## Feds hope tapes will show Clayton wasn't entrapped

HOUSTON (AP) — Federal prosecutors were expected to use transcripts of secretly taped conversations today to convince a federal judge Texas House Speaker Billy Clayton and three other defendants in the Texas Brilab sting operation were not entrapped.

U.S. District Judge Robert O'Conor was to consider 50 defense pre-trial motions that prompted prosecutors to make use of the transcripts while filing 17 answers

Clayton, L.G. Moore, a Deer Park labor leader, and two Austin lawyers, Randall B. Wood and Donald W. Ray, are scheduled to go on trial before O'Conor on Sept. 8.

The defense contends the tapes were obtained illegally and cannot be used against the defendants and contends the indictments should be dismissed in that the defendants were entrapped in a conspiracy orchestrated by an FBI informant, Joseph Hauser, and others.

The June 12 indictments charge extortion, racketeering, fraud and conspiracy and allege Clayton accepted \$5,000 in cash and was promised \$600,-

The government contends the money talk took place as Hauser, aided by Moore, posed as a representative of a fictitious insurance agency that was seeking a valuable contract on insurance for state employees.

Clayton has said he received \$5,000 from Hauser and Moore but planned to return the money.

One of the transcripts prosecutors released quotes Clayton, upon receiving the \$5,000, as saying, "We appreciate the heck out of it." Of the \$600,-000, Clayton is quoted as saying, "I want to tell you it sure would help pay

some of my bills." During the Nov. 8 meeting, Hauser is quoted as telling Clayton, "I hear in the rumbles you got a good shot to be the next governor.'

Clayton is quoted as responding, "I feel like we've got a good shot," adding later that "... our only position is we don't want to do anything that's illegal or anything to get anybody in trouble and you all don't either.'

In Brownsville, Clayton says he wasn't bothered by last week's release of transcripts of taped conversations federal prosecutors used to indict him in connection with an alleged bribery scheme.

'They're going to be released one way or another, so it's all the same to me," said Clayton, who was in Brownsville Sunday to address the Texas Public Employees Associa-

Roy Minton, one of Clayton's attorneys, said an attempt might be made to close the hearing.

According to the the transcripts, Clayton said, "We appreciate the heck out of it," when an FBI informant handed him \$5,000 last Novem-

# Officials install tough security at airports

MIAMI (AP) - Armed federal sky marshals were ordered onto selected commercial aircraft as security agents, wary after a record three hijackings to Cuba in one day, foiled what the FBI said was yet another hijack attempt Sunday.

Many marshals would wear plain clothes, officials said, and would act on a policy that security checks at airports were the best way to prevent hijackings. "We don't want any shootouts in the sky," said John Leyton, a spokesman for the Federal Aviation Administration in Washington.

Two men — both Cuban refugees were arrested at Miami International Airport on Sunday with bottles of gasoline as they tried to board Air Florida's flight from Miami to Key West, said FBI agent Bill Hayes.

A third man, seeing talking to the other two, was also taken into custody, but was released later without being charged, Hayes said.

The arrests capped a week in which six U.S. jets were hijacked to Cuba. all by Cuban refugees unhappy with life in the United States, according to Hays. Four other Cubans were arrested in Tampa on Saturday night before boarding a flight with gasoline, officials said. Details on charges against the men found carrying gasoline were not immediately available.

The six hijackings were the most in a single week in U.S. history, and the three Saturday were the most in a single day. All planes, passengers and

Meanwhile, airline officials said travelers held to their plans, but pas-sengers were buying more insurance in case they were caught in a hijack-ing that ended tragically, an airport insurance agent said.

"They are a little worried," Adelpha Toledo said Sunday as she sold a \$100,000 policy to a man headed for New York's LaGuardia Airport. Yesterday a lot of people bought insurance. They're afraid, if they do get hijacked, of what's going to hap-

Acting U.S. Attorney Vincent Antle of Miami promised vigorous prosecution of anyone caught attempting a

"There are travelers on planes who have weak hearts and the excitement and fear of a bomb threat or fire could result in fatal heart attacks," he warned. "A small mistake aboard a hijacked plane, such as a pistol shot or the flame of a match, could end in a crash and the loss of hundreds of

Federal Aviation Administration spokesman Roger Myers said marshals would fly on randomly chosen aircraft leaving Florida and on other routes, including Miami-New York. In many cases, passengers would not know a marshal was aboard, he

"These sky marshals will be flying selected flights out of Florida and from some other cities," he said in Atlanta. "But Florida is the hot spot

And that was there, at least in considerable measure, as evidence of U.S. military strength to remind the Iranians that the U.S. has military strength in that area."

Appearing with Bush at a Los Angeles news conference on Saturday, Reagan said his intention would be to restore "governmental relations" with Taiwan broken when President Carter's administration established full diplomatic ties with China 18 months ago.

### No Chinese red carpet out for George Bush on this trip

PEKING (AP) — George Bush was the U.S. government's chief representative in Peking only five years ago. But now that he is Ronald Reagan's running mate, the Chinese government does not plan to roll out the red carpet for his return on Wednesday.

"His visit is strictly private," said a Chinese official in explaining why American correspondents outside China are not being given visas to cover the visit of the Republican vicepresidential candidate.

It's not that Bush is unpopular with the Chinese. He was well-regarded by them during his 1974-75 stay as head of the U.S. Liaison Office, before the United States recognized the Communist government. If the Chinese are reserved toward him now, it's because of the company he is keeping.

Chinese officials want to know whether Reagan plans to re-establish official relations with the Nationalist government on Taiwan if he is elect-

Reagan said last June that was what he would do, and the Chinese reacted with indignation. They were somewhat mollified when Richard Allen, Reagan's principal campaign coordinator for foreign policy, said this shouldn't be taken too seriously. But on Sunday Xinhua, the official Chinese news agency, carried an American news agency report that Reagan, in bidding Bush goodbye in Los Angeles the day before, advocated official relations between the United States and Taiwan again and said this would not mean closing the U.S. Embassy in Peking.

Xinhua said the American agency's report was headed "Reagan supports 'both Chinas' policy.'

### Tighter airport security causes longer lines for passgeners

Newlywed Patricia Altvater was also waiting in one of the long lines Sunday. She was angry. Not over the lines, but over what she called the government's disorganized policy of handling Cuban refugees.

"I think it's a shame the whole thing wasn't organized in a more humane way," she said.

Officials identified the successful and would-be hijackers as Cubans who had been among the 118,000 refugees to arrive in the U.S. since April aboard "Freedom Flotilla" boats. The State Department on Sunday again urged the Cuban government to allow unhappy refugees to return to the island. But the Cuban government has yet to respond.

Meanwhile, officials are fighting the wave of hijackings with increased security measures, including putting marshals aboard flights and scrutinizing luggage.

But airline officials report neither the long lines at security stations nor the threat of hijackings have dampened passengers' spirits.

'Surprisingly, bookings aren't down'' said Robin Cohn, an Air Florida spokeswoman. Air Florida had two of its Miami-Key West jetliners diverted to Havana during last week's air piracy surge.

"On Friday," she said, "boardings to Key West were up 10 percent" compared to two weeks ago. I think some people might want to go now —

tions gather Thursday and Friday for a "national affairs briefing." The sessions, highlighted by a Reagan appearance Friday, are aimed at awakening a "sleeping giant" by rallying Christians to endorse conserva-

tive tenets with votes. "This one meeting could easily turn out an extra 5 million or perhaps 10 million voters. That should quiet those who ridicule us," says the Rev. James Robison, television evangelist and an organizer of the two-day con-

The issue, conference organizers say, is the survival of America.

