The Irvin St. Clair well, a mile northeast of Muleshoe was double checked for pumping capacity and proped to be producing 1718 gallons of water per minute. It was the strongest well yet tested by Mr. Thurmond in the Panhandle area.

Mr. Adams commented: "While we are all proud of our strong wells, it might be well also to give sober consideration to the fact that the St. Clair well also had a temporary draw down from the 20 foot natural level down to 63 feet, 6 inches while pumping. A little mental arithmetic will indicate that many wells in the Muleshoe area should have a deeper setting to insure efficient operation.
