## Large bobcat killed near R-Lee

One of the largest bobcats ever trapped in Coke County was caught Tuesday by John Page of Robert Lee on the Paul Burns place near Edith.

The cat weighed in at 32 pounds which is the largest that Page had ever trapped. "I've heard of a 35-pounder," said Page, "but that is the biggest

one I've ever trapped."

Page added that before the cat was trapped, it had killed a deer, dragged it across a road and buried it.

He said that there are quite a few bobcats in the area and other predators including red foxes and coyotes.

Members of these bands will return to Abilene Saturday, Feb. 11 for a day of rehearsal with the other members of the bands and perform in a concert that evening at 7 p.m. at Cullen Auditorium on Abilene Christian University campus.

## IRS tax packages should all be out

If you haven't received your tax package by now, you probably won't receive one this year, the Internal Revenue Service says.

Tax packages are mailed each year shortly after the December holidays, and are received by most taxpayers during the first two weeks in January or earlier. Due to the postage costs involved tax packages only receive limited forwarding.

Some taxpayers wait well into February hoping that their tax packages will still arrive in the

mail. Although tax packages are very helpful in filing federal tax returns, especially due to the computerized peel-off address labels and coded envelopes they contain, these items are not absolutely necessary to file a return.

Taxpayers who do not receive tax return forms in the mail may obtain forms from many libraries, banks, post offices, IRS offices, or by calling the IRS at 742-2440 in Dallas, 335-1370 in Fort Worth, or 1-800-424-1040 elsewhere in Texas.

## Steers capture top spot in 16-A basketball race

Robert Lee's Steer basketball squad is in sole possession of first place in boys District 16-A competition with two games remaining in regular season.

The Steers wrenched the lead away from the Sterling City Eagles last Friday with a 29-22 victory and then tripped the Bronte Longhorns 53-45 Tuesday.

Robert Lee is in good position to enter the throneroom of District 16-A if they can get past Forsan today (Friday) and Tuesday when they play Garden City in the finale. In both contests, the Steers have the home court advantage.

Today's game may be a problem for the Steers as the only loss they suffered while reaching their present 5-1 loop mark was at the hands of the Forsan Buffaloes on Jan. 17 by a 47-46

score. The boys are 19-2 overall.

Robert Lee's girls won last Friday over Sterling City 48-28 and fell to Bronte Tuesday 40-30. The 'B' girls were tripped up by Bronte on Tuesday 26-18. The 'A' girls stand 12-9 and 3-4.

In the boys game with Sterling, Bobby Boone was the leading scorer with 10 points followed by Kirby Rasco with nine, Greg Grim with six and Eddie Hood with four. Carol Longoria led the girls in the victory over Sterling with 14, Carrath Metcalf had 13, Missy Grim hit double figures with 12, Lin Long scored three and Jana Gartman, Lee Ann Molinar and Patty Bloodworth, all scored two points.

Kirby Rasco topped the scoring against Bronte with 16 points. Hitting 11 each were Jimmy Skinner and Bobby Boone as Greg Grim had eight and Eddie Hood scored seven. Jana Gartman did the most damage to Bronte with 14 points in the girls game, Lee Ann Molinar had seven, Missy Grim scored six, Carol Longoria had two and Carrath Metcalf hit one.

Becky Clendennen was the top 'B' girls scorer with eight while Tancie Bell had seven, Dana Anthony had two and Debbie Flowers scored one.

The JV girls and boys participated in the Irion County tournament last weekend as the girls finished second and the boys won third place.

Rankin stopped the girls 42-26 in the title contest as Tancie Bell

scored seven, Teresa Harlin and Becky Clendennen each had six, Tracy Pearson had four and Debbie Flowers hit three.

Robert Lee won the second round game over Miles 39-36 with Tancie Bell again leading the scoring with 12. Tracy Pearson had eight, Dana Anthony hit six each, Becky Clendennen had four and Debbie Flowers scored three.

In the opener the girls bounced Eden 39-26 led by Dana Anthony's 13 points. Tracy Pearson hit nine, Becky Clendennen had six, Teresa Harlin and Debbie Flowers scored four each, Nikki Epperson had two and Tancie Bell scored one.

The JV boys took third in the meeting with a 48-35 victory over Irion County. Tim Garringer scored 16, Randy Stephens had 14, jim Bob Jacobs hit eight, Kevin Johnson scored six and Scott Robertson had four.

Saturday morning, Miles sent the RL unit to the third place game by beating them 69-57. Tim Garringer poured in 23 points in that one followed by Jim Bob Jacobs with 10, Kevin Johnson with eight and Randy Stephens and James Paul Skipworth with six each.

Robert Lee won its opener with a 55-48 victory over Eden. Randy Stephens led that game with 17 points. Kevin Johnson had 15, Tim Garringer hit 10, Jim Bob Jacobs scored seven, James Paul Skipworth had four and Dwayne Harlin scored two.

