Goodland folks say when you look at a map you can see that much traffic will be diverted from the east, say around Vernon, where people are headed for Roswell; and a traveler from Muleshoe, for instance to Ruidoso or Roswell, would save a few miles by going by way of Goodland.

The Legion men and Auxiliary members are mighty proud of their new home and they want everybody in the Muleshoe ter-ritory to be proud of it, too.



## **Insect Control Is Discussed At Meet**

Plainview, June 28.-About 100 farmers heard Ralph Lloyd, of Houston, talk on cotton insect control at a meeting of the Hale for several years in local cafes, County Agriculture Improvement committee in Plainview Monday.

Reporting on a field trip he and county agent Manuel Ayers made through Hale county fields, Lloyd said "In almost every field we found damage from fleahoppers

and thrips." Lloyd suggested that farmers follow the advice of extension entomologist Guy E. Carpenter in controlling these insects. If there are from 25 to 35 flea.

hoppers per 100 terminals in cotton it is time to apply ten pounds of five percent DDT wixed with 75 percent sulphur, or ten percent toxaphene mixed with 40 percent sulphur per acre at seven to ten day intervals.

For thrips he suggested ten to 12 lbs. of ten percent toxaphene mixed with 40 percent sulphur.

## **Rat Flea Spreads Typhus Fever Germ**

AUSTIN, June 28 .- The people of Texas have been fortunate in escaping any serious outbreaks of typhus fever this wear, the total number of reported cases to far being 133. This is a gratifying decrease in the incidence of this disease, but at the same time, it is well to warn that only continued stringent rodent-control measures will hold this disease in check.

This is the advice of Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, who says that "Typhus is one of the most debilitating of all diseases, and the long drawn out illness results in such loss of time that this factor is usually even more expensive to the victim, than his doctor and hospital bills."

Inasmuch as typhus fever is transmitted to man by the rat flea, the control of typhus depends almost upon ridding our-selves of rats. 6. Both funds must be expended on an equitable basis. 7. Before any county can levy

and collect the tax, it must be approved by a vote of qualified tax pavers.

Final passage of this bill into law brings to close a long pro-gram of WTCC, which included promotion of the Constitutional Amendment no. 7, for abolishment of the State ad valorem tax.

This was a part of the duty of the WTCC Soil Conservation Commission of which Charles C. Thompson of Colorado City, was chairman. Other members of the commission were Sterling Williams, Snyder; W. R. Cusenbary, Sonora; G. Nisbet, Dumas; and Walter R. Humphery, Fort Worth.


