

Appeals court rules out class action in Enron suit

NEW ORLEANS (AP) - A federal appeals court ruled Monday that Enron Corp. shareholders cannot proceed with a class-action lawsuit against investment banks for their alleged role in the accounting fraud that led to Enron's collapse.

The 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals opinion reversed a ruling by U.S. District Judge Melinda Harmon in Houston, who had said shareholders could sue as a class.

Bombs rock Baghdad, Kirkuk, killing 26

BAGHDAD (AP) — Bombs tore through a Shiite mosque during prayers in Baghdad and struck several targets in the oil-rich city of Kirkuk, killing at least 26 people Monday as suspected Sunni insurgents pressed their campaign on the fourth anniversary of the start of the war. President Bush pleaded for patience as he faced Democrat-sponsored legislation that effectively would require the withdrawal of American troops from Iraq by the fall of 2008.

Texas Tech athletics director presents \$80 million plan for sports facilities

The east façade will include the new ticket office, Red Raider Club, a hall of fame, athletic offices and an outdoor club.

Texas Tech Athletics Director Gerald Myers proposed an \$80 million renovation of several athletic facilities to the Texas Tech Board of Regents March 13.

The proposed renovations include upgrades to the football stadium, the baseball field and the softball field.

The plan involves renovating Jones AT&T Stadium by adding 30,000 seats, making the stadium a two-tiered bowl and moving the ticket office to allow for more seats. The visitors' side of the stadium will have a façade matching that of the home side, with 22 suites instead

Myers said the addition of seats will be a multi-step process and will be phased in over a period of 15 to 20 years. "Our immediate plans are to add 9,400 seats in the north end of the stadium and add a

façade and an office structure to the east side of the stadium," he said. "The goal is to mirror the building on the west side. We are looking to increase the capacity to about 63,000 (seats),



wet-style pet food was made by Menu sold throughout North America under 51 brands and cat food sold under 40 brands, including lams, Nutro and Eukanuba. The food was sold under both store and major brand labels at Wal-Mart, Kroger, Safeway and other

The FDA has yet to tally how many reports it has received of cats and dogs suffering kidney failure or death. The company has reported just 10 deaths, of nine cats and a single dog.

"We are still trying to find out what the true picture is out there of animals. We're talking about 1 percent of the pet food (supply) and it's really just impossible to extrapolate at this point," Sundlof said.

Menu Foods spokeswoman Sarah Tuite told Associated Press Radio the company was "still trying to figure out the cause."

"We're testing and testing, but we can't identify the problem in the product," Tuite said.


Other companies - Nestle Purina PetCare Co., Procter & Gamble and Hill's Pet Nutrition Inc. - said that as a precaution they were voluntarily recalling some products made by Menu Foods.

A complete list of the recalled products along with product codes, descriptions and production dates was available from the Menu Foods Web site, http://www.menufoods. com/recall . The company also designated two phone numbers that pet owners could call for information _ (866) 463-6738 and (866) 895-2708. The lines have been swamped by callers.

Tuite said the company has added more people and lines to cope with the calls. Callers who get a recording saying the line is out of order should try again, she added.

The company became aware of a potential problem after it received an undisclosed number of owner complaints that dogs and cats were vomiting and suffering kidney failure after eating its products.

Tuite told AP earlier the recalled products were made using wheat gluten purchased from a new supplier, which has since been dropped.

Sunni insurgents resilient despite crackdown

BAGHDAD (AP) — Sunni insurgents, resilient despite the five-week security crackdown in the capital, killed at least six more U.S. troops over the weekend. A Sunni car bomber hit a largely Shiite district in the capital Sunday, killing at least eight people.

The American military said four U.S. soldiers died and one was wounded when the unit was struck by a roadside bomb in western Baghdad. During the ongoing security sweep in the capital and surrounding regions, the soldiers' battalion had found eight weapons caches and two roadside bombs and helped rescue a kidnap victim, the military said

A fifth soldier was killed in an explosion in Diyala, an increasingly volatile province just northeast of the capital. A Marine died in fighting the same day in Anbar province, the vast, largely desert region that sprawls west of Baghdad to the Saudi Arabian, Jordanian and Syrian borders. The regions are controlled by the Sunni insurgency.

