## NEWS IN BRIEF

### Stafford convicted

PURCELL, Okla. (AP) — Roger Dale Stafford, already sentenced to death for murdering six Oklahoma City steakhouse workers, was given three more death sentences Friday for his conviction in the deaths of three members of a Texas family.

The seven-man, four-woman McClain County jury reached a guilty verdict earlier Friday, 90 minutes after beginning deliberations. They deliberated an additional hour before determining that Stafford should die by lethal injection.

LaVerne Lorenz, whose former husband, Air Force Sgt. Melvin Lorenz, and 12-year-old son, Richard, were killed June 22, 1978, wept softly as the verdict was read. Also killed was Lorenz' second wife, Linda, 31. The three members of the San Antonio, Texas, family were slain during a journey by car to the funeral of Lorenz' mother in Jamestown, N.D.

### Families removed

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Russians have begun flying their families home from Afghanistan in the wake of recent rioting in Kabul, U.S. intelligence sources said Friday.

Wives and children of Russian civilian officials and advisers stationed in Afghanistan are leaving aboard Soviet Aeroflot shuttles between Kabul and the Soviet Union, the sources said.

There was no indication how many dependents have left so far. The sources estimated that about 1,000 wives and children remain to be flown home.

### Strike to end?

CHICAGO (AP) — Striking firefighters reached a tentative agreement with the city late Friday, and the union's acting president said firemen could be back at work on Saturday after 23 days off the job.

The Rev. Jesse Jackson, who served as mediator, announced the tentative settlement and said union members were asked to attend a midnight meeting to ratify it.

Jackson said no details of the agreement would be released before the Chicago Fire Fighters Union and its executive board meet.

William Reddy, the union's acting president, was asked at a news conference whether he would personally recommend ratification. "Yes, I will," he said.

He said that if the agreement is ratified, firemen could be back at work during Saturday's 8 a.m. shift.

### Banks nationalized

SAN SALVADOR, El Salvador (AP) — The civilian-military junta on Friday nationalized all of the 19 locally owned banks and imposed restrictions on the five foreign banks operating here.

Soldiers carrying automatic rifles and wearing bullet-proof vests were deployed around the banks Friday morning and the decree imposing government control was read at a news conference in the late afternoon. No disturbances were reported and banking officials said there was no rush by customers to withdraw their funds. The government guaranteed all existing deposits.

### Inmate escapes

SEAGOVILLE, Texas (AP) — Benny Hurtado, 21, of Clovis, N.M., who was transferred to the minimum security federal prison here after a riot destroyed the New Mexico State Penitentiary, has escaped, prison officials said Friday.

Hurtado, a convicted burglar, escaped from the prison Wednesday, according to Assistant Warden William Ezell.

Meanwhile, in Santa Fe, N.M., State Corrections Secretary Adolph Saenz said Friday that officials have accounted for all 1,156 inmates who were in the state penitentiary when the riot broke out.

# Hostages now in council's hands?

Moslem militants at the U.S. Embassy in Tehran said early Saturday they will hand over the 50 Americans held hostage 126 days to emissaries of Iran's ruling Revolutionary Council at 8:30 a.m. EST, Tehran radio reported.

The radio, monitored in London, said the armed students who took over the embassy Nov. 4 announced in a statement that the handover will take place after the hostages are given "full medical checking and films are taken of them."

The statement said the militants

made the announcement "following a reported broadcast on behalf of the Foreign Ministry on the handover of the American hostages." There was no immediate elaboration.

On Friday, the militants had said they would not turn over the Americans until authorities had agreed to a new demand — that they be allowed to address the Iranian people.

The demand came after Iranian protesters rallied at the embassy for the second day calling on the radicals not to give up their captives and demanding that the government not compromise with the United States. Iranian President Abolhassan Bani-

Sadr in recent weeks has refused to give the militants the radio and television time they once enjoyed.

There was no immediate comment from Iranian officials, who earlier Friday said the approximately 50 hostages would probably be moved Saturday from the embassy to another, undisclosed location, where the U.N. investigative commission on Iran would meet with them.

Even if the authorities do assume control of the Americans, an early release appeared unlikely. Tehran Radio said Friday that the revolutionary government still intends to leave the decision on the hostages' fate to

the new Parliament, which will not be elected fully until next month.

The militants, who have held the Americans for 125 days, called on the ruling Revolutionary Council on Thursday to take custody of the hostages.

They said the Bani-Sadr government had applied heavy pressure to allow the U.N. commission visit. Since they did not want to stand by and allow such a visit, the militants said, the only alternative was for the authorities to assume responsibility for the hostages.

But on Friday a spokesman for the militants said in a telephone inter-

view with a Western reporter in Tehran that the embassy occupiers were now demanding "that the Iranian people know what we have to say" before they would hand over the Americans.

Another militant spokesman said earlier Friday they would like to appear "on a television and radio program to explain the truth to the nation."

The militants maintain that the U.N. visit is what the "great Satan" America wants and is inconsistent with the "Imam's line," that is, the policy of revolutionary leader Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini.

# In Midland talks, Hance focuses on inflation

Slicing into inflation will be the primary battle for Congress as spring begins, according to U.S. Rep. Kent Hance who spoke Friday before numerous groups in Midland.

Hance, a Democratic congressman from Lubbock, updated Congress' work for the Texas Association of Business meeting in Midland Center and outlined political problems in relation to nuclear energy during a seminar sponsored by Alerting Women About Resources & Energy.

As Congress undertakes work on the budget while wrestling with inflation, Hance predicted the windfall profits tax will be passed within three weeks and advocated the need for nuclear energy to meet the nation's energy needs in the future.

"With inflation running 18 percent, it takes courage for a congressman to go out and talk with your district these days," he quipped.

TURNING MORE serious, however, Hance said inflation has been increasing steadily since 1976 when the inflation rate then was 5 1/2 to 6 percent. The biggest contributor to inflation is deficit spending by the federal government, he contended.

The new budget for the next fiscal year also will include a deficit of about \$40 billion.

