City of RL signs water contracts

The City of Robert Lee is happy to announce the signing of all contracts for the complete new water treatment plant.

Contract No. 1 was to General Filter Company for clarification unit and gravity filter unit. This contract was for all pumps and equipment for the plant. This contract was signed May 17. Some of this equipment has already arrived with the entire balance due in 2 to 4 weeks.

Contract No. 2 was to Gracon Construction Company. This contract is for total installation of the new equipment. This work should start in about two weeks.

The treatment plant improvements comprise:

1. Conversion of one of two sedimentation basins into an upflow solids contact clarifier.

2. Elimination of existing rapid mix facilities.

3. Installation of a dual media gravity filtration unit of 1000 GPM capacity at a 4.0 GPM per square foot rate.

4. Conversion of the second of the two sedimentation basins into a 100,000 gallon clearwell storage unit for treated water.

5. Installation of two vertical turbine 750 GPM each can-type transfer pumps.

6. New chemical and chlorination (feeders, piping, and controls) equipment.

7. Plant site work and yard piping.

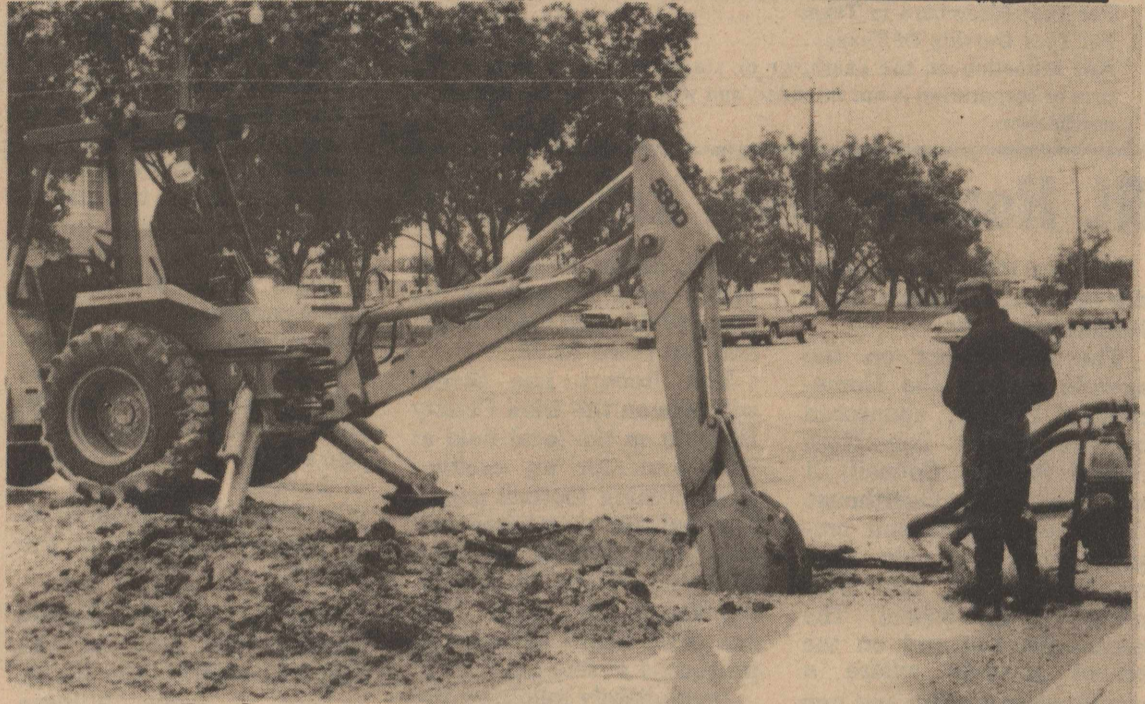
8. Appurtenances.

The total cost of the entire project is \$525,876.00. Funds for this are available and arranged for.

Also, a contract for pump and equipment to gather waste from Spence Lake on the surface has been agreed on and will probably be installed within the next 10 days.

Total construction time for the treatment plant is approximately 300 days.

The City wants to thank all of you for your patience and understanding and cooperation. We have been working on these improvements for the past three years.