## High wind causes late outage, fire

High winds Sunday night caused a power shutdown in Robert Lee.

The wind blew a primary wire off the top of a transformer pole in the Overland Trail area of Robert Lee at 12:15 a.m. and it came into contact with another wire causing sparks, said Bob Boone of West Texas Utilities in Robert Lee.

The sparks ignited dry grass in the area and the Robert Lee Volunteer Fire Department was called out to extinguish it.

Due to the difficulty in safely repairing the damage by climbing the pole, a bucket truck was called out of San Angelo, said Boone. The repairs were made in about 15 minutes, he added.

## Ex-Coke attorney faces jail sentence

Roy Lee Ford, 46, a former Coke County attorney pleaded guilty last week in U.S. District Court in San Angelo to distribution of one-half ounce of cocaine, according to a report in the San Angelo Standard-Times.

Ford is a Big Spring attorney who served as Coke County attorney from 1971 to 1974.

He entered the guilty plea after an investigation of drug trafficking in Howard County was completed. Ford was scheduled to enter the plea on Nov. 2 in Abilene with three other defendants in the case, but withdrew it at that time.

Ford is expected to be sentenced at a later date and faces up to 15 years in prison and a possible fine of up to \$25,000.

Ford admitted to delivering the drug on May 12, 1983 to a man identified as Cooper Proctor.

## Millican files for re-election

Finis Millican, Coke County Commissioner, Precinct 3, has announced his intention to run for a second term as commissioner in the May Democratic Primary.

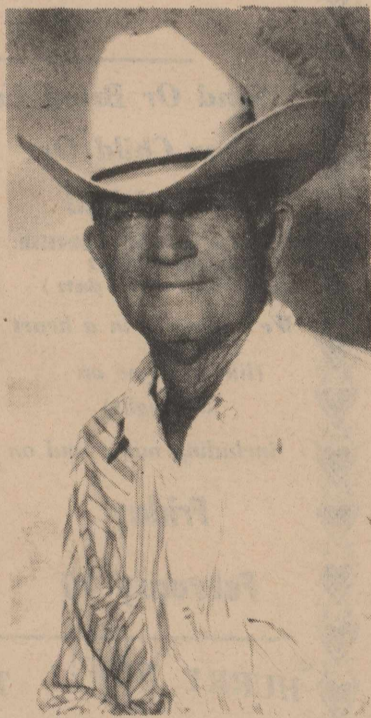
Millican was appointed commissioner in Jan. 1978 by County Judge W.W. Thetford and was elected to his first term in 1980.

The lifelong resident of Coke County is the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. P.W. Millican, Coke County pioneers who settled near Edith in 1900. Millican still lives and ranches the place his parents settled. He and his wife, Sue, have one daughter, Sue Ann, a 10th grader at Robert Lee High School.

Millican graduated from Robert Lee High School and served in the U.S. Army Medical Corps during World War II. He served overseas for 28 months and was at Normandy Beach during the Allied invasion of France in 1944.

He received his first roadwork experience in the '50s when he worked for two summers on the construction of FM 2034 between Robert Lee and Water Valley for the Harry Campbell Construction Co. He also worked as a road hand for Precinct 3 under Floyd Harmon and Jett Hood.

According to Millican, the Robert Lee area has expanded during his tenure. "We opened

several streets in south Robert Lee as the town has grown," said Millican. "I foresee the need for further expansion and additional roads in the Western part of the County. I plan to do more work on rural roads," he said.

"I will appreciate Robert Lee's and surrounding area's vote and support," added Millican.

State Comptroller Bob Bullock will have a representative from his San Angelo office in Robert Lee on February 14, 1984 to

assist local taxpayers and answer questions about state taxes.

Bullock said Enforcement Officer Nancy Shattuck will meet with local taxpayers in the Conference Room at the Coke County Courthouse from 9:00 a.m. to 10:00 a.m.

"If Robert Lee area merchants, or anyone else for that matter, have any questions about state taxes or need help in preparing state tax forms, Ms. Shattuck will be there to assist them," Bullock said.

"We're trying to cut the red tape in this office, and we believe these face to face sessions with taxpayers help do just that," Bullock added.

The San Angelo office, headed by Ron Parish, serves San Angelo and surrounding counties.

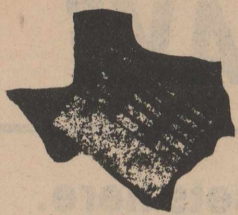

**A LAUGHING MATTER**

Have you had your 15 laughs today? It is suggested by researchers that the average American laugh 15 or more times each day for health maintenance. If you haven't laughed 15 times each day you may be out of balance in your "serious" lightness ratio. If you are a serious, hard-working, dedicated, love-my-work kind of person that does not take time for humor and laughing, you may find that you are less productive and effective than if you take time out for a little humor.