Looking at a plan proposed by two congressmen, Hance said it calls for a balanced budget by cutting out about \$30 billion. It would be an across-the-board cut with no new programs added.

Balancing the budget is the first step Congress must take in trying to bring down inflation," said the first-term congressman. The 435-member

representative body has become more conservative the past couple of years, and Hance predicted that after the November general election it will become even more conservative.

Entitlement programs have caused problems because they are automatically hooked into the budget "whether or not we want them there. We must change the law to get rid of these entitlement programs," Hance said.

A MAJOR FIGHT that will involve the budget concerns Social Security benefit increases which are tied into inflation, Hance predicted. As inflation goes up, so do the benefits.

Inflation also is causing a problem in the housing industry as permits for new homes have dropped. And with the prime interest rate climbing daily, Hance cited figures in which mortgage rates for a new \$60,000 home are at 17 1/2 percent.

Cutting government spending and taxes while increasing production would be another means of cutting into the inflation problem, according to Hance.

Despite numerous protests and an oil rally planned in Washington, D.C., the windfall profits tax bill will be passed within three weeks, according to Hance. And he recommended oilmen — including some 40 Midlanders — conduct the rally in a positive manner.

"I emphasize to the people from my area not to do anything to distract from the real issues," he said, referring to the farmers' rally more than a year ago in which farmers tied up traffic for hours.

WITH A JOINT committee of House and Senate members working on the windfall profits tax bill, the revised legislation now calls for decontrol

of oil along with a lower tax than had first been proposed, he said.

"I'm against the tax, but we've probably done the best we're going to do with that bill," Hance said, warning that if the bill fails, President Carter will reimpose controls on oil.

And while oil men are complaining that the tax is too high, Hance said some congressmen will vote against the bill saying the tax is too low.

"I would never in my wildest imagination have guessed the kind of thinking of some of those people (congressmen)," he added with a laugh.

The Russians are digging in for a long stay in Afghanistan, according to Hance. However, he doesn't foresee them invading Pakistan or Iran in the near future. And if they do, he believes the invasion will be part of a subversive plot to take over their governments.

LOOKING AT THIS week's turn of events in Iran with the hostages being turned over to the Iran Revolutionary Council, Hance believes it is "only a matter of time before they are released. They are getting into position for a release."

Although the U.S. is opening trade and relations with China, Hance warned the U.S. should keep China "at arm's length. They may be for us today and against us tomorrow."

Because all the figures point to oil and gas being depleted at some point in the future, Hance told participants at the AWARE seminar in Theatre Midland he supports development of nuclear energy.

The issue of nuclear energy is only a recent development, he claimed, saying there was little protest about it until the latter 1970s. The biggest majority of protesters are leftovers from

# Despite 'draft', Ford undecided

WASHINGTON (AP) — The leader of a drive to draft former President Gerald R. Ford for another White House race said Friday the effort is "moving very fast." Ford said he was still undecided.

Thomas C. Reed, a former Air Force secretary who launched the draft effort, said, "The response so far has been very enthusiastic."

Larry Speaks, a spokesman for the draft group and a former assistant press secretary in the Ford White House, said Reed was sounding out Republican governors and other political leaders for support. He said Reed would announce new backers of the draft movement at a press conference in Washington Monday.

Govs. William Milliken of Ford's home state of Michigan and James A. Rhodes of Ohio were expected to be on that list. Both states have primaries with large delegations, which Ford might hope to share if he announces in time to get on their ballots.

In Maryland, state Senate Republi-

can Leader Edward Mason said he had been informed by the Ford organization that the former president's name will remain on the ballot for Maryland's May 13 primary. Fred Wineland, the secretary of state, had tentatively listed Ford last week, an action which requires a specific declaration of withdrawal for the name to be removed.

"If Gerald Ford's name is going to be on the ballot in Maryland, I'm going to work for him," Mason said. "My impression is that he's going to run."

The deadline for getting on the Ohio ballot is next Thursday and the deadline for Michigan is the following day.

"I think he can be expected to move before then," said a Ford supporter who asked not to be quoted by name.

In Rancho Mirage, Calif., John Sears, Ronald Reagan's former campaign manager, said "I think Mr. Ford could be nominated if he decided to run."

Asked if he were ready to make that decision, Ford replied "No, I am not."

Ford and Sears met briefly with reporters outside the former president's desert home following a nearly 1 1/2-hour discussion.

Sears declined to say whether he specifically urged Ford to run.

"Whatever decision the president (Ford) has to make, he'll have to make it pretty soon," Sears said.

Sears was asked if Ford indicated he would run.

"I received no great enlightening about that today," he replied.

"John (Sears) and I had a very interesting and helpful gathering," Ford said. "John is a real professional in the political arena."

Sears also declined to give details of their discussions.

"We discussed politics, as we have at various times for 15 years," he said.

Ford backers in Nebraska moved Friday to get his name on that state's May 13 primary ballot.

State Sen. John DeCamp and other Ford followers filed the petitions. Under state law, Ford must submit an affidavit by March 14 approving the petitions if he is to get on the ballot.

Meanwhile, Republican leaders across the country were giving a mixed reaction to the idea of a Ford candidacy.

"A lot of people would be very excited if he ran," said Hattie Bickmore, head of the state party in Maine.

"I don't know if he's testing the water or it's a legitimate bid," she said. But Mrs. Bickmore noted that Ford had carried Maine over Jimmy Carter in 1976.

Utah GOP Chairman Bill Stevenson said Ford's chances of winning the nomination are "very slight" and he should stay out of the race.

"I think Jerry Ford would best serve the Republican Party and the people of America by remaining a senior-type advisor," said Stevenson, a Reagan supporter. "I don't see him contributing materially to the campaign."

# ... but columnists say he's sure to run 'barring unexpected'

PALM BEACH, Fla. — Former President Gerald R. Ford has decided to make a run for the Republican presidential nomination.

He disclosed in an exclusive interview that, barring the unexpected, he'll publicly reveal his plans with a March 13 announcement geared to the primary filing deadlines for Michigan and Ohio, two states he regards as crucial to his candidacy.

Ford flatly ruled out an Illinois write-in effort in the March 18 primary there.