Rawlings announces CCSWCD election

An election for a director to serve in Zone 1 on the Coke County Soil and Water Conservation District Board is scheduled for October 9 at the Baptist Church at Silver, announced Joe Rawlings, chairman of the board. The election will be held at 8 p.m.

State law decrees that to be eligible to vote in a soil and water conservation district director's election, a person must own agricultural land within the sub-division where the election is being held. The person must also live in a county all or any part of which is in the district and the voter must be 18 years old.

Legal qualifications state that a candidate for the office of a soil and water conservation district director must own land in the zone he represents, be 18 years of age and be actively engaged in farming or ranching. He must also live in a county all or part of which is in the district.

Zone 1 of the district includes an area in the north-west part of the county to east of Sanco. Wilbern Millican is the current member of the board who represents Zone 1.

SWCD directors are to help promote sound soil and

water conservation programs on farm and ranch lands within the district and to serve as a voice for farmers and ranchers on conservation matters and other issues affecting private property rights of landowners.

The district board of directors coordinates efforts of various local, state and fed-

eral agencies and other organizations and has authority to enter into working agreements with these governmental agencies and private concerns to carry out its purpose.

All conservation programs managed by the district are of a voluntary nature to the landowner or operator.

RL Post Offices vandalized recently; walls defaced



According to Ms. Lewis, it is a federal offense to tamper with anything inside or on the grounds of a government post office and could result in a federal prison sentence.

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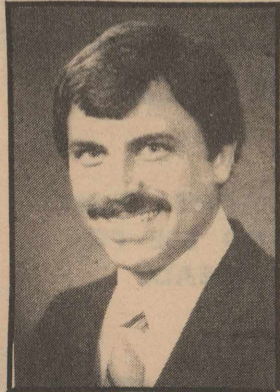
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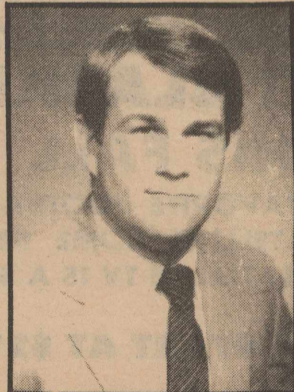

Steers score in final two minutes to bite Bulldogs; Wildcats are next

Such as Michael Wilson, Randy Stephens, John Hinnard, Philip Stephens, Harold Jameson, Doug Bell and Bobby Boone opening up holes for Greg Grim to amass 178 yds. rushing. The defense of Kevin Johnson, Joe Torres, Douglas Roberts, Dwane Harlin, Tim Garringer, Mike Sanchez, Jim Bob Jacobs, J.P. Skipworth and Kirby Rasco stopped the Bulldogs when they needed to be stopped. A name is just a name to some sports readers, but these are the 1984 Steers that downed a good Eden ball club. They showed that they could do it. When the chips were down by scoring in the last two minutes without getting the jitters and blowing it. That a way to go, Steers!

1st Quarter

The Steers received the opening kickoff at the S.18 with a return to the S.41 by Grim. But the Steers can't get started and Rasco punts to the E.29. Then Eden puts on a very time consuming drive making 4-1st downs to the S.24 using nearly 9 minutes of play. But they bog down there and the Steers defense holds on downs at the S.27. Then Eden holds for little gain and the Steers punt to the E.42. The Steers then halt them for a 4 yd. gain and Eden punts to the S.16. One play and the quarter ends at the S.18.

2nd Quarter

The Steers then make 2-1st downs to the S.43 but that's all and they punt to the Eden 6 yd. line. Then Eden makes 2-1st downs to

