# Tech faculty researches binge drinking in hopes to understand trends

Texas Tech faculty and staff are doing what they can to better understand young adults' trends and behaviors in fects of binge drinking," he said. "We're alcohol-related topics.

"Binge drinking isn't like alcoholism," he said. "People don't come for treatment. They don't see it as a problem. People drinking 16 standard drinks within a night, for example, are very different from drinking five. So not all binges may be equivalent, where people can really be affected."



Tech's grade was determined through eight categories of environmental sustainability: administration, climate change and energy, food and recycling, green building, transportation, endowment transparency, investment priorities and shareholder engagement. Tech received a D or an F in all categories except investment priorities, for which it received

According to the report, students' knowledge and actions in the interest of environmental friendliness directly are related to their climate change awareness and proactive behavior.

Sean Duggan, managing director of University Student Housing, said in order to be more earth-friendly, students, faculty and staff need an attitude change and a cultural adjustment to become more

"Especially as we push toward 40,000 (students)," Duggan said, "I think now is the time to try and think of that and how are we going to have more students here, but maybe impact the environment