Our talks with Ford followed an unusually harsh attack on President

Carter in which Ford charged the president with bringing "catastrophic evils" down on the nation.

Ford showed confidence, determination and unusually good spirits in discussing a late bid for his party's nomination. He also denied having said that front-runner Ronald Reagan could not be elected.

But, in fact, the paramount objective of a Ford race would be to stop Reagan, widely blamed by Ford men as responsible for Ford's defeat in 1976.

Ford told us that he had never said Reagan, the party leader he most dislikes and whom he barely defeated in a bitter contest for the nomination in 1976, was not electable. What he did

say, Ford told us, was that Reagan generally was "perceived" as being unelectable — a perception common to many Republican politicians and voters.

The "unexpected" events that might change Ford's mind are three in number:

He is demanding evidence of wide support among party policymakers and leaders in statehouses, state legislatures and Congress. Several governors already have asked him to run, including Gov. William G. Milliken in his home state of Michigan and, say Ford intimates, Ohio's Gov. James A. Rhodes.

If evidence of "wide support" fails to develop, Ford would not announce. But, he told us: "At least I would then

have made it clear that I was willing to make the effort if called upon and I could not be blamed if our party gets beaten in November."

That Carter, by miraculous transformation, suddenly shows what Ford said he totally lacks: leadership qualities capable of extricating the nation from "disastrous" policies of the past 37 months. Ford clearly, and somewhat sadly, rules this out.

Jerry Ford's attack on Carter before our interview with him was rougher than anything ever said about the president by Reagan, Bush, Rep. John Anderson of Illinois and other 1980 candidates, present and past. Talking informally but with unaccustomed emphasis and spirit to a black-tie dinner of party fatcats at the

Poinciana Club, Ford said:

Carter's policies have produced "catastrophic evils." On the home front, the worst of these was "squandering the economic inheritance" left him by the Ford administration; and abroad, encouraging Soviet actions against U.S. interests by paring down American military strength and inviting Soviet offensives.

"One of the most evil" claims of Carter, said Ford, is that oil-pricing policies of the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries can be blamed for the phenomenal rate of inflation. "It just ain't so," Ford said. Carter's own economic policies have been a much greater contributor to inflation and Carter's attempt to blame OPEC is phony.

### State supreme court justice visits city

The petitioner's chance of receiving some relief from the Texas Supreme Court is very good, Texas Supreme Court Justice Will Garwood told members of the Midland Bar Association Friday during a noon meeting.

"In about three-fourths of the cases application is granted on, the petitioner gets some relief from the Supreme Court."

Garwood spoke to the Midland Bar Association on "The inner workings of the Supreme Court." According to Morris Bullock, who introduced Garwood, the Supreme Court justice is the newest member of the court, having been appointed by Gov. Bill Clements. Since Clements is not calling a special session of the legislature, Garwood will not be affirmed or disapproved before he stands for re-election in November.

Garwood also told Midland Bar Association members that applications to the Court had almost doubled since 1958. In 1958 there were 480 applications, and in 1978, there were 900. Fifteen percent of the applications were granted in 1958, compared to 11 percent in 1978. Garwood added that applications for writs of mandamus also have grown greatly, increasing from 26 in 1958 to 120 in 1978.

"I think that is because more and more lawyers are seeking mandamus in the Supreme Court to control the discovery process in trial," he said.

He ended by pointing out that dissents have decreased from 30 percent to 18 percent in the last 20 years and that refusals of applications have dropped from 48 in 1958 to four in 1978.

Garwood also gave those present a quick overview of the history of the Supreme Court.

### Education of aliens discussed

HOUSTON (AP) — A Dallas school administrator said Friday allowing children of undocumented aliens to attend public school without paying tuition would "adversely affect some programs somewhere."

Robby Collins, deputy associate superintendent of management for the Dallas Independent School District, testified for the state in a trial that will decide the constitutionality of a Texas law requiring illegal aliens to pay public school tuition.

Collins said inflation will be a major factor in school finances in the 1980s and predicted a 100 percent inflation rate would lead to a "management of decline."

He said allowing illegal aliens to attend school tuition-free would place a further financial burden on schools, adding that Dallas schools will probably have to raise taxes this year to fund a 15 percent employee salary increase. "Each community and state will be forced to reorder its priorities (because of inflation)," he said.

Dallas schools are now unable to offer bilingual education to all students who qualify because of a shortage of teachers, according to Collins.

He also said an influx of minority children would upset the "delicate balance" of the current busing program.

Testimony in the trial will begin its fourth week Monday before U.S. District Judge Woodrow Seals.

## Like heat, wholesale prices rise

WASHINGTON (AP) — The biggest leap in energy costs since 1974 sent wholesale prices surging at nearly a 20 percent annual rate for a second straight month in February, the government said Friday, and inflation-wary banks boosted prime lending rates to a record 18 percent.

The government's latest sign that inflation is worsening came as the Carter administration was trying frantically to fashion a new inflation-fighting strategy. At the same time, the

government reported that the nation's unemployment rate edged down from 6.2 percent to 6 percent in February. The Labor Department said its index of price increases at the wholesale level — the stage just before goods reach consumers — rose 1.5 percent last month after climbing 1.6 percent in January.

At that rate, wholesale price inflation for the full year would hit 20 percent, surpassing the record 18.3 percent set in 1974. Wholesale prices rose 12 1/2 percent last year. The February increase, as in January, was paced by near-record rises in energy costs that more than offset a decline in wholesale food prices for a second consecutive month.

Major banks, meanwhile, were setting records by raising interest rates for their best corporate customers, first from 17 1/2 percent to 17 3/4 percent, then to 18 percent.

### Business borrowing rates climb again

NEW YORK (AP) — Business borrowing costs continued to soar Friday as the prime lending rate rose by as much as three-quarters of a point to a record 18 percent at one major bank and to 17 3/4 percent at most others.

President Carter will confer with his economic advisers on inflation this weekend, following reports that U.S. producer prices surged 1.5 percent but unemployment fell slightly to 6 percent in February.