'Christians have been led to believe the lie that they are not supposed to affect policy making," said Robison, who has a ministry near Fort Worth and helped organize this week's gath-

"Which means that if the poor people, family people, religious people stay out of politics, that leaves policy making to the radicals, to the wicked, the anti-God and the anti-moral."

Robison and other ministers have vowed to unite behind candidates opposing liberal causes such as homosexual rights, the Equal Rights Amendment, abortion and government interference in church mat-

"A Gallup poll showed that 70 percent of those who profess to know Christ did not vote in the last presidential election. That's criminal. There's got to be a get-tough attitude among Christians ... or this nation is through," says Robison.

Among those who have agreed to address the gathering, expected to attract 10,000 people, are anti-ERA activist Phyllis Schlafly, former Texas Gov. and Treasury Secretary

John Connally, Brig. Gen. Albion Knight, U.S. Sen. Jesse Helms, R-N.C., U.S. Rep. Phillip Crane, R.-Ill., and television evangelists the Rev. Jerry Falwell and Pat Robertson. We want to influence all viable



Killed was Roman Galindo, in his 20s. He was pronounced dead by Peace Justice Manuel Valles.



Reagan also recited a string of alleged Carter injustices to veterans, describing the president's treatment of veterans as "unconscionable," "regrettable and insensitive," "hypocrisy" and a "betrayal."

'This present anti-veteran administration has stacked the deck against you through the vast power of the White House," Reagan told the VFW convention.

"It has not escaped me that the Carter administration has cut the Veterans Administration budget each and every year of its incumbency with respect to the federal budget....Where has the money denied our deserving veterans gone? Surely not to our national defense, which is in shambles," Reagan said.

Speaking of Vietnam veterans, Reagan said the Carter administration has been "shabby" in the benefits it has given them.

"It is the height of hypocrisy for the administration in high-sounding words to repeatedly tell us how much we owe our Vietnam veterans and then, only in this election year, recommend a stingy 10 percent increase in the GI Bill when these veterans have not had an increase since 1977, Reagan said.

"It is a breach of faith that compensation for those with service-connected disabilities has not kept abreast of inflation," he added.

Reagan said he believes the best hope of maintaining peace with the Soviet Union "is to convince them they cannot win at war," repeating his willingness as president to spend "whatever it takes to be strong enough that no other nation will dare violate the peace."

### Reagan strategists plan assault on Carter's base

ATLANTA(AP) - Ronald Reagan's strategists are plotting an assault on President Carter's political heartland — the southern states Carter swept in 1976.

National and regional Republican directors were joining Reagan campaign chairmen from 14 states today for a two-day summit meeting to plan the assault on the South.

"It's Carter's base," said Lee Atwater, southeastern regional political director of the Reagan campaign. "He swept the South in 1976, but all the data in the last few months indicates that he's in deep trouble. Sensing the possibility of victory, the Republicans are placing a "new

emphasis" on the South this year, by Atwaters's account. "If he (Carter) can't sweep the South, he doesn't have a political base," Atwater said in an interview last week. "And you can't win in American politics without a political base. The meeting will be geared with that in mind."

Atwater said today's session, with Rep. Carroll A. Campbell Jr. R-S.C., serving as chairman, would examine polling information, inspect state campaign finances, schedule campaign appearances and deal with

Bill Timmons, national director of the Reagan campaign, and Dick Wirthland, Reagan's national campaign strategist, were scheduled to address the group.

Southern Republican leaders are hopeful about their chances, even in Georgia, Carter's home state. "I can only say that if the present trend continues, Reagan would carry

the state," Georgia GOP Chairman Matt Patton said.

### Begin puts finishing touches on his reply to Sadat's letter

TEL AVIV, Israel (AP) — Israeli press reports said today that Prime Minister Menachem Begin will tell Egyptian President Anwar Sadat that a summit on the stalled Palestinian talks cannot replace the Camp David peace accords, and that Begin will insist Egypt immediately resume the negotia-

Begin met with Israel's negotiating team today to put finishing touches on a reply to Sadat's letter, the second in which he blamed Israel for the failure of the 15-month-old talks to achieve significant progress toward establishing a self-governing authority in the occupied West Bank and the Gaza

Sadat suspended the negotiations earlier this month to protest Israel's adoption of legislation affirming undivded Jerusalem as its eternal capi-

Sadat called for a three-way summit with President Carter on Friday, saying that the meeting should be held after November's presidential election. American officials have not said whether they would welcome such a meeting, but a State Department spokesman said the negotiations should resume as soon as possible.

Begin was expected to include in his letter a point-by-point rebuttal of Sadat's charges that Israel bided by the Camp David accords in its settlement activities in the occupied territories and its actions in the eastern sector of Jerusalem.

The Maariv newspaper reported that Begin also would ask for an explanation of Sadat's remark that "the tale of the people of Israel started in Egypt, and it appears that it is God's will that it end there.

In an editorial, the Jerusalem Post castigated Egypt's Al Gomhouriya newspaper for publishing a cartoon portraying Israel's annexation of Jerusalem as similar to Hitler's annexations in Eastern Eu-

The cartoon showed Begin under a blazing sun labeled "world anger" and carrying a swastikashaped umbrella symbolizing the Jerusalem decision. The caption read: "The Nazi decision."

"This type of warfare is uncondonable today even where there is no formal peace, let alone where peace has been formally concluded," the paper wrote. "For Egyptians to use the Nazi hatchet on Israel, with Mr. Sadat's license, is an unspeakable

Israeli Foreign Minister Yitzhak Shamir last week protested another Al Gomhouriya cartoon which showed Begin receiving a swastika-shaped medal from Hitler. A Foreign Ministry spokesman said Shamir had not yet received a reply to his protest.

In the United Arab Emirates, the president of Abu Dhabi was quoted today as calling for Arab states to created a united military command to wage war against Israel. "There is no other option for the Arabs except war to deter Israel and its supporters," the newspaper Alwihdah quoted Sheik Zayid ibin

### Tampons may be cause of teen-ager's death

LIVERMORE, Calif. (AP) — A teen-aged girl who died of a heart attack may have been the victim of toxic shock syndrome, a disease associated with the use of tampons, a county coroner said.

Diane Silva, 15, of Livermore died Aug. 10 at Valley Memorial Hospital, a few hours after being admitted with complaints of a fever, cramps and diarrhea, according to Roland Prahl, Alameda County coroner. Prahl said Saturday he would send material on the case to the U.S. Center for Disease

#### Millions homeless after rains

DACCA, Bangladesh (AP) - Rain-swollen rivers inundated more than 100,000 acres of croplands, killing seven people and forcing more than two million people from their homes, authorities said today. The confirmed number of dead since flooding began last week rose to 13.





### Third World nations should shelve expectations

One of the favorite words of the politics of the last two decades was "expectations." Expectations were often spoken of as rising or being

Now the funny thing about these expectations is that when some Americans spoke of them rising, they were talking about other nations, and when they were suggesting that they be lowered, they were talking to us.

To hear them tell it, my kid is

supposed to lower his expectations while an Ethiopian raises his. Excuse me, but there is a place you can file that proposition and you won't find it in an office supply store. Actually, any Ethiopian who has

rising expectations is either on his way to the United States or crazy and the same can be said for most of the citizens of the so-called Third World. Let us cleave away the upper middle class liberal guilt (today's version of self-flageilators) as well as propaganda and general academic eyes on he world as it is.