Laughter not only makes you feel better, the use of humor can be a major tool for insight. It can

help you laugh at some of your own little quirks, as well as laughing with others at their fun-worthy failings.

Laughter is a great stress reducer. When you laugh, you briefly lose muscle tone. All the tense muscles of the body are relaxed. Some physicians find they can cure tension headaches by getting patients to laugh.

Where do you get a steady supply of laughter? To begin with, be positive. Keep a happy outlook on life and give yourself a few rewards along the way. Take time out for a few pleasures that can at least bring smiles, if not outright laughter.

**Frozen canned foods safe to use**

College Station-- Those canned green beans you have stored in the garage may taste a little mushy when you finally get around to eating them, says a Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension foods and nutrition specialist.

"A decrease in quality or texture may be noticeable in canned foods which were stored in garages or sheds during December's freezing tempera-

tures," says Dr. Alice Hunt.

If you haven't already, check stored foods now for broken seals and cracks in jars or bulging cans, says the specialist. These foods will not be safe to eat and should be discarded, she adds.

Rust formed from condensation on the outside of cans poses no danger, says Hunt, although you may want to wipe up any remaining moisture to prevent further rusting. The food will not be safe to eat "if the rust has gone through the can," cautions the specialist.

If Texas is hit with more severe cold this winter, canned foods stored in unheated areas would have an additional slight decrease in quality. But it would take many severe freeze-thaw cycles to make the food completely unpalatable, Hunt says.

## Emergency response funds made available

Funds have been made available through CVOG for the purpose of purchase and installation of equipment to establish an emergency response center.

These Personal Emergency Response Systems (PERS) are monitoring services in which equipment connected to an individual's home telephone transmits an alarm for help to a response center.

This alarm is sounded when the client activates a cordless call button worn as a pendant or on a clip attached to clothing. The alarm is activated up to 150 feet from the telephone.

At the response center, the operator contacts the appropriate person to respond to the emergency. A responder may be a volunteer friend, neighbor or relative who has previously agreed to assist the client if

called upon. The responder may of necessity also be an agency such as the police department, sheriff's department or an emergency medical service.

The home unit which attaches to the client's own home telephone would cost approximately \$200. installed.

Some clients would meet eligibility requirements for assistance in obtaining the units of the Department of Human Resources.

This service has been a life line for many aged and disabled who may have fallen or developed a sudden illness preventing them from reaching the telephone.

The Coke County Judge and Commissioners Court, in cooperation with the administrators of the Hospital Districts would like to hear from those interested in more information or who would

want this system.

In order to obtain funding, they will have to present a proposal to CVOG by a February 15, 1984 deadline, so time is limited.

## LEGAL NOTICE

Deleting existing Section X and adding a new Section X to the Ordinance governing the rules and regulations of E.V. Spence Reservoir adopted by the Board of Directors of the Colorado River Municipal Water District December 3, 1968, as it relates to use of public areas and trespassing.

## SECTION X PUBLIC AREAS AND TRESPASSING

The District shall provide and maintain certain areas along the shoreline of the reservoir as public areas for recreational purposes. Such areas will be clearly designated as "public areas" with public fishing, swimming, picnicking, camping and boat launching confined to those areas and the shoreline waters adjacent thereto. All other public use of District owned lands lying below elevation 1900 feet and the water's edge shall be unlawful. Any use of the shoreline (except in designated "public areas") by the public in engaging in any activity, including but not limited to the above stated recreational activities, is prohibited and shall be an unlawful trespass upon such shoreline.

Provided, however, that this section shall not apply to the Colorado River Municipal Water District, its employees and authorized representatives in the enforcement of the District's Rules and Regulations governing the Robert Lee Reservoir, and in carrying out its functions of maintaining said Reservoir and its watershed.

Further, this section shall not apply to the owners or lessees of shoreline property above elevation 1900 feet, as to their use for recreational and other authorized purposes of District land lying below elevation 1900 feet and the water's edge which is bounded by a projection of their lateral property lines to the water's edge. This section shall not apply to those persons having the consent of the owner or lessee to use such property described, however, in any prosecution for violation of this Section, the burden shall be upon the alleged trespasser to prove the consent of the owner or lessee of said property. The exemption herein provided shall in no way authorize any person to go upon the land of another and shall in no manner repeal or annul the applicability of the remaining provisions of this act as they relate to the use of said Reservoir, and the lands forming the margin of said waters.

The provisions of this Ordinance shall be in full force and effect five (5) days after the second publication of the notice of this Ordinance as required by law.

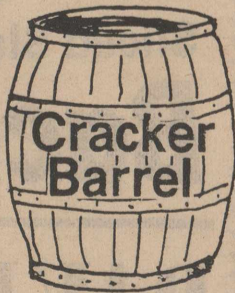
