

Research Of Sorghum Grains As A **Substitute For Flour Being Resumed**

LUBBOCK, Oct. 30.—Research on sorghum grains and flour made from grains produced in Texas' southplains area is being resumed by the foods and nutrition department at Texas Technological

Shallu, which produces a fine grain white flour, and Martin maize, producer of a coarser darker flour, are the two grains which will be tried in the next experiment. Standard receipts for hot will be used in the tests. The exsubstitute for wheat flour to obtain equally satisfying products. "Revived interest in utilizing for human consumption an abundantly grown crop as sorghums in this area prompted extension of grain sorghum experiments done in 1942. During that year some work was done in use of flours from coarser maize in hot breads," Mrs. Michie said.

Since Shallu has been developed, indications are that, because breads, yeast breads and pastries of better milling properties of this grain, it will be possible to make periments are designed specifi-cally to determine allowable proportions of sorghum grain flour also that this flour will be more suitable for use in wider range for flour mixtures.

Q. What is the name of this cut of meat?

A. These are spareribs. Q. Where does the cut come from and how is it identified?

A. Spareribs are cut from the side of the pork carcass. They are the ends of the ribs which have been removed from the bacon strip. The spareribs have a flat, gently-ribbed appearance, with a coating of fat. The ends of the rib bones are visible as is the lean meat between the ribs Q. How should this cut be prepared

A. Spareribs may be braised roasted. Complete cooking is important to bring out the fullest flavor of the meat, so they are always cooked to the well-done stage. To braise the to the well-done stage. To braise the meat, first brown it well in hot fat in a heavy utensil. Add a small amount of liquid, and cook slowly, covered for 1½ hours. To roast, place the "ribs" on a rack in an open roasting pan and bake in a moderate over. (350° F.) about 2½ hours. To barbecue roast, the spareribs heating becue, roast the spareribs, basting frequently with your favorite barbe cue sauce. Spareribs are also delicious when stuffed with a bread or fruit stuffing and roasted.

Adams Tells How To Treat Swine To Stop Mange

Mange is caused by small mites which burrow into the skin, spending their entire life on the infected hog. It spreads chiefly by direct contact with infected animals and sleeping quarters. The mites are so small they are very difficult to observe with the naked eye. As the mites burrow into the skin, they produce intense irritation and inflammation. A thick knotty, wrinkled condition of the skin developes.

Hog mange is a serious prob-lem in the Texas Panhandle from now until late spring as hogs are prone to bed down in close contact in infected quarters.

Until recently, the average armer gave up in disgust after trying to clean up his premises by now out dated methods.

Tests that have been made by he Omaha Livestock Sanitary and loss Prevention Board involving 2,000 infected farm and feed lot nogs and the use of chlordane and penzene hexachloride have been concluded and results are worth our attention.

Both of the above chemicals gave excellent results in cleaning up even the most advanced mange cases with only one treatment.

You must use caution in applyng benzen hexachloride as it may aint the meat if applied in less than 30 days before slaughter. If chlordane is used, special veterinary emulsion concentrates only should be used.