Many of the nations in the Third World are nations in name only. Their boundaries were drawn on maps by European politicians divvying up the spoils of war. Those boundaries were drawn, in most cases, either to cheat the man across the table or to establish a useable colony. They were not drawn to establish viable nations and quite often no thought at all was given to natural geographic boundaries or tribal areas. Many of today's independent nations lack both sufficient land and resources to support their

pour into Egypt, for example; Egypt is never going to make it as an indegendent nation, trying to squeeze 40odit million people into the Nile delta. There is a limit to how many people you can stuff into an army or jam into the bureaucracies or export as labor. Egypt can make it as head of a small empire or as a colony, but not as an independent nation.

Imperialism has been made a dirty word by the imperialistic Soviet Union's propaganda apparatus, but the fact is that empires are viable entities while the great majority of nations are not.

We have seen since World War II the breakup of the British, French. German, Dutch and Japanese empires and the rise of the Soviet and American empires and the struggle between the two, a struggle we are losing since we refuse to face our choices honestly

To some extent, both we and the Soviets are victims of our own propaganda which has fostered all of those rising expectations. Both we and the Soviets were happy to feed the flames of nationalism so long as our economic rivals were being burned. Now every ethnic group and sub-group on the planet either claims or aspires to expectations.

### Iran invasion plan has mid-October date

WASHINGTON - A startling, topsecret plan to invade Iran with powerful military force has been prepared for President Carter. The ostensible purpose is to rescue the hostages, but the operation would also exact military retribution.

This would create a crisis on the eve of the election. Political studies show that support for the incumbent president has always soared dramatically during a national crisis.

### Rebels say Soviet air raids killed 1,200

ISLAMABAD, Pakistan (AP) - Afghan rebels claim Soviet air attacks on 22 villages killed more than 1,200 men, women and children celebrating the end of Moslem holy month of Ramadan. Other sources report a new post-Ramadan rebel offensive, and say a team of Soviet generals is in

Kabul planning a counter-strike.

The Afghan rebel group Hizbe Islami, the Islamic Front, said in a statement issued in Islamabad that nearly 30 Soviet bombers and helicopters destroyed 22 villages in Wardak Province, south of the Afghan capital of Kabul

It said the raids occurred last Tuesday during "the Moslem festival of Eid," a joyous celebration marking the end of the 30-day Ramadan period of dawn-to-dusk fasting.

Like most rebel reports, this one could not be independently confirmed. Such reports often contain exaggerated claims.

Nor was there any confirmation of a report reaching the Indian capital of New Delhi on Sunday that rebel Moslem guerrillas launched a string of post-Ramadan raids against Afghan government troops and their Soviet allies around Kabul:

The report, from a source in Kabul who has proved accurate in the past, said the rebels killed 13 Soviets and captured four others in a raid near the sprawling Bagram military air base north of Kabul

The source said rebels also took a busload of 22 Afghan air force pilots and mechanics hostage last week about 40 miles north of Kabul. He said the guerrillas offered to trade them for guerrillas captured during Ramadan, but the government replied with stepped-up helicopter gunship attacks

on rebel strongholds.

The source did not report what be-

came of the hostages. The Kremlin has maintained 85,000 or more Soviet troops in Afghanistan since last December to bolster the pro-Moscow Kabul government in its war against the anti-communist guerrillas. Diplomats say Soviet troops are in firm control of Afghan cities but face stiff resistance from the

guerrillas in the rugged countryside. Weekend reports from Afghanistan said a team of top Soviet generals was meeting in Kabul to plan a major new offensive against the rebels. The reports from reliable sources gave no

### Battle troops land in Espiritu Santo

LUGANVILLE, Espiritu Santo (AP) — Two hundred Papua New Guinea troops with full battle gear landed on this rebellious South Pacific island Monday to take over peacekeeping duties from a force of 200

British commandos and French paratroopers.

As the force landed, a rebel radio broadcast threatened civil war and said the streets would run with blood if foreign troops did not leave the

island, the largest of the 72 New Hebrides. The British and French troops left two hours after the arrival of the Papua New Guineans.

French military planes evacuated 56 French residents, most of them women and children, to New Caledonia Sunday in anticipation of clashes between the rebels and the New Guinean soldiers. A French navy landing craft completed the loading of personal belongings of French residents of the island Monday

France and Britain governed the New Hebrides jointly for 74 years. In May, two months before the archipelago was to get independence under a government dominated by English-speaking residents, a Melanesian tribal chief and former bulldozer driver named Jimmy Stevens led a bow-and-arrow rebellion on Espiritu Santo by French and part-French settlers and native bushmen. The rebellion was backed by French landowners and a group of right-wing Americans who hoped to establish a tax-free haven for unrestricted capitalism on the island

The joint force of French and British troops was not sent to the island until just before the New Hebrides became the independent nation of Vanuatu on July 30. Since then, the central government has failed to establish its authority over the rebels, and the British-French force has made no attempt to arrest rebel leaders or close down their radio station despite demands for action from the Vanuatu government.

### Group alleges attacks on juvenile refugees

FORT McCOY, Wis. (AP) - Teenage Cubans whose resettlement status is uncertain are living in fear at the Fort McCoy refugee center, some driven to suicide attempts to avoid attacks by other refugees, a Cuban-American organization has charged.

The Cuban American Legal Defense and Education Fund of Fort Wayne, Ind., said it filed suit in U.S. District Court at Madison seeking safe quarters for an estimated 375 juveniles at the western Wisconsin

The juveniles, who arrived in the U.S. in the "Freedom Flotilla" boatlift, were not accompanied by parents and thus have been considered ineligible for resettlement under federal

Graciela Beecher, board president of the fund, said she visited the camp for two days at the request of refugees who want to help the teen-agers. She said in a telephone interview from Fort Wayne that the youngsters "live

'They have been raped ... They told me they were drinking shampoo to kill themselves," she said.

The group's suit, filed Friday on behalf of all the camp's juveniles, said rights of due process and of freedom from cruel and unusual pun-ishment are being violated.

Officials at the camp said Saturday

they were unaware of the court ac-

The youths, classified by the gov-ernment as "unattached minors" are among 5,600 remaining refugees at

"Many of the juveniles are desper-ate," said Nic Gutierrez, an interpret-er for the U.S. Catholic Conference. "They are just jumping fences and going through barbed wire to try to get out of there."

Gutierrez said conditions have been worsening, and the juveniles should

be removed from the camp.

A series of fights erupted last week during which about two dozen refugees were injured. The La Crosse Tribune, in a copyright story in Sunday's editions, said tension that sparked the fighting is being blamed on the Aguilas or Eagles, an organization of about 700 refugees created by center efficiels to maintain order in center officials to maintain order in the camp's barracks.

Gov. Lee S. Dreyfus, meanwhile, criticized center officials during the weekend for the recent disappearance of a 26-year-old refugee, Jose Alfredo Sanchez.



Have you noticed that any time your neighbors seem to have the slightest problem with a water faucet or a clogged sink they immediately panic and call the plumber? Neither step is necessary in most cases.

For most minor tragedies a plumber is not needed. With a few tips that we're about to give you, you'll be able to fix it yourself and save enough money to buy a good gourmet dinner

First, let's look at a clogged sink drain. The source of your troubles is usually close to the fixture and, thus, you or any able-bodied member of your family should be able to solve the problem without paying the

Forget those chemical cleaners. They won't solve the problems if something solid is clogging your drain, plus, they are quite caustic and injurious to skin. Instead get a rubber suction cup plunger, also known as a "plumber's friend." One of your neighbors probably has one, if you don't have one laying around the

Now, leave just enough water in the sink to cover the bottom of the suction cup. This provides an airtight seal over the drain. Hold the handle of the

plunger absolutely vertical. Push it down quickly and pull it up quickly. This alternate compression and



### Strike halts shipping in Poland's major ports

GDANSK, Poland (AP) - The strike in a three-city industrial area on Poland's Baltic coast blocked shipping in the nation's largest seaports today, and a special government commission arrived to begin negotiations with strike leaders demanding sweeping changes.

