ASCS will allow grazing; harvesting

To accommodate farmers whose hay production and pasture development have been severely hampered by adverse weather conditions, USDA's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service recently gave farm program participants special permission to graze their livestock and harvest hay or forage on cropland taken out of production by the 1985 acreage reduction and land diversion programs.

ASCS official J.E. Quisenberry, Jr. said the special acreage conservation reserve

(ACR) haying and grazing could benefit about 40 farmers in the county.

ACR acres include unpaid acreage reduction acres and diverted acreage for which payment is made. Without special authorization, the grazing period on these acres would have been closed between June 1 and Oct. 31, 1985.

In addition to grazing livestock on their own ACR cropland, Quisenberry said program participants are authorized to let another farmer use their ACT acres. "No

charge may be made of this privilege, however, other than to recover any reasonable harvesting cost."

The ASCS official said any acreage designated as a wildlife food plot of habitat may not be hayed or grazed, and any haying or grazing of ACR acres shall not remove the cover to the extent that the acreage is unprotected from wind and water erosion.

Farmers interested in ACR haying and grazing must notify the ASCS office of their intentions.

Candidates for upcoming local elections reviewed for voters

Absentee balloting in the upcoming city, school, and hospital district elections has been going on since March 18, and continues through April 2, just prior to the elections scheduled for April 6, 1985.

A review of the candidates for these offices is as follows:

In the Robert Lee Independent School District Board of Trustees election, the terms of incumbents Mary Herring, Donnie Robertson, and Gaylon Pitcock are up, and each of these incumbents have filed for re-election. Thomas Lee has also filed in the school board election, rounding out the ballot in the race.

In the Bronte School Board election, the terms of Andra Arrott, Larry Spivey, Wayne Arrott, and Ronnie Sims expire this year, and all have filed for re-election, along with the following other candidates: Lisa Dunn Glenn, Michael Owens, Jerry Truman Parker, and Mrs. Pat Moore. Holdovers in the Bronte School Board election are Pat Martindale, Lynn Phillips, and Jim Morrow.

Regarding the Bronte City Council Election, the terms of Dorris Saunders and Corky Collins expire this year, and both have filed for re-election. Holdovers on the

Bronte City Council include Mayor J.T. Henry, Harold Dunn, W.J. Neighbors and Ed Hart.

In Robert Lee, those with terms expiring are Jody Rodriguez, F.W. (Pete) Prentice, and J.A. Dunklin. All have filed for re-election, along with Bascom Chesney, who has also filed in this race. The remaining members of the city government in Robert Lee are Mayor Robert D. Vaughan, Alice Beaty, and Wilson Bryan, Councilmembers.

In both the east and west side Hospital District elec-

tions, those with terms expiring are running for re-election, with no additional candidates on the ballot this year. On the west side, Dale Wojtek and Richard Johnson are running for re-election, and in the east side hospital election, the terms of Stover Taylor and Mary Glenn expire this year, and both have filed for re-election. Hold-over board members include LeDrew Arrott, Noel Percifull, and Eddie Alexander.

Mark your calendar, and don't forget to vote in the upcoming elections.

Dear Editor:

Re: West Coke County Board of Directors

Tonight's board meeting represents a sad disappointment to the advances and cohesive team effort forged on behalf of all the residents of Coke County.

The patients come first! As Chief of Staff for the West Coke County Hospital District, I can neither settle for less once a constructive force has been set into play nor put the patients in jeopardy by reneging on my promise to fulfill my contract with the Board in toto.

I was absolutely appalled that a Board member who had been absent from three consecutive meetings of that body could move to negate what the remainder of the Board had voted to approve throughout those meetings. Dallas architect Michael Arrington, selected by the Board to put together a proposal for general medical facility expansion, had given freely more than 42 hours of his professional time, not to mention secretarial costs, transportation fees, ancillary design-related expenses and out-of-pocket expenditures exceeding \$3150. In addition, Mr. Arrington made the community a gift of ready blueprints worth

\$90,000 for a 3000 square foot medical office, and escorted the Director of Nurses, the Administrator and myself to numerous planned developments he had designed where the key concept was plan.

His proposal tonight was just that... a proposal to plan for the here and now while allowing for future expansion. A Board member's motion to contact from three to five additional architectural firms for similar proposals magnifies the eventual cost that many times over, places us three to five times further behind schedule, and gives other architectural contenders access to the fruits of the laborious efforts Mr. Arrington freely expended on behalf of county taxpayers.

The Board essentially moved to disregard all the preparation done heretofore and begin again.

Once again, the Board was willing to "finish out a downtown office" as a temporary relief for overcrowding, which amplifies the scab-on philosophy of a group looking only at the bugs on the windshield and overlooking the road ahead. Mr. Arrington, of Design Matrix, offered us a clear view of that road.

Health care has come quantum leaps since my arrival here scarcely eight

months ago. Not only do we have a fully competent Director of Nurses, we have a laudable nursing staff and an accredited and well equipped surgery complete with a Board-eligible surgeon, Dr. Hamamcy.

We also have a magnificent complement of ancillary services that I fought tooth and nail to achieve, So That Our Own People Can Know The Best In Medical Care Without The Flight Out Of Town... A Respiratory/Cardiac Department Second To None, A Physical Therapy Department Equalling That Of Some Major Centers... And Qualified Lab/X-Ray Personnel.

And yet, as any of you can attest, I have struggled through the confines of two scant rooms to see upward of 50 patients in a single day (cost for these patients to commute would be approximately \$15,000 per month I'm saving the town by being accessible). I have been patient along with my patients, on your promise that when the time came we would build suitable facilities. Folks, the time is past due.

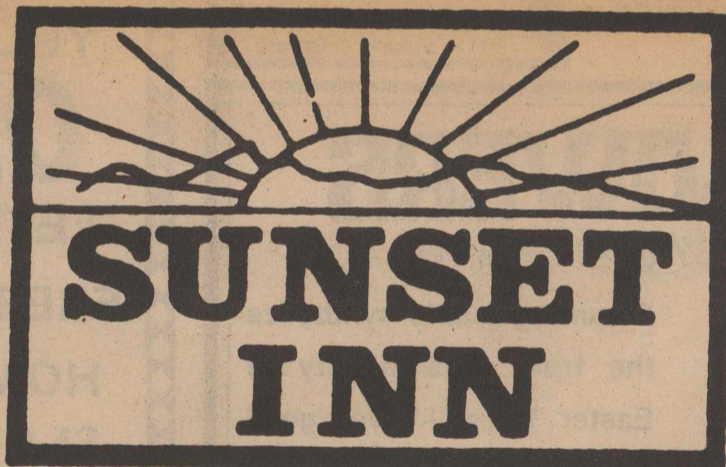

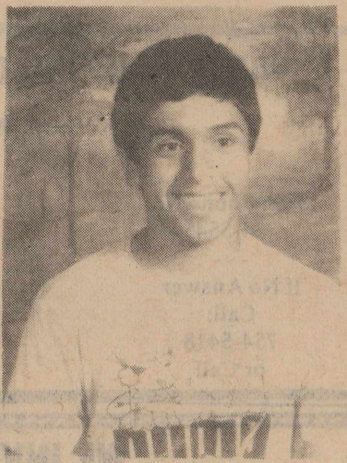
