Coke County voters favor the GOP

Coke County followed the state and national trends at the polls on Nov. 6 in the General Election when voters showed favor to most Republican Party candidates in record turn-outs.

A total of 2286 persons registered to vote and qualified to cast ballots in the county, reported County Clerk Ettie Hubbard. Precinct chairmen tallied 1438 votes plus 174 absentee ballots from the clerk's office for a total of 1612.

Absentee voter turn-out, usually an indicator of what election day numbers will be, was again true to form. Coke County did fall below the 72 to 75 percent voter participation predicted for Texas by Secretary of State Myra McDaniel but the 71%

recorded was the best in recent years. This elevated percentage indicated the high voter interest and intensive voter registration campaigns shown before the election.

Coke County's complete results follow.

The Reagan-Bush ticket recorded a landslide in Coke County with 1060 votes over Mondale-Ferraro with 532. La Roche and Davis received 8.

Phil Gramm outran Lloyd Doggett in the hard-fought U.S. Senate race 965-611.

Democratic State Representative of the 66th District Dick Burnett totaled 858 over Republican challenger Steve Stephens with 682. Burnett apparently carried Tom Green, Mitchell, and Coke

Counties while Sterling County favored Stephens.

Charles Stenholm, U.S. representative of District 17, unopposed gained 1106.

For Railroad Commissioner Mack Wallace had 919 to 530 for John Thomas Henderson.

John Hill polled 993 to John Bates' 489 for Chief Justice of the Supreme Court while two other justices for Place 1 & 2 were unopposed; Franklin S. Spears, 1020 and C.L. Ray, 1032.

Sam Houston Clinton, 860, to 524 for Virgil E. Mulanex for Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 1 - Place 2,

unopposed, W.C. (Bill) Davis, 1023; Place 3, unopposed, Bill White, 1027.

In the Chief of Justice, Court of Appeals, 3rd District race, unopposed, Bob Shannon, 1050. District Judge's race for 51st District, unopposed, Royal Hart, 1133. Gerald Fohn, 1100, unopposed for District Attorney of the 51st District.

With no opposition, Coke County candidates gained voter confidence as follows, Bill Helwig, county attorney, 1166; Marshall Millican, county sheriff, 1232; Maurine Vosburg, county tax collector-assessor, 1220;

George Newby, county commissioner, Precinct #1, 360; Finis Millican, county commissioner, Precinct #3, 357; Bob Fields, constable Precinct #1,332; and Wayne Arrott, constable Precinct #2, 308.

Coke County voted for amendment proposition #1, 925-327; for #2, 833-457; for #3, 666-589; for #4, 609-419; against #5, 579-632; against #6, 290-889; for #7, 680-495; and against #8, 315-869.

Statewide, all proposed amendments apparently passed except #6 and #8, with tabulations still incomplete at presstime.

Football Championship of Coke County on the line tonight

The 1984-85 Coke County Football Championship will be on the line when the Bronte Longhorns stampede into Robert Lee Friday night (tonight) to challenge the Steers.

This week will wrap-up regular season play in District 8-A West Zone. Eden's win over Sterling City clinched the only play-off spot yet decided in the zone, going into the last week of play. The possibilities of the order of play-off finishes reads like a lottery lineup. Since the ruling of the UIL committee a few years ago which allows

the runner-up teams to go to the play-offs this game is even more significant.

If Eden beats Miles and Robert Lee (5-4) beats Bronte (4-4-1), Eden is the winner and Robert Lee is the runner-up. If Robert Lee wins and Eden loses, Robert Lee is the winner and Eden is the runner-up.

If Bronte beats Robert Lee and Irion County (5-3-1) beats Sterling City, Irion County is the runner-up.

And finally, if Bronte beats Robert Lee and Sterling City beats Irion County, Bronte is the runner-up.

When East meets West Friday night at 7:30, there's more on the line than district wins. There's a rivalry and pride, too. Bronte dashed Robert Lee's play-off hopes last year 16-13. Robert Lee took the 1982 County Championship 28-0.

Athletic Director Nelson Coulter has good reason to work his Steers harder this week in preparation for the game. He is a Bronte High School graduate and played for Longhorn Coach Gerald Sandusky.

The game promises to be a classic matchup. Be There!

The Health Fair will feature screening services for various health problems as well as informational services from 18 organizations, health professionals, and service groups.

The Health Fair is jointly sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service through the Coke County Family Living Committee, the Texas Department of Health, Regional IV, the Robert Lee Senior Citizens, and the Coke County Extension Homemakers. These organizations are working cooperatively to hold this event in hopes that more Coke County citizens will become better informed about their health and well-being, as well as the many services offered in this area by different organizations.