"Many enterprises in the tri-city are on strike, including the ports of Gdansk and Gdynia," the official Gdansk Radio said. "There is, therefore, no movement of ships. There will be no arrivals or departures of ships with the white and red (Polish)

Nevertheless, a Polish ferry sailed as usual from Karlskrona, Sweden to Gdynia, with no plans of limiting service, a company spokesman said. Edward Gierek, the Polish Commu-

nist Party leader, postponed a trip to West Germany where he was expected to ask for economic aid for Poland's rising economic troubles. The strikers expected him to address the nation on the labor unrest. No reason was given for the postponement of the trip, which was to have begun Tues-

A commission headed by Deputy Prime Minister Tadeusz Pyka was expected to meet with a 13-member negotiating committee representing all the strikers in Gdansk, Gdynia and Sopot, dissident sources said.

They said the workers' committee was headquartered in the giant V.I. Lenin Shipyard here, occupied by as many as 16,000 workers since Thursday, and that it issued 16 demands in the name of all strikers in the area. They said 30 enterprises had joined

The demands included an increase in average monthly wage from the current \$170 to \$236 to compensate for meat price hikes, meat rationing to stabilize the market, liquidation of special shops for the police and Communist Party officials, guarantees of the right to strike and establish free trade unions, freedom of expression, abolition of censorship, and release of all political prisoners.

The strike-bound region 200 miles north of Warsaw has a population of 700,000, including some 200,000 workers. Although the actual number of strikers was not known, at least 80,000 workers were reported affected.

In addition to shutting down the ports and the Lenin Shipyard, Poland's biggest, whose workers average \$267 a month in wages, the walkouts idled most refinery operations and transportation in Gdansk, a factory in Gdynia that manufactures electric equipment for ships and other plants in the area.

### French fishermen's strike blockades harbors of Corsica

strike by French fishermen that brought chaos to English Channel ports spread today to the Mediterranean with the blockade of three harbors on the island of Cor-

The fishermen closed the ports of Bastia, Ile Russe and Calvi in solidarity with other fishermen blocking ports from Cherbourg to Dunkirk on the northern French

Coming at the height of the holiday season, the action by the Corsican fishermen inconvenienced thousands of travelers aboard car ferries bound for mainland ports such as Nice or on their

way to Corsica. Thousands of British tourists already were stranded in make-shift hotels at schools and clubs in the Normandy ports as companies that operated channel car car ferries to and from France switched operations to other ports.

With some 400 miles of harbor along the northern coast completely blocked, many motorists drove on to the Belgian ports of Ostend and Zeebrugge to catch a ferry home. The result was

### Top British diplomat called in for talks on jailed Iranians

Iranian Foreign Minister Sadeq Ghotbzadeh called in the top British diplomat in Tehran today and demanded an immediate solution to the problem of Iranian demonstrators imprisoned in London, saying the issue would affect relations between the two countries, the Iranian Foreign Ministry said.

The ministry disclosed no details of the meeting which came one day after Britain, apparently fearful of a takeover like the seizure of the U.S. Embassy in Tehran, temporarily closed its embassy in the Iranian capital following demonstrations by thousands protesting the arrest of the Iranians in London.

The British Foreign Office said eight of its diplomats were being recalled, but a senior diplomat, Charge d'Affaires Arthur Wyatt, and three others would remain in Tehran to provide consular protection for the estimated 250 Britons still living in

A spokesman described the move as a "precautionary measure at a time of tension" and said the closure was temporary. He also said no more visas are being issued for Iranians to visit Britain.

Relations between Britain and Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini's revolutionary regime worsened after British police arrested 68 Iranians at violent anti-American demonstration outside the U.S. Embassy in London on Aug. 4. The Iranians, 40 of whom remain in jail facing trial on weapons and assault charges, were protesting the arrest in Washington of the 191 Iranian demonstrators on July 27. Those arrested in Washington were subsequently released.

The Iranian Foreign Ministry said it had been told a London court would decide early this week whether or not to free to jailed Iranians.

Iran's Parliament, which is empowered to decide the fate of the Americans, met Sunday, but appeared no closer to opening its hostage debate.

The legislators voted to reject the credentials of a Jewish member, Eshaq Farahmandpur, who was accused of having connections with the late Shah Mohammad Reza Pahlavi, cooperating with an international Jewish organization and opposing the execution earlier this year of Albert Danielpur, a prominent Iranian Jew, Tehran Radio said.



## Flood damage in Pennsylvania high

BRADY'S BEND, Pa. (AP) - A flash flood that ripped through three counties in western Pennsylvania, killing seven people, caused about \$42 million in damage, state officials

"These figures are still being re-fined, but they're in the ballpark," a spokesman for the state Emergency Maanagement Agency said Sunday in Harrisburg.

Gov. Dick Thornburgh was to ask the federal government today to declare the three counties a disaster area, according to Joseph Ketchum of the state Department of Community Affairs. The declaration would make residents eligible for low-interest loans to rebuild homes and busin-

Damage to private property was estimated at \$25 million, while damage to public property was set at \$17 million, according to Craig Williamson, deputy director of the emergency management agency.

Heavy rainfall, including four inches in 30 minutes recorded in Brady's Bend, swelled creeks and streams late Thursday and early Fri-

The torrents poured into more than half a dozen communities in Armstrong, Butler and Clarion counties, washing away houses, trailers, cars

The hardest hit town was Brady's Bend, the hom of all seven drowning victims. A woman and a 2-year-old boy were

still missing.

Scores of area residents and volunteers shoveled away mud, picked through debris and took stock of their belongings Sunday.
Marc Hillwig, civil defense director

for Armstrong County, said about 360 people had been made homeless. All of them were staying with friends, relatives or volunteers, he said.

"The cleanup is going to take a long, long time," said Loretta Posey, a volunteer worker at a command post in Brady's Bend.

"Trees and shrubs are flattened. People have been hauling mud out from everywhere. It's unbelievable,"

### Five guards injured in prison disturbance

STILLWATER, Minn. (AP) - Officials of Minnesota State Prison were searching a cellblock for weapons today after a brief uprising by inmates that left five guards injured.

About 20 inmates, armed with screwdrivers and pieces of pipe, took over a cell hall for eight minutes Sunday before guards broke up the disturbance by firing shots into a ceiling, said Warden Robert Erick-

He said the cellblock was locked up and was being searched for weapons.

One guard was in stable condition at St. Paul Ramsey Medical Center early today. Hospital officials said he received stitches for unspecified in-

"He was beaten up by the inmates," Erickson said.

Four other guards were treated and released. The disturbance began about 7 p.m. CDT during a recreation period, Erickson said. He said most of the inmates involved were Indians.

He said the uprising may have been motivated by an incident earlier Sunday in which an Indian inmate threw his tray of food at a guard. The inmate was transferred, Erickson said, and during the move both the inmate and the guard were injured. Further details were not available immediately.

Erickson said charges would be filed against inmates identified as participating in the distur-



NEW YORK (AP) - Jurors in the Abscam trial already have seen a videotape showing U.S. Rep. Michael O. Myers receiving \$50,000 from an FBI undercover agent, and this week the rest of the country may get a chance to watch it as well

The trial of Myers and three co-defendants was to enter its second week today with the prosecution planning to show more tapes and the judge to decide if he will allow the FBI tapes to be shown on network television

On Friday, U.S. District Judge George C. Pratt granted a request from the three major commercial networks to be allowed to broadcast the tapes entered into evidence, one of which shows Myers, a Pennsylvania Democrat, receiving \$50,000 in a

motel room.