Bankers and economists attributed the rate spiral to money-tightening by the Federal Reserve, acting to curb 18 percent-a-year inflation, and to a borrowing surge by businesses fearing higher rates or the imposition of credit controls by the government.

A White House spokesman said Carter does not plan to announce any anti-inflation moves until next week. The President has the authority to order controls on borrowing and lending.

The prime rate, which is not directly tied to consumer loan rates but can indicate short-term loan rate trends, stood at 11 1/2 percent to 11 3/4 percent a year ago. The prime was at 15 1/4 percent Feb. 15 when the Federal Reserve launched its latest effort to slow inflation and curb economic activity by making money harder to obtain.

### Tito's illness 'may be prolonged'

LJUBLJANA, Yugoslavia (AP) — Yugoslav officials said Friday that President Josip Broz Tito was being kept alive by medical instruments and his recently stabilized condition might be prolonged for some time.

They said the 87-year-old Yugoslav leader had come close to falling into a coma more than three weeks ago and now was being aided by an artificial kidney machine every four to five days.

For the first time since Tito fell gravely ill Feb. 10, reporters were allowed briefly into the 4,200-bed Ljubljana Clinical Center where he is confined. They were given a brief tour but were barred from the upper floor where Tito remained under intensive care, and were not allowed to speak with members of the medical team overseeing his treatment.

The eight-member medical panel said in its midday advisory that Tito's general health "has not... essentially changed."

Slovenian press spokesman Tone Vahen later told reporters at a special press center. "We know about the stabilization of his condition. Because of good medical instruments being used, this stabilization

could last a very long time."

Tito was admitted to the hospital in January because of a circulation problem in his left leg, which later was amputated. Following a brief period of apparent recovery, his doctors gradually disclosed heart and kidney weaknesses, pneumonia and an undescribed bleeding problem.

His condition has been described as grave for weeks, except for a Feb. 14 advisory that he had been in critical condition the night before.

"When the officials used the expression 'critical state,' the word coma was not used," Vahen said. "But it was very clear that he was on the border — in and out."

Vahen left unclear Tito's subsequent mental state. Doctors have not described it since saying on Feb. 20 that he felt better even though he was unimproved.

The spokesman said the artificial kidney machine, which doctors first mentioned Feb. 22, was being used "sometimes twice a week" to cleanse Tito's blood.

"But you can believe that the process takes place at least every four to five days," Vahen said.

On Saturday, North Carolina State, 20-7, meets Iowa, 20-8, before Maryland, 23-6, the regular season titlist in ACC, plays Tennessee, 18-10, in the East Regional; Duke, 22-8, the ACC tournament winner, plays Penn, 17-11, in the Midwest Regional, and Clemson, 21-8, another ACC stalwart, plays Brigham Young, 24-4, in the West Regional.

The fifth ACC team, North Carolina, 21-7, plays Sunday against the winner of the Texas A&M-Bradley game.

When North Carolina State meets Iowa, it will be a battle of contrasting styles.

"We call hand-checking in this league," said North Carolina State coach Norm Sloan. "Iowa does a lot of hand-checking..."  
"I think the Big Ten is more of a physical league," said Iowa Coach Lute Olsen. "The ACC is more of a finesse league."

Tennessee hopes to exploit the same kind of tendencies when it meets Maryland. "We're very inclined to play a physical game," Tennessee Coach Don DeVoe said. "But I don't know if you can play a physical game against Maryland because at times you can't catch them."

Lefty Driesell, Maryland's flamboyant coach, said his team needs to shut off the Volunteers' inside game. "We've got to stop them from making layups," said Driesell.

Clemson has a different problem

out in the West Regional. The Tigers must stop Danny Ainge, the key to Brigham Young's run-and-shoot offense. When he's not worrying opposing basketball coaches, the 6-foot-5 Ainge is an infielder for baseball's Toronto Blue Jays.

But it's interesting to note that the author, the hit man of the title, Jack Tatum, says he was just following orders. That, of course, is not an original defense. Himmler thought of it first.

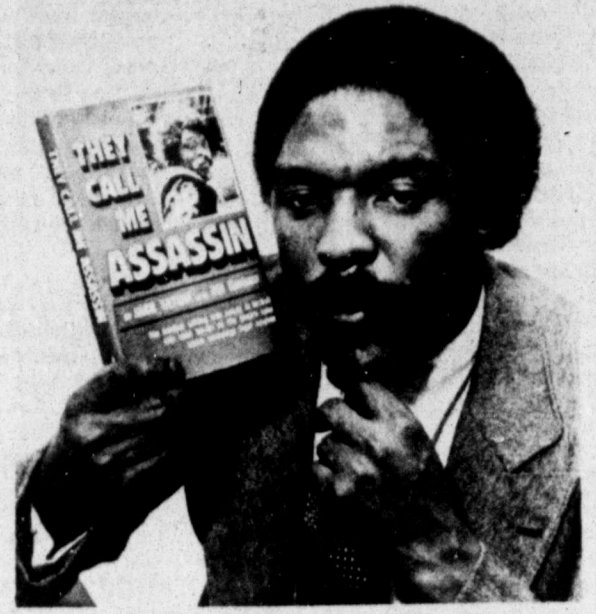
THE BOOK doesn't leave you long in doubt as to why Jack Tatum is called assassin. Jack begins to hit people as early as page 5. I played my first game of football as a sophomore in high school, and even then I was effective.

Of course, Jack Tatum's finest hit is on himself. They Call Me Assassin is a casebook study on the destruction of a young athlete by a cruel system.

THE CHARACTER builders got hold of John David Tatum very early in the game when he was recruited out of a Passaic, N.J., high school. Those with any romantic notions about the nature of athletic recruitment might want to consider this paragraph: I... made my first visit to Syracuse. It was a delightful weekend. I received something like \$300 in cash for expenses, a car to drive around, and even a girl.

The seduction of John David Tatum was complete long before he became a roving ambassador of ill will for the Oakland Raiders. Tatum freely admit if he did on the street what he did on the field he would get one to 10, and a lot higher number than 32 on his chest.

