THESE TWO EXCELLENT ten-point bucks were taken last weekend off a south Coke County ranch. Both were rattled up with horns, more evidence that the rut has started in the county deer population. Todd and Michael Lee [pictured left to right], killed the buck on the left, which sported a very uniform, tall-tined rack, and a 20% spread. Their dad, Tom Lee, rattled up the older buck on the right, caught him running with a doe, and took this buck the afternoon before the boys shot the higher horned deer. The deer on the right had a wider rack, 21 inch spread, with shorter tines, and an unusual dropped tine on each side. [We should have a more detailed picture of the two bucks by next week's issue].

Turkey Shoot winners announced

Saturday, Nov. 16, Red Canyon Gun Club held its first annual turkey shoot at the rifle range in Robert Lee. Shooters shot for prizes of turkeys, shooting equipment and free meals at the Cracker Barrel Restaurant.

Shooters shot both 22 rim-fire rifles and high power rifles at steel chickens at a distance of 200 meters. Seventeen relays were shot for the prizes with no less than 8 shooters in a relay and most

of the time relays were full with 10 shooters. Excellent scores were shot in the 22 rimfire competition, with each relay hotly contested. Three shooters tied for top score in the 3-shot 22 event.

Richard Johnson, Bear Brasuel, and Add Davis shot a blazing 29 out of 30 possible score. J.P. Skipworth shot a 28, Jim Herford a score of 27, Kenneth Green shot a pair of 27's, Mel Kennedy of San Angelo shot

a 27. The competition was very close in all events with a score of 24 being the least winning score. There were 4 different relays that had tie scores and had to be settled by the most hits in the center 10 ring, and guess who lost 3 matches on the ring tie breaker? Yes, Darren Williams, but old Darren put it all together in the final relay and beat Richard Johnson by 1 point, 28 to Johnson's 27, to win the steak dinner for 2 at the Cracker Barrel Restaurant, compliments of Butch Davis, who by the way won a relay and claimed a ammo prize. Bear Brasuel proved he still had the stuff in the off-hand steel chicken shoot with the winning score of 2 hits out of 3. Good shooting, Bear.

Then there was the shoot-off between the Chevy house boys and the Ford boys. The Ford boys were led by "Dead-Eye" Sandy Norrid and Tony "The Eye" Smith. The Chevy boys were well represented by old Add "Trigger" Davis and Randy "Mt. Man" Bessent, but a strange thing happened.

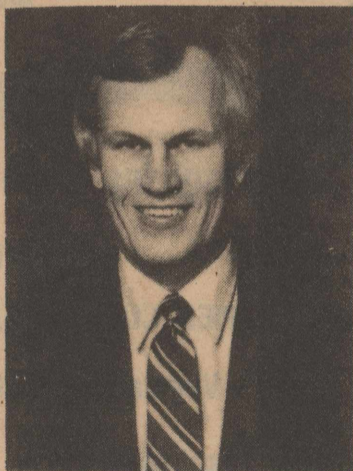
Stenholm visit slated

Now is the time to order seedlings for planting windbreaks next spring. Seedlings can be ordered from the Texas Forest Service Nursery at Lubbock.

Fourteen conifers and hardwoods are available from the nursery. Afghanistan pine, Arizona cypress, and red cedar are the most popular conifers. Russian olive is the hardwood in the greatest demand. 43,000 seedlings have already been sold. If you plan to plant next spring, do not delay sending your order in.

Order blanks are available at the SCS office in Robert Lee. Sample seedlings of Afghanistan pine, Arizona cypress, Austrian pine, red cedar are available for viewing at the SCS office.

- Discussed state property tax board proposed procedural rule changes.



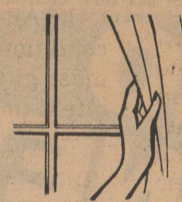
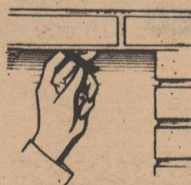
SET THERMOSTAT AT 68°

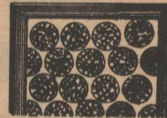

Making sure your holiday packages will be delivered

Robert Lee Postmaster Coe Lewis has half a dozen "dos" and "don'ts" for customers who want to be sure their holiday parcels get delivered.