But Pratt said the ruling wouldn't go into effect until 5 p.m. today and said he might allow the defense, which objected to the decision, a fur-

Flooding forces evacuations

WHEELING, W.Va. (AP) - Heavy rains sent scores of small streams in northerr West Virginia over their Janks early today, flooding communities and forcing hundreds of families from their homes, officials

The National Weather Service said this morning that the rain was letting up in most areas but said additional thunderstorms could develop in the afternoon

There were no immediate reports of injuries, but police said a number of families were trapped in their houses in Marshall, Ohio and Hancock counties. They said rescue teams in boats were working to evacuate buildings surrounded by the rapidly rising waters.

No damage estimates were immediately avail-

The National Weather Service said at least 2 inches of rain fell in northern counties overnight. The service issued flash flood watches for all of northern West Virginia except the Eastern Panhandle.

Andy Kondik of Hancock County emergency services said "several hundred" families had been forced from their houses. Many of those houses were filled with 4 to 5 feet of water, said rescue worker Carl Sut-

Power outages were reported in some areas. COVINGTON, Ky. (AP) - An attorney for the families of 15 miners killed in a 1976 underground explosion says he's "well pleased" with a \$5 million out-of-court settlement with Blue Diamond Coal Co.

The settlement came just days before Tuesday's federal court trial of a \$60 million damage suit accusing Blue Diamond of failing to enforce safety

'It was a fair offer and the money certainly can be used by the widows and their children," said Eugene Goss. Goss was one of the attorneys handling the case for relatives of the 15 men, who died when a methane gas blast ripped through a Scotia Coal Co. mine in Letcher County on March 9, 1976.

Eleven members of a recovery team were killed two days later in a second blast inside the mine. Claims arising from the second blast haven't been settled and Goss said Sunday "we're going to get the

machinery cranked up to get that case rolling. Blue Diamond, the Knoxville, Tenn., parent firm of Scotia, agreed to pay \$1.75 million to the miners' relatives within four days after the judge's order is entered and an additional \$860,347 within 60 days.

The settlement order, signed Saturday by U.S. District Judge William O. Bertlesman, also calls for the plaintiffs to receive a monthly tax-free payment from the company.

Although the order didn't contain a total dollar amount, former Kentucky Gov. Bert Combs, who represented Blue Diamond, estimated its value at "a little more than \$5 million. Washington lawyer Gerald Stern, who represented

the plaintiffs, estimated the award at close to \$6

Stern said the settlement was the first paid Kentucky miners in at least 60 years. He said that under Kentucky law, an employer could not be sued in a miner's death, leaving the family only workmen's compensation. A federal court ruled after the suit was filed that Blue Diamond had immunity, but that decision was overruled by a federal appeals court. Stern said that the size of the settlement indicated

that the company was at fault in the explosions: 'They don't pay \$6 million if they aren't liable."



The signs said "Luv Ya, Blue!" They could just as well have said 'Luv Ya, Snake!'

Ken Stabler, the silver-and-blackclad villain of so many years when he and the rest of the Oakland Raiders invaded the Astrodome, wore Houston's pastel blue on Sunday.

He gave the Oilers' placard-carrying fans a thrill by throwing three touchdown passes, two to tight end Rich Caster, as Houston beat New Orleans 20-17 in the day's only National Football League exhibition

On Saturday it was Oakland 31. New England 29; Dallas 19, Los Angeles 16; Cincinnati 21, Chicago 3; San Francisco 17, San Diego 14; St. Louis 21, Tampa Bay 14; Baltimore 17, Green Bay 3; Detroit 24, Buffalo 17, and the New York Giants 9, Denver

Tonight, it's Washington at Cleveland, Minnesota at Kansas City and Miami at Seattle.

Stabler was cast away by Raiders

owner Al Davis, who engineered a quarterback swap that brought him Dan Pastorini. This weekend, at least, Houston seemed to wind up the winner in the deal. Stabler hit 18 of 28 passes for 217 yards in three periods, completing scoring strikes covering 15 yards to Billy Johnson for a 6-0 halftime lead and 10 and 45 yards to Caster in the third quarter.

Stabler clearly hoped it was a preview of the regular season. "Hopefully we will save some more good games for the regular season," he said. "I really feel confident with the offense, even though it was the second preseason game.

Pastorini, playing a more conservative game in Oakland, completed five of eight passes for 109 yards but 65 of those yards came on one play, a touchdown pass to Cliff Branch. Jim Plunkett also teamed with Branch on a TD pass, this one covering 21 yards, but it was rookie Marc Wilson, making his debut with the Raiders, who hit Terry Robiske on a 17-yarder with fourth down and nine seconds left that turned back the Pa-

"We wanted to se him under pressure, and he performed very well under pressure," said Oakland Coach Tom Flores, clearly less thrilled than his rookie passer.

"I never was in a game in high school or college with an ending as exciting as that!" Wilson crowed.

Danny White, who no doubt will be performing under pressure - and under Roger Staubach's shadow - all year, began filling his predecessor's shoes by tossing touchdown passes of 18 and 27 yards to Butch Johnson as Dallas defeated Los Angeles. The Cowboys defense, much maligned last year after injuries and departures weakened it, showed that it, too, is ready for anything. In the closing minutes, with the Rams on the Dallas 1-yard line, the Cowboys stopped two running plays and forced two incomplete passes to preserve the victory.

Jack Thompson also made another strong bid to oust Kenny Anderson as the Bengals' No. 1 quarterback, heaving a TD pass of 44 yards to Steve Kreider, then finding Dan Ross on a 1-yard toss to beat Chicago.

# Opportunistic Astros gain first place in crazy NL West

While the Los Angeles Dodgers and Cincinnati Reds were fighting it out for first place in the National League West this past weekend, the Houston Astros heard opportunity knocking.

And they knocked back - hammering out four straight victories over the San Diego Padres, including a 5-0, 9-2 doubleheader sweep Sunday.

The result of all that offensive noise by the opportunistic Astros was a first-place foothold today in the wild, wild West race.

"We had to win four ballgames." said Houston's Ken Forsch, who hurled a four-hitter in the opener. 'We're not a good road club and we had just lost three straight coming

"Our pitching has been tough. The loss of J.R. Richard was a shocker. There is no way to replace a J.R., but the starters are going to have to pitch a good seven innings each game and try to keep the score down.

The Reds, meanwhile, knocked off the Dodgers 6-2 to take two out of three games in their big series in Los Angeles and held second place, a half-game behind the Astros. The Dodgers dropped two games off the pace, in third.

Elsewhere in the NL Sunday, the Pittsburgh Pirates beat Montreal 5-1 in the opener of a doubleheader before the Expos came back to take the nightcap 4-2; the Philadelphia Phillies stopped the New York Mets twice, 9-4 and 4-1; the Chicago Cubs whipped

the St. Louis Cardinals 6-2, and the Atlanta Braves beat the San Francisco Giants 8-2.

Jose Cruz homered and doubled and drove in a pair of runs in support of Forsch's fine pitching in the first game. Forsch, 10-10, had a no-hitter going until rookie Luis Salazar lined a single to left with two outs in the fifth inning for his first major league hit. Forsch allowed only four other baseruners in the game.

In the nightcap, Joe Morgan and Art Howe keyed a seven-run second inning with two-run singles as the Astros completed their sweep. Joe Niekro, 12-11, coasted to victory, allowing the Padres eight hits while walking one and striking out five.

