## O. M. Self Named FHA Director

Appointment of O. Manuel Self, Route 2, Muleshoe, to a three year term on the Farmers Home Administration county committee for Bailey County was announced today by L. J. Cappelman, State Director.

Mr. Self succeeds Henry E. Schuster whose term expired June 30. Also on the committee are Troy Atkinson, Muleshoe, and Walter Dameron of Circle Bay.

A committee of three serves in each agricultural county through out the nation in which the agency makes farm ownership and operating loans. Appointments are scheduled so that a committee always has two experienced members.

The Bailey county committee has an important place in making supervised credit available to local farmers, according to Marvin C. Wilson, County Supervisor.

Before any money can be borrowed through the agency an applicant must have the approval of the county committee. In the case of farm ownership loans, the farm to be purchased, enlarged or improved must also be approved by the committee.

"The members know agricultural conditions in the county, are often familiar with the farm the applicant plans to operate," Mr. Wilson explained.

In addition to approving loans the committee cooperates with the county supervisor in overall administration of the program in the county. Periodically they review the progress of borrowers to determine whether they have reached a financial position that would enable them to refinance their loans through private lenders. A farmer who is eligible for credit from regular lending sources is not eligible for a loan from the Farmers Home Administration.

"Using this system of operation, the agency has helped 650 families in Bailey county toward better farming and better living with farm purchase and farm operating loans," Mr. Wilson said. In the past 12 months 200 applications have been received for this type of credit.

**THE PROBLEM OF EROSION**  
W. E. Moore of the Soil Conservation District has furnished us with a copy of a USDA booklet entitled Our American Land and

from its interesting pages we lift the following from the article under the above title:

**What is Erosion?**  
Soil is not permanent. Under many conditions it is extremely unstable. When wind or water move across bare earth they usually carry some soil with them. They may move it hundreds of miles or only a short distance, but eventually they carry away large amounts of soil unless it is tied down.

Dense plant growth helps to slow down this soil movement. This gives nature time to replace what little soil is removed by erosion. Nature does this by constantly forming new topsoil from underlying subsoil and rock. This slow process, known as "natural erosion" or "geologic erosion," goes on unnoticed over hundreds of years. This type is not dangerous usually; it may be beneficial to man and the earth. Many fine agricultural areas have been formed in this way.

But where land is cultivated or left bare, another and faster kind of erosion occurs. This is accelerated

erosion, and it is caused by man's carelessness. When land is cultivated there is no dense growth of plants so erosion may be a thousand times faster than on protected land. Accelerated erosion damages grass lands when the grass is thinned out by overgrazing. It damages woodlands left bare by overcutting, overgrazing and burning. This is what we now know as soil erosion, and unless it is checked it may ruin our good land.

**What has happened to our land?**  
Man seems to have a habit of wasting the gifts of nature. Nowhere has our waste been greater, however than in our misuse of land. A survey made in 1934 indicated that we had let erosion badly damage or ruin about 282 acres of the country's crop and grazing land. Another 775 million acres of our crop, grazing, forest and other kinds of land had eroded to some extent. This is tragic, because so many families have lost a means of earning a living. It is tragic because productive land is the basic resource from which future generations must live. Generally the worst erosion has taken place on the farm lands of southern United States where erosion goes on at all seasons. Much of the topsoil has been removed from large areas across the nation and the less productive subsoil is being farmed in many places.

**How fast is our land being damaged?**  
Today the Corn Belt is one of the larger areas being rapidly damaged. Throughout the country about 110 million acres of cropland, on farms that cover about 260 million acres are now being damaged at a critical severe rate. This means that yields from about a fourth of the land now used for crops will be considerably lower within 10 years, if present farming methods are continued.

Another fourth of the land now used for crops is eroding at a less rate, but still serious rate. The present productive level of this land will

decline within 15 to 20 years unless it is farmed with effective conservation methods.

Present erosion damage to the remaining half of our land now in crops is going on at rates much less serious. This does not mean that the land is producing all it can. Better farming methods, in fact, would increase production on much of it.

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**

H. J. R. No. 35  
HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an amendment to Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide that Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) of the assessed taxable value of all residence homesteads as now defined by law shall be exempt from all taxation for all State purposes; providing the effective date; providing for the submission of said Amendment to a vote of the qualified voters at an election and providing for necessary proclamation and publication.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Sections 1-b and 1-c be added to Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas to read as follows:

"Section 1-b. Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) of the assessed taxable value of all residence homesteads as now defined by law shall be exempt from all taxation for all State purposes.

