### Restoration project set for Bronte

Bronte Sesquicentennial committee members and representatives of the business community met in joint session last week to discuss plans for repainting and repairing business buildings along Hwys. 277 and 158 in downtown Bronte. The first businesses to comply with the renovation plans were Cumbie & Arrott Merchandise and owners of buildings housing Margarets Flowers and City Barber Shop.

Downtown restoration work is the most important project set forth at the beginning of the planning year by the Sesquicentennial committee. The refurbishment is occurring to coincide with the Olympic Torch Run through Bronte on June 29.

Some of the objectives the group hopes to accomplish are the repainting of building fronts with coordinating color tones, repairing of awnings and overhangs, general clean-up and repair work and repair of sidewalks. Other items under consideration are business signs of uniform design and lettering.

This work is being financed by funds raised through moneymaking projects (past and future) as well as volunteer help and donations. The committee is stressing that the utmost participation and cooperation is necessary for the satisfactory completion of the project.

The progressive committee members further an-

nounced plans for the Olympic Torch Run through the city on June 29. The torch will arrive at 12:15 noon on Sunday. The route will proceed from the Bronte Nursing Home in a northerly direction on Hwy. 277. There will be a short ceremony on the bank parking lot and the torch will depart toward Abilene.

The Sesqui committee is also requesting each business to provide a holder and fly a flag during the torch run as well as other appropriate occasions.

Delbert Lee Vestal, 84, of Ballinger, life-time resident of Coke and Runnels Counties, died at 6:45 p.m. Tuesday, June 3, east of Ballinger.

Funeral services were held at 2:00 p.m. Thursday, June 5, in Rains-Seale Funeral Home Chapel in Ballinger with burial in Robert Lee Cemetery.

Mr. Vestal was born Feb. 14, 1902 in Robert Lee to Catherine and J.J. Vestal, long-time blacksmith in Coke County.

He was active in the Methodist Church all his adult life until his health began to fail several years ago. He was on the school board for a number of years before his move to Ballinger in 1945.

He was married to Martha Iva Parker April 14, 1925. She preceded him in death December 30, 1981.

On June 1, 1982, he married Lois Dixon of Bronte, who survives him.

## Hospital Board meeting

The regular monthly West Coke County Board of Directors meeting was held June 16, 1986 at the hospital. The meeting was called to order at 6:00 p.m. The minutes of previous meetings were approved. The monthly financial reports, management reports and list of bills to be paid were received and approved. West Coke County Hospital District administrator, Stephen Goode reported on the results of physician recruitment efforts and the possible availability of two physicians for Robert Lee. Wayne Ulrich also reported on the possible availability of a third physician candidate. Recruitment efforts will continue until physicians are moved to Robert Lee.

Administrator reported on cost of obtaining Workman's Compensation insurance.

Administrator presented to the board a comparison of wages at West Coke County Hospital District to wages of similar hospitals in Texas.

Staffing levels were discussed and the board instructed the Administrator to trim the hours of employees

wherever possible. It was pointed out that the recruitment of a physician should generate business and permit employees to return to full schedules.

The resignation of Jean Rozzle, director of nursing for the nursing home, was accepted.

The board approved a proposal from Accounts Management Corporation to serve as collection agency for West Coke County Hospital District; the agreement will be executed by the administrator.

Administrator reported confirmation that the maximum hospital district tax rate is \$0.25 per \$100 valuation. There cannot be a tax increase because the hospital district tax rate is already at the maximum. The board approved of expanding the hours of the clinic to 9 a.m. - 9 p.m. seven days per week.

Board approved administrator's recommendation that "unofficial summary" of board minutes to be released to local press.

Meeting adjourned about 11:00 p.m.

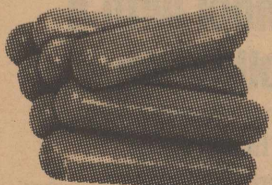

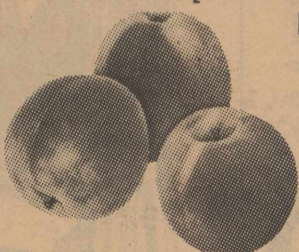

**MOBILE HOME SUMMER SURVIVAL** - According to Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service housing specialist Dr. Susan Quiring, mobile home owners can make minor improvements that will increase comfort and help maintain reasonable energy costs. If your mobile home doesn't have large trees shading it, she suggests adding arbors and trellises to support vining plants that will provide shade. Low-cost, easy-to-built trellises are especially effective on east and west facing walls where the summer sun is intense. When the roof can't be shaded, coat it with a light-colored or aluminized treatment so that most of the sunlight will be reflected, says Quiring. To protect windows from direct exposure to the sun, the housing specialist suggests awnings, light-colored or reflective draperies or draperies or reflective film.

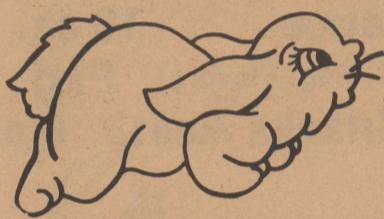

## Composting lawn clippings

Recent rains should make lawn grasses grow, and that means more mowing and a lot of grass clippings to be dealt with.

Instead of throwing away those clippings, put them to good use in a compost pile. Excess leaves twigs and garden litter can also be used.

Compost is a good source of organic matter for gardens and flower beds. Furthermore, composting is an excellent way to get rid of garden and yard debris.

Make the compost pile 4-6 feet wide and any length, depending on material and space available.

The simplest composting method is to alternate 4-6 inch layers of plant material, such as leaves or grass, with 2-4 inches of good garden soil. Add manure to the soil layer if it's available, and sprinkle commercial fertilizer on each layer of plant material to hasten decomposition. Use a cupful of fertilizer with a ratio of 1-1-1

per 10 square feet.

The top layer of the compost pile should be soil and should form a basin to hold water. Water each layer of organic matter before adding the soil layer. Water the pile thoroughly when completed; then add water as needed to keep the material moist but not soggy. Leaves decompose slowly if too dry.

Turn the compost every three to four months to aerate the material and speed decomposition. Within six months to a year it will be ready to use and you'll be glad you saved those grass clippings.

You'll be surprised when you visit Coke County Museum! It's interesting.