The Astros quickly wrapped up the second game by sending 12 men to the plate in the second inning with Morgan and Howe providing the key hits. Morgan's single drove Steve Mura, 4-5, from the game.

Well, it seems the folks who said baseball would never have another 400 hitter were right.

Would you believe .. 401? Say it slowly and reverently four-oh-one - because that's what George Brett of the Kansas City Royals is batting today. The season, though, still has seven weeks to go the last .400 hitter was Boston's Ted Williams, who hit .406 in 1941 - but the way Brett is sizzling these days he might keep going up instead of drop-

After all, Rod Carew was hitting 384 on Aug. 17, 1977, and finished at

"I think the longer I'm up there, the longer the pressure is going to mount," said Brett, who is on a 29game hitting tear that included a 4-for-4 performance - two singles. two doubles and five RBI - in Sunday's 8-3 victory over the Toronto Blue Jays. "An the longer the hitting streak goes on, the more it's going to mount. I'm sure it's going to be tough.

Brett's heroics overshadowed a slugging display by Al Oliver of Texas, who unloaded a double, triple and home run in the opener and slammed three more homers in the nightcap of a doubleheader, driving in seven runs as the Rangers swept the Detroit Tigers 9-3, 12-6.

## Nancy joins men in Hall of Fame

The roster of the All-American Collegiate Golf Foundation's Hall of Fame reads like a Who's Who of the

Among the players honored have been Arnold Palmer, Hale Irwin, Johnny Miller, Billy Casper, Deane Beaman, Tom Watson, Andy North, Ken Venturi, Lanny Watkins and John Mahaffey. All that was missing was a woman,

but now you can add a lady to the list. Nancy Lopez-Melton was inducted last week, the first female named to the college golf shrine which annually honors the nation's top collegiate players, current and past.

Melton played the game at Tulsa University and golf's gain was engineering's loss. "I was spending so much time playing golf that I realized I couldn't do that and keep up with my studies, too," she said. "So, I decided to go on the tour."

Many fans view the pro golf tour both men's and women's - as a glamorous way of life but Melton knew better. Nancy had finished tied for second as an amateur in the 1975 U.S. Open and second again in the 1977 Open, her first pro tournament. That gave her a taste of tour life and she wasn't so sure it was for her.

"I grew up seeing it in the Open," she said. "It's a lot of travel and hard work. I didn't know if I wanted that type of responsibility.

When she decided to try the tour, Melton burst on the scene like no rookie ever has in her sport, or perhaps in any other sport for that matter. She won nine major tournaments in 1978, her first year, and five of them came in a row, a dazzling debut that earned her rookie of the year and player of the year honors - the first time a golfer has swept those two She was Nicklaus, Palmer, Trevino

and Watson all rolled into one lovely package. Women's golf had never seen anything like her. And, at age 21, it was the best of times and it was the worst of times for Melton. "It was difficult," she said. "I had

to grow up quickly to cope with it. I didn't get to enjoy that time. All I did for those five weeks was play, practice and do interviews. I never had time to say, 'Hey, look what I've

Two weeks after the streak ended, Melton decided she owed herself a vacation. "I hadn't stopped before because, well, you want to see if you can keep on winning," she said. "But I was so tired, my game had gone downhill, I couldn't concentrate mentally and physically. I just took off."

The break refreshed her and Nancy came back for four more tour victories before the season ended and eight more in 1979. There have been two victories this season, giving her 19 for her career. "As an amateur, you don't think



### U.S. denies misleading investors

NEW YORK (AP) - "We don't feel we've been misleading in the past, said a Treasury Department official in announcing that U.S. Savings Bonds no longer will be promoted as a good investment.

Is that so? So it wasn't misleading to tell people that "Savings Bonds make a comfortable retirement almost a certainty." And it wasn't misleading to assure parents that bonds would buy a college education?

Or to recruit some of the most

successful businessmen in the country to encourage workers to buy Savings Bonds when, if they had any financial sense at all, those businessmen scorned bonds for themselves?

Apparently it wasn't misleading either to advertise that bonds paid interest of 6.5 percent or 7 percent when, in order to obtain that measly rate, the buyer had to hold the bonds for 11 long years ...

.. during which time the same federal government ran up enormous debts that helped spread an inflation that, at current rates, would halve the buying power of those bonds, even after payment of dividends.

In August 1978, when Savings Bonds were paying 6 percent, a Treasury official was asked to defend the program. If \$75 were put into Savings have \$100.80 after five years.

In reality, of course, the buyer won't have \$100.80 or anything close to it in comparable dollars, a consequence of raging inflation. He'll be lucky if he has half that much in purchasing power. But Uncle Sam didn't let that dampen his enthusiasm

- only his sense of fair play. The same sort of reasoning was used in projections that claimed to show how you could save for retire-ment or the education of a child. Nothing whatever was said about the

erosion of inflation. An oversight? It requires great naivete to believe that a department that handles the world's biggest financing job simply forgot about infla-tion when making projections of

school and retirement expenses. No, it wasn't an oversight. Not when the subject so consistently was left unmentioned at a time when inflation was on everyone's mind. Not when in the "Build for the Future" brochure the word wasn't mentioned once, although any projection of buy-ing power must deal with it.

Instead, the suggestion throughout was that "they'll continue to increase in value," and they'll put "personal savings goals within reach," and 'here's how your dollars for education grow."

Many people saw through the pro-motion and sold their bonds, some of them to go into bank certificates that offered them higher annual rates for six months than the Treasury offered over an 11 year period.

Among the angriest were retirees who believed Uncle Sam's promise that bonds "can make the difference between retirement that's barely adequate and an old age with dig-

nity." They know what dignity is. The Gray Panthers, an organization of older Americans, complained to the Federal Trade Commission last year that the government's promo-tions were misleading investors by claiming bonds were a good invesm-

### DR. NEIL SOLOMON Genetic disorders usually are inherited

Dear Dr. Solomon: A friend of mine tells me that hepatitis can cause diabetes. Is there any connection between the two conditions? - Steve.

Dear Steve: Hepatitis (inflammation of the liver) can be caused by a viral infection, the effects of alcohol or drugs, and many other factors. Also, an excessive amount of fat in Losing issues outnumbered gainers the blood can cause the liver to

There is no direct connection between diabetes and hepatitis, although the liver plays a major role in digestion. The liver stores glucose as glycogen, thus helping maintain normal blood sugar levels in both diabetics and non-diabetics. A diabetic with liver disease may be more prone to serious hypoglycemic reactions (relating to an abnormally low level of glucose in the blood), especially if he or she uses alcohol.

Dear Dr. Solomon: A niece of mine recently underwent an abortion after tests showed a defect in the fetus. This was completely unexpected since neither her family nor her husband's shows any evidence of disease. How does such a defect occur in the absence of any history in either the mother's or father's family? - Ms.

Dear Ms. S.: According to Dr. Rosalind Coleman, an assistant professor of pediatrics at Duke University, from two to three percent of all births involve a major genetic malformation or biochemical defect.

The body is composed of cells of various sizes, each with a nucleus.

Within the nucleus are chromosomes which fix the direction each cell will take. For example, chromosomes determine the color of a person's hair

The 46 chromosomes, in turn, are composed of genes. Except for egg and sperm cells, each cell contains about two million genes. Egg and sperm cells contain half as many chromosomes and, therefore, half as many genes. When cells divide, chromosomes may break, or the informa-tion they carry may be entered incor-rectly. Some of these errors will re-

sult in a genetic disease. There are several ways for genetic disorders to be inherited. By one method of transmission, both parents carry one affected gene. Although the parents do not manifest any problem, the child who inherits both affected genes will have the disease. This method of transmission can occur 25 percent of the time; 50 percent of the time the child, like the parents, will be a carrier.

