

Heating Infant Formula In Microwave Ovens -- Infant formula can be safely heated in a microwave oven if certain precautions are followed, says Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service nutritionist, Dr. Alice Hunt. First, heat the milk only to barely warm, not boiling. Remember the container may remain cool, while the milk is too hot. Microwave the bottle of milk without the top at a medium setting until warm, which is about one minute per six ounces from refrigerator temperature. Attach the nipple and cap and shake the bottle to redistribute the heat. "Most importantly, let the bottle stand a few minutes before testing the temperature, and always sprinkle several drops on your inner wrist before giving the bottle to the baby," she cautions.



This week is National Consumers Week. We can all become better consumers and save money by learning good shopping skills. Too many of us purchase on impulse, and later regret those purchases. Here are some tips to help you make wise purchases.

Save money as you shop for food by using these trips:

* Compare eggs prices. If there's less than a 7-cent price difference between one size and the next smaller size in the same grade, you will get more for your money by buying the larger size.

* A half gallon of milk usually costs less than two quarts. The larger size is only a bargain if you use it before its expiration date.

* Choose meat by the cost per serving rather than cost per pound. Money paid for bone, skin and fat is wasted.

* Buy a whole chicken and cut it yourself rather than buying chicken parts.

* Refrigerated, cured hams are usually less expensive than canned hams.

To get the most for your money, you should be able to recognize quality clothing when you see it. Good quality means good fabrics, notions and construction.

One way to learn about quality clothes is to examine

expensive garments in a top-notch store before you sift through a mixture of items at a sale or discount store. Here are some tip-offs that tell you an item is of good quality:

* Good fabrics, especially natural fibers, including wool and cotton used either alone or in blends. Read the label for fabric content.

* Linings in skirts and pants.

* Precise match of plaids, checks or patterns at the seams.

* Even stitching in a matching color, with flat seams and no hanging threads.

* Well-made buttonholes and buttons of quality material, such as wood or bone, rather than plastic.

* Finished inside seams and ample hems.

Consumers are buying appliances that have many electronic features without considering future maintenance and service costs. Electronic circuit boards are more sensitive to power surges and fluctuations which may result in damage. So in addition to the extra cost of these features which can be as much as \$100, the cost of repairs and maintenance over the life of the appliance may be expensive.

In 1984 - the Postal Service handled 68.43 billion pieces of 1st class mail; 9.52 billion pieces of 2nd class mail; 48.25 billion pieces of 3rd class mail and 599 billion pieces of 4th class mail.

The difference in 3rd class and 4th class is that 3rd class mail includes small parcels that weigh up to one pound. If it weighs more than a pound-it is 4th class or parcel

Home energy audits offered

Home energy audits described as "simple, free and easy" are being offered to customers of West Texas Utilities Company.

The program is called QUEST---short for Quick Energy Savings Test--- and is designed to show just how energy efficient a home really is.

"QUEST is a vehicle through which our customers can find out how they can control their energy use," said Paul Sublett and Bob Boone, local WTU managers. "Most people could conserve more energy in their homes if they knew what to do."

QUEST actually is a quick energy analysis of a home. All a customer has to do is to obtain a questionnaire from the local WTU office, fill in the blanks, and send it back to WTU by postage freereply mail.

The questionnaires are received by WTU's Customer Technical Services Department in Abilene for evaluation. With the customer's prior to 13-month electric billing, accurate analysis of the home energy efficiency can be made. A less accurate analysis can be done without the 13-month billing.

-- Graphs indicating annual utility costs for an energy efficient home and for an average home.

-- Estimated potential dollar savings and ranges of cost for energy conservation measures which may be appropriate for the home based on information the customer supplied through the questionnaire.

It doesn't take long to fill out the questionnaire, but for proper results the customer should be as accurate as possible. Mrs. Johnson said.

QUEST is available to all WTU customers, but it does not supplant the more detailed Residential Conservation Service (RCS) audit that has been offered by all electric utilities for the past several years. The RCS audit is still available for a \$15 charge.

