er season termed disappointing

Coke County deer hunters ended the 1984-85 season on Sunday, Jan. 6, with their version of a popular ad phrase, "Where's The Venison?"

The deer harvest this hunting season was, for the most part, a big disappointment. Nice bucks were few and far between and the does and yearlings were not as visible in daylight hours as they usually are.

Many theories have been offered to explain the reduced harvest, but it could be a combination of reasons. Although most of the deer taken were in good shape, the meager rations of the droughty conditions of last spring and summer probably affected the fawn crop and reduced numbers of adults with die-offs of the weak and

Another possibility that made deer less visible could be a change in rutting dates that did not coincide with the hunting season or nature protected the does from stress by not bringing some of them into season at all.

State game management officials hope to know more of rutting times and reproductive rates when spring fawns are born.

The one positive note for avid hunters has been the wide-spread fall rains that, if continued through spring, could revitalize the state and county for a rebound next vear.

Quail hunting in Coke County will continue through February 24. The bag limit of 12 per day is of no value as the birds are really scarce.

Texas Parks and Wildlife personnel say surveys indicate the statewide quail population plummeted to its lowest ebb in more than 10 years. Turkeys also experienced poor reproductive success, although a number of adult birds were seen this year. They did state that bird populations normally rebound rapidly, sometimes in one-year periods.

A short winter season for mourning dove hunters in Coke County began Jan. 5 and will run through Jan. 14 with a 12 per day bag limit. Hunting hours for the migratory birds are one-half hour before sunrise to sunset. Doves have also been in short supply due to last summer's scarcity of food