It's unclear just when Jack Tatum subverted the original principles of the game and substituted massacre for victory, but it took hold. Over and over in his book, he cops out to skipping the interception of a pass in favor of semi-decapitat-

ing the receiver. If you saw Super Bowl XI and thought it was won by a Stabler-to-Biletnikoff pass, he was disabused. It was decided, Jack Tatum says, by a Tarkenton-to-Sammy White pass. I realize I could have intercepted, he says, but he opted instead to mug Receiver White.

ON AUG. 12, 1978, in a lousy exhibition game, Darryl Stingley, a wide receiver for New England, ran what Tatum calls a dangerous pattern through the middle of Tatum's own defense. It was that, all right. He would have been better off jogging through Central Park at 3 in the morning with a money belt. It was one of those plays where I could have attempted to intercept, Tatum admits candidly, but because of what the owners expect of me when they give me my paycheck, I automatically reacted to the situation by going for the intimidating hit. It was a fairly good hit but nothing exceptional.

That of course depends on the point of view. For Darryl Stingley, it was exceptional. His neck was broken in two places, his spinal cord paralyzed. He will never run a pass pattern again. He will never run anything again. He is on wheels for the rest of his life.

As to remorse, Jack Tatum says, Don't look at me, look at football. Did he corrupt the game -- or did the game corrupt him? The sad thing is, it's academic to Darryl Stingley. Or to Jack Tatum. Victims, both.

Underpaid Guidry grows impatient

FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla. (AP) — Ace left-hander Ron Guidry said Friday that the New York Yankees were stalling on his request for an extension of his "underpaid" contract.

"I feel that I should get what I deserve under present salary scales," said the 29-year-old Guidry. "We have tried to talk to the Yankees, but they continue saying they want to wait until everybody is around."

He indicated "everybody" consisted of all those in the policy making process, including owner George Steinbrenner, executive vice president Cedric Tallis, General Manager Gene Michael and Manager Dick Howser.

A 25-game winner and the American League's Cy Young Award winner in 1978, Guidry is one of the lowest-salaried players on the Yankees' payroll. His pay is fixed at between \$150,000 and \$200,000, putting him in the second 10 of the roster.

He is far off the plateau reached by pitchers of no greater stature, including Nolan Ryan of Houston, who signed for \$1 million a year, and

reliever Bruce Sutter of the Chicago Cubs, who was given an arbitration ruling for \$700,000 a year.

Guidry has two years remaining on his existing contract before he can play out his option and become a free agent.

Because of his success in the past three years, he and his attorney, John

Schneider, have been pressuring the Yankees' front office to rewrite his contract.

Reports circulated by Schneider are that Guidry is pressing for both a huge salary raise and team security. He reportedly is asking \$700,000 a year for seven years or \$800,000 a year for five years, with the

next two years of his contract included.

Another report was that Steinbrenner, miffed that Guidry participated in the "Superstars" television competition during the winter in defiance of the club's wishes, was preparing to offer a trade to San Diego for young outfielder Dave Winfield.

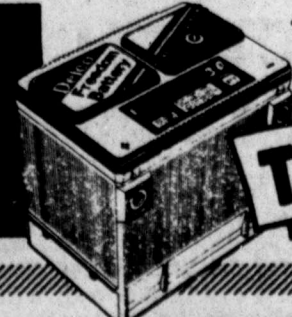

own individual swing within the framework of good basic fundamentals. So, next week, the grip will be discussed.

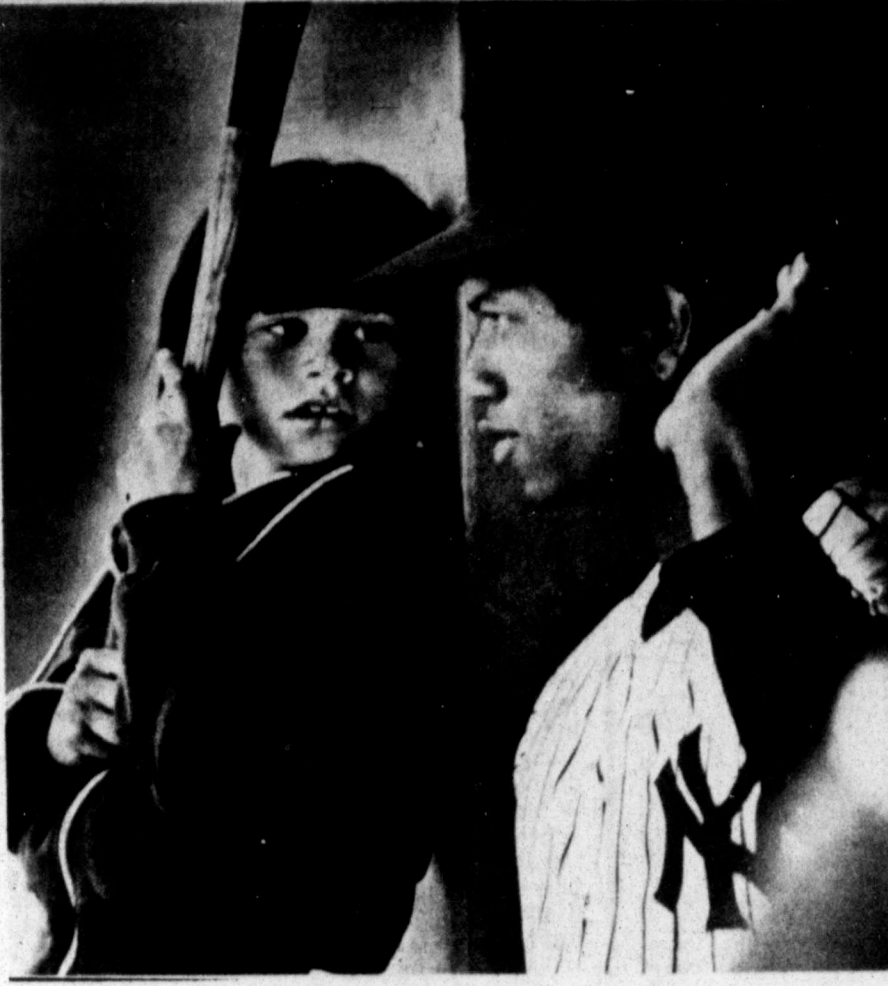

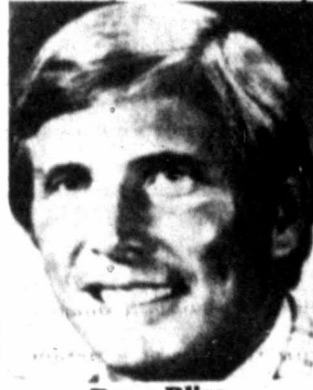
Edwards shot a 71 in the warm, sunny, windy weather and had a two-round total of 137.

