

# Dove prospects dim for upcoming hunting season

Mourning Dove season, the favorite of many hunters, will open in Coke County on Saturday, Sept. 1, for a 60 day season. Shooting will continue through October 30. Coke County falls in the Central Zone of the state and a short 10 day season has again been set from Jan. 5 through Jan.

The prolonged drought on the heels of one of the coldest winters on record in late 1983 have taken a toll on bird numbers. Prospects are dim for the upcoming season. Resident nesting birds in the regional area are few in number; they have either moved to other areas of the state or died off. It is estimated by Texas Parks and Wildlife personnel that 60 percent of the mourning doves harvested here are Texas-raised birds. The other 40% come down from northern states later in the season after much cooler weather drives them South.

Only bright spot for shot-gunners will be that if any

feed, such as sun-flowers or laid-out grain fields, are near an available water source you would know where to corner the doves. Many dirt tanks are dry now and watering holes are few and far between.

Shooting hours for mourning doves are one-half hour before sunrise to sunset with a statewide bag limit of 12. A hunting license is not required for those hunting in the county of their residence. Shotguns must be plugged to a threeshot capacity for Mourning Doves, migratory birds.

Veteran hunters know the standard rules but perhaps they bear repeating for beginners. If you wish to give your birds to another person, he may carry them if a note is attached, with the name of the party who took the birds, his address, total count, and the date. No hunting is allowed on public roads, road right of ways, or on property without permission. Always observe gun safety for an enjoyable hunting season.

Today it is housed in a new modern building with a professional burglar alarm system. Many families of the area have made contributions of their collections to the museum. 

or reduced price meals.

Application forms are being sent to all homes with a letter to parents or guardians. To apply for free or reduced price meals, households should fill out the application and return it to the school. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school. The information provided on the application will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility and may be verified at any time during the school year by school or other program

For the school officials to determine eligibility, the household must provide the following formation listed on the application: Names of all household mem numbers of all adult household members or a statement that the household member does not possess one; total household income or the household's food stamp case number if they currently receive food stamps; and the signature of an adult household member certifying that the information provided is correct..

Applications may be submitted at any time during the year.

Under the provisions of the free and reduced price policy the Bronte ISD Superintendent Michael Hartman, will review applications and determine eligibility. Parents or guardians dissatisfied with the ruling of the official may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on an informal basis. Parents wishing to make a formal appeal may make a request either orally or in writing to Superintendent Michael Hartman, Bronte I.S.D., Box 370, Bronte, Texas, 76933, 473-2511 for a hearing on the decision.

Households are required to report increases in household income of over \$50 per month or \$600 per year and decreases in household size. Also, if a household member becomes unemployed, or if the household size increases, the household should contact the school. Such changes may make the children of the household eligible for reduced meals or for free meals if the household's income falls at or below the levels shown above.

In certain cases foster children are also eligible for school meal benefits. If a household has foster children living with them and wishes to apply for them, the household should contact the school for more information.

The information provided by the household is confidential and will be used only for purposes of determining eligibility and verifying data.

In the operation of child feeding programs administrated by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, no child will be discriminated against because of race, color, sex, national origin, age or handicap. If any member of a household believes they have been discriminated against, they should write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C.



### Taxes required

Some wage earners and other individuals who have income other than wages may be required to estimate taxes. The Internal Revenue Service says the next due date for estimated tax payments is September 17, 1984. You are liable for filing a

declaration of estimated tax if you have income not subject to withholding of more than \$500 and you expect to owe at least \$400 on next year's return. The IRS states that you are also liable if you expect to owe at least \$400 and your gross income is more than:

\$20,000 - if you file as single head of household, qualifying widow or widower, or married, can file a joint declaration and your spouse has not received wages for 1984.

\$10,000 - if you are married, can file a joint declaration, and both of you have received wages for 1984.

\$5,000 - if you are married and cannot file a joint declara-

Just like tax withholdings by employers, estimated taxes are paid in advance of filing the actual tax return that is due for the year. Estimated taxes are normally paid in four installments (the first two were due April 15 and June 15;, and there is a substantial penalty for underpayment of estimated taxes.

For 1984 returns, the two remaining estimated tax installment dates are September 17, 1984, and January 15,


