The Muleshoe Gin was so damaged by fire last Saturday that it will do no more ginning this season, the management announced.

The fire was discovered by employees during the noon hour and only efficient work by the Muleshoe fire department prevented the total destruction of gin and plant. The building still stands, but the owners said it was ruined on the inside. Smoke poured from the firemen were able to extinguish the blaze at all.

Earl Kromer, of Amarillo, one of the owners, said he was unable to estimate the amount of the loss, because some machinery that appears in good shape may be uined by the heat and other machinery that seems ruined may be capable of repair.

Boots Bryant, manager, was at lunch when the fire alarm sounded but quickly got to the scene. The company had placed about \$6,000 worth of new gin machinery in the plant last summer, and repaired machinery and equipment not replaced. The gin has had a rop, and was ginning at the time of the fire. The bale being ginned

Members of the city commission this week revealed that a large amount of the \$205,000 in new bonds they have asked for and which will be voted upon Friday, December 3, will go to provide a modern sewage disposal plant, and to erect another water tower in Muleshoe.

Both are "must items in the city of Muleshoe's future program; the people in the long run have little choice in this matter. They will be provided sooner or later.

Muleshoe's population increase has made additional above ground storage space a required improvement. The state fire insurance commission has made this ruling, and unless it is provided the citizens of Muleshoe will pay additional fire insurance premiums.

A city of the size of Muleshoe needs above ground water storage of 250,000 gallons the commission says; we now have one above ground reservoir with a capacity of 50,000 gallons. An underground storage was built a year ago, but water has to be pumped from this reservoir and should a situation develop that would disrupt electric service, this source of water would be useless.

#### **Disposal Plant Required**

Members of the city commission said that Muleshoe has gone along without a sewage disposal plant about as long as possible. At present the sewage accumulates at a low place in the draw, then is pumped to the site of the old dump ground. But the pumps have been there for y and are on their last legs. Besides that, the present disposal method is unsanitary and a danger to health.




It is proposed to install a one-unit Imhof disposal plant, such as is widely used by the cities. This plant disposes of all impurities and eliminates odors as well as danger of contamination.

These two major improvements will use a large part of the proposed bond issue. The remainder will be used to run sewer and water lines to newer parts of town where these conveniences are not now available, and to make repairs and improvements where needed.

There is a considerable section of town, beginning at the western edge of Hospital addition and continuing around the southwestern perimeter to the Clovis highway where sewer and water facilities are not available, although a number of new homes have been built there.

About half of the new bonds would be water and sewer revenue bonds; the other part would be tax obligation bonds. Details of these bonds, rate of interest, their duration, etc., are contained in the election order carried in this week's Journal.

Members of the city commission invite the citizens to confer with them in regard to this proposal, which they think is in the interest of the people as a whole.