# Mustangs hire Bliss

DALLAS (AP) — Dave Bliss, a Bobby Knight disciple of discipline play, accepted the Southern Methodist head basketball coach job Friday on a five-year contract expected to net \$100,000 a year.

The 36-year-old Bliss unreeled a string of one-liners at a news conference in the SMU student center called to name Sonny Allen's successor.

Asked if he had been given a winning timetable by Athletic Director Russ Potts, the boyish-faced Bliss said, "We've got to have results by this afternoon."

Spotting Mustang forward Ollie Hoops in the crowd, Bliss quipped, "Ollie, do you know anybody we can play today?"

Bliss, who coached at Oklahoma five years after being hired away from Indiana where he was an assistant to Knight, said he left OU because of the "positive" aspects of the SMU job.

"SMU has a proud basketball tradition," Bliss said. "And it's a great area to recruit in. I also think having a National Basketball Association franchise can help."

Bliss compiled a 77-62 record and was twice named Big Eight Conference coach of the year. The Sooners won their first Big Eight title in 30 years last season with a 21-10 record.

Oklahoma was 15-12 this year.

Asked to categorize his team, the former Ivy League star at Cornell said, "I hope that we are

the kind of team that plays with intelligence both offensively and defensively."

Bliss said he realized he needed immediate help and added, "It is important for us to recruit the right type of players right away. I've seen some of the SMU players on television but that's about all I know about them."

Bliss was queried about his relationship with the media in Oklahoma and he laughed, "Well, a basketball coach can't act stable all the time. It's a game of emotion and sometimes it's not possible to have sane answers after a tough game. I've always tried to be fair."

Potts, who has been criticized for his heavy-handed way of getting rid of Allen, said, "You're judged in life by two things — the people you put around you and what you do yourself. Who knows, five years from now I might be getting some heat."

Potts said he talked with Knight for more than an hour about Bliss who scored well on level of intensity in recruiting, floor coaching and discipline.

"I believe you have to have a disciplined team today," said Potts. "Tom Landry, Darrell Royal, Eddie Sutton, Dean Smith and John Wooten all win with discipline."

Potts said he was also impressed with Bliss' "energy level."

"This is a young man's game now," said Potts, who added, "Dave will be on the road at 2 p.m. today for Austin" for the Texas high school playoffs.

Allen resigned with two years left on his contract which SMU will pay while Bliss left Oklahoma with permission on three years remaining on his contract. Potts said that Bliss will have a television show and a pregame radio show at SMU.

# Ex-champs enter Indy 500 field

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Three former winners were entered Friday to compete in the 64th Indianapolis 500 as members of the Penske Racing Inc. team, Indianapolis Motor Speedway officials said.

Mario Andretti, Bobby Unser and Rick Mears will drive for the 1980 Penske team in the May 25 race.

Speedway President John Cooper said the Penske entries were the first received for the race, which is expected to attract a field of more than 80 qualifiers.

In only his second 500-mile race, Mears led the field last year after winning the pole position with a qualifying speed of 193.736 mph.

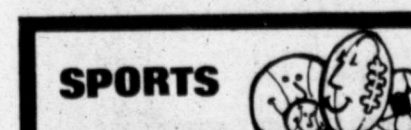

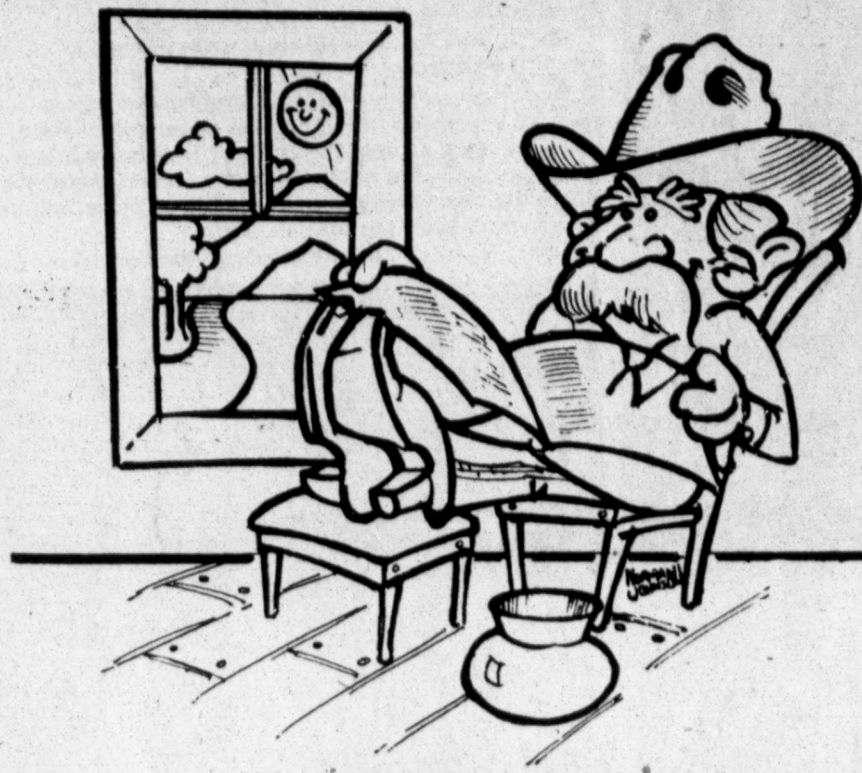

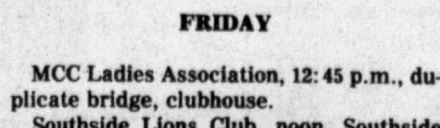

# Blackwood Brothers recall getting caught 'smuggling' Bibles in Russia

One can be purchased here for \$10. But in Russia the price of a Bible is \$125. And that's not over the counter, but on the black market.