All of the U.S. victims were killed on Saturday, the military said in a series of statements that also reported that a seventh soldier died from non-combat injuries but gave no other details.

While U.S. and Iraqi troops have flooded the Baghdad streets and a heavily armored American column was sent north to adjacent Divala province, attacks on American and Iraqi forces have been robust.

U.S., North Korea resolve Macau bank dispute

BEIJING (AP) - The United States and North Korea have resolved a dispute over \$25 million in frozen North Korean funds, clearing the way for progress in dismantling the North's nuclear programs, U.S. officials said Monday.

The U.S. nuclear envoy, Christopher Hill, said six-party talks — which resumed Monday — could now "move on to the next problem, of which there are many."

U.S. Deputy Assistant Treasury Secretary Daniel Glaser said the funds would be transferred into a North Korean account at the Bank of China in Beijing to be used for education and humanitarian purposes. Glaser said Pyongyang in had proposed the arrangement.

The funds, some of which U.S. authorities suspect may be linked to counterfeiting or money laundering by cash-starved North Korea, had held up progress in nuclear disarmament talks.

"North Korea has pledged ... that these funds will be used solely for the betterment of the North Korean people," Glaser said.

U.S. Embassy vehicle hit by roadside bomb

KABUL, Afghanistan (AP) — A car bomb exploded near a three-vehicle U.S. Embassy convoy on a busy road in Kabul on Monday, wounding several people, one seriously, officials said.

The blast, witnessed by an Associated Press reporter, badly damaged the front of one black SUV that was shunted to the other side of the road. First aid was administered to at least two people at the scene.

The other two vehicles in convoy also were damaged, close to the burning wreckage of the car where the bomb was apparently planted.

Joe Mellott, a spokesman for the U.S. Embassy, said several people in the convoy were wounded, one seriously. He did not identify them or say whether they were Americans. He said the U.S. ambassador, Ronald Neumann, was not in the convoy.

An initial alert over an embassy warning system said, "a U.S. Embassy convoy was struck by a suicide bomber in the vicinity of the U.S. Embassy," according to an AP reporter who heard the alert over the phone.

Senate seeks answers about firing of federal prosecutors

WASHINGTON (AP) - Republicans on the Senate Judiciary Committee say the Bush administration needs to be more straightforward about the White House's role in the dismissals of eight federal prosecutors.

"I've told the attorney general that I think this has been mishandled, that by giving inaccurate information ... at the outset, it's caused a real firestorm, and he better get the facts out fast," said Sen. John Cornyn, R-Texas. Sen. Patrick Leahy, D1Vt., the chairman of the committee, pledged to get the public testimony of White House officials involved in the case whether they want to testify or not.

On Monday, the Justice Department planned to turn over to Congress documents that could provide more details of the role agency officials - including Attorney General Alberto Gonzales - and top White House officials played in planning the prosecutors' dismissals.

The White House was also expected to announce this week whether it will let political strategist Karl Rove, former White House counsel Harriet Miers and other officials testify or will seek to assert executive privilege in

Wisconson man cleared of rape by DNA evidence

CHILTON, Wis. (AP) - Lawyers for a man who spent 18 years in prison for a rape he didn't commit say he has been wrongly convicted for a second time, this time in the murder of a photographer whose charred bones were found in a burn pit outside his home.

A jury convicted Steven Avery on Sunday of killing Teresa Halbach, 25, on Halloween 2005 near his family's salvage vard. Jurors rejected Avery's contention that he was framed by the same sheriff's department that b helped wrongly put him behind bars 6 for a 1985 rape.

Halbach disappeared Oct. 31, 2005, after going to the yard in rural Manitowoc County to photograph a minivan that Avery's sister was e' selling through Auto Trader Maga-⁹ zine. Avery had called that morning to request the photo, testimony is showed.

