

County Stock Show sets record

The 1986 edition of the Coke County Stock Show made its mark in the record book this past week-end, as a number of records fell prey to a bunch of hungry exhibitors, and a stock show committee who wouldn't let a ''soft'' economy affect their youngsters, or their livestock projects.

According to officials, the quality of the livestock exhibited excelled every year any can remember, and the premium sale awarded the young exhibitors to the tune of \$16,640, over \$2,000 more than was netted at last year's county show.

Pammy Millican duplicated his award-winning performance of last year, as his Champion Finewool Lamb was named Grand Champion of Show. Pammy also received the Ralph Walker Memorial Top Hand award for the second year in a row. Waylon Ensor exhibited his Medium Wool Champion lamb to Reserve Grand honors in the sheep show.

In the Finewool Lamb division, Pammy Millican exhibited the Champion, with Robert Runnion showing the Reserve Champion.

Champion Cross-bred lamb was exhibited by Michael Lee, with Kerry Lee winning Reserve Champion honors.





SODIUM AND SALT -- A sodium intake of 1,100 to 3,300 milligrams daily is considered safe and adequate for a healthy adult, says Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service nutritionist Mary K. Sweeten. One teaspoon of salt contains 1,938 milligrams of sodium or almost two-thirds of this daily amount.

You can carefully avoid the salt shaker and still be getting significant amounts of sodium from the sauces you use to flavor food. For example, soy sauce contains about 1,029 milligrams of sodium per tablespoon. One tablespoon of Teriyaki sauce contains 690 milligrams, chili sauce 227, Worchestershire sauce 206 and barbecue cause 130 milligrams. Those people on a physicianprescribed low-sodium diet of 1,000 to 2,000 milligrams per day, should carefully select from sauces and other condiments to avoid exceeding their sodiu: 1 allotment, she says.

Major farm provisions told

Secretary of Agriculture John R. Block recently announced major provisions of the 1986 farm programs in Washington, D.C.

Acreage reduction programs will be in effect for wheat, corn, oats, barley, grain sorghum, and upland cotton, according to J.E. Quisenberry, Jr., County Executive Director, of the Coke County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. "The programs are designed to curtail the burdensome supplies of these commodities," Quisenberry said.

Program requirements call for a 25 percent reduction of wheat and upland cotton acres, and 20 percent for feed grains. Included in the announced wheat and feed grain acreage reduction programs is a 2.5 percent paidin-kind land diversion provision, according to Quisenberry.

"To be eligible for loans and target price protection, farmers must sign up and comply with program requirements." He said program sign-up is expected to begin in March.

The target price for 1986 wheat will be \$4.38 per bushel, the same as last year. Feed Grain program participants will be eligible for target prices of \$3.03 per bushel for corn, \$2.88 for sorghum, \$2.60 for barley and \$1.60 per bushel for oats. Loan rates per bushel are: wheat, \$2.40; corn, \$1.92; sorghum, \$1.82; barley, \$1.56; and oats, \$.99. Upland cotton loan rates will be announced later, Quisenberry said

Under the 1986 programs, participating producers who plant at least 50 percent of their permitted acreage to a program crop and plant the remaining permitted acreage to a non-program crop, other than soybeans or extra long staple cotton, or devotes such area to conservation uses will be eligible to receive deficiency payments on 92 percent of the permitted acreage. "Winter wheat producers whose harvested acres do not exceed 65 percent of their farm's wheat base may be eligible for diversion payments on an acreage equal to an additional 10 percent of their wheat base," the ASCS official said. As with the previous acreage reduction programs, for 1986 haying and grazing on acreage conservation reserve land will be permitted at the request of individual State ASC committees. However, haying and grazing is prohibited during the five principal growing months, June 1 thru October 31. Further acreage reduction program details will be available from the local ASCS office as they become known.