That's what the Blackwood Brothers, a nationally known gospel singing group that recently received their sixth Grammy, discovered on their first trip to the Soviet Union in 1976.

The group recalled its experiences in Russia during a recent trip to Midland, which included a concert before a large crowd at Lee High School.

During that first trip to Russia, the train on which the Blackwood Brothers' party of 30 Americans was travelling was stopped at the Russian border, set off by a 20-foot-high barbed-wire fence with strategically placed towers occupied by armed soldiers. Russian soldiers boarded the train to search for and confiscate Bibles and other Christian reading material.

"Before we left the States we had the American Bible Society in New York City print us approximately 400 Bibles in Russian," said James Blackwood, the only member who has been with the group since it started in 1934.

The Blackwoods' compartment door opened and the officer asked, "Do you have any literature?" Cecil Blackwood responded by handing him the book he was reading - "How to Lose Weight." The officer glanced at it, tossed it back at him and left.

The following year the Blackwoods were not so lucky. The group flew to Leningrad and a spot customs check of luggage re-

vealed the Bibles Cecil was carrying. Three-and-a-half-hours later the Russians customs department let him go.

"I was in a 10-foot-square room with a table and a camera in the corner that took my picture over and over," explained Cecil. "I was told that I ought not to bring trash like that in because 'we've got Lenin's teachings.'"

"It's a racket anyway. The Bibles are sold on the black market for \$125."

On their first trip, the Blackwood party had difficulty contacting the Baptist Church in Leningrad once inside Russia.

There is one registered church allowed in each city and the Blackwoods had, before they left, sent five cables and 10 letters to this church, explained James.

"When we arrived, our guide denied that there was any such church. We had gotten the address and phone number from the World Baptist Alliance in Washington, D.C., so we called from the hotel. The pastor (who spoke English) said, 'We have been expecting you.'"

The church had received one cable and one letter.

At the Russian pastor's suggestion, the group took a caravan of taxicabs, minus guide, to the church.

"The place was packed with people standing in the aisles and looking through holes in the walls. We sang as many familiar hymns (in English) as we could. In fact, the congregation would sing, the choir would sing and we would sing. The people were beautiful to us."

"We gave out all 400 Bibles and were asked, 'Will you come back?' That's why we went back the next year."

While visiting another church during their second tour of Russia, James said, they noticed that "as the minister would read from the Bible, the congregation would copy down what he read because all they had was what they copied."

This time the Blackwoods quietly left their Bibles on the seats because they had discovered, James said, "that you can be arrested for either handing a Bible to someone or taking one from someone else."

"Also, the Russians don't take their children to Sunday school because they (the children) can be taken away from them for that and put in state schools. They can't be baptized until they are 18."

Two types of churches exist in Russia — those that are registered and those that are not, James said.

"It is an imprisonable crime to attend one that is not, but those Russians that belong to a registered church get no advancement in their jobs."

One of the most moving experiences the Blackwoods had, James said, involved a 75-year-old minister who had survived five years in Siberia after the 1937 Stalin purge.

One of the members of the Blackwood party was originally from Latvia, Russia. Before the group left the states she had written her aunt who still lived there. Her aunt and an elderly minister had traveled 13 hours to meet them when they arrived, James said.

"We gave him a suitcase of Bibles to take back and he cried as he kissed us first on one cheek and then on the other."

