Ms. Page, who only recently accepted her position as a representative of the Shelter, stated she has set certain goals in her undertaking. One of these will be to increase public awareness to wide-spread abuse as well as the role the Family Shelter can play in the lives of women and children. She will also seek volunteers in each county who could take an active part in the Shelter program by serving as a contact between those seeking help and the Family Shelter itself in San Angelo.

Emphasis should be placed

on the fact that the San Angelo Shelter serves 13 counties including Coke County. It is suppported and funded by the Texas Department of Human Resources, the United Way and the City of San Angelo as well as private donations.

In emergencies, those needing help may call 655-5774, collect. This is a 24 hour hotline number; trained personnel are on duty 7 days a week. You DO have a choice! Funding is even available for transportation to the Family Shelter for those in need.

Ms. Page will be back in Coke County to discuss any problem or give information on the San Angelo Family Shelter the last Tuesday of each month.

ASU Hosts Band Camp



The Extension Way People Helping

With water supplies declining in Texas, homeowners and other should be interested in landscape development to conserve water.

Concern over impending water shortages has stimulated interest in reducing water use for turf and garden areas.

Water conservation can be practiced in all areas of landscape development and maintenance, including plant selection, irrigation practices and equipment, and soil preparations. The practices can be aesthetic as well as practical.

Homeowners can lower their landscape water usage in several ways:

--Using native and adapted plants. Native plants often thrive on existing growth conditions and reduce the need for extra irrigation. Many plants have been introduced that show adaptability to soil, rainfall and temperature conditions.

--Taking advantage of innovations in irrigation practices and equipment. The landscape irrigation business is experiencing a revolution, with new timing devices, low pressure systems, drip irrigation systems and small ponds and fountains also can effectively use water as an aesthetic addition to a landscape.

--Using mulches for insulation. By providing an insulating layer between the sun and soil, mulches prevent rapid drying and lower soil temperature in hot weather, which keeps the top soil from crusting or hardening. Low-cost materials such as hay, grass clippings, bark and pine needles are excellent for mulching and can add appeal with texture and color.

--Properly preparing the soil. When soil has been loosened and improved with plenty of organic material, such as peat, or compost, it will hold significantly more moisture and release it over a longer period of time. However, organic materials break down over time and need to be supplemented. A compost pile can be a good source of these materials, allowing the homeowner to recycle leaves, grass clippings and other waste to improve the soil.

These are just a few practices that homeowners can use to significantly reduce water usage in their outdoor environment.

Former Coke Attorney Sentenced Six Years

Roy Lee Ford, ex-Big Spring lawyer, has been sentenced to six years in the Texas Department of Corrections. The formal sentencing took place in Federal Court in Abilene on Thursday, July 26. Exact date for Ford to begin his prison stint has not been set by Federal Judge Halbert Woodward.

Warren Heagy of Odessa, Ford's legal counsel, and the defendant had asked the court for probation. Ford, 47, told the court, "I am as ashamed as a man can be who has violated the trust of family and friends, but I am not deserving of anything."

Ford, who had entered a guilty plea on January 24 to a charge of distributing cocaine. could have been sentenced to 15 years in prison and fined \$25,000. He entered the plea after an investigation into drug trafficking in Howard County was completed. He was charged with delivering one-half ounce of cocaine to a man identified as Cooper Proctor on May 12, 1983.

A practicing attorney in Big Spring for number of years, Ford served as Coke County attorney from 1971 to 1975.



McCraw Reunion Attended By Betty Clawson And Her Sister

Recently Miss Betty Clawson and her sister, Mrs. James (Christine) Stewart of Macomb, Okla. and her brother, Frank Clawson, Jr. of Oklahoma City attended the National Reunion of the McCraw Clan in the U.S., held in Richmond, Virginia June 29-30. Their mother, the late Odessie McCraw Clawson was honored at the reunion for her part in preserving the McCraw Heritage, and the family history book written by her in 1980 was placed in the Virginia Archives, together with a dedication and a memorial.

On the way East, the group stopped at courthouses in McNairy and Hardin Counties, Tennessee and did some research on their McDonald/Fields ancestors; drove on through the Smoky Mountains to Asheville, North Carolina where their Smith ancestors lived, then over to Iredell County, North Carolina where their paternal ancestors, the Sloans, Harrises, Morrisons and Logans lived in the late 18th century. At the courthouse there they picked up copies of the old deeds where their 4th great grandfather, Fergus Sloan, gave the land for the old Fourth Creek Presbyterian Church in 1759

and the land for townsite of Statesville, the county seat of Iredell County, in 1790.

Following the reunion they drove over to Washington, D.C. for a brief tour of the city, then came back through the Shenandoah Valley, visited the old Civil War battlefields of Manassas and Bull Run, then on to Franklin County, Virginia where their ancestor Benjamin McCraw lived in the 1780's; on down through North Carolina and South Carolina into Georgia. They spent a couple of days in Cherokee County and visited the old home place on the banks of the Etowah River where their McCraw ancestors settled in 1830 and lived for more than six decades, and several old cemeteries where they and their descendants now lie resting.

They then came home by way of Alabama, Mississippi and through the Ozarks in Arkansas. It rained 8 of the 10 days while they were gone and the weather was nice and cool.

Miss Clawson commented that the group saw lots of pretty country but nothing that would beat Coke County, and she was glad to get back home again.

Postal Pointers by Postmaster Coe Lewis

Here's a few pointers on stamp collecting as told to me by Dennis T. Parker who runs a stamp shop in Odessa and is an avid stamp collector. Will be giving us pointers from time to time: Anything with a stamp on it is valuable-be it an old picture post card, old letters, documents, revenue tax stamps and even old bedding tax stamps. There was a yellow stamp on bedding and chairs. Also stamps were put on butter, newspapers, bank checks and duck hunting stamps. Do not tear

stamps off old letters or cards. Reason: a 2c red stamp of 1903 is worth 5c retail soaked off. It is worth 15c still on the letter and if you have a first day cancellation—it is worth \$2,750.00. Condition of the stamps will be a major factor.

Save those stamps-get the kids interested in saving used stamps and we will try to get a junior or Ben Franklin Stamp Club organized in the near future.
