tax donations have heretofore been granted, the State Automatic Tax Board shall continue to levy the full amount of the State ad valorem tax for the duration of such donation, or until all legal obligations heretofore authorized by the law granting such donation or donations shall have been fully discharged, whichever shall first occur; provided that if such donation to any such county or political subdivision is for less than the full amount of State ad valorem taxes so levied, the portion of such taxes remaining over and above such donation shall be retained by said county or subdivision."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the date fixed by law for the General Election in November, A. D. 1948, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon "FOR the Constitutional Amendment of Section 1-a of Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide that no ad valorem tax shall be levied for State general revenue purposes after January 1, 1951, and authorizing the several counties to levy additional ad valorem taxes, provided for a Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) residential homestead exemption, and providing for tax levies in counties having tax donations," and "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment of Section 1-a of Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide that no ad valorem tax shall be levied for State general revenue purposes after January 1, 1951, and authorizing the several counties to levy additional ad valorem taxes, provided for a Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) residential homestead exemption, and providing for tax levies in counties having tax donations." Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such manner that each voter shall vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

Soil 'Bank Account' Determines Returns

Check Up on Solvency To Assure Prosperity

Check up on your soil fertility "bank account." It's more important to you than the number of dollars you have in your commercial account.

Your present and future prosperity depends on your soil's crop producing ability. Crop producing ability, in turn, depends on the size of your soil fertility bank account—how you match deposits and withdrawals.

Every crop you sell carries with it nitrogen, phosphate, potash and

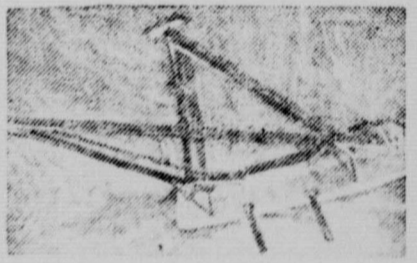


other plant nutrients. Unless you balance these withdrawals with good management "deposits" that replace nutrients, rebuild organic matter and repair damaged soil structure, your soil bank account will be overdrawn.

Among steps recommended for keeping your soil bank solvent are: Use deep-rooted legumes regularly in the rotation. Apply lime on the basis of soil tests. Use commercial fertilizer containing phosphate and potash as needed. Return manure, corn stalks, straw and other crop aftermath to the soil. Use contour cultivation and other conservation methods where necessary.

Just as you will get a notice if your checking account is overdrawn, lower per acre yield and higher per bushel costs will notify you if your soil bank account is being overdrawn.

Farm Bulldozer Blade



This bulldozer blade can be attached or removed from a tractor in three minutes. The blade was salvaged from a road scraper and the pins are old 1 1/2 inch galvanized dragline pins. The 4 clips which attach the pushers to the tractor are 1 1/4 or 1 1/2 inch flat iron which was bent into shape and welded to the pusher pins. Braces for the frame are 1 1/2 inch pipe.

Hampshire Sow Sets New Production Mark

Harriet, Lady Bess, 230 lbs., with the litter with 12 piglets, established a new production record for the Hampshire breed. This sow is the first to have made a 12 pig litter in the Hampshire county. She is five years old and has raised 15 pigs in eight litters. In her six other litters she has raised 63 pigs, an



average of 10.1. These pigs weighed a total of 418 pounds, 36 days after farrowing. She is owned by William C. Goodheart Jr., Estlin, Ohio. She was fed corn, oats, alfalfa and pelleted milk by products prior to farrowing. Her pigs were raised on a ration of seven parts corn and three parts oats with 8 per cent milk by products added.

Tests Disclose Silage Increases Hay Tonnage

Tests of haymaking methods show that considerably more tonnage of feed will be obtained from a meadow crop when it is put in a silo than can be procured by any other method of storing.

Analysis of field cured and mow cured hay and of grass silage show a larger percentage of protein in grass than in similar forage cured either in the field or in the mow.

Insects Destroy Grain In Bins

College Station.—In the past, some farmers have lost as much as one out of eight bushels of wheat stored in the bins.

"For 1 grain insect, once or twice a year if wheat is dry and the bins have been cleaned and disinfected, says Paul Gregg, assistant extension entomologist of Texas A. and M. Coll-

But with wheat dry and disinfected bins, you haven't done all to reduce the grain loss. This is only the beginning. Most important is keeping the insects out once you have rid the clean bins of them.

By inspecting the bins frequently, you can see whether any insects have flown or crawled into the filled grain bin. If you do find new comers,

you can kill them with a mixture of three parts of ethylene dichloride to one part carbon tetrachloride. In steel bins, entomologists recommend three gallons of the 3 to 1 mixture, or two gallons of the 1 to 1 mixture for each 1,000 bu. of wheat. These dosages should be doubled where wheat is stored in light, wooden bins.

Level off the surface of the grain at least six inches below the top of the bin before spraying the chemical evenly over the surface of the grain. If it is possible, the fumigant should be applied to the grain bins from the outside by means of a 1/2 inch or 3/4 inch type sprayer.

Gregg warns that these fumigants are poisonous to humans as well as to the insects, so persons using these chemicals are advised to use caution, and to avoid breathing their fumes, avoiding the liquid on themselves, and on their clothing.

By inspecting the bins for insects

and spraying when necessary farmers will have more grain in better condition for the millers, says the entomologist.

Start of Ice Business

The first long-distance ice shipment was sent in 1799 from New York to Charleston, S. C. The real beginning of the ice business came in 1805 when Frederic Tudor of Boston shipped a cargo of 130 tons to the West Indies. His first competitor, Gage, Hittinger and company, Boston, introduced ice to the people of London. This was natural ice from rivers, lakes and ponds, harvested in winter and stored for use in summer.

Stay on Leeward Side

The young of the white bass generally are found on the leeward side of the lake on a windy day, while older fish are almost invariably on the windward side.

High Psychiatric Loss
In active theaters of World II, the rate of psychiatric casualties was two or three times that of World War I. Chief cause of increase appeared to lie in the fact that warfare was more terrific in World War II than ever before and the mental hazards were considerably greater than those encountered in the trench warfare of 1914-1918.

Electric Block System
Thomas S. Hall in 1867 invented the automatic electric block system. First installation was made on New York and Harlem railroad. The wheels of the locomotive strike lever pivoted to the rail and this turn sets the signal at danger if the train is out of the block.

First Draft Law
First use of selective service, in America was in the court of Bath, N. C., when Royal Governor Hyde called all able-bodied men to the militia around 1710.

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
