## SGA results: Moses to be president




Suit filed by Lubbock against former AAG health administrator By NAOMI KASKELA StafF Writer

Alleged reluctance in producing information led to the City of Lubbock filing a lawsuit against former health administrator for the city American Administrative Group, Inc. According to court documents, the City of Lubbock initially entered into a contract with ICON Benefit Ad
ministrators in November, 2003. In 2006, AAG "assume the role of claims supervisor under the contracts between the city and ICON."
The lawsuit was authorized by the Lubbock City Council a its meeting Monday moming, said city attorney Anita Burgess "The lawsuit was filed in order to obtain access to records," she said.
The request for records stemmed from irregularities disco
ered by city staff according to the city ered by city staff, according to the city council Web site.
Burgess declined to comment on the nature of the it regularities.
"At this point in time, what I can tell you is that it would be speculative for us to try to say anything (abou the irregularities)," she said.
According to court documents, the City of Lubbock
tried to audit records from AAG in the past but it faced lack of cooperation by AAG representatives.
"In May 2005, the City of Lubbock, pursuant to direction of the then Assistant City Manager, Lee Ann Dumbauld, and pursuant to the terms of the Contracts, attempted to audit the files maintained by ICON," ac cording to court documents. "However, ICON refused to allow the City's auditors, Benefit Partners, Inc., to auat the City's right."
After the refusal, the audit was abandoned, but in Oc tober 2006, a letter was sent to AAG demanding rebates to the city in the sum of at least $\$ 212,852.25$. The letter also notified AAG another audit was forthcoming, accordin to court documents.
The second audit began in December 2006 because of the discovered irregularities, but representatives from
AAG were unwilling to cooperate, according to court documents.
Currently, the city is waiting for a response to be filed by AAG, Burgess said.
AAG still has time to file a response, at which time a Floyd Price council said comment on the lawsuit because hestrict 2, declined to enough information on the matter. Price said he left right after the travel out of state to another meeting. Representatives from AAG and the Parker Group, another business being audited by the City of Lubbock, could not be reached for comment.

## Former Navy sailor arrested for terror charge

WASHINGTON (AP) - A former Navy saitor was arrested Wednesday for allegedly releasing classified infor-
mation that ended up in the hands of a suspected terrorism financier.
Hassan Abujihaad, 31 , of Phoenix, is accused in a case that began in Connecticut and followed a suspected terrorist network across the country and into Europe and the
Middle East.
He was arrested in Phoenix on charges of supporting ter

 Abuiihaad, who is also known as Paul R. Hall, is charged in the same case as Babar Ahmad, a British computer specialist arrested in 2004 and accused of running Web sitesto raise money for terrorism. Ahmad is scheduled to be extradited to the U.S. to face trial.
During a search of Ahmad's computers, investigators discovered files containing classified information about the positions of U.S. Navy ships and discussing their sus ceptibility to attack
Abuiihaad, a former enlisted man, exchanged andity
winh Ahmad while on active duty on the USS Benfold, guided-missile destroyer, in 2000 and 2001, according to an affidavit released Wednesday. He allegedly purchased videos promoting violent jihad, or holy wa: In those e-mails, Abujihaad discussed naval military
briefings and praised those who attacked the USS Col in 2000, according to the affidavit by FBI Agent David Dillon.
The documents retrieved from Ahmad show drawings of Navy battle groups and discuss upcoming missions.

Police said they also found two bottles of unlabeled prescription drugs inside the vehicle. <br> Lubbock police arrested a suspect for aggravated assault following an alleged domestic dispute in the 5200 block of 41 st Street. According to reports, the suspect was arguing with an individual when the suspect revealed a shotgun. Police said the two fought, and the victim bit off a portion of the suspect's ear. After the suspect was cleared from treatment at the University Medical Center, he was transported to the Lubbock police | holding facility. <br> Lubbock police received a report of a burglary inside a residence in the 1700 block of Elkhart Avenue. Police said unknown suspects broke the front door to gain entry and stole a 42 -inch Magnavox television worth $\$ 1,000$ and a DVD player worth $\$ 60$. <br> Lubbock police received a report of a residence burglary in the 3100 block of 59th Street. | Violence <br> CONTINUED FROM PAGE 1 <br> constant text messaging to find out where a partner is and what he or she is doing. <br> High school and college-age individuals also frequently use e-mails to control a partner in a relationship, said Roy Rios, the Communications Director at Women's Protective Services in Lubbock. <br> According to the Red Flags Web site, a statewide survey of 16 -year-olds to 24 -year-olds showed that 75 percent of Texans in the age group have either experienced dating violence personally or know someone who has. <br> "That was very surprising to us," Hingorani said. "It's almost as prevalent as domestic violence." <br> The survey showed 60 percent of females and 40 percent of males had experienced dating violence, either as victims or abusers. Rios said men typically are viewed as the abusers, but that is not always the case. <br> "In our society, men are empow- | pack, and they're supposed to work hard and keep their families under their thumb. With that kind of mentality, it's especially difficult for a man to admit he's being abused, so a lot of it goes unreported." <br> Rios said despite the name, Women's Protective Services helps men also, but many men are embarrassed to ask for help. <br> "A man's role in society makes him embarrassed to reach out for help in a dangerous situation," Rios said. "There's help out there for them, but it's hard to say 'I need to call Women's Protective Services for help."' <br> Jerica Timmons, a sophomore education major from Pampa, said she would not know what to do if a friend in an unhealthy relationship asked her for help. <br> "I guess I'd try to give her good advice," Timmons said. "If she goes to church, maybe she could go to a preacher, but other than that, I really wouldn't know what to tell her." <br> Hingorani said he wants all students to beaware of the RedFlags program because they may encounter an abusivé situation either personally or through a friend. | information because people in this age group go to their peers first for help," he said.
