

#### BIGNESS FOR PEACE

Thomas Jefferson had a word of encouragement that applies to anyone alarmed about the world crisis today. In his first inaugural address, the third President said: But would the honest patriot, in the full tide of successful experiment, abandon a government which has so far kept us free and firm on the theoretic and visionary fear that this government, the world's best hope, may by possibility want energy to preserve itself? I trust not . . ."

Jefferson spoke to a nation young, weak, and troubled. At imes it appeared that the United States of his day might never fulfill its potentialities as the stronghold of the free.

But it did. And the words and vision of men of Jefferson's ilk helped point the way.

Today the task is proportionately no bigger than on March 4,

With the advent of the Atlantic Pact, we of the Atlantic community asknowledge that keeping peace in the world is our task. We acknowledge it—but we also look askance at it. As in Jefferson's time there are those who say the task is too big. Confidence Shrinks

Bigness' Bogey

One prime reason why we lack confidence in the pact, or in the United Nations, or in the prospect that peace can be kept, is of Russia, its army, and its ideology. Fear of the bigness of China, its chaos, and its complex-

It is fear of the bigness of the A-bomb and the B-bomber that whispers between the lines of the A-Pact. Fear of fear itself.

Yet bigness is the very stature of our time. It is the usual symbol of our greatness, not our apprehension. It is the biggest corn crop, the greatest wheat harvest. sprout beyond their parents. Bigger ships, bigger planes, wider day's standard operating proce- ied Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Cudd





# Plan Now For

COLLEGE STATION, March 28-Texas dairymen should be planning now for adequate pasture, hay and silage crops for their herds says, G. G. Gibson, extension dairy husbandman of Texas A. & M. College. Each cow needs at least two tons of hay and three tons of silage. Good pastures will reduce the cost of producing milk and the cow does the harvesting. Lower production costs are daily becoming more important, and the producer who can cut costs now will con-

tinue to find dairying profitable. Now is the time to plan for storage space on the farm for the year's supply of hay, silage and grains. It is always good business to store these feeds when the supply is large and thequality good, says Gib-

Hungry cows grazing on lush clover are subject to bloat; this can cause the loss of animals. Gibson says it is a good idea to feed the cows hay before turning them into clover pastures. This practice will prevent bloat.

Many cows are lost each year because they get wire, nails, bolts, and nuts mixed in with their feed. Watch for this hardware and be sure that none of it gets into feed bins. You'll save more cows if

The Texas Agriculture Experiment Substation ran some tests recently on sweet sudangrass and common sudangrass. At the con-clusion of the experiment, they decided that one is as good as another in sudangrass pastures. Common sudangrass yielded more total forage during the dry years and was drouth resistant. On the other hand, sweet sudan is resistant to the common bacterial foliage di-sease, and holds its lush greenness and palatability better as it approaches maturity with cattle grazing both the leaves and the stalks,

A regular check on the dairy will keep the dairymen in profit-able production, the specialist con-cluded.

### **605** Were Treated At Scottish Rite **Hospital In Dallas**

Six hundred and five crippled children of Texas received surgery and medical attention at the Texas Scottish Rite Hospital for Crippled Children in Dallas, according gin May 1. to the recent annual report re-leased by Asher Mintz, secretaary.

for the year, 5311 clinic treatments were given other crippled children, who came to the hospital from all corners of Texas. ### **Grazing Test Is Underway At Tech**

The third and final phase of a grazing experiment at Texas Technological college for comparative results on feeding Hereford cattle on irrigated pastures of alfalfa, mixed brome and rye grasses and alfalfa and mixed grasses will be-

Ten Hereford yearlings, picked at random from last spring's calf In addition to the 605 in-patients crop on Texas Tech property at Pantex ordnance plant, are to be used for the last test. These same Herefords have been used in a calf feeding experiment and were shown at the Junior Livestock show in Lubbock recently, W. L. Stangel, dean of agriculture, explains. Results of the second test will be completed and published in May. Each phase of the grazing experiment is for one year.

The calves weighed 418 pounds average in November, March 12 their weight was 605 pounds average. The pasture feeding of the calves has been started to demonstrate that calves can be satisfactorily fattened without nurse cows and gain cheaply and profitably. This practice can be followed by 4-H and Future Farmers of America members provided their calf entries receive dry lot classification in shows, Dean Stangel explained.

#### HOUSE BEAUTY AIDS

#### Removing Paint

Old paint and varnish is safely taken off with a com-mercial paint remover. Brush the liquid over the surface generously and allow to stand about 5 minutes . . . until the paint or varnish begins to soften. Then scrape off with putty knife, the strokes going with the grain of the wood. If first application does not remove all the old coat, repeat the process. The surface should be wiped with benzine to clear away all traces of the remover.

#### Painting A Trim

Use small brush for trim jobs, and dip only one-third of the brush into the paint to avoid spattering. Enamel paint is flowed on with straight parallel strokes. If enamel gets too thick in spots, pick up the excess with the brush and move it along the surface or wipe back into can. Wipe off any paint that goes over edge with clean rag. To paint floor or wall trims, use piece of card board or tin to protect surfaces not to be painted.

#### **Painting Frames**

Paint or varnish should be applied to window and mirror frames with a small brush to avoid any over-run of the paint. Here the job is further simplified by use of a masking tape at the mirror edge. The tape with adhesive backing is easily applied and stripped off, catches any paint which goes over the edge. Dry paint spots can be removed from glass with old razor blade in safety scraper.

## Safe Storage Of Sorghum Grains On The Farm Is Now Being Studied

A series of experiments are understorage of sorghum grain on the farm, according to Director R. D. Lewis of the Texas Agricultural Lewis of the Texas Agricultural Refining Company.

These experiments are centered at the Beeville substation.
Cooperating with the Texas Station are the U.S. Production and Marketing Administration and the Corn Products Refining Com-

Sorghum grain is considered a highly perishable crop by Gulf Coast farmers because of its high moisture content. The crop is harvested during June and July and must be sold immediately since there are no facilities for on-thefarm storage.

If practical methods of safe on-the-farm storage can be developed through this study, the farmer will be able to market his sorghum grain in a more orderly manner, Lewis said. He will be better able to take advantage of fluctuations in market prices.

Sorghum grain production has had a tremendous expansion in the Gulf Coast area in the past few years. High temperatures and humidity, and severe insect damage make the safe storage of sor ghum grain in that section very

hazardous, Lewis said. Seventeen storage bins will be used at Beeville for these tests. Seven are made of steel, four of wood, three of temporary construction and four are underground pits. Each bin will hold from 1,000 to

Tech field. Coach Hedges track squad will be competing on those two days for district honors and a chance to take some of his men to the state meet in Austin to vie for state honors.