their 38 and then they are halted. They punt to the End Zone and the Steers get the ball at the 20. Then Greg Grim burst one loose for 68 yds. to the E.12 yd. line. 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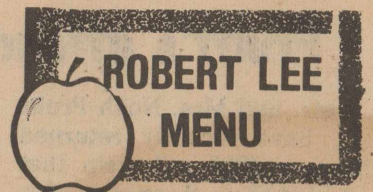
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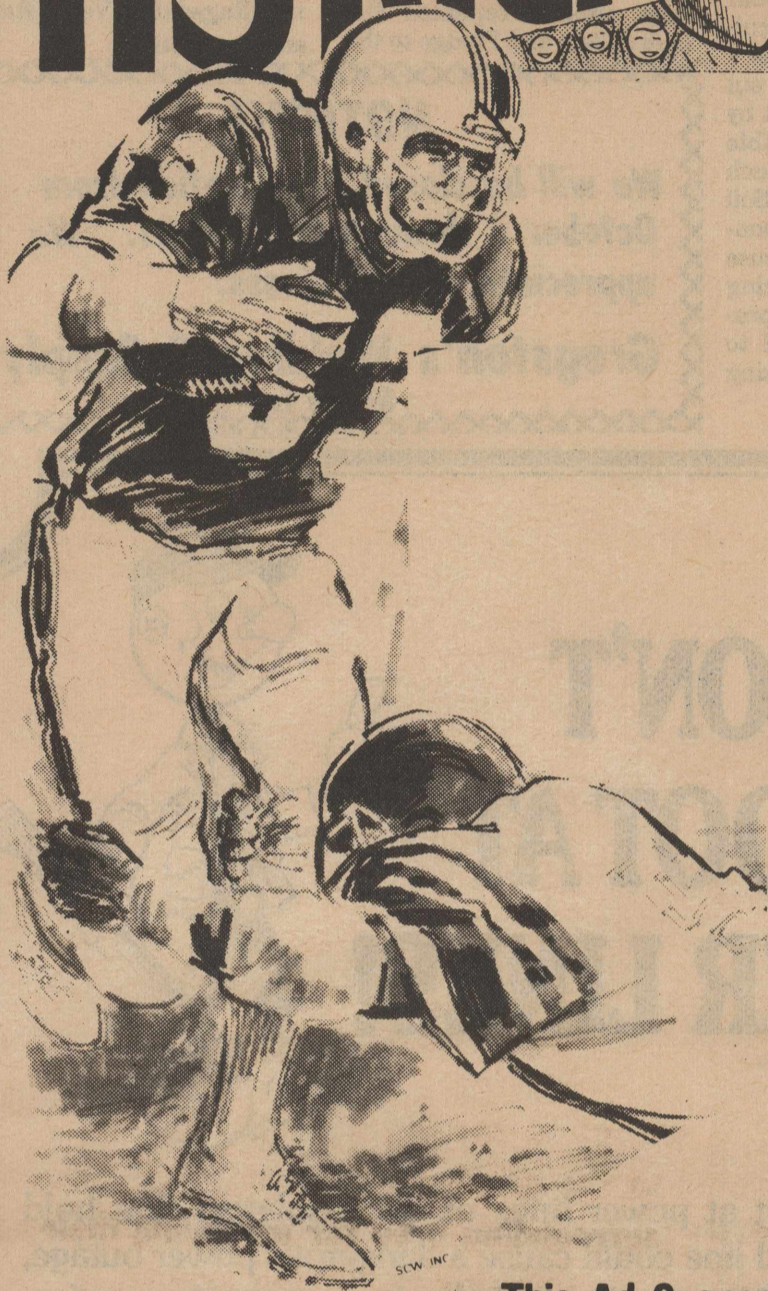

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SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS

Many Texas ranchers are discovering that more intensive grazing systems are becoming essential to their economic survival. Although the type of system used may vary a great deal, all have as their goal making the most efficient use of the grazing resources. Ranchers and stockfarmers alike, are looking for sustained high yields from their livestock and wildlife combined with protection of their most precious resource - the soil.

A well designed and operated grazing system should permit range improvement while increasing livestock production. Usually, livestock are the main harvesters of the forage produced and are the chief source of income on the average Coke County ranch. As rangeland carrying capacity is increased and the number of livestock on the ranch can be increased also, then many of the costs of ranch operation go down on a per head basis. In recent years wildlife income from hunting leases has become more important in this area. Grazing systems, as an extra benefit, usually improve wildlife habitat also, which may make their use more valuable. There is usually more pure profit per acre from wildlife than from most other ranching alternatives.