Avery, 44, put his head down and shook it when the verdict was read. He faces a mandatory life prison term. No sentencing date

Earmarks are more complicated than they seem

he week before spring break, Texas Tech Chancellor Kent Hance traveled to Washington, D.C., to lobby for research funding. According to an article in The Daily Toreador, it appears Hance was hoping Congress would appropriate money to Tech in the form of earmarks, despite a few problems.

"There is a lot of uncertainty right now concerning earmarks," Hance said in the article. "Some Democrats made campaign issues about earmarks, but I'm confident that though they may change the name, there will still be earmarks in the budget."

Hance went on to explain his opinion on earmarks. "We have received almost \$100 million in research funding from earmarks," he said in the article. "Earmarks are not a bad thing. It is nothing more than Congress saying, 'We want the money spent on this program.""

However, it's much more complicated than that.

Earmarks in the federal budget are a result of lobbyists and congressmen getting funding for special projects for their districts placed in appropriations bills while in committee. Once these bills are sent to the floor, they do not list 90 percent of the special projects and appropriations — only general categories.

Therefore, members of Congress literally do not know what they are funding. It's a sneaky, secretive process of getting money — and it has been rapidly increasing in the past few years. That's why, as Hance said, "some Democrats" talked about it in the campaign.

Off the top of my head, though, I can think of two pretty prominent Republicans who have made quite a big deal out of curbing earmarks. One of them happens to be the president of the United States.

In President George W. Bush's State of the Union Address, he said, "Next, there is the matter of earmarks. These special interest items are often slipped into bills at the last hour - when not even C-SPAN is watching." (He is such a hoot.) "You



didn't vote them into law. I didn't sign them into law. Yet, they're treated as if they have the force of law. The time has come to end this practice."

This must have been an important issue to the president if he decided to include it in the State of the Union. That's because he realizes the importance of balancing the federal budget. The latest numbers from the Congressional Budget Office project more than \$200 billion in deficits for 2007. Bush has proposed Congress eliminate the deficit in five years. One of the main ways he believes this can be achieved is to "restrain the spending appetite of the federal government."

Bush is exactly right. And so is another prominent Republican — the one man in the Senate who just about everybody knows as being the strongest fighter against earmark spending: John McCain of Arizona.

"We need to curtail earmarks ... not just disclose them. The process is clearly broken when each year Congress continues to earmark billions and billions of taxpayer dollars," McCain recently said on the Senate floor. "The American public ... deserves better."

McCain discussed how earmarked funding had exploded during the 12 years of Republican congressional control. The budget included 4,126 earmarks in 1994, but in 2005, there were 15,877 earmarks — nearly a 400 percent increase. He said during the last three years, we've seen the largest number of earmarks in the nation's history, and the dollar amount has more than tripled in the past decade to \$64 billion for the 2006 fiscal year.

"This is wrong and disgraceful, and we urgently need to curtail this seemingly out of control pork-barreling practice that has become the norm around here," McCain said.

Why is earmark spending bad for the country? It undermines democracy

While this particular funding promoted by the chancellor may be good for Tech, and even good for the country, plenty of other programs ments. known as "pork-barrel" spending are wasteful and take away funds from the important programs — such as ours. CARTAGENA, Colombia (AP) - Gabriel Garcia Marquez was mobbed Monday when he appeared at a luncheon during a meeting of the Inter American Press Association.

The publicity-shy Nobel literature laureate arrived just as the richest man in the world, Bill Gates, was leaving the meeting. But the author clearly wished he had the security detail afforded the Microsoft chairman to fend off overzealous admirers.

Garcia Marquez, whose "Hundred Years of Solitude" is considered by many as a Spanish-language classic, is a national icon in his native Colombia. People treated him like a museum piece as he dined with journalist friends in a big tent at the event. Dozens jostled with police officers standing guard to have their pictures taken with him and to have books autographed.

Garcia Marquez, known endearingly as "Gabo," has in recent years shunned interviews assiduously - even with journalists he knows well.
