# Rainfall totals more than six inches

Coke County has received two days of torrential rain. It began raining at 5:30 a.m. on Tuesday, slacked off in the afternoon and night and started again about the same time on Tues. morning. J.E. Quisenberry, who mans the official gauge in Robert Lee, had 3.90 for a 2-day total at 1 p.m. Wednesday. South and west of town some residents had received as much as 6 inches during the same period. Mess Box Creek ran full and emptied into the river and rain flooded ditches and terraces

around.

Bronte received only .60 on Tuesday but were rewarded with up to 6 inches Wednesday by presstime. Skies remain dark with rains continuing.

Farmers and ranchers are elated with the rain and the cooler temps (held down in the 60's on Wed.), following about 10 days of 100+, topped by a high of 110 degrees on August 20.

Stock tanks are filling and pastures should have some growing time, with farmers looking forward to planting small grains when hay and milo crops are finished.

No storm damage resulted from the clouds other than a WTU utility pole on 11th Street in Robert Lee being struck by lightning and set afire early Tuesday morning.

# **Grand Jury indicts three**

Coke County Grand Jurors met in their first session in the county courthouse on Tuesday which resulted in three criminal indictments. The new panel was summoned last week for the August term.

Ynes Lara of Robert Lee was indicted for burglary of a habitation, stemming from charges filed earlier this month. He had been free on bond prior to the hearing.

The Grand Jury returned an indictment of unauthorized use of a motor vehicle against Theresa M. Mecher of Robert Lee.

Terry Scott Harrell, a Sweetwater resident, received an indictment of forgery by passing during the session.

No pre-trial hearing dates have been set at this time.


## **Coach marries**

# **Soil Conservation News**

by Mike Mecke, Soil Conservation Service, USDA REST FOR HEALTHY PASTURES

Deferred grazing is the removal of livestock from a pasture for a specific period during the growing season. The purpose of this deferment or rest, is to promote plant reproduction, the establishment of new plants or to improve the vigor of established plants.

Preferably, a system of grazing and deferment would be used to be sure that rest periods are spread throughout the year over a period of several years. This is especially important on native rangeland or reseeded pastures containing two or more species of desirable grasses. Grasses and other good forage plants have different physiological times for root growth, seed production, leaf growth, etc. and so

WHEN YOU RECEIVE UN-ORDERED MERCHANDISE

-- Have you ever responded to an ad for a "free trial" offer and then been surprised when you received extra un-ordered merchandise -and a bill? Some companies count on fact that many consumers mistakenly believe they are obligated to pay for the merchandise or to return it at their own expense, says Nancy Granovsky, a family economics specialist. "If you're sent things in the mail that you did not order, you have a legal right to keep the shipment as a free gift, according to Federal Trade Commission (FTC) rules," explains the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service home economist.

RESPONDING TO FREE GIFT OFFERS -- SOME "free gifts" offers come with strings attached, that the consumer doesn't find out about until the merchandise has been received, says family economics specialist Nancy Granovsky. She points out that under Federal Trade Commission rules, all conditions and terms for receiving a free item must be sent out with the original offer. "Before you sign up for this type of offer, be sure to read the fine print, she advises, "you'll probably find out that you have to pay something or do something in order to get the free item," says the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service home economist.

they need different periods of rest from livestock grazing in order that they can carry out these functions.

To make the planning of a grazing system more difficult, some forage plants are "cool season" and others are "warm season" plants. What this means is that the plants are in an active growing and reproductive stage either during the cool part of the year or during the warm part of the year. The locally common rescue grass, Texas wintergrass, oats and wheat are some examples of cool season grasses. The gramas, bluestems and Kleingrass are examples of warm season grasses. However, differences in seeding, root growth and leaf growth still exist among plants in the same growing season, so their deferment needs are different. This is why a systematic deferment is an essential part of any good grazing system.

Many types of deferred grazing systems have been developed and used across Texas with great success. These include 4, 3 and 2 pasture systems; high intensity and low frequency systems and the cell grazing system, just to name a few. # **DPS predicts 43 fatalities**

Officials of the Texas Department of Public Safety estimate that 43 persons could be killed in traffic accidents across the state during the Labor Day period.

The 78-hour holiday period begins at 6 p.m. Friday, August 29 and ends at midnight on Monday, September 1.

"During this period, the Department will have additional troopers on duty," Adams said. "We know that some drivers wil be determined to violate the traffic laws. DPS officers will be taking enforcement action against as many violators as they can to increase the safety factor for law abiding motorists."

Adams said the final fatality count for the 1985 Labor Day period was 52.

"Twenty-one of the 52 deaths resulted from traffic accidents in which speed or DWI was a contributing factor," Adams pointed out. "That's why our officers will be concentrating on these violations during the upcoming Labor Day weekend."

Adams said the DPS deeply appreciates the positive response shown by Texas motorists to the safety belt law.