Exhibits and screening are planned from the following groups: Texas Department

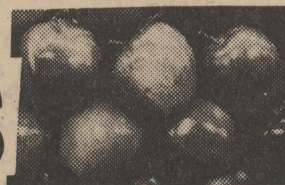

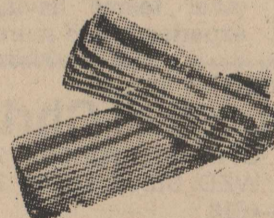

The San Angelo paper read as if Miles was the overall victor and played way above the Steers, but with the Steers having over 200 yds. rushing and Miles only 83 it doesn't seem that way and we had more passing yards also, so who had the better team?

1ST QUARTER

Miles received the opening kickoff with a return to their 31. But the hogs hold and M. punts to the S.40. The Steers can't gain and they punt to the M.12. Keith Eubanks was welcomed as a new EMT to the Robert Lee group.

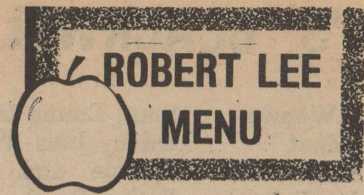
Appointed to the West Coke Co. hospital board to represent the EMS for the year are Lou Wright, Dortha Wright and Gene Hinard.

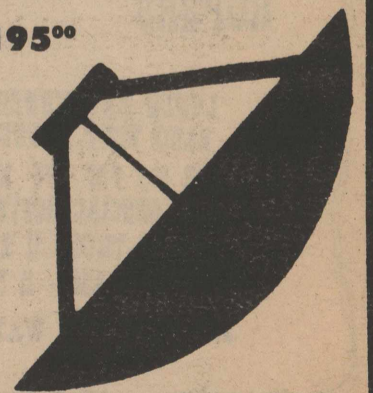

BRONTE SCHOOL NEWS

Santa Anna Mountaineers shackle Longhorns; Bronte High School travels to Robert Lee

Turnovers proved to be the deciding factor of this game. Bronte lost four fumbles and had three passes intercepted, plus two blocked punts one of which was carried in for a Santa Anna score. Santa Anna on the other hand only had 2 passes intercepted and one blocked punt, giving the Mountaineers huge advantage in momentum and field position.

1ST HALF

Bronte won the toss and elected to receive, with Pete Puentez bringing the ball out to the Longhorn 30 yard line. Bronte earned 25 yards in seven plays with Corby Kelso, Kerry Lee, and Blain McGinnis carrying the ball 4, 1, 2 times apiece respectively. A penalty moved the Horn's back to mid-field, however McGinnis connected with David Phillips for a 12 yard gain. Kerry Lee gained seven more yards on two carries and a first down. Corby Kelso carried twice for 3 yards to the Santa Anna 28 yard line. McGinnis hit Pete Puentez on a 28 yard scoring pass for the games initial score. McGinnis ran in the two point conversion giving Bronte an 8-0 lead with 6:18 left in the first quarter. Todd Lee kicked off for the Longhorns with Kerry Lee stopping the return at the S.A. 28 yd. line. S.A. had the ball 5 plays making one first down before having to punt. Kerry Lee, Blain McGinnis, and Butch James led the Horn tacklers, also joined by Todd Lee and Doug Tounget. Bronte put the ball in play at their own 26 yard line but could not manage a first

down and David Phillips got away a 38 yard punt. S.A. moved the ball 18 yds. in six plays with Corby and Duff Kelso and Joel Sanders joining in on the stops. The 1st quarter ended and S.A. was setting up to punt as the second quarter began. The punt was excellent going inside the Bronte 10 yd. line and hitting a Horn player allowing S.A. to recover at the Bronte 7 yd. line. On the next play a near S.A. TD was deleted by a clipping penalty moving the ball out to the 27 yard line. The Mountaineers were unable to get a score as Todd Lee halted a 4th down attempt at the Bronte 9 yard line. Bronte gained no yardage in three plays and so David Phillips punted, just barely getting the kick off. The punt rolled out of bounds at the Longhorn's 32 yard line. S.A. moved the ball down to the Bronte 9 yard line, but again were stalled by the stiffening Horn defense headed by Blane Braswell and Chewy Puentez. The Mountaineers attempted a field goal which fell no good. Bronte took over at their own 20 yd. line, but not for long as the 1st play resulted in a fumble with S.A. recovering. S.A. was unable to move the ball at all and a field goal attempt was blocked by Todd Lee. Bronte had the ball three plays making nine yards before punting the ball. S.A. set up shop at their own 45 yd. line. Seven plays took the Mountaineers to the Bronte 5 yd. line, but a clipping call moved them back out to the 20 yd. line. Butch James and Doug Hoyt threw the quarterback for an 8 yd. loss to the

28 yd. line. On the next play Senior Doug Tounget intercepted a pass and rambled 58 yds. to the S.A. 22 yd. line. Two consecutive passes to David Phillips resulted in a TD for the Horns with 11 seconds left in the half. Kerry Lee attempted to run for the two point conversion and fell just inches short. After the kick off S.A. tried a "Hail Mary" pass which Pete Puentez intercepted and the half ended with Bronte leading 14-0.