A grazing system consists of two or more pastures which are alternately grazed and rested in some type of planned sequence over a period of years. Many ranches in this area also utilize cropland planted to temporary summer or winter forage crops in their grazing system. Summer pastures especially, such as forage sorghums or Sudan, can be very beneficial to range improvement and allow higher stocking rates during normal rainfall years. Summer pasture stocking rates are usually quite high and their use allows for valuable summer and fall deferment of native pastures which is essential for range condition improvement. Winter grazing is usually less harmful to rangeland than summer use, so ranchers should plan to utilize their lowest condition ranges during the dormant winter

months and rest them during the growing season which will speed up pasture improvement.

Several factors should be taken into consideration when planning a grazing system. Probably the most critical is the manager's attitude. A higher level of management is required in almost any system and more record keeping - a chore despised by many ranchers. If a high intensity - short duration type of system is chosen, more labor may be required. An early step in the planning process is to take a forage inventory of the ranching operation. Vegetational characteristics of the ranch or farm need to be considered, such as type of forage produced (cool or warm season grasses, crops, etc.); the presence of poisonous plants in some pastures (oak, sacahuista, etc.); or pastures heavy in plants damaging to wool or mohair. Physical aspects of the ranch need to be considered, such as topography, water, pens, and potential pasture carrying capacities.

A good grazing system allows range plants to recover from close grazing, make seed, regain vigor, and build up food reserves. The livestock are naturally a very important part of any system and your schedules for breeding; lambing, kidding or calving; and livestock working operations need to be considered.

Be flexible in your system and keep it simple. Many Southwestern ranching experts now recommend keeping your base cow/calf herd at 50 to 60% of the ranch's carrying capacity and using some type of stocker animal to balance out. This gives you more flexibility which is desirable in any ranching operation and lessens the chance of having to cut deeply into your breeding herd during any but the worst of droughts. All of us are aware of the pain of having to cull deeply into a breeding herd that we've become "married" to during years of selection and management.

Finally, in order to measure the effectiveness of your grazing system, maintain accurate records on all important animal and pasture performance indicators. Good cost/return records will also be valuable in

assessing the status of your operation. The Texas Agricultural Extension Service has a new record keeping book out which should be examined by every operator for possible use in their farm or ranch business. Coke County Soil Conservation Service personnel will be happy to discuss the various types of grazing systems in use, analyze present ranch conditions and to help design your new grazing system if desired.

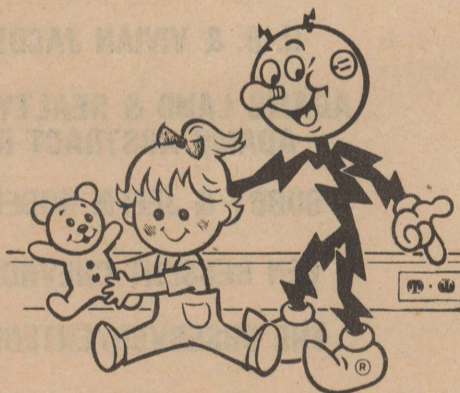
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DON'T SHOOT AT POWER LINES!



Never shoot at power lines or the insulators that hold them. A severed line could cause a dangerous power outage, and the downed line itself could also be a very serious safety hazard.

Here are a few other tips on how to live more safely — electrically:

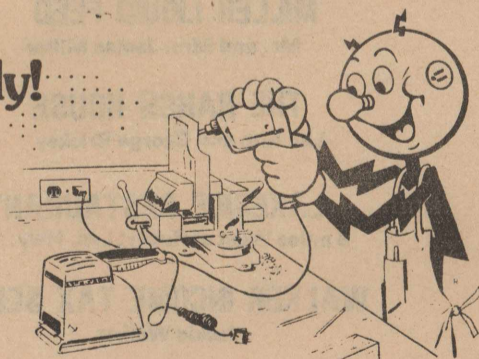


Keep Children Away from Outlets!

Don't let small children play near electrical outlets. A child could easily put a finger or some object in an outlet when you're looking away. A wise safety precaution would be to put safety caps in all wall outlets.

Use Power Tools Wisely!

Be extra careful when using power tools. Always be sure the wiring is adequate for the job. See to it that there are enough circuits of the right size, and that all circuits are grounded. Also, never use electric tools in the rain or on wet surfaces.

