Sara, three-year-old daughter of Mr. & Mrs. Warren Tomlinson of San Angelo suffers from a liver defect present from birth and is in desperate need of a liver transplant. Until her health became a critical issue in the last 3 months, the family has basically battled their economic situation alone since her birth but transplant costs are overwhelming. A number of benefits have been staged to attain at least a portion of the estimated \$150,000 total.

Sara's father, Warren Tomlinson, was raised in Bronte and aunts Geneva Simpson and Bobbie Arrott reside there.

Sheriff's Report

Coke County Sheriff Marshall Millican reported the Fourth of July weekend as rather quiet, with no deaths due to accidents as were prevalent in other Texas areas. The only motor vehicle accident occurred 13½ miles Northwest of Robert Lee on Highway 208 near Panther Gap. A welding truck driven by R.D. Smith of Robert Lee overturned and caught fire. The blaze was extinguished by the Robert Lee Volunteer Fire Dept. Smith escaped with minor injuries.

One arrest was made at Lake Spence during the holiday when an armed terrorist threat was made to individuals.

Millican also reported two

burglaries of homes in Robert Lee on the night of July 2. Mr. and Mrs. Chism Brown returned home Tuesday night around 9:30 p.m. and found 2 televisions and a microwave oven had been taken during their absence. A rear bedroom window was the apparent entry site in the south Robert Lee home.

A house owned by Mr. and Mrs. Lendy Devoll was entered, probably the same night Millican said, the front door kicked open and a skill saw and phone equipment was stolen.

Millican stated that his office has no leads or tangible evidence at this time but the investigation continues.

NOTICE OF INTENT TO IMPLEMENT RATES

General Telephone Company of the Southwest in accordance with the Public Utility Regulatory Act and the Rules of the Public Utility Commission of Texas gives notice of its intent to implement new exchange access rates for the provision of shared tenant and tenant resale services.

These proposed rates are applicable to customers of General Telephone Company of the Southwest, excluding hotel/motel customers, who provide local exchange telephone service of General Telephone Company of the Southwest to their tenants or patrons on a resale or shared use basis. This resale or sharing arrangement is normally provided utilizing a customer-provided PABX or other similar stored control switch capable of common control processing or other features commonly associated with a PABX "Smart" switch.

These proposed rates are designed to recover costs on a usage basis for local exchange telephone service access and are identical to General Telephone's "Optional Measured Service" rates. The monthly access rate will be \$28.95 per trunk line and the usage rates are as follows:

As this is a new service offering, we are unable to determine the number of customers who may be affected. Currently, there are no known prospective customers. Until any customer utilizes this new offering, there will be no effect on the revenues of the telephone company, and in any event, the telephone company does not expect revenues to be affected by more than 2 1/2 percent. These proposed rates, where applicable, will provide tariffed local exchange access to customers who then will provide shared or resale services to tenants.

These proposed rates have been suspended by the Public Utility Commission of Texas and will become effective as proposed or modified by order of the Commission on a date to be determined by the commission.

The proposed rate schedule is on file with the Commission for public inspection and is also available at any business office of General Telephone Company of the Southwest.

Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the commission as soon as possible. 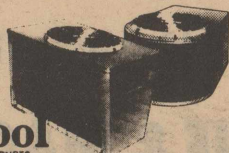

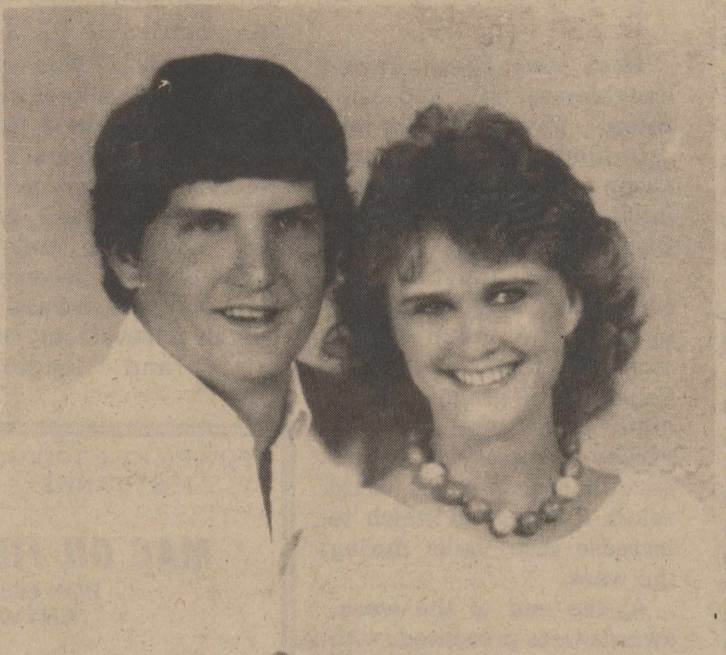

Maxwell retires from teaching

For almost half a century Dr. Everett B. "Doc" Maxwell dedicated his life to teaching band students the feat of marching and playing an instrument at the same time.

