First US execution of woman since 2005 set for Sept. 23

| RICHMOND, Va. (AP) - A Virginia woman who used sex and money to persuade two men to kill her husband and her stepson to collect a $\$ 250,000$ life insurance policy was scheduled Thursday to be executed in two months, which would be the first U.S. execution of a woman in five years. <br> A judge set a Sept. 23 execution date for Teresa Lewis, 41, the only woman on Virginia's death row. She would be the first woman executed in the state in nearly a century. <br> Lewis offered herself and her 16 -year-old daughter for sex to two men who committed the killings. She provided money to buy the murder weapons and stood by while they shot her husband, Julian Clifton Lewis Jr, 51 , and stepson Charles J. Lewis, 25 , in 2002 in Pittsylvania County in southcentral Virginia. <br> Lewis rummaged through her husband's pockets for money while he lay dying and waited nearly an hour before calling 911 . <br> The gunmen, Rodney Fuller and |

Southwest said its adjusted earnings were 29 cents per share in

analysts' expectations. Revenue rose 21 percent thanks to a 15 percent increase in average fares

a 250 -word essay, hold at least a "B" average in their science and math classes and age in theie science and math classes and
have their math and science teachers have their math and science teachers
write them a letter of recommendation.
With the male-tofemale ratio being With the male-to-female ratio being equal, female campers were given an opportunity to explore STEM fields that they may not have had on their own.
"Girls problem with science and math because problem with science and math because really is," Hambright said. "These girls have been proved positive that (math and science) are. They really dive into this and love it",
