# BigCottonCrop For Plains Seen

Bailey County's current cotton acreage is estimated at 150,000, against an estimated acreage of 115,000 last year at this time in the most recent appraisal of the crop by K. N. Klapp. Lubbock. South Plains representative of the Anderson-Clayton Cotton Co. This figure about corresponds to opinions expressed by local observers.

Thursday, July 7, 1949

It is likely that around 30,000 acres have been lost in this county due to high winds, hail, and ex-cessive rainfall. Much replanting has been done but cotton destroyed in the latter part of June was replaced in many instances by feed crops.

Mr. Klapp estimated Bailey County's irrigated land at 9,000 acres, while dry land planted to cotton was estimated at 141,000 acres. Last year on June 21 he fig-ured the irrigated acreage at 9,000 and dry land planted to cotton at 106.000 acres.

#### South Plains Record Seen

Twenty South Plains counties have 2.830,000 acres in cotton, an increase of 26 percent over June 21 of last year, when 2,244,000 acres were in cotton, it was estimated.

Of that total, 744,000 acres are irrigated, an 83 percent increase over lastis year's 462.000 acres. Dryland cottom totals 2,086,000 acres, percent over the 1.782,000 of drylland contion last wear.

**Twine-Tving Baler Speeds Hay Harvest** Made "Haylift" Work **Possible** in West

Over the vast areas of the plains states where 1948's unprecedented snows caused extensive suffering of both livestock and human beings, machines like the one shown above are beginning to be more appreciated.

Not in the actual haylift operations. wherein grain for starving cattle and food for humans were dropped from airplanes, but in the preliminary phase of harvesting, without which the haylift would have been impossible.



The machine shown here turned at up to 7 bales a minute during the haying season of last year, adding this tremendous output to the stockpiles of grain from which the aylift drew its supplies.

Thus the machine helped to provide the thousands of "bombs" of baled hay with which fliers saved the lives of starving cattle in a great rescue operation.

Just a few years ago operation haylift would have been impossible. It was not until this machine was introduced in the early 1940's that farmers could put their hay into twine-tied packages automatically.

He says there are three different types of electric water pumps that are in general use on Texas farms. The shallow well pump, the lowest priced one, is best suited for wells with a water level of 15 to 28 feet below the sorface. The plunger type, deep well pump is used when the water lev-el is deeper than 22 feet. The cyl-inders that lift the water in this type are lowered to within 20 feet of the water, Ulich says. It can be of the water, Ulich says. It can be used for well of any depth, but is especially adapted to deep ones. The third type water pump is the jet pump, used for either shal-low or deep wells. The jet pump doesn't have to be directly over the water source, which is an ad-vantage

vantage. If you're figuring on buying a water pump this year, it may save you some money to buy the kind that will best fit your farm needs