**SELECTIVE CULLING
REDUCES FEED COST**

Most of us finally got greatly needed rain last week but we aren't out of the woods yet. The wet, soaked ground sure beats the dust we have had, but in most areas it is still bare ground and probably will be for awhile.

There will probably be winter weeds to get sheep through for awhile but sufficient forage for cattle is still down the road. If producers haven't done so, you should consider culling any open or late calving cows. With a cow calving on time and barely covering feed cost an open cow or one that weans one of those late summer

calves is only a liability.

Pregnancy testing can determine when cows will calve and those that are open or late calves can be eliminated or replaced with a heavy bred cow that will have a coupon by her side this spring when it comes time to pay for supplemental feed.

The culling process should also weed out cows with bad eyes, udders or feet and legs. With expected heavy feed costs to winter our cows there is no reason to keep a cow that will not do her part next year.

This has been a bad year to say the least and it might surprise some producers how many open cows they have.

Horns get offense rolling; defeat Water Valley; Eagles arrive tonight

District 8A action began Friday night in the Wild, Wild West zone. This particular zone proves to be a case of heart-burn to the pollsters. For example, the Harris poll favored Water Valley by six points while the Standard-Times poll gave Bronte the edge. Nonetheless Bronte overcame a slow start and a 2-0 halftime deficit and rallied to a 22-8 victory over the Water Valley Wildcats.

First Half

Bronte won the toss electing to receive with Pete Puentez returning the kick from the 5 yd. line out to the 25 yd. line. Three plays and a penalty put Bronte back 13 yds. with a 4th down at their 12 yd. line. A bobbled snap on the punt attempt had Todd Lee scrambling through the endzone and tackled for a safety with 10:48 left in the 1st quarter. This wound up the scoring for the half. The 1st half did not prove to be an exciting half offensively for the Longhorns, as unofficially they netted a negative three yards and no first downs. Water Valley on the other hand used up most of their offensive push the 1st half with 102 yards of total offense. However, the Wildcats only put the 2 points Bronte spotted them early in the 1st quarter on the scoreboard. The Longhorns deepest penetration into Water Valley territory occurred early in

the 1st quarter when Doug Tounget hopped on a Wildcat fumbled at the Water Valley 23 yard line. Water Valley threatened twice during the half, once at the Horn 8 yd. line and second at the 15 yd. line. The Longhorn defense however tightened with strong team tackling.

Second Half

Bronte dominated the 2nd half offensively compiling an unofficial 159 yards. Chewy Puentez started the half off good with a 22 yd. kickoff return out to the 47 yd. line. The first Bronte possession stalled because of a fourth and short fumble. However, after stopping Water Valley Bronte drove 80 yds. in 4 plays for a score with 7:01 left in the 3rd quarter. Kerry Lee handled the ball once for 49 yards and Corby Kelso handled it three times for the rest and the TD. The try for two points failed on a Pete Puentez pass attempt for David Phillips. Bronte scored again on their next possession overcoming three penalties. Pete Puentez ground most of the yardage with runs of 21, 17, 9, and 2 yards respectively. Blain McGinnis and Corby Kelso also added 3 apiece. Kelso caught a Puentez pass for a 13 yard TD with 2:02 remaining in the 3rd quarter. Pete Puentez ran in for the two points with a nice fake and Bronte lead 14-2. Todd Lee hopped on a Wildcat fumble

at the W.V. 30 yd. line to set up the final Bronte score, their 3rd consecutive scoring drive. Pete Puentez and Corby Kelso alternated carrying the ball twice each to work it down to the Water Valley 10 yd. line. Kerry Lee busted down to the 5 yd. line, followed by two back to back Pete Puentez carries getting the ball in the endzone with 10:18 remaining in the final quarter. The last score came when a high snap on a Bronte punt attempt sent David Phillips chasing the ball inside the Bronte 5 yd. line where he was tackled at the 3 yd. line. On the next play Water Valley scored making the final score 22-8. Defensively the Longhorns played well and drastically decreased Water Valley's star runners average rushing per game statistic. The Wildcats only managed 3 pass completions in 13 attempts, with Pete Puentez gathering 2 interceptions to lead the Longhorns in that area. The loudest pop of the leather came from Todd Lee, but let me commend once again the whole defensive effort.