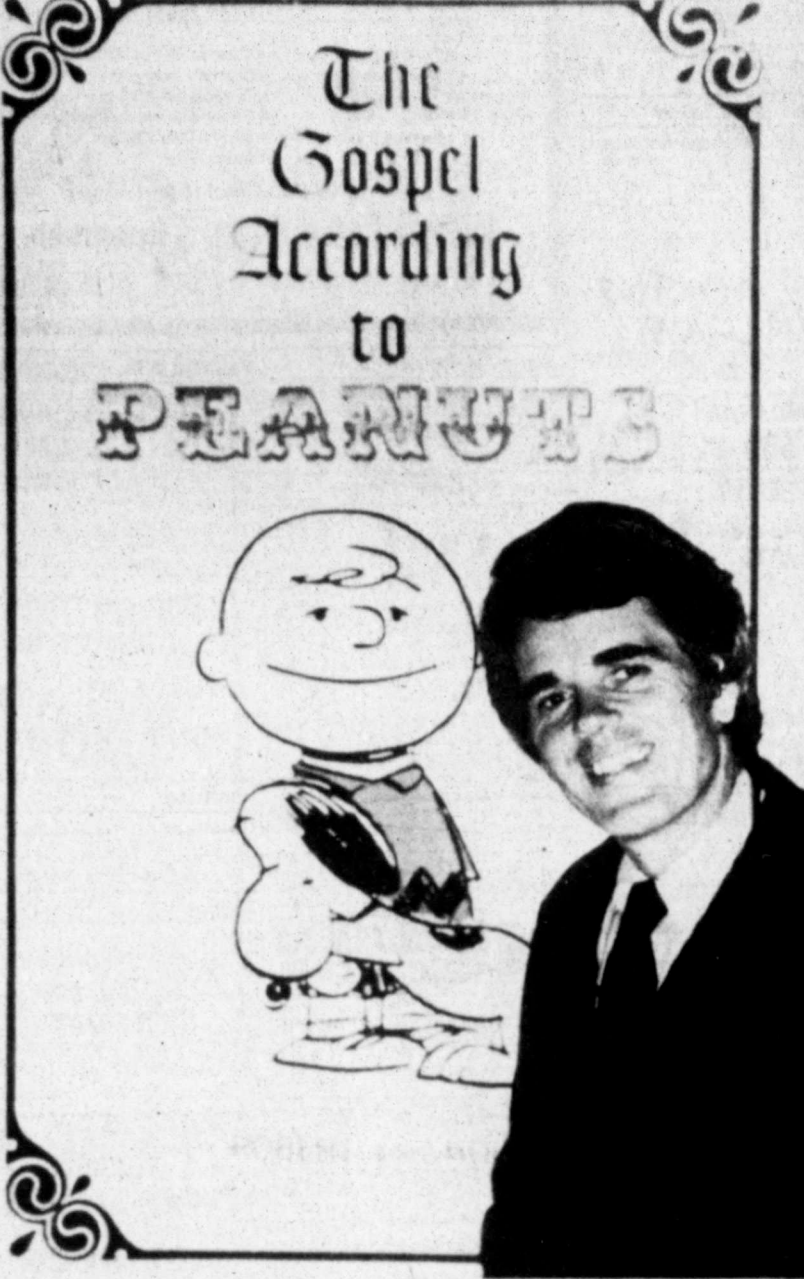

# First Citrus Belt estimates ready

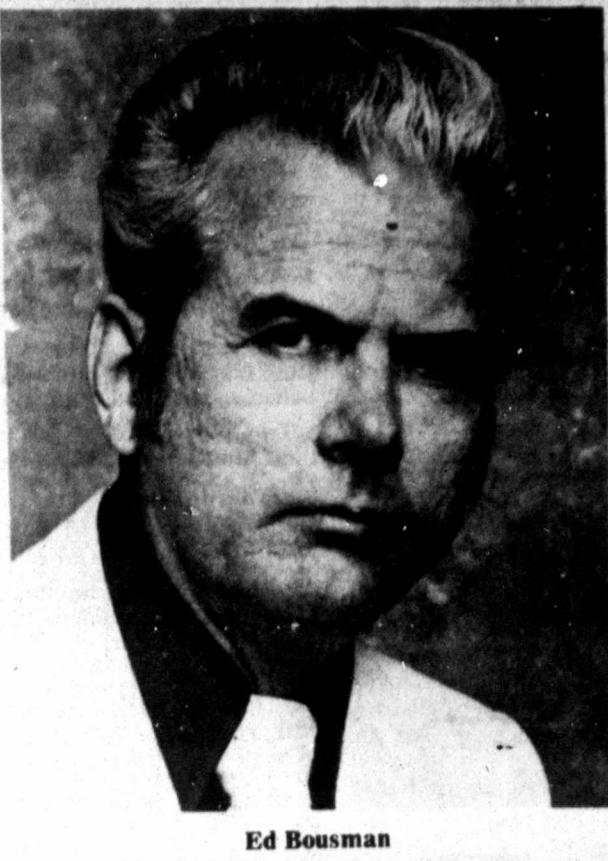
LAKELAND, Fla. (AP) — Preliminary surveys of the Citrus Belt areas hit hardest by this week's record cold snap indicate growers will lose between 5 and 6 million gallons of frozen concentrated orange juice, Florida Citrus Mutual said Friday.

The concentrate yield from a 90-pound box of Valencia oranges could be reduced from 1.33 to 1.29 gallons per box, according to the preliminary figures.

McKown said the survey was made by field representatives through on-site inspections and discussions with growers.

The freeze apparently had little effect on the grapefruit crop, although some fruit was knocked off trees by Sunday's high winds, he said.

He said 93 million boxes of oranges remain to be harvested, including most of the 85-million box Valencia crop. The state's total orange crop is expected to be 205 million boxes, he said.

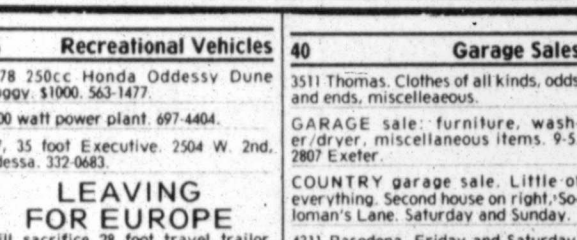

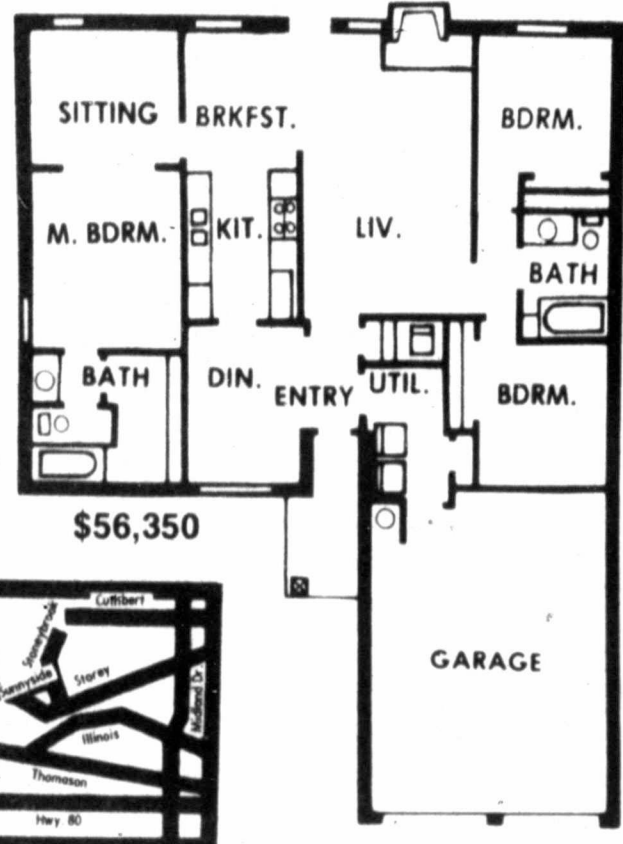

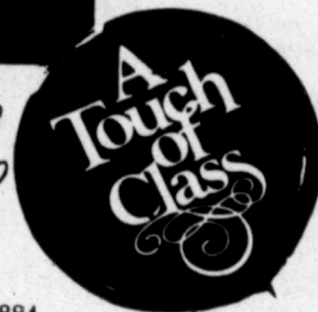
