





Fight for West Texas water will be taken to Austin it has been announced by John D. Mitchell, Odessa, president of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, which this week blasted 17 amendments to the new water code proposed by the Texas Water Conservation Ass'n.

Representatives of the organization will spend most of this week in Austin girded for the fight they will make on the passage of the new code, unless amendments are accepted which will guarantee recovery and prior water rights for domestic purposes in the West Texas area.

In a statement issued by WTCC Manager D. A. Bandeen and members of the legal counsel of the Municipal Rights committee an analysis of the proposed surface water code is offered, in which it is pointed out contradictory features of the bill, as well as making nugatory present prior rights of municipalities. The statement, made to Mitchell and Mayor Lawrence Hagy of Amarillo, chairman of the WTCC Municipal Legal Water Rights Committee, took up the proposed code section by sec-


tion and listed the 17 objectionable points, offered criticism and an amendment to replace them.

the adoption of an engineering formula.

"When we find our Texas cities ranging in water appropriations from one-eighth acre foot per capita to approximately 10 acre feet per capita, a procedure enabling this sort of inequality is against for Texas to arrive at and formulate an equitable formula for distribution and appropriations of its water," the statement said. 



The Hoover Commission was authorized by the 80th Congress to conduct a study of the organization of the executive branch of the government and to make recommendations for changes. The findings and recommendations of the Commission will be published in from 40 to 50 volumes to be issued at irregular intervals during the next few months. The first report to make its appearance will probably be the over-all report.

In addition to the reports and ecommendations, task force studies will also be included in the documents. Among the subjects to

During the fall months very dittle moisture was received in was almost given up for lost. Some wheat was blown out by the hard winds about that time but this was only a small per-

centage of the total acreage. One farmer told The Journal that he has 900 acres of wheat that looks as good as he ever had, and that practically no blowing occurred during the fall. He planted just after a nice rain had fallen in

September. Reports from various parts of the Plains indicate the present moisture will last until mid-March or early April, when another rain will be needed to carry the fast growing plants along, then in early summer, when plants begin to head out further moisture will be needed.

People of the Muleshoe country are hopeful of having a fair wheat crop to "tide over" from last fall's short feed and cotton crops and start the money to rolling. How-ever, crops of alfalfa, beans, etc. be coming off about that will time, so that it is only a matter of a very few months until cash crops will be coming out of the fields of this territory.


