Absentee balloting for upcoming election to continue through Nov. 2

Absentee Balloting for the November 6 General Election began on October 17 and will continue through Friday, November 2. Registered voters in Coke County may vote absentee until that time in the County Clerk's office in the Courthouse at Robert Lee. For those persons who are unable to vote in the office, contact can be made with the clerk to mail the ballot to you. If the ballot is received by mail, it must also be returned by mail, post-marked by the deadline date.

County Clerk Ettie Hubbard reported Tuesday morning an absentee balloting count of 20 votes in her office with 25 having been mailed out to voters over the county.

On Tuesday, November 6, Coke County will join the rest of the nation in balloting of the General Election to elect the President, Vice President, members of the Congress and Legislature,

and state, county, and precinct officers. Also on the ballot will be eight proposed constitutional amendments.

In compliance with the Texas Election code, the polls will open at 7:00 a.m. and close at 7:00 p.m. on Election day.

Election precincts, location of the six polling places, and election judges are as follows:

Precinct No. 1:

Elections to be held at the Recreation Hall in Robert Lee, with Patti Ivey as Presiding Judge and Charlotte Wojtek as Alternate Judge.

Precinct No. 2:

Elections to be held in the City Hall in Bronte with Royce Fancher as Presiding Judge and Flora Smith as Alternate Judge.

Precinct No. 3:

Elections to be held at the Courthouse in Robert Lee with Victor Wojtek as Presiding Judge and Polly Large as

Alternate Judge.

Precinct No. 4:

Election to be held at Tennyson Community Building in Tennyson, with Lora Belle Brown as Presiding Judge and Bill Hartman as Alternate Judge.

Precinct No. 5:

Elections to be held at the Old Depot in Bronte with Willie B. Edmiaston as Presiding Judge and Pearlie Mae Andrews as Alternate Judge.

Precinct No. 9:

Elections to be held at the Pecan Baptist Church Annex Building with D.O. King as Presiding Judge and Connie Millican as Alternate Judge.

Kenneth Lackey, Noel Percifull, James P. Arrott and Golda Smith will serve on the absentee canvassing Board.

Water levels increasing in area lakes and stock tanks

Runoff water from good rains last Saturday, Sunday and Monday have greatly benefited water levels in tanks and lakes around the area. Previous rains had saturated thirsty earth causing creeks and draws to flow.

Oak Creek Lake, which supplies the City of Bronte with water, reportedly gained 1.95 feet during the three-day rains.

Mountain Creek Lake, Robert Lee's primary supplier, rose four feet since the first rains started, according to Water Superintendent James Royall. Robert Lee has had to supplement Mountain Creek water this last year with purchased water from Lake Spence.

Lake Spence itself netted

about 2/10 of a foot as reported by W.L. Metcalf. He stated the gain would last about a week as Spence water is being supplied to several cities.

Full stock tanks and soaked pastures and fields are bringing big smiles to lots of faces in the area as rains have been general around us. Measurements for the last three days vary from 1.50 to 3 inches in the county. Those lucky enough to get small grain crops planted now have them up and growing.

At press time Tuesday, more showers were forecast by the National Weather Service for Wednesday and Thursday.

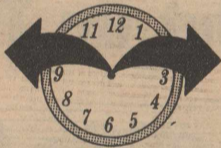
Coe is asking for all Robert

Turn Clocks Back...



On Sunday, October 28, at 2:00 a.m., Texas will join the rest of the nation in turning back the clocks one hour to end Daylight Savings Time for 1984. For those who don't elect to stay up until the appointed time, clocks can be rolled back Saturday night at bedtime.

In returning to Standard Time, daylight will come quicker and dark will approach sooner.

This is understandably

confusing as this law on time change was enacted in Washington.

Daylight Savings Time was first used during World War I to increase daylight productivity, then used again when World War II was declared. Some states kept the flip-flop change until the energy crisis a few years ago when the government made the change into law.

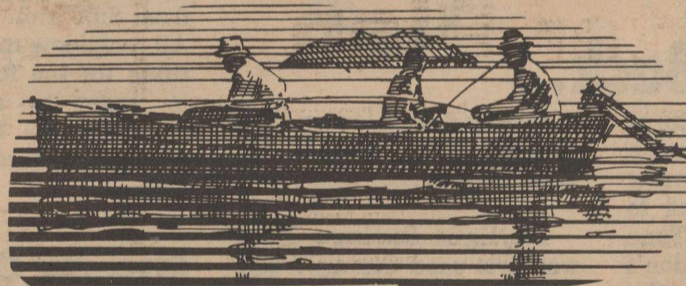
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WTBR Art Exhibit planned


There has to be a solution which is best for all, and I think it's time to look for it.

