

BOWERS.

Bowers is a two-year-old was sired by Joe Bowers. His dam, Maudena, was a black thoroughbred mare. Joe Bowers, Jr., pacing record 2:28, was sired by Old Joe Bowers, whose pacing record was 2:22. He by McMeins Traveler. Joe Jr's first dam, Fannie, was by Lounds. (thoroughbred.) Lounds by Childe Harold out of Sea Beed; 2nd dam by old Traveler; 3rd dam, Beula, by Boah, a Canadian pacer; 4th dam, Stockholder (thoroughbred); 5th dam, Sallie Gant, by McMeins Traveler; 6th dam by old Lexington. Joe Jr's dam has the best pedigree of most mares living. She had a grandson that can pace in the two twenties, only 3 years old; \$3000 will not buy him. Joe Jun, with trotting record of 2:18 sold for \$8000. Joe Bowers 3rd, sired



by Joe Jun, can trot a mile in 2:28. Echo, another one of his colts, can pace under 2:30 with about 60 days training, shows a 2:16 gait on quarter. Cyclone, another of his colts, can pace a mile in 2:24. Joe Bowers 3rd will sell for \$1500 or \$2000, Echo for \$1000, Cyclone for \$750. Several other colts just put on Columbia Fair Course that show speed, not valued. Joe, Jr., has one colt at Merces, first station above Abilene, that sold for \$600 only 4 years old. One at Hubbard City, Tex., 2 years old, sold for \$300. In August, 1889, I refused three offers for Joe, Jr. \$1500, \$1300, \$1000, by different men. References: B. S. Thomas, Sec. 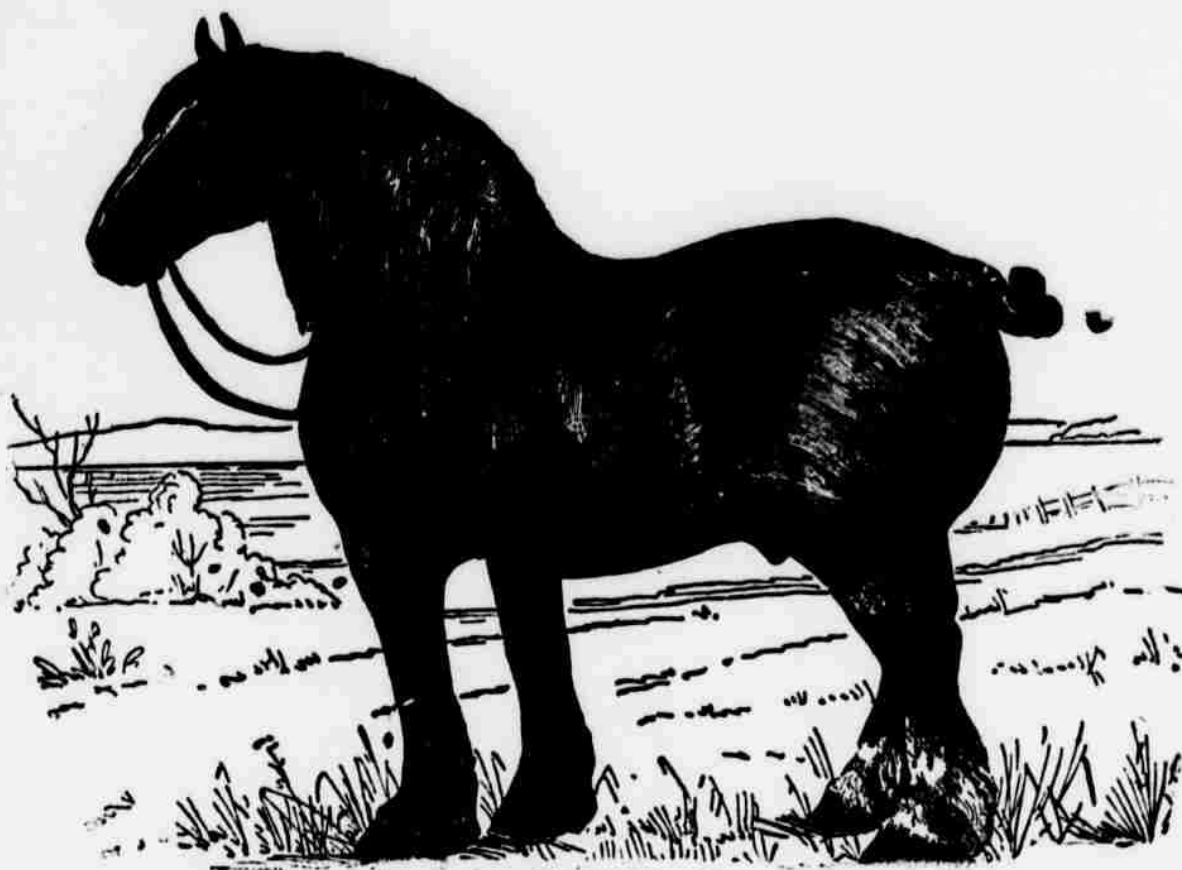