"We'd like to mark the first anniversary of the seat belt law by having far fewer fatalities occur than our statisticians have estimated for the holiday period," Adams said.

During the July 4th holiday period earlier this summer, 8 or 9 persons killed in motorcycle accidents had not been wearing helmets.

"Though only those motorcyclists 18 and younger are required to wear protective headgear, statistics show overwhelmingly that helmets save lives," Adams said.

As part of the increased driving awareness program, the DPS will furnish revised fatality counts to the new media during the Labor Day period.

# **Drivers** cautioned

Last year in Texas there were 1,228 accidents involving school buses, with seven fatalities and 323 non-fatalinjuries. Schools are about to open again, and drivers are once more being cautioned to be unusually attentive in and around school zones and school buses.

An increasing problem in recent years has been drivers who either ignored or were unaware of the law restricting vehicles from passing a school bus while the bus is loading or unloading children. Children often cross the street in front of the bus, and a car that's trying to pass may not see them coming.

The problem became so bad two years ago that the Texas Legislature considered requiring buses to have mechanical arms at the driver's window that would extend into the traffic lane while the bus is stopped. At present, buses in Texas have flashing lights at the front and back of the vehicle when stopped, as well as signs noting that vehicles are required to stop for the buses.

To emphasize the importance of stopping for these buses, the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation has produced public service announcements with Texas singersongwriter Jerry Jeff Walker as its spokesman.

Walker, the 44-year-old author of the classic, "Mr. Bojangles," believes in the message he offers in the television commercial.

"It's important to note that stopping for those flashing red lights is not just a courtesy, it's the law," Walker said. "That means stopping whether you're behind the bus or approaching it from the other lane."

The law states: "The driver of a vehicle upon a highway inside or outside a business or residence district upon meeting or overtaking from either direction any school bus which has stopped on the highway for the

purpose of receiving or discharging any school children shall stop the vehicle before reaching such school bus when there is in operation on said school bus a visual signal such as specified in Section 124 of the Act, and said driver shall not proceed until such school bus resumes motion or is signaled by the school bus driver to proceed or the visual signals are no longer actuated. A violation of this subsection is punishable by a fine of not less than \$50 nor more than \$200.

In addition to Walker himself, his daughter Jessie, son Django (named for 30's-era jazz guitarist Django Reinhardt) and 10 other children from the Austin area took part in the PSA production. The Austin Independent School District supplied a brand new bus for the spots.





### ASSESSING LIFE **INSURANCE NEEDS**

There's no easy answer to the question of how much life insurance is enough. But there are some guidelines that can help you assess your insurance situation.

The purpose of life insurance is to create an instant estate for your family in the event that you should die. Most experts agree that a young family with children will need 60 to 75% of its present after-tax income to live on. Families with grown children or no children might need as little as 40% for the surviving spouse. Single people may not need to worry about life insurance if no one depends on their

For more specific information, try one of two common methods for estimating family insurance needs. With the "multiple earnings" approach, you multiply your gross earnings by a certain number to estimate the recommended level of insurance. The number you use depends on factors like your age and amount of income. The multiplier usually varies

from 3 to 10 times your gross annual income.

The second method is more comprehensive. It considers immediate expenses and income needs over the family life cycle. Immediate expenses include funeral expenses, estate taxes, payment of debts, an emergency fund for survivors and a college fund.

Then the annual income needs, adjusted for the survivor's income and life expectancy, as well as the expected social security income, are computed. Income from assets, the life expectancy of the spouse and assumptions about the rate of inflation and return on investments are also considered. This method is more complicated than the first, but can also give you a more accurate picture of true life insurance needs.

If it's been a while since you have reviewed your life insurance policies, now may be a good time to determine whether you have enough insurance to provide your family with an adequate income.

# Dove season to open

The mourning dove season will open in the Central Zone, of which Coke County is a part, on Labor Day, September 1, and run through October 30. Bag limits have been set at 12 birds per day. This limit may include no more than 2 white-winged doves and 2 white-tipped doves, which neither is likely to be seen in our area.

Surveys indicate that bird levels are 26 percent above 1985 counts, due to more rainfall and better crop conditions. The opening outlook in Coke County has been dismal for about 4 years now but more birds seem to have raised in the area this year than in several years. Until other flocks of birds migrate to Texas in a few weeks, good hunting will probably center around water holes. Some fields and sunflowers

might be good bets when dry weather returns.

Dove hunting hours will be 30 minutes before sunrise to sunset. Shotguns must be plugged back to 3-shell capacity for migratory birds. As of the 1985 hunting season, everyone in Texas who will hunt any wild bird or animal must have a valid hunting license.

Any resident over 17 years old who hunts, fishes or traps should have on his person a drivers license or identification obtained from the DPS.

Questions a hunter has can be referred to Coke County Game Warden Sparks Burdett or the Texas Hunting Guide for 1986-87 and its supplements available free at any location selling license.