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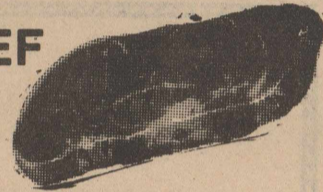
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Merits of junior livestock shows discussed by 4-H officials at University of Wisconsin

Republished from 4-H Meat Animal Notes, University of Wisconsin

"Before we discuss the merits of a junior livestock show, maybe we better define it. First of all, it's not a junior livestock show, it's a youngster show where livestock are used as props or visual aids. About 90% of the people who come to a livestock show come to see their youngster or someone else's youngster show themselves, and they have to have an animal in order to get into the ring.

Junior livestock projects should never be sold as money-making project. It is a teaching project, and should be sold as such. What does it teach?

1. It teaches youngsters to get along with people. Showing animals, winning, getting beat, and so forth, helps

youngsters to get along with others.

2. Livestock feeding teaches responsibility. It is the feeder's responsibility to hear the alarm clock and obey it. If they learn nothing more than that, feeding is worthwhile.

3. Junior livestock projects teach youngsters to attend to details. In feeding, and especially through life, it is often the little things that count. The person who goes the extra mile gets the job done.

4. Decision-making is the most painful task that a teenager has. The good animals shown this year didn't

REDUCE TRACTOR THEFTS
 -- With tractor thefts a major problem in rural areas today, farmers can take certain steps to hinder thieves, suggests a community development specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. These include removing the rotar, shutting off the fuel line, locking the tractor in gear, chaining the wheels, and keeping a close watch on the tractor or hiding it. These steps can remove the opportunity for tractor thefts.

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just happen to be here. Somebody planned it that way.

5. Feeding teaches youngsters to plan. Without a good planning job, we are sunk.

6. Somewhere along the line, we hope our young feeders will learn a little about livestock production.

We don't expect every youngster who feeds a calf, lamb, or hog to become a beef cattleman, sheepman or hogman; neither do we expect all little league baseball players to play for the major leagues.

Feeding is a family project. I don't mean the whole family does the work. I mean the whole family must enjoy it. Half the value of the project is lost if the parents don't attend the show.

I think sometimes we are prone to look at investments through the wrong end of a telescope. For example, we don't buy a car, we buy transportation; we don't buy a TV set, we buy entertain-

ment; we don't miss a day at school, we lose a day of education. By the same token, we don't invest toward a premium list or buy some youngster's calf or pic in a premium sale. Rather than that, we invest in the future of some boy or girl who in turn will help to keep America the greatest country on earth."

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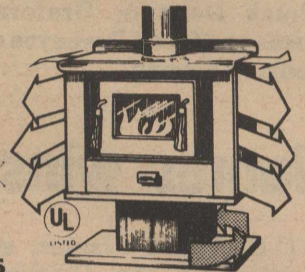
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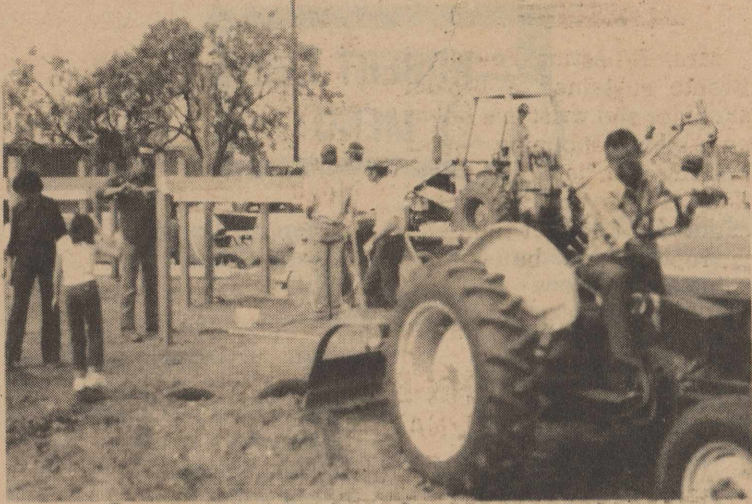

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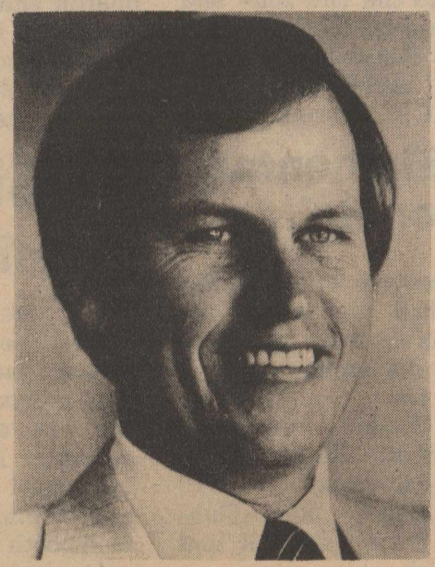

Steers change image as they pluck Eagles; assault Santa Anna here tonight

This brings to mind the tale of Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde. The turn-around of the Steer story for this year is a typical change like the two story book characters. The past two weeks the Steers were like Dr. Jekyll, conservative and easy going, but Friday night the Steers changed into the counterpart of Mr. Hyde. They were ugly to the Sterling City Eagles and played with devil may care, Hell bent for Viciousness. Their blocking and tackling was right opposite from the former weeks and it was great! Some of the boys became of age Friday night and found out it was easier to run over, than be run over.