Section 1-c. Provided, however, the terms of this Resolution shall not be effective unless House Joint Resolution No. 24 is adopted by the people and in no event shall this Resolution go into effect until January 1, 1951.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the date fixed by law for the General Election in November, A. D. 1948, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon the following words:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment exempting Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) of the assessed taxable value of all residence homesteads from all State taxes," and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment exempting Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) of the assessed taxable value of all residence homesteads from all State taxes."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment; the above provisions for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such manner that each voter shall vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

with the good land we have left, but we can't keep our present standard of living if we lose any more. We now have around 460 million acres of good cropland in the U. S. This includes, besides that now in crops, about 85 million acres that need clearing, drainage, irrigation, or other improvements. That's all we have. And all but about 95 million of this 460 million acres is subject to erosion if it's not protected.

SO, we have no more land to lose. Actually we need more good crop land now. Too many farmers are working poor land that should be turned back to grass or woodland. More waste of good land would amount to a national crime on the part of those responsible—meaning ourselves.

Yet we are allowing about 500,000 acres to go down to ruin each year. If a foreign nation should invade this country, every man, woman, and child would immediately rise to the defense of our land. We would throw the enemy out regardless of cost—

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**

H. J. R. No. 24  
HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an Amendment to Section 1-a of Article VIII of the Constitution of Texas to provide that no ad valorem tax shall be levied for State general revenue purposes after January 1, 1951, and authorizing the several counties to levy additional ad valorem taxes for certain purposes, providing for a Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) residential homestead exemption, and providing for tax levies in counties having tax donations; providing for submission to the qualified electors and for the necessary proclamation by the Governor.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Section 1-a of Article VIII of the Constitution be amended so as to be read as follows:

"Section 1-a. From and after January 1, 1951, no State ad valorem tax shall be levied upon any property within this State for general revenue purposes. From and after January 1, 1951, the several counties of the State are authorized to levy ad valorem taxes upon all property within their respective boundaries for county purposes, except the first Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) value of residential homesteads, not to exceed thirty cents (30c) on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation, in addition to all other ad valorem taxes authorized by the Constitution of this State, provided the revenue derived therefrom shall be used for construction and maintenance of Farm to Market Roads or for Flood Control, except as herein otherwise provided."

"Provided that in those counties or political subdivisions or areas of the State from which tax donations have heretofore been granted, the State Ad Valorem Tax Board shall continue to levy the full amount of the State ad valorem tax for the duration of such donation, or until all legal obligations heretofore authorized by the law granting such donation or donations shall have been fully discharged, whichever shall first occur; provided that if such donation is for less than the full amount of State ad valorem taxes so levied, the portion of such taxes remaining over and above such donation shall be retained by said county or subdivision."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the date fixed by law for the General Election in November, A. D. 1948, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon "FOR the Constitutional Amendment of Section 1-a of Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide that no ad valorem tax shall be levied for State general revenue purposes after January 1, 1951, and authorizing the several counties to levy additional ad valorem taxes, providing for a Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) residential homestead exemption, and providing for tax levies in counties having tax donations," and "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment of Section 1-a of Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide that no ad valorem tax shall be levied for State general revenue purposes after January 1, 1951, and authorizing the several counties to levy additional ad valorem taxes, providing for a Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) residential homestead exemption, and providing for tax levies in counties having tax donations." Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**

H. J. R. No. 35  
HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION  
proposing an Amendment to Section 61, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to provide that all sheriffs, deputy sheriffs, county law enforcement officers including sheriffs who also perform the duties of assessor and collector of taxes, and their deputies, constables, deputy constables, and precinct law enforcement officers shall be compensated on a salary basis in all of the counties in this State beginning January 1, 1949; providing for submission of this Amendment to the vote of the people of Texas; providing the time, means and manner thereof.  
SECTION 1. That Section 61, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:  
"Section 61. All district officers in the State of Texas and all county officers in counties having a population of twenty thousand (20,000) or more, according to the then last preceding Federal Census, shall be compensated on a salary basis. In all counties in this State, the Commissioners Courts shall be authorized to determine whether precinct officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis, with the exception that it shall be mandatory upon the Commissioners Courts, to compensate all constables, deputy constables and precinct law enforcement officers on a salary basis beginning January 1, 1949; and in counties having a population of less than twenty thousand (20,000) according to the then last preceding Federal Census, the Commissioners Courts shall also have the authority to determine whether county officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis, with the exception that it shall be mandatory upon the Commissioners Courts to compensate all sheriffs, deputy sheriffs, county law enforcement officers including sheriffs who also perform the duties of assessor and collector of taxes, and their deputies, on a salary basis beginning January 1, 1949.  
"A fee earned by district, county and precinct officers shall be paid into the county treasury where earned for the account of the proper fund; provided that fees incurred by the State, county and any municipality, or in case where a pauper's oath is filed, shall be paid into the county treasury when collected and provided that where any officer is compensated wholly on a fee basis such fees may be retained by such officer or paid into the treasury of the county as the Commissioners Court may direct. All Notaries Public, county surveyors and public weighers shall continue to be compensated on a fee basis."  
FOR the Constitutional Amendment of Section 61, Article XVI of the Texas Constitution providing that all sheriffs, deputy sheriffs, constables, deputy constables and other law enforcement officers shall be compensated on a salary basis; and  
"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment of Section 61, Article XVI of the Texas Constitution providing that all sheriffs, deputy sheriffs, constables, deputy constables and other law enforcement officers shall be compensated on a salary basis."  
Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine and each voter shall vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.  
Sec. 2. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

