## Muleshoe Gins Are Getting Busy

Muleshoe gins were getting down to business this week as cotton began to pop open in earnest in this territory, influenced by warm fall weather.

The three plants here had turned out more than 100 bales according to a summary made this morning.

Cotton seed is selling for \$65 per ton the ginners said.

Meanwhile it won't be long until a need for cotton pickers and pullers will be felt here. Bolls are opening fast and farmers will want to get their harvesting done while the good weather lasts.

The drought and hot weather of August cut a great swath in Bailey county's cotton crop, which will be about one-third to a half of the estimate for August 1, it is now believed. Irrigated cotton north of the sand hills is good. Much of the dry land crops all over the county also is good but there are spots where the drought eliminated all thoughts of a harvest.

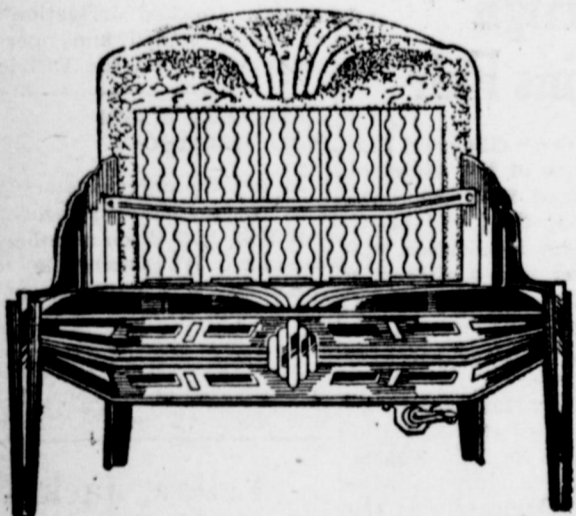

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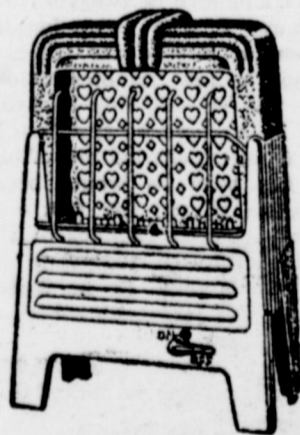



**Fertilizer Sales In Texas Increase**

COLLEGE STATION (Spl.)—Last year's fertilizer sales in Texas were five times those of 1936, according to Dr. J. F. Fudge, State Chemist of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

If fertilizer sales are any indication, the farmers of this state are feeding the soil to fatten the crops. For the fiscal year 1947-48, Texas fertilizer sales amounted to over 451,000 tons.

Compare this with only 85,000 tons back in 1936-37. The 1939-40 records show an increase to 116,000 tons. And just a year ago in 1946-47 the sales were slightly over 401,000 tons.

A breakdown of the main types of fertilizer shows over 91,000 tons of 5-10-5 were sold in the year ending June 30, 1948. The 4-12-4 topped this with well over 103,000 tons, and all the mixed fertilizers totaled nearly 225,000 tons. Sales of 20 percent superphosphate came to over 165,000 tons. This figure is included in the 212,000 tons of all materials sold, such as ammonium nitrate, rock phosphate, nitrate of soda, superphosphate 45 percent and up and 16-20-0.

### One-Wheel Power Unit

The power unit designed by Clayton M. Edwards, Cornell University, for Lincoln Ave. Welding Foundation, can be used to drive numerous types of mounted garden tools, lawn mowers, lawnmowers or snow blades. A cultivator tool bar can be attached across the rear of the frame. Cast-iron wheels on each end of the tool bar will adjust depth and give three points on the ground for balance. All welding on this unit can be done with a 3/16-inch diameter electrode, using approximately 180 amperes welding current.



Blackhead of turkeys causes heavy losses. Phenothiazine powder mixed in the mash at the rate of one ounce daily for 100 birds, has been found effective in preventing losses, because it destroys cecal worms which are carriers of the blackhead organisms.

### Herds and Flocks

All night lights help to prevent stampeding of turkeys on range.

To make lambs tick proof, spray them with DDT. Mix one pound of a 50 per cent wettable DDT powder in 25 gallons of water and apply it to the back, belly, sides and around neck and ears. One application should last for two or three weeks.

### DDT Proves Effective On Peach Tree Borer

DDT, when used as a trunk spray, will control the peach tree borer, according to the New York State agricultural experiment station. The new method of borer control takes the place of older methods using ethylene dichloride of PDB crystals, since it is non-injurious, labor-saving, time-saving and inexpensive. DDT is used at the rate of two pounds to each 100 gallons of water.

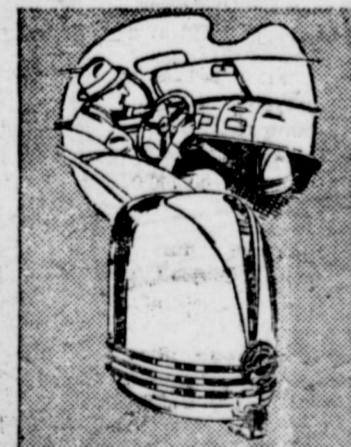

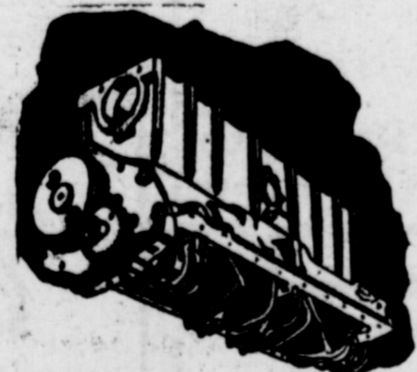

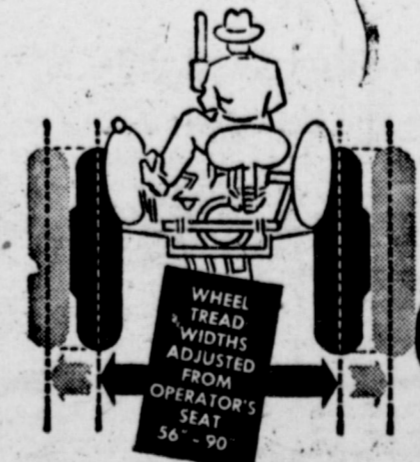