Sterling City comes to Bronte Friday night for another district game and Bronte's Homecoming. The Eagles are boasting a 3-0-1 record and will probably be the toughest challenge yet. The Longhorn record is now a respectable 2-1-1. Be There Friday Night.

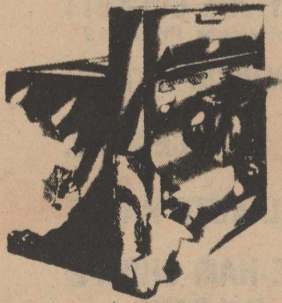

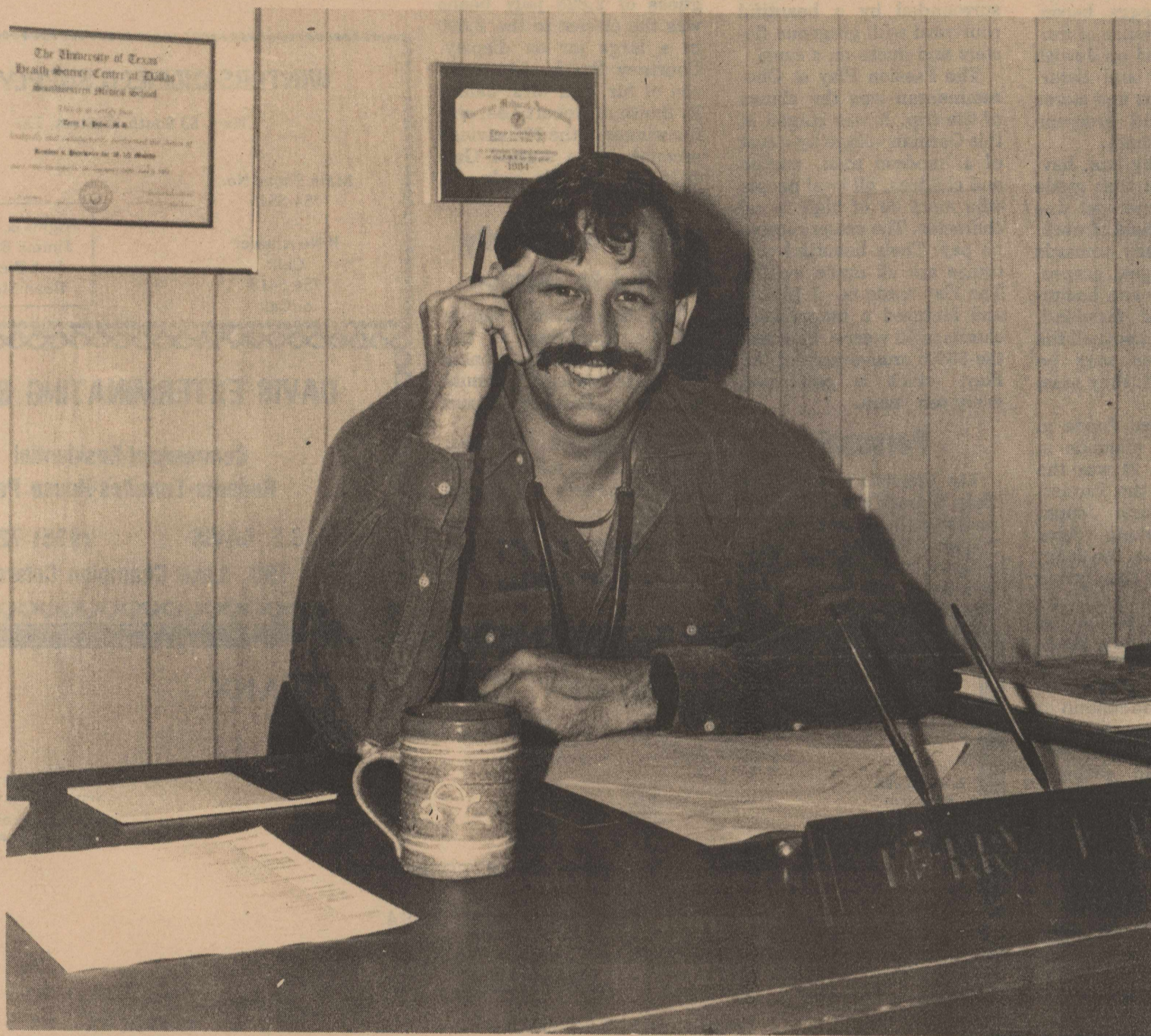

Edmiaston visits Holy Land

Mrs. Don (Willie B.) Edmiaston of Bronte was among a 37-member tour group who visited the Holy Land. She has been kind enough to share her experiences with our readership.