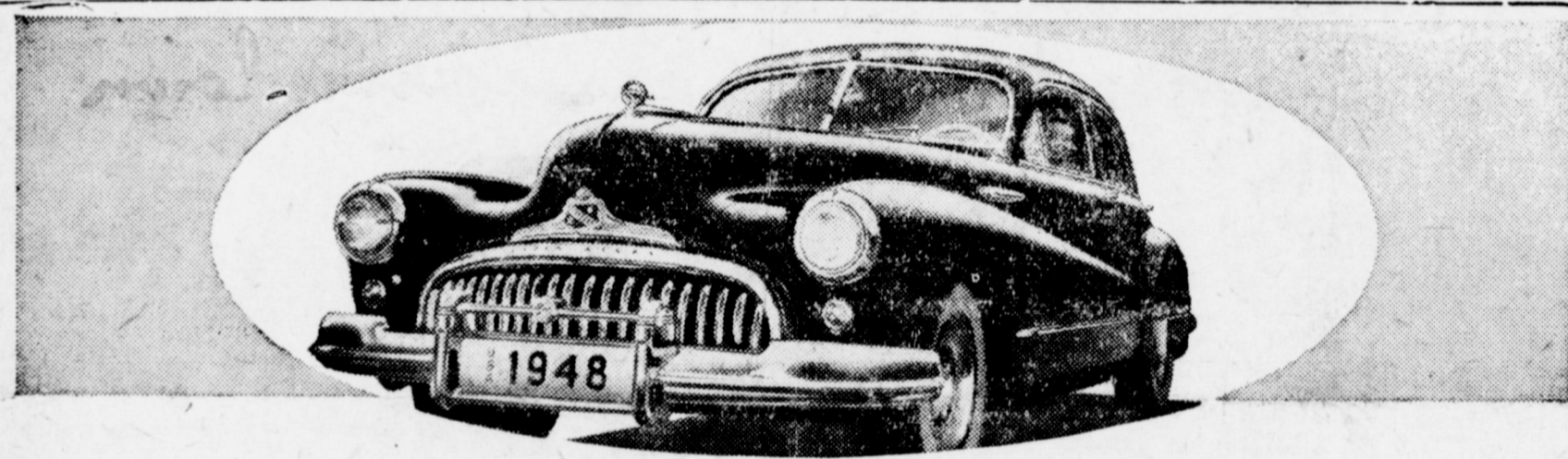

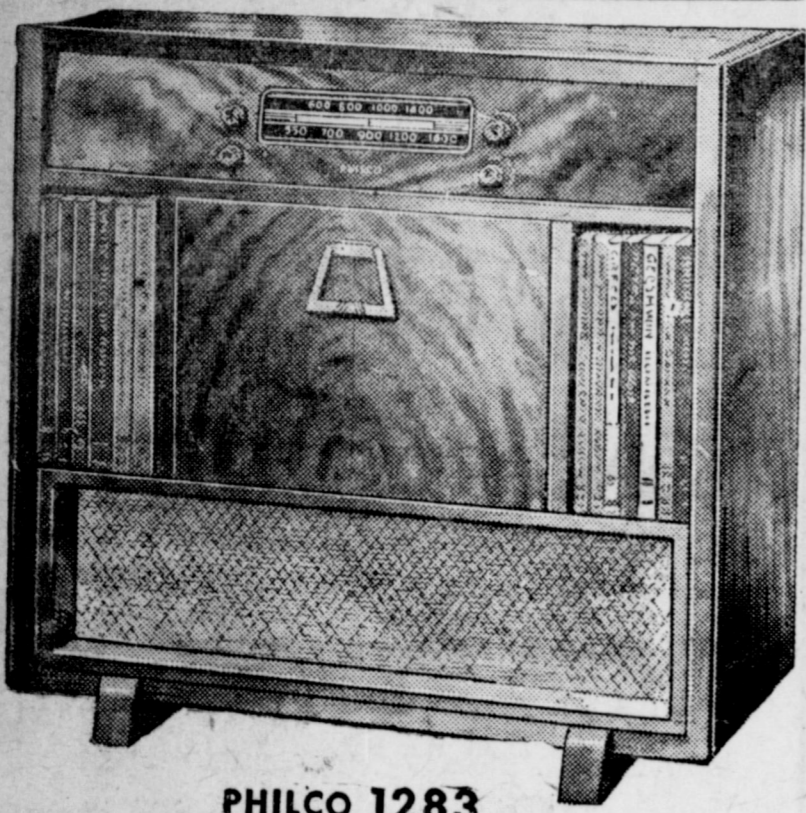

Third Of Farms Raise Bulk Food

American agriculture's production record during the war and since was accomplished largely by less than a third of the nation's 5.9 million farms with a third of the farm population.

This is shown in a Department of Agriculture study of farms by total value of production. The survey breaks down farms into seven broad classifications, running from large-scale operations such as cattle ranches or big mechanized grain farms down to groups classed as nominal units representing mostly residential homes or places where elderly farmers have retired. The figures are based on the 1945 census of Agriculture.

The study shows that approximately 1.7 million farms, representing 29 per cent of the total number of farms, turned out 76 per cent of the gross value of farm production in 1945. This means that 4.2 million farms contributed only 24 per cent of the gross value of farm production in that year. Products raised and consumed on the farm are not included.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

H. J. R. No. 29 HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto another Section to be designated as "Section 99" to authorize counties of the State to provide insurance for county employees; providing for the Governor's proclamation, and submission to the electorate.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III of the State Constitution be and the same is hereby amended by adding thereto another Section following Section 93, to be designated "Section 99" to read as follows: "Section 99. The Legislature shall have the power to pass such laws as may be necessary to enable all counties of this State to provide Workman's Compensation Insurance, including the right to provide its own insurance risk, for all county employees as in its judgment is necessary or required; and the Legislature shall provide suitable laws for the administration of such insurance in the counties of this State and for the payment of the costs, charges and premiums on such policies of insurance and the benefits to be paid thereunder."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the date fixed by law for the General Election in November, A. D. 1948, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon "FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing Workman's Compensation Insurance for county employees," and "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing Workman's Compensation Insurance for county employees." Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the other expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter may vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