Once it is known how a particular genetic disease is being transmitted, the parents can be counseled about their chances of having a child with a genetic disorder. Physicians often can tell if a problem existed before can tell if a problem existed delete conception or during pregnancy. If it is determined that the parents have a genetic defect, they should be advised of these chances of having a child with the defect. However, if they are not carriers and the problem occurred after conception, they would be able to plan their family without having to worry about the possibility of a genetic disorder.

### Book's cover termed surest way to appeal to readers

NEW YORK (AP) - You can sell a book by its cover.

So says Lester del Rey, who, with his wife Judy-Lynn, brings out six science-fiction and fantasy paperback books each month.

"A book's cover," says the 65-yearold Del Rey, "does a lot more selling than the author's name. With the exception of a handful of well-known writers whose name sells, the cover alone has to be depended on to catch a reader's attention and to get him to buy the book.

"I'm a great believer in the kind of cover that used to appear on the old pulp magazines, only much better done. The cover I like has a scene done by a top artist - from the book itself which not only tells a story but also suggests that here is something interesting to read. More importantly, it makes a browser want to buy the book. Now that's a cover."

Del Rey handles the fantasy and his wife the science fiction for Del Rev Books — a Ballantine Books imprint and, he says, there are "no job conflicts. I don't read everything she publishes and she doesn't read everything I publish."

Del Rey defines science fiction as a literary form with events that usually take place in the future, dealing with things that, while not possible now, are probable and could be justified by future scientific developments.

Fantasy, he says, is a much older form and deals with magic, the super-natural, the fantastic. "It involves taking the old myths and reworking them. The form looks back to the past

- even if it is placed in the present and the reader believes because he wants to believe. He is trying to return to the world of fairyland he heard

about as a child."
He adds, with a smile, that the forms do mingle on occasion. "Suppose," he says, "you have a fantasy situation that is set on another planet. What is it: fantasy or science fiction?'


Del Rey has worked in both forms He says he has written some 40 books - some non-fiction but the bulk fantasy and science fiction. He hasn't, however, published a novel since

The reason, he says, is that he is too busy reading, "and I can't find the time to write."

He says he relies to a great extent on "over-the-transom" - unsolicited - books to get the titles he needs in his publishing work.

"The problem," Del Rey says, "is that most professional writers don't write fantasy. They apparently decided years ago that fantasy doesn't pay, so they don't do it.

### Common Market book real gold mine of trivia

BRUSSELS, Belgium (AP) -There's a new book out this summer, full of sex, fabulous wealth, violence, social upheaval and untimely death. But it's not likely to be a best seller

and it won't be a movie.

It is entitled "Social Indicators for the European Community," a 234page gold mine for trivia prospectors and armchair students of the Western European scene. All by the numbers.

Those willing to plough through its tables, asterisks, small type and symbols are apt to make some startling discoveries or reinforce their stereotypical beliefs about the nine Common Market countries.

For example, according to the book, published by the Common Market's statistical service, Irish workers strike more often than Danes; Belgium has more doctors per capita than Britain; people in Italy like to walk to work, and the average Luxembourg resident works 58 minutes to buy a leg of lamb.

Cirrhosis of the liver, an ailment linked to heavy drinking, kills more people in France - 47.6 per 100,000 han in any of the other eight Common Market countries, Italy, Denmark, Britain, The Netherlands, West Germany, Belgium, Ireland and Luxem-

The average Belgian worker spends 59 minutes on the job to make money for a kilo (2.2 pounds) of frozen fish. The average Frenchman works 1.49 hours for it.

If you're a miner in Luxembourg your chances of getting killed on the job are better than in any other Common Market country. The safest mines are in The Netherlands, where one in a million miners died last

No country is slighted in the book Readers who look long and hard enough will find some aspect of social life in which one nation excels. Here is a list of the countries and the things they have the most of or lead in:

LUXEMBOURG: Night workers, foreign students, people leaving the country each year and houses with more than seven rooms, 25 percent of all the dwellings.

WEST GERMANY: Total popula-



For example, in a short note on page 180, the reader learns that the kilo of frozen fish that cost more in France than in Belgium are not just any fish but "cod fillets, not breadcrumbed, in carton."

Statistics show that the Netherlands consumed 1,186 pounds of newsprint per 100 inhabitants in 1967, but luckily the book does not leave its readers in the dark about what newsprint is. It is "bleached, unsized or slack-sized printing paper, without coating, of the type usually used for newspapers."

The purpose of the book, which is available to the public in the Common Market offices in the United States and 12 other countries, is designed to give Common Market planners recent information on conditions in the nine countries and identify problems. The information comes from national archives and Common Market question-





# Viet vets keep Legion convention as strong as ever

BOSTON (AP) - With a parade that attracted 200,000 to the streets of Boston, the American Legion has convened its 62nd annual meeting, nearly as strong as ever thanks to an influx of Vietnam veterans.

About 20,000 Legionnaires and their families are in Boston this week for the convention, where they will hear from independent presidential candidate John B. Anderson on Tuesday, Republican contender Ronald Reagan on Wednesday and President Carter on Thursday.

The Legion, which has grown by 10,000 this year after a decline for the past four years, takes its political role seriously. It has refused to endorse a presidential candidate since its inception in 1919 as an organization for World War I veterans.

Membership reached a high of 3.3 million in 1946, then fell to a low of 2.5 million in 1964. Figures have wavered over the past decade, but 700,000 Vietnam-era veterans have pushed membership back to 2.6 million - the largest veterans' organization in this

"We have experienced an increase in members and feel it is because of a new concern about this country and the community," says National Com-mander Frank I Hamilton, a 57-yearold Greensburg, Ind., attorney who served in the Army during World War II. "American Legion members are optimistic about the future, but they are upset about the way things have

The Legion, headquartered in Indianapolis, is divided into 58 "departments," including the 50 states, and several foreign countries. Membership is heavy in the Midwest and South. Pennsylvania has the most members with 249,054. Hawaii has the fewest with 2,190.

The Legion will consider 800 resolutions this convention, ranging from the protection of the snail darter to the danger of Castro's Cuba. The group is a strong advocate of increased military spending, favoring a new strategic bomber and deployneutron weapon. weapons systems scrapped by the Carter Administration.

The Legion has also taken up the banner of social issues in recent years, fighting for increased GI benefits and renovations and improvements at Veterans Administration

Hamilton says the Legion's recent growth is largely due to social and economic conditions that have brought reluctant Vietnam vets into

"We've had our ups and downs," he shrugs. "When times are tough, like it was for the boys in the '30s, the American Legion was where people gathered to discuss their concerns."

Meanwhile, an estimated 200,000 people lined downtown sidewalks Sunday to watch the Legion's

"It takes your mind off your prob-lems," said Carolyn Scott, who drove an hour from Warwick, R.I., to join the spectators.

For about four hours, problems were drowned out by the bellowing bugles, pounding drums and flapping flags of 5,000 entrants.

Legionnaires from Panama wore wide-brimmed hats and those from Mexico played guitars. Three smiling girls posed on a red, white and blue float hauling a large, blue American Legion emblem. Actors on another float depicted the raising of the flag at

"It makes me feel happy," said Aida Palmieri of Medford, as she bounced from her seat to clap for a passing band. "I think people are encouraged to do more for country when they see all the people who have served in the wars.'

### Pair stumbles onto sunken treasure

NEW ORLEANS (AP) - Gulf hrimpers Curtis Blume and Steve Smith stumbled onto a dream - a sunken treasure ship loaded with gold

With salvage far from complete, about \$350,000 worth of gold, 30 pounds of silver, five tons of copper and many artifacts have been plucked from the wreck of what is believed to be an 18th century Spanish cargo ship.