After 47 years of struggling to convert aspiring band students into polished musicians, Maxwell has retired from the teaching profession.

"There was never a dull moment, and every day there was something to look forward to," he said.

Maxwell was born in Garrett, the son of a Church of Christ minister.

In 1933, he graduated from Abilene Christian University with a bachelor of science degree in science. The financial burden of paying for a college education during the Depression left Maxwell virtually penniless, so he immediately sought employment wherever he could.

He accepted a job in Bronte and taught band during the lunch hour.

"I met with the students every day in the auditorium and they gave up their lunch to learn," he recalled. "The other students ate outside and played at recess, but dedication kept the band members inside."

In 1936, he married Virginia Adams in Cordell, Okla. Following their marriage, the couple moved to Denver City where he began the school's first band program. During what spare time he had, Maxwell com-

pleted his studies and received a master's degree in education from Texas Tech in 1942.

He taught in Andrews for 12 years, and there he acquired nationwide attention for his composition of marches for the field and concert.

In 1959, they moved to Lubbock, where Maxwell directed music at Lubbock Christian College for one year. He then taught in Abernathy for nine years, winning sweepstakes awards (earning first-division ratings in marching, concert and sightreading) and receiving consecutive first place awards in the Panhandle South Plains Fair parade.

In 1969, he returned to LCC, and completed further studies until he received his doctorate in education from Texas Tech in 1970. Maxwell taught for six years and decided to retire. But his resignation only lasted through summer, when he discovered Lubbock Christian High School needed a part-time Science teacher.

This past spring, Maxwell decided that he must finally and permanently retire. At his final band concert, he was awarded with a plaque commending his years of dedication to students.

The Maxwells plan to stay in Lubbock. His wife said her husband only retired from the classroom, and would continue to work on his rent houses in the city and improve his golfswing.

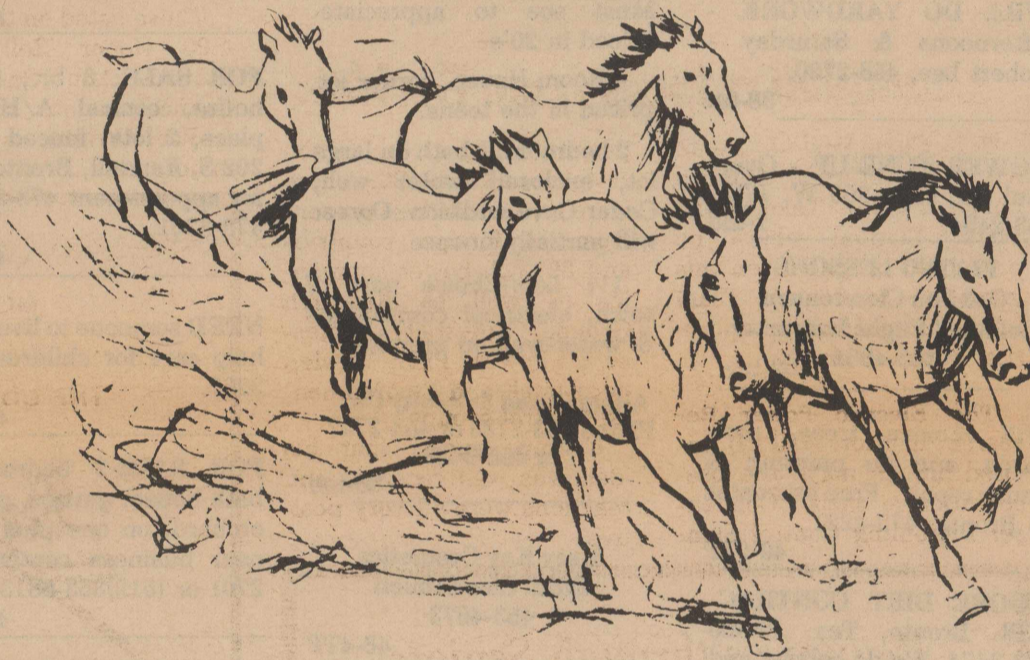