feed a hungry world since the war is the medium family farms. There were approximately 1.2 million of these in 1945 with a population of around 5 1-2 million, or nearly a fifth of the total farm population. They raised 30 per cent of the total gross value of farm production.

Next to these came the group classed as largely family farms, of which there were 409,000 in 1945. The population of these farms was 2.2 million, or less than 10 per cent of the total farm population. These farms contributed 24 per cent of the total gross value of farm production.

The big-scale farming operations are not numerous, totaling only 102,000 out of the nation's 5.9 million farms and having a population of less than a million, or about 4 per cent of the total farm population. These big farms raised 22 per cent of the gross value of farm production in 1945.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

H. J. R. No. 33 HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an Amendment to Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto another Section to be known as Section 1-a, authorizing the Legislature to provide for the retirement and compensation of Judges and Commissioners of Appellate Courts and Judges of District and Criminal District Courts on account of length of service, age or disability, and for their reassignment to active duty where and when needed; providing for the submission of the Amendment to the voters of this State; and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as "Section 1-a," which shall read as follows: "Section 1-a. The Legislature shall provide for the retirement and compensation of Judges and Commissioners of the Appellate Courts and Judges of the District and Criminal District Courts on account of length of service, age or disability, and for their reassignment to active duty where and when needed."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at an election to be held on the second day of November, 1948, at which election all voters favoring such Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for the retirement and compensation of Judges and Commissioners of the Appellate Courts and Judges of the District and Criminal District Courts on account of length of service, age or disability and for their reassignment to active duty where and when needed."