Farm Bureau update

Coke County Farm Bureau was organized in July of 1945 by Marvin Carter, Organizational Director of Texas Farm Bureau Federation of Waco, Texas. There were six directors, C.E. Arrott, president; Bryan Gartman, vice president; Mrs. C.E. Arrott, secretary; and David O. King, S.G. Danford, and V.V. Wojtek as directors.

The membership was around 50 members with \$6.00 as the dues, with the purpose to promote agriculture education, to help the farmers and ranchers analyze their problems and bond together to solve them. There was and is many services made possible through group association. The life insurance, car and home insurance, health insurance, accidental death insurance, and property protection program.

Sterling County was added to Coke County in 1974, making it Coke-Sterling Farm Bureau.

We have a membership of 837 families as of Nov. 1, 1984, with the dues at \$25.00 a family. The present directors are Billy D. Johnston, Water Valley, president; Robert Melvin Brown, Bronte, vice president; Robert Gallaway, Bronte, secretary of board; and Charlie Boecking, Bronte; R.I. Brown, Tennyson; Roger Graves,

Tennyson; Alonzo Robbins, Bronte; W.E. Hartman, Tennyson; Finis Harmon, Robert Lee; Tom Price, Robert Lee; Bobby Roberts, Robert Lee; Allen Bloodworth, Silver; John Stephens, Robert Lee, board members.

There are two agents, George Demere, Water Valley, and George Brickey, Robert Lee. With one full time office secretary, Teresa Millican of Robert Lee, and two part time secretaries, Mrs. C.E. Arrott of Bronte, and Gaylene Van Dolah of Robert Lee.

Farm Bureau is an independent organization of farm and ranch families who use the organization to help analyze their problems and to formulate actions to solve those problems. The Farm Bureau is totally controlled by its members through majority decision and is financed by voluntary dues.

Farm Bureau's structure guarantees membership control. Members originate policies, and through their delegates, control state and national policies and election of officers and directors.

Policies that guide the organization originate at the grassroots level with each member given an opportunity to participate. They are adopted after discussion and exchange of ideas at county, state and national conventions.

Don't touch that dial

The telephone has been ringing off the wall. You decide to take the telephone off the hook, so you won't be disturbed. You could cause telephone service problems without knowing it, or interrupt your own telephone service.

When you lift the receiver from its base, telephone equipment in GTE's central office provides a dial tone. If you take your receiver off the hook and do not complete a call, the telephone equipment is tied up for as long as the receiver is off the hook.

"Telephone switching equipment is designed to handle average calling levels," said E.O. Cambern, General Manager for General Telephone's West Texas Division. "This means that all customers cannot have a dial tone at the same time. So when you take your phone off the hook, you may be preventing someone else from getting a dial tone."

Some electronic switching

equipment in GTE's central offices is designed to put an off-the-hook telephone out of service. This is to prevent tying up dial tone equipment.

Cambern added, "If your telephone has been left off the hook, you should replace it immediately. Then, lift the receiver to see if there is a dial tone. If dial tone has not been restored in a reasonable time period, you should contact Repair to reinstate service."



TIME TO CHECK FOR CASEBEARERS

Pecan growers need to be on the look-out for pecan nut casebearers, those perennial pests that can destroy a pecan crop if not controlled.

Based on various prediction models and trappings, casebearers should be showing up in Coke County on about May 27.

Normally, casebearers damage nuts within a two week period.

To time spray applications for effective control, first check for eggs on a daily basis. Eggs are usually found on the tips of nutlets and are about the size of a ball in a ball point pen. These are white when first laid, then turn red over a three to five day period before turning white again after hatching.

Apply an insecticide the third day after the first eggs hatch to kill the larvae before they enter the nutlets. Since the larvae will hatch over a week-long period or more, a second application may be necessary.

Insecticides recommended for casebearer control include Diazinon, Pydrin, Malathion, and Zolone. It is also recommended to add zinc to any spray application to control rozette of pecans which stunts growth and reduces production.
