Convicted priest sentenced to 25 years

EASTLAND (AP) - A former priest was sentenced Wednesday to 25 years in prison after being convicted of the aggravated sexual assault of an 11year-old boy in the early 1990s.

The Rev. Thomas Teczar, 65, was a priest in the Fort Worth Roman Catholic Diocese until his departure in 1993. He served in several parishes, including Ranger, where the victim was abused.

Teczar was convicted on three counts of sexual assault and one count of indecency with a child. He was sentenced to 25 years for each assault charge and 15 for the indecency charge; all sentences will run concurrently, the Fort Worth Star-Telegram reported.

Ex-con guilty in Fla. girl's slaying

MIAMI (AP) — A sex offender was found guilty Wednesday of kidnapping and raping a 9-year-old girl. and burying her alive in a case that led to a crackdown around the country on people convicted of sex crimes. Jurors deliberated about four hours before returning the verdict against John Evander Couey in the slaying of Jessica Lunsford, who was snatched from her bedroom in February 2005 about 150 yards from the trailer where Couey had been living. Her body was found in a shallow hole, encased in two black plastic trash bags.

SGA results: Moses to be president

For the second time in one week, Texas Tech students and candidates gathered in the Student Union Building basement to hear the results of the Student Government Association election Wednesday night.

Before the results were announced, Mason Moses, a presidential candidate, said he was anxious to find out the winner.

"I'm excited and happy it is over and I'm really excited to find out who won," Moses said. "It all depends on voter turnout. Hopefully if I did my job right, people got out and voted again."

Working in the same office, Moses said a friendly rivalry was created between him and Matt Fowler, the other presidential candidate.

Fowler, current SGA internal vice president, said he was optimistic and relieved about hearing the results.

"I worked as hard as I could," Fowler said. "I ran a good campaign, I ran a clean campaign, and I'm proud of everything that I did. The election results will come what may.'

Students waiting for the results became quiet as Ben Montecillo, the SGA chairman election commissioner, stepped up to the podium to announce the winners. He said 2,161 students voted in the run off election; a higher number than last year's run off.

Moses was announced president, winning with 57.68 percent of the vote. For external vice president, Taylor Hutcherson came out victorious earning 54.41 percent of the vote.

Suit filed by Lubbock against former AAG health administrator **By NAOMI KASKELA** STAFF WRITER

Alleged reluctance in producing information led to the City of Lubbock filing a lawsuit against former health administrator for the city American Administrative Group, Inc.

According to court documents, the City of Lubbock initially entered into a contract with ICON Benefit Administrators in November, 2003. In 2006, AAG "assumed the role of claims supervisor under the contracts between the city and ICON."

The lawsuit was authorized by the Lubbock City Council at its meeting Monday morning, said city attorney Anita Burgess. "The lawsuit was filed in order to obtain access to

records," she said.

Council raises dating violence awareness

The Texas Council on Family Violence and Women's Protective Services in Lubbock are teaming up to promote healthy relationships and raise awareness concerning dating violence for both high school students and college students.

The family violence council has launched a program called Red Flags, which is designed to address dating violence in people ages 16 years old through 24 years old. "We want to educate youth about the signs of dating violence," said Jitin Hingorani, communications director of the Texas Council on Family Violence. "If they learn about healthy relationships, they're less likely to become victims of domestic violence." According to the "Red Flags" Web site, http://knowtheredflags.com, dating violence encompasses more than physical violence. It is a pattern of abusive behaviors, physical and emotional, that one person uses to control another in a relationship.

More than 100 survive jet crash

YOGYAKARTA, Indonesia (AP) - Survivors of the fiery crash-landing of a Boeing 737-400 Wednesday said the plane appeared to be going too fast and shook violently before it touched down, lurched off the runway and exploded in flames, killing at least 21 people.

About 115 dazed and bloodied survivors staggered from the Indonesian jetliner after it broke through a fence and came to rest in a rice paddy. Most escaped without major injuries, although several suffered burns and broken bones.

The request for records stemmed from irregularities discovered by city staff, according to the city council Web site.

Burgess declined to comment on the nature of the irregularities.

"At this point in time, what I can tell you is that it would be speculative for us to try to say anything (about the irregularities)," she said.

According to court documents, the City of Lubbock tried to audit records from AAG in the past, but it faced a lack of cooperation by AAG representatives.

"In May 2005, the City of Lubbock, pursuant to direction of the then Assistant City Manager, Lee Ann Dumbauld, and pursuant to the terms of the Contracts, attempted to audit the files maintained by ICON," according to court documents. "However, ICON refused to allow the City's auditors, Benefit Partners, Inc., to audit these files even though the Contract mandated this was the City's right."

After the refusal, the audit was abandoned, but in October 2006, a letter was sent to AAG demanding rebates to the city in the sum of at least \$212,852.25. The letter also notified AAG another audit was forthcoming, according to court documents.

The second audit began in December 2006 because of the discovered irregularities, but representatives from AAG were unwilling to cooperate, according to court documents.

Currently, the city is waiting for a response to be filed by AAG, Burgess said.

AAG still has time to file a response, at which time a court date will be set, she said.

Floyd Price, councilman for District 2, declined to comment on the lawsuit because he said he did not have enough information on the matter,

Price said he left right after the meeting on Monday to travel out of state to another meeting.

Representatives from AAG and the Parker Group, another business being audited by the City of Lubbock, could not be reached for comment.

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Former Navy sailor arrested for terror charge

WASHINGTON (AP) — A former Navy sailor was arrested Wednesday for allegedly releasing classified information that ended up in the hands of a suspected terrorism financier.

Hassan Abujihaad, 31, of Phoenix, is accused in a case that began in Connecticut and followed a suspected terrorist network across the country and into Europe and the Middle East.

He was arrested in Phoenix on charges of supporting ter-

classified information to unauthorized people.

Abujihaad, who is also known as Paul R. Hall, is charged in the same case as Babar Ahmad, a British computer specialist arrested in 2004 and accused of running Web sites to raise money for terrorism. Ahmad is scheduled to be extradited to the U.S. to face trial.

During a search of Ahmad's computers, investigators discovered files containing classified information about the positions of U.S. Navy ships and discussing their susceptibility to attack.

Abujihaad, a former enlisted man, exchanged e-mails

rorism with an intent to kill U.S. citizens and transmitting with Ahmad while on active duty on the USS Benfold, a guided-missile destroyer, in 2000 and 2001, according to an affidavit released Wednesday. He allegedly purchased videos promoting violent jihad, or holy war.

In those e-mails, Abujihaad discussed naval military briefings and praised those who attacked the USS Cole in 2000, according to the affidavit by FBI Agent David Dillon.

The documents retrieved from Ahmad show drawings of Navy battle groups and discuss upcoming missions.

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

"We want peers to be aware of this information because people in this age group go to their peers first for help," he said. "We want the peers to know about what we do and how we can help so they can suggest our services to someone who may need them. Our overall goal is to reduce violence in Texas."

Durant named AP's Big 12 player of the year

AUSTIN (AP) - The comparison was inevitable.

When Texas freshman Kevin Durant was scorching Big 12 opponents for 30 points game after game, it wasn't long before some wondered if the kid could pull off what Carmelo Anthony did and carry his team all the way to a national championship.

Anthony led Syracuse to the 2003 title as a freshman in his only college season.

"He just carried his team on his back," Durant said this week. "When he needed to hit a big shot, he hit it. That's what I want to do with my team."

Durant has done that all season, leading the league in scoring and rebounding and carrying No. 15 Texas (22-8, 12-4) within a game of a share of the Big 12 championship.