Those voters opposing said Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for the retirement and compensation of Judges and Commissioners of the Appellate Courts and Judges of the District and Criminal District Courts of this State on account of length of service, age or disability and for their reassignment to active duty where and when needed."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of the State.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

S. J. R. No. 2 A JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an amendment to Section 28 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to provide for a Board for apportioning the state into senatorial districts and representative districts in the event the Legislature fails to make such apportionment; providing for the issuance of the necessary proclamation by the Governor and making an appropriation.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 28 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read as follows: "Section 28. The Legislature shall, at its first regular session after the publication of each United States decennial census, apportion the state into senatorial and representative districts, agreeable to the provisions of Sections 25, 26 and 26-a of this Article. In the event the Legislature shall at any such first regular session following the publication of a United States decennial census, fail to make such apportionment, same shall be done by the Legislative Redistricting Board of Texas, which is hereby created, and shall be composed of five (5) members, as follows: The Lieutenant Governor, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, the Attorney General, the Comptroller and Public Accounts and the Commissioner of the General Land Office, a majority of whom shall constitute a quorum. Said Board shall assemble in the City of Austin within ninety (90) days after the final adjournment of such regular session. The Board shall, within sixty (60) days after assembling, apportion the state into senatorial and representative districts, or into senatorial or representative districts, as the failure of action of such Legislature may make necessary. Such apportionment shall be in writing and signed by three (3) or more of the members of the Board duly acknowledged as the act and deed of such Board, when so executed and filed with the Secretary of State, shall have force and effect of law. Such apportionment shall become effective at the next succeeding statewide general election. The Supreme Court shall have jurisdiction to compel such Commissioners to perform its duties in accordance with the provisions of this section by writ of mandamus or other extraordinary writs conformable to the usages of law. The Legislature shall provide the necessary funds for clerical and technical aid and for other expenses incidental to the work of the Board, and the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall be entitled to receive per diem and travel as set by the Board's session in the same manner and amount as they would receive while attending a special session of the Legislature. This amendment shall become effective January 1, 1951."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held throughout the state on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1948, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"For the amendment to Section 28, Article III of the Constitution of Texas providing for a Board for apportionment of the state into senatorial districts and representative districts in the event the Legislature fails to make such apportionment."

Each voter at such election shall mark out one of such clauses on the ballot, leaving the clause expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

Sec. 4. The sum of Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the treasury of this state not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

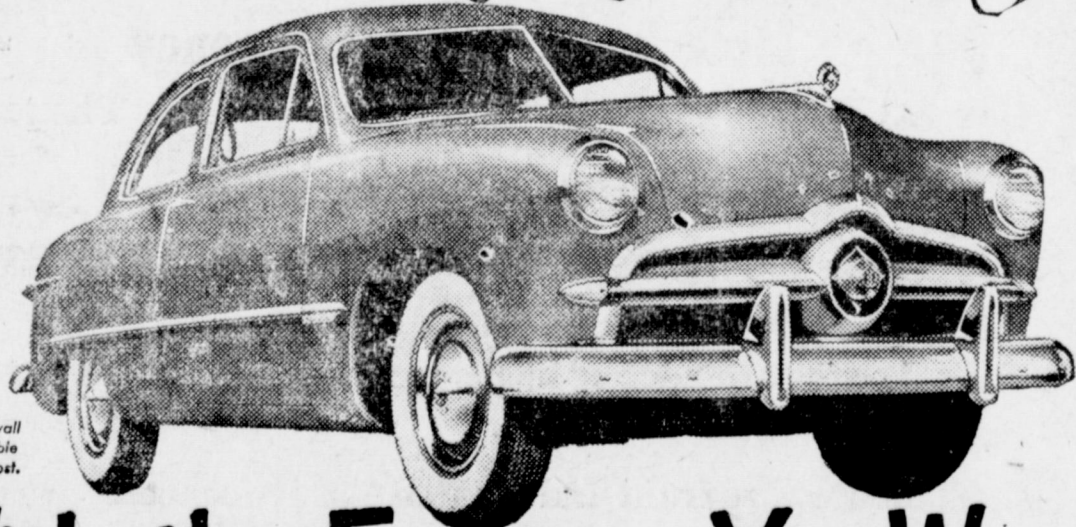

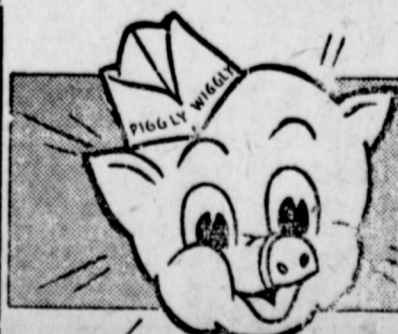