*** Don't box yourself in -- use the right container.** Boxes must be adequate in size for the items being mailed and provide enough space for cushioning material. They must also be strong enough to hold the weight of their contents. If the box has adequate space for an address (cross out confusing information), it is not necessary to wrap it in paper. If you use paper, however, be sure it is equivalent to the kind used in grocery bags (60-pound weight). Fiberboard tubes and similar long packages are acceptable if their length does not exceed 10 times their girth.

*** Give yourself some cushion.** Cushioning absorbs and distributes shock and vibration. Examples of good cushioning materials are foamed plastics, corrugated cardboard and loose fill material such as polystyrene, popcorn or shredded newspaper. Loose fill material should completely cover the items being mailed.

*** Close parcels up right.** Use tape, not string or rope, to close packages. Cellophane and masking tape should not be used. Pressure sensitive, filament-reinforced tape is recommended and should be wrapped around the parcel at least twice.

*** Addresses are important.** You can spend a fortune on wrapping, but your package will never reach its destination if it is not addressed right. Print or type the address clearly on one

side of the parcel only. It is also a good idea to put the name and address inside the package in case the address label comes off.

*** Don't mail your pet elephant.** Packages must not exceed 70 pounds. They must also be a least 3½ inches wide and 5 inches long, and total length and girth cannot exceed 108 inches.

*** Don't overinsure.** If your parcel is valuable, you might want to insure it, but insure it only for its actual value. The Postal Service pays claims based on the actual value of lost or damaged items and not a higher insured amount.

"If you follow these six suggestions, it'll help us get your package where it's going on time, in good shape," Postmaster Lewis said.

Bronte, Robert Lee sales increase

Bob Bullock, Texas State Comptroller, recently sent \$115.2 million in checks to 1,010 cities who levy the one-percent city sales tax. Of this amount, Houston got a whopping \$17.7 million in revenue, a 4 percent raise from last year. The tax payments covered the 3rd quarter of the tax period for 1985.

In Coke County, Robert Lee was the recipient of \$9,557.36 and the city of Bronte received \$3,536.04. Both totals represented about a 10% increase from the same period in 1984.

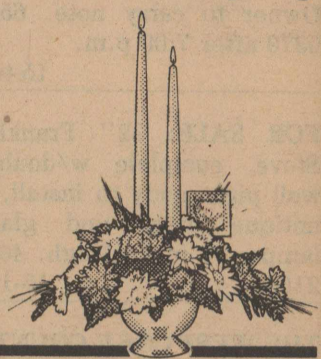

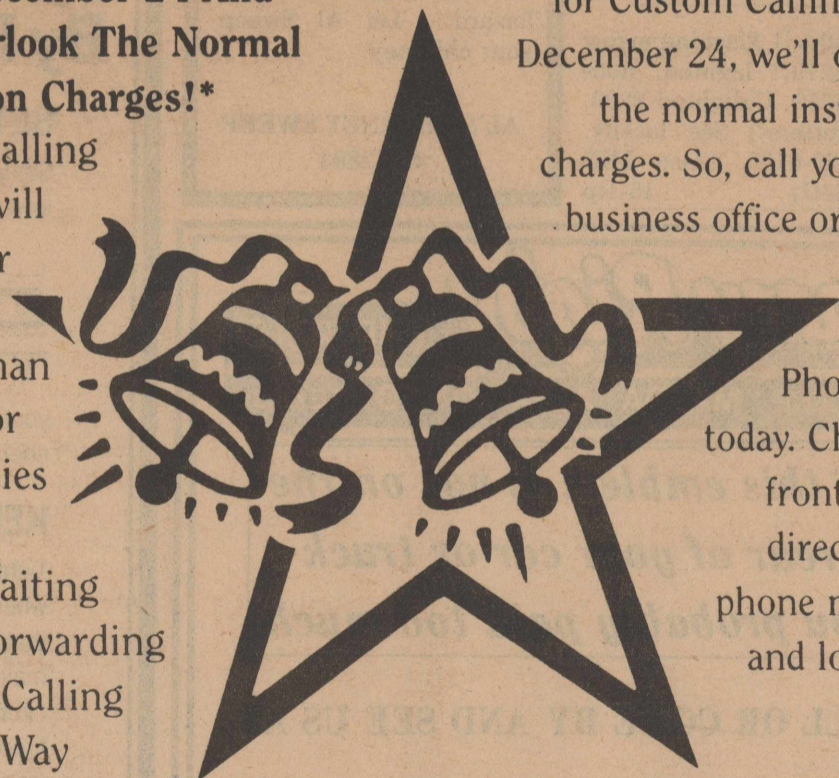