1ST QUARTER

The Steers took the opening kickoff and started at their own 24. In fine fashion they drove the ball with 4-1st downs to the Eagles 19 yd. line. But they then bogged down and a attempted field goal failed and the Eagles took over. S. City moved for 2-1st downs to their 41 but the Steers then held and they punt to the Steer 29 as the 1st quarter ends.

2ND QUARTER

The Eagles then hold and the Steers punt to the E.13 yd. line. The Eagles start another drive making 5-1st downs to the Steer 31, but the Steers then hold and they punt into the end zone and the Steers get the ball at the 20. The Steers have trouble as they fumble at the S.27 and S.C. recovers. They

made a 1st at the S.17 and from the 11, they complete a pass for the TD. They kick their extra point and lead now 7 to 0.

S.C. kicks off with the Steers returning to the 40. The Steers can't move and they punt to the Eagle 28. They make a 1st at their 45 and then Rasco intercepts a pass to end the 1st half.

3RD QUARTER

The Steers kickoff with S.C. returning to the S.48. The Steers hold for little gain and S.C. punts to the S.15. The Steers makes a 1st at the S.31, then Grim makes a big 1st with a 52 yd. run to the Eagle 18. Then from the 10, Grim burst through a big hole for the TD. The extra fails and the score is 7 to 6. The Steers kickoff with S.C. returning to the S.41.

The Steers get a break as S.C. fumbles and Jacobs recovers at the S.33. But the Eagles hold and Rasco kicks a good one that lies on the S.C. 5 yd. line. S.C. makes a 1st at the 19, but then the Steers hold and on the punt attempt, Grim crashes through and blocks the punt which bounces back out of the end zone to give the Steers a 2 pt. safety and they lead 8 to 7. The Eagles have to free kick and the Steers get the ball at the S.34. But S.C. holds and the Steers punt to the S.C. 20 with a return to the 41 as the 3rd quarter ends.

4TH QUARTER

The Steers hold again and again on the punt attempt, Grim blocks it and they get

the ball at the S.C.34. The Eagles then hold on downs at the E.24 and they make a 1st at their 36. The Steers then recover a fumble at the E.37. The Steers then drive it down their crawl for 2-1st downs and another TD by Grim from the 13 yd. line. Joe Torres then kicks the extra point and the Steers lead is now 15 to 7.

The Steers kickoff to the E.39 with no return. S.C. makes a 1st at the 50, but the Steers then hold on downs at the 45 yd. line. The Steers make a 1st at the S.C. 32, but the Steers then fumble after a big gain at the E.21.

Then the Eagles put on a scoring drive for 3-1st downs to the S.39 and from the 30 they complete a pass and run play for the TD, with 59 seconds left. Then the scary part as they go for 2 pts. to tie the ball game they attempt a pass. The receiver was wide open in the end zone, but from out of no where came Grim to intercept and the Steer still led by 2. S.C. then onside kicks but the Steers cover the ball at the S.36. 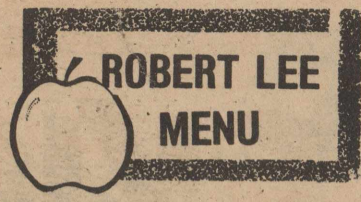