2ND HALF

The 2nd half began with Bronte kicking to S.A. The Mountaineers attained one first down due to a penalty and then punted. Bronte began at their own 14 yd. line, and moved the ball to the 4 yard in 3 plays and now the nightmare begins. The punt attempt by the Horns was blocked by S.A.'s Craig Duquette and without breaking stride the ball bounced back into his arms and he trotted in for the TD with 8:16 left in the 3rd period. The PAT was good cutting Bronte's lead to 14-7. After a nice kick off return by Pete Puentez, Bronte set up shop at their own 30 yard line. However, shop didn't last long as the first down play resulted in a fumble recovered by Santa Anna at the 32 yard line. The Mountaineers moved the ball to the Bronte 15 yd. line but a penalty and tough defense stopped the drive. Robbie Cooper made a big play on 4th down during that series. Bronte's first play was again a fumble and S.A. gained possession at the Horn 35 yd. line. It took

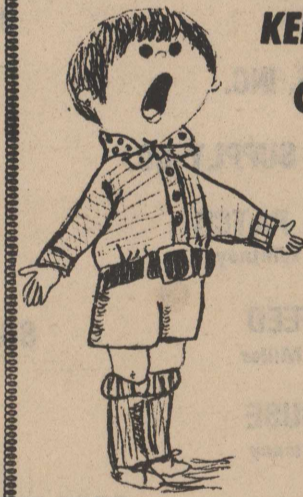

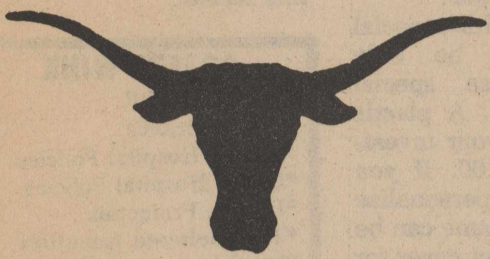

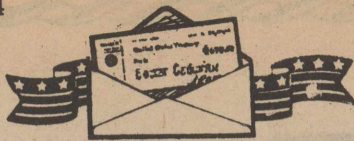
Chapman services held Friday

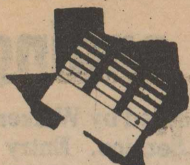

Health and vigor of trees and quality of fruit depend on a well-planned, well-executed control program.

There has been several instances of peach tree borer damage recently in Coke County. This damage is characterized by small holes around the trunk and lower portions of the tree and usually has sap oozing out. Uncontrolled, borers can eventually kill a peach tree in two or three seasons.

The optimum time for treatment is the first two weeks of November and there are several chemicals that can be used. Paradichlorobenzene crystals (PDB) is

a common cure for borers. The crystals should be placed a narrow band in a 2 inch furrow around the trunk in a 2-3 foot circle. Cover with a mound of clean dirt 4-5 inches high. Avoid pushing material against the tree. Mounds should be removed in early spring. For 2-3 year old trees use 1/2 ounce of crystals, 4-5 year old, 3/4 ounce and mature trees, 1 ounce.

There also are several liquids that can be used and are found at the local feed store and hardware stores. Read and follow label directions when applying these.

EMS fundraiser progressing

The West Coke County Emergency Medical Service announced this week that they are about two-thirds of the way on the fund-raising effort for money to purchase a monitor-defibrillator for use on the ambulance. The fund now totals \$4800 and the goal is \$6500. A monitor-defibrillator unit is need on the ambulance because it enables the volunteers to monitor a patient's heart status from minute to minute. With the high percentage of heart patients (about 80%), the service really needs this equipment. In addition, for certain patients who have a complete cardiac shutdown, the defibrillator portion of the unit can be used to attempt to get the heart to beat again. Needless to say, if the heart can be gotten to begin beating again, a life may have been saved. What price can you put on a life? Lou Wright, a paramedic volunteer with the service notes that the information provided by the unit not only aids the volun-

teers in giving good patient care but enables them to radio patient status to both the doctor at the local hospital and to the receiving doctor in San Angelo. This makes the patient's care much better and the success rate is much higher.