The Texas party departed D-FW, stopping in Atlanta where other members joined and then continued on to Tel Aviv, Israel, which is on the Mediterranean Sea. The time difference is eight hours, so the group arrived in time to go to bed. The next morning they had a breakfast buffet of raw fish, cheese, cucumbers, boiled and scrambled eggs, bacon, ham, and many kinds of fruit. They had arrived on Jewish Sunday (Friday and Saturday), so all shops and stores were closed and everyone goes to the seashore.

They toured by bus, having an excellent tour guide who had a degree and was excellent in his field of work. Tel Aviv has many orchards of apples, oranges, grapes, dates and olives and beautiful flowers and farmland. The government owns all the land, no homes may be bought or owned, they must be rented.

Tel-Aviv (called Joppa in Biblical times) abounds in Biblical history. It was the home of Simon the Tanner, Jonah sailed from Joppa, and it was where Peter raised Dorcas from the dead. In this area, the tour group visited Caesarea built by Herod the Great, the largest harbor in the Eastern Mediterranean where Paul was imprisoned and tried; Mt. Carmel and the Mountain of Beatitudes. They traveled the Damascus Road where they saw armed soldiers, large tanks and jeeps. Boys age 18 must serve three years, girls have to serve two years non-combat duty. The group crossed the Sea of Galilee in a boat to the other side where they boarded their bus and went to Mt. Tabor and the River Jordan.

The tourists departed for Jerusalem the following day, where they would spend five days at the Inter-Continental Hotel built on the top of the Mt. of Olives, overlooking the city of Jerusalem. Jerusalem has been destroyed 14 times. In 1948 it was divided and called Old and New Jerusalem, both coming under Jordanian rule.

Places of interest here were the Wailing Wall, Shepherd's Field, Jesus' birthplace, Dome of the Rock and other places significant in Christian history. They visited St. Ann's Church where the acoustics were most beautiful-- speak one word and it would have a musical ringing sound. They also went to the Market Place where they were instructed to stay together and hold on to their purses, lest they disappear, for here the people make their living off of the tourists.

The next day, the group traveled to the Dead Sea, where the water is very salty. Bathers were advised to stay in only 20 minutes, and a shower afterward is a

must. The area here is desert with no vegetation at all. Arabs here live in tents, the Bedovin Arabs on one side of the road and the other Arabs on the opposite side. They were herding their sheep and goats, the stock looked fat.

Their next destination was Munich, Germany's largest city, where they saw the New City Hall with its 250 ft. high steeple. They arrived in time to hear the clock strike at 11:00 a.m.-- it strikes at 11 a.m. and 6 p.m. each day. They saw the Hindenburg Palace built on 500 acres, surrounded by a beautiful courtyard with gorgeous flowers and ducks on a canal.

The Passion Play at Oberammergau was the climax of the trip. It was staged at this German village by a cast of a hundred men, women and children, all local people who must be of high moral character. The actors receive no pay. Their beautiful costumes are all made locally. The Play made up of 15 acts and featured a magnificent chorus of 50 voices. This was the 350th anniversary of the Play, which is performed every ten years.

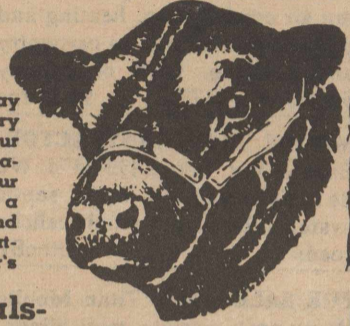

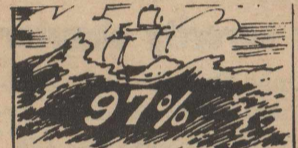