BUT BLUME AND Smith aren't counting their money yet - they won't see it until lawyers, state bureaucrats and scientists finish work intended to protect the shrimpers and

The wreck lies under 18 feet of muddy Gulf of Mexico water and a layer of silt about 11/2 miles off southwest Louisiana's Cameron Parish.

A round-the-clock guard is stationed at the site - an area of the seabottom 120 feet by 200 feet - and one diver often on duty is is Smith, a shrimper whose sea adventures have always been business. "I ALWAYS HAD to work for a

Scientists believe the wreck is Spanish and from the mid-1700s. Academic researchers are trying to figure out where the ship came from and

where it was going.
With a bit of luck, Perry said, they may find a cargo manifest, which would detail the ship's contents and might list their origins and destina-

THE STATE OWNS the seabottom where Blume's shrimp nets snagged the wreck in the winter of 1979, and the Department of Culture, Recreation and Tourism will dictate how the salvage is done.

"That was only the second time in my life that I'd been over there," said 45-year-old Blume of his find. "It was just pure accident that I found it because there were lots of boats that hung up on it. There were a lot of nets

Blume, who is married and has three children, said he never spent much time thing about finding treasure, adding: "I was always too busy trying to make a living." He is still

GOV. DAVE TREEN has described the wreck as the most important ar-chaeological find in Louisiana waters and perhaps one of the most significant in the Gulf Coast region.

He acknowledges many people would have looted the vessel, destroying its archaeological value and never reported the discovery.

But Smith and Blume decided they had no choice. They knew the state would complicate salvage efforts, but did not want to have to deal with black marketeers to dispose of the bounty.

"YOU COULD BE looking over your shoulder for the rest of your life," said Smith.

Free Enterprise Salvage Inc., the company Smith and Blume set up with Lake Charles businessman John D. Bailey and Berry Brothers Construction Co. of Berwick, a dredging and construction operation, will get 75 percent of the wreck's value.

"We can either give them artifacts or cash or a combination of both. We just have to give them, after appraisal, 75 percent of the fair market said Perry

THE HUNT BEGAN when Blume called in Smith, who usually dives to repair shrimp boats, to determine what had snagged his nets. Blume had already pulled up several ballast

rocks and some copper ingots.
Smith found the wreck in water where visibility is about six inches.
"There's no looking at it," he said.
"You dive down and feel it."

The two brought in others to help with the financing and the work.

"I was real happy," said Everett Berry, who runs the Berwick dredging company with his brother, Doyle.

**Associated Press Writer** SEOUL, South Korea (AP) - Dissident leader Kim Dae-jung charged today that his court-martial on sedition charges was "political repression" and refused initially to answer questions as the court of four army generals ordered him tried separately from persons accused with him.

Kim later relented to explain his connection with what military prose-cutors called an "anti-state" organi-

Meanwhile, a reliable military source reported that the leader of the South Korean military regime, Gen. Chun Doo-hwan, would retire from the army on Friday in preparation for his election to the presidency next week by the electoral college. More than 400 electors from the Seoul region met today and unanimously recommended his nomination.

Chun, a protege of the late President Park Chung-hee, seized control of the regime last December. Acting President Choi Kyu-hah resigned on

Saturday to make way for him, but the constitution prohibits officers on active duty from holding top govern-

ment posts.
"I decline to answer questions because this trial amounts to political repression," Kim said in a statement to the military court trying him on six charges that could get him the death penalty if he is convicted, diplomatic observers attending the trial report-

"I was rehabilitated and received an amnesty from conviction under emergency decrees, and I therefore refuse to be tried (on the same charges).

Kim, 56, then sat silently, swaying slightly back and forth, as the prosecutors asked him a series of questions about alleged pro-communist activities when he was in his 20's and about his connection with an organization of Korean residents in Japan that has been called "anti-state," the observers said. But after a brief recess to consult

with defense attorneys, Kim denied the Japan-based group was anti-state, and noted that he returned to Seoul before the group was formed.

Martial-law authorities heavily

censored reports by two foreign correspondents and four Korean reporters admitted to the courtroom. But foreign diplomatic observers attending on behalf of their governments also reported what went on.

Kim made his protest at the beginning of the second day of the trial, which began last Thursday. At that time, after a six-hour reading of a 154-page indictment against Kim and 23 other men, a separate trial was ordered for 11 of those accused of lesser charges. Today the judges ordered that Kim

be tried alone, and the 12 other defendants were led from the courtroom. Before they left, one of them, the Rev. Moon Ik-hwan, told the court the charges against them were "outrageous and unfounded. We feel that 10 years' effort for democratization went for nothing. "I don't know about the others," he

continued, "but I want to cite four reasons why we refuse this trial. One, this trial is simply a formality. It is nothing more nor less than a political trial. This is not a trial but part of our

At that point, an officer of the court stopped him from speaking.

Kim is charged with inciting the large student anti-overnment demonstrations in Seoul in early May and with organizing and financing the uprising May 18-26 in the southern city of Kwangju in which more than 260 persons are believed to have died.

The government also charges Kim with having had contact for a long time with the North Korean communists and with helping to set up a pro-communist organization in Tokyo while in self-imposed exile there in

Kim went to Japan after nearly defeating the late President Park Chung-hee in the 1971 presidential election. He was kidnapped from Tokyo in 1973, presumably by agents of the Korean Central Intelligence Agency, and brought back to Seoul, where he was put under house ar-

He was jailed in 1976 for his open opposition to Park, was released in 1978, and his political rights were restored after Park was assassinated last Oct. 26. He was one of three leading candidates for the presidency, but all three have now been eliminated from contention by Gen.

### Enlisted women have higher fallout rate than men

WASHINGTON (AP) - In another blow to the all-volunteer military, women recruits are failing to finish their first enlistments at a much higher rate than male volunteers.

An Army study estimates the fallout rate for women will reach 46.7 percent this year - 13.5 percentage points higher than for young men.

"Current forecasts indicate that first-term female attrition rates will increase further," said the study which predicts that the trend for comparable male volunteers "will remain

Army officials appear at a loss to explain the high fallout rate among women in the first hitch. The Army Research Institute is looking for the But M. Kathleen Carpenter, the

Pentagon's equal opportunity chief, said she believes there are at least four main reasons. "There is a significant lack of ac-

ceptance of women in non-traditional roles by their male peers," said Ms. Carpenter in an interview. "Men often find women performing bet-

At last report, about 61 percent of the army's 59,000 enlisted womnen were in "non-traditional" skills, such as maintenance, transportation and engineering. The remaining 39 percent were assigned to "traditional" fields, as clerks, medical orderlies

Ms. Carpenter said Army women who do manage to get traditionally male-type assignments all too often find themselves shuffled into handling paperwork. This, she said, stunts their career development opportunities.

Furthermore, Ms. Carpenter said, women find themselves under heavy psychological pressures, working in what she called a "fishbowl environment in which they are very closely scrutinized."

She also said sexual harassment is factor in souring young women soldiers toward military life and causing them to look for ways to get out. She declined to go into specifics on the

extent of sexual harassment, but indicated she regards it as a major prob-

At the same time, Ms. Carpenter acknowledged that some women soldiers "are using pregnancy as a vehi-cle to get out" when they are unable to gain job satisfaction in uniform.

Whatever the causes, the problem is of deep concern to the Army because planners long have counted on recruiting increasing numbers of women to fill out the ranks in years ahead, when the military age male population declines. The current goal is to increase the

number of enlisted women to 85,000

out of an army of about 765,000 over

the next five years.