Conservation program told

To conserve eroding cropland, and help adjust the production of surplus agricultural commodities, the Secretary of Agriculture has announced a new Conservation Reserve Program. The program is designed to convert highly erodible cropland to permanent vegetative cover for 10 years, according to J.E. Quisenberry, Jr., County executive Director of the Coke-Sterling County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

Cropland classified as highly erodible is defined as land in capability classes II-V, eroding at higher than twice the soil loss tolerance, or land in capability classes VI-VIII. For retiring such land from crop production, Quisenberry said farmers will receive annual rental payments, based on a bid of up to \$50,000. per year in cash or commodities; and one-half the expenses of establishing the permanent vegetative cover on the land. "Rental payments will be made annually as soon as possible after Oct. 1 of each calendar year," said Quisenberry. "Cost-sharing payments will be made as soon as possible after individual participants report the approved conservation treatment is completed."

He said farmers who decide to return land to production during the 10-year contract period must repay the government, with interest, all of its costs for annual rental and for establishing cover. In the event of national need, however, the Secretary of Agriculture may declare that any farmer who wants to return the land for production may do so without penalty.

"USDA will retire only the most highly erodible land under the Conservation Reserve Program," Quisenberry said.

Farmers who are interested in the program should contact the Coke County ASCS office.

Mrs. Lexie Lewis







Tax preparation tips

Although the volume of individual tax returns completed by paid preparers increases from year to year, the taxpayer remains legally responsible for the accuracy of the return.

This is why the IRS advises taxpayers to exercise the same degree of consideration that one would in choosing a doctor, lawyer, or any professional person.

The IRS offers these tips on what to expect in dealing with a preparer:

* Taxpayers should not sign a blank return, nor one which is partially completed, nor one prepared in pencil.

* Preparers should sign

the return and give his or her identification number, as required by law.

* Taxpayer must be given a copy of the completed return.

* Preparers who promise a refund, claim a special relationship with the IRS, or boast of ways to beat the tax system should be avoided.

* Preparers are required to keep copies of returns or a list of taxpayers' names and identification numbers for three years.

* Paid preparers (other than bank preparers) cannot endorse, cash, or negotiate a client's refund check.

AIDS difficult to transmit

Americans should be more afraid of their own intolerance and lack of knowledge about AIDS than about catching the disease, according to physicians at Baylor College of Medicine.

"Panic and extreme reactions about AIDS are unwarranted," three Baylor physicians knowledgeable about the disease reported in "Baylor Medicine", a monthly publication of the College. "Our biggest cause for fear is the fear and intolerance that feed on the absence of knowledge."

AIDS, or acquired immune deficiency syndrome, is a disease that impairs or destroys the body's ability to fight infection. It is caused by a new human virus discovered by American and French scientists. The virus is called human T-cell lymphotrophic virus, type III (HTLV-III) or lymphadenopathy associated virus.

Studies suggest the virus cause infections in central Africa as early as the mid-1970s. The disease was first diagnosed in 1981 among male homosexuals in New York City and Los Angeles.

Since then AIDS has caused almost 7,500 deaths and the number of cases and deaths has doubled each year.

AIDS is spread through intimate sexual contact in which blood or semen is exchanged, through infected hypodermic needles, blood or blood products, and from an infected mother to her newborn. Aomosexual or bisexual men and intravenous drug users have the greatest chance of developing AIDS.

However, AIDS is not contagious in the same way as the common cold or chicken pox, according to William T. Shearer, M.D., Ph.D., a Baylor expert on the immune system.

"The AIDS virus dies easily outside the body and is difficult to transmit," Shearer said.

Another Baylor immunologist, Roger D. Rossen, M.D., pointed out that more than 80 percent of the people infected by the AIDS virus since 1981 have not developed the disease.

The Baylor researchers outlined what is known about AIDS so far, such as evidence that:

--AIDS is not spreading rapidly to the heterosexual community. Cases involving heterosexuals can usually be traced to one of the high-risk groups.

--AIDS is not spread through food, shaking hands, hugging, kissing or other forms of casual contact.

The researchers admit that the evidence on how AIDS is spread may change.

"We all run the risk of being wrong," said Vernon Knight, M.D., chairman of microbiology and immunology at Baylor. "But people who extend their reasoning to the point of absurdity will exhaust themselves emotionally and financially."

KEEP ATTIC VENTS OPEN THIS WINTER - During the winter, moisture produced inside the house tends to migrate to the outside. Part of this moisture passes through the roof into the attic area. Once this moisture has condensed in the attic, it will settle in the insulation, reducing its effectiveness and adding to your energy bills, she cautions.