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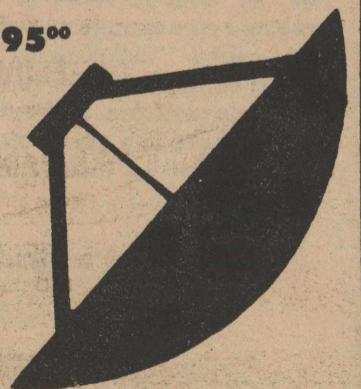
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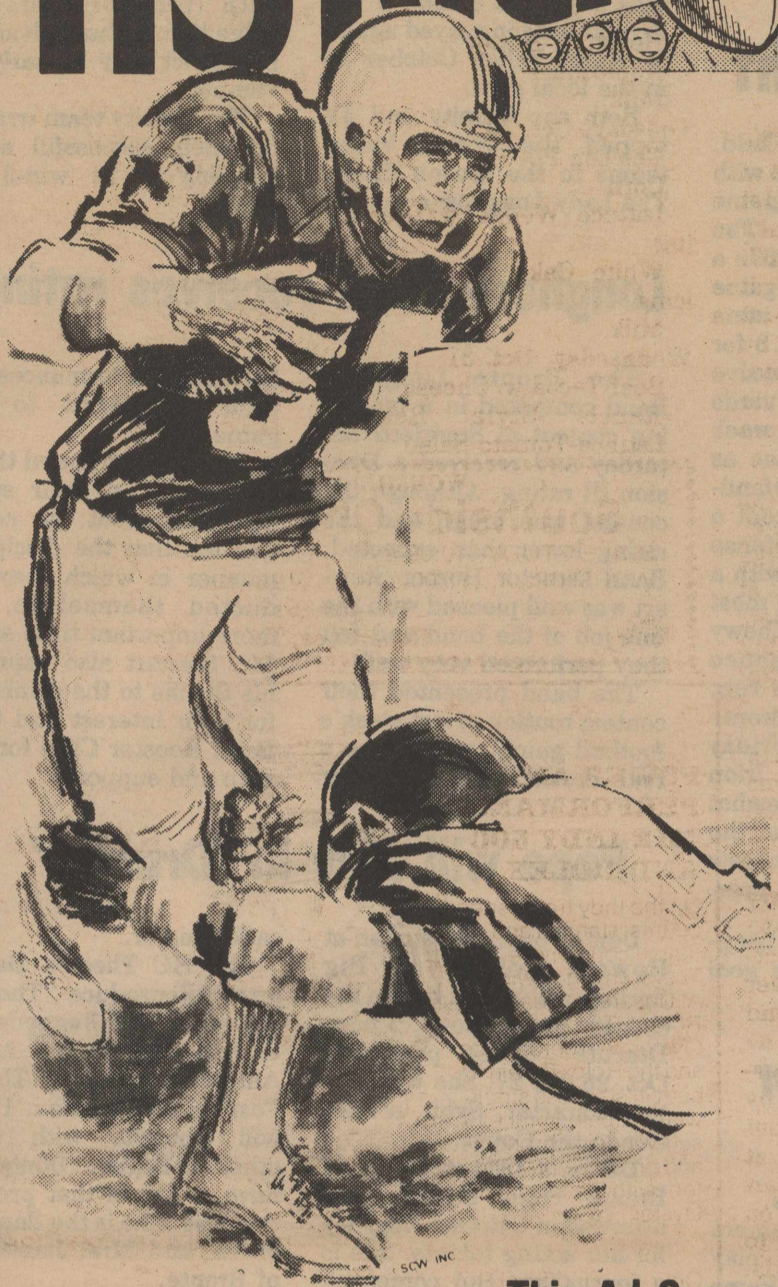

Horns bitten by Bulldogs for first district loss; travel to Mertzon tonight

The Eden Bulldogs handed Bronte their first loss in zone play by a score of 7-0 Friday night. The loss slipped Longhorn record to 4-2-1 for the season and 3-1 in zone action. Eden improved their record to 3-4 and 3-1, to move into a tie for first with Bronte.

1ST HALF

The Bronte Longhorns dominated the first half, with the Longhorn defense and Punter David Phillips keeping Eden pinned deep in their own end of the field. Eden's five first half possessions started from their own 7, 4, 22, 14, and 15 yard lines respectively and they never penetrated their own 24 yard line. The Bulldogs were also denied a first down and only 20 first half yards. On the other hand, Bronte began their six first half possessions from their own 32, Eden's 9, 47, 38, Eden's 44, and 47 yard lines respective-

ly. The Longhorns attained 75 yards and 5 first downs and penetrated into Bulldog territory on all possessions but the first, once having the ball at the Eden 2 yard line and failing to score. That possession was the result of a Todd Lee fumble recovery at the Eden nine yard line.

2ND HALF

As the second half got started it appeared the Longhorn's were going to prove West Zone superiority, by taking the ball at their own 35 yard line and literally ramming their way through the throat of the Bulldog defense. Eight consecutive running plays took the Longhorns 63 yards to the Bulldog two yard line, but Bronte again failed to score with a fourth down pass intercepted. That very series seemed to turn the momentum. From that point on Eden with the inclusion of quarterback Danny Hernandez kept Bronte pretty well penned in

their own end of the field. Eden's lone score came with 9:57 remaining in the game to take a 7-0 lead. The Longhorns failed to sustain a scoring drive as the game ended. Bronte's final stats were 11 first downs to 8 for Eden, and 193 offensive yards compared to 144 yards for Eden. The hit of the week goes to Senior Todd Lee as he leveled a Bulldog defender attempting to intercept a Longhorn pass. The defense did play a good game with a solid performance from most every player led by Chewy Puentez whose presence around the ball, pass or run, warrants mentioning. Bronte travels to Mertzon on Friday night to take on the Irion County Hornets in somewhat of a grudge match for the Longhorns as the Hornets surprised them last year.
