Arraignments held in court cases

Arraignments for several civil and criminal cases on the docket for Coke County were held last Tuesday, Sept. 30, with Judge Royal Hart presiding.

Appearing for the pre-trial hearing was Ynes Lara of Robert Lee, indicted late in August by the Grand Jury on a burglary of a habitation charge. He is free on a \$20,000 bond and was accompanied by his attorneys. A trial date was set for Dec. 8, 1986.

Theresa Marie Mecher of Robert Lee, who was free on a \$5,000 bond after being charged with unauthorized use of a motor vehicle, failed to appear. Judge Hart order-

ed forfeiture of the bond and instructed she be taken into custody.

The court appointed an attorney for a Nolan County man, Terry Scott Harrell, being held in jail on an indictment of forgery by passing.

Roger Dale Dunnivan of Midland, charged with theft of livestock in Coke County, is scheduled to make a plea on October 9 in Tom Green County.

The court heard several civil cases, also.

Next jury trial dates were set for December 8, 1986 and the regular term of court will be the last week in February, 1987.

Details are sketchy at press-time, but officials are at this point speculating that the cause of the fire was due to an electrical short. What is known is that the entire inventory of the store was heavily damaged by fire, smoke, and water, and the building also received some structural damage. The Bronte Volunteer Fire Department receives the credit for some very quick action which resulted in minimal structural damage to the building, and the containment of the blaze from other adjoining buildings.

Lowrance was born Dec. 5, 1904, in Robert Lee. He was a lifelong resident of Robert Lee, worked as a rock mason, and was a longtime member of the Church of Christ.

Survivors include two daughters, Mrs. Kenneth "Freda" Pickett and Mrs. Robert "Laura" Harris, both of Burkett; four brothers, Ervin and David Lowrance, both of San Angelo, and Robert and Jesse Lowrance, both of Abilene; three sisters, Effie Bitmore and Alta Jewel Stovall, both of San Angelo, and Hazel Eubanks of Bronte; seven grandchildren; and 13 great-grandchildren.

Rosary was conducted at Johnson's Funeral Chapel in San Angelo, Sept. 25 for Mrs. Katie M. Stroud of Spring. Funeral services were held at Sacred Heart Catholic Church on September 26, followed by burial in Calvary Cemetery in San Angelo.

Storm pounds parts of county

Robert Lee was on the leading edge of a band of severe thunderstorms late Tuesday afternoon which resulted in some wind and hail damage. Coke County had been included in a tornado watch most of the afternoon when the storm carrying driving rain and marble to golfball-size hail struck about 5:30 p.m. The immediate city limits suffered some hail damage to trees and cars. J.E. Quisenberry gauged the official rainfall at 1.48 inches of the welcome stuff while some showed 1.80.

In Coke County's vicinity, Winters had minor damage including a confirmed tornado about 8 miles northwest of town. Bronte received only a small amount of rain from the thunderstorm cell.

Fall hunting season set to open

Fall hunting season is gearing up in Coke County with the opening of archery season - October 4 through November 2. Bowhunters will mainly hunt whitetail deer in our area but may also try for turkey.

Former wording in previous bow requirements stated it must be able to propel an arrow 130 yards. A change for '86-'87 says minimum peak draw weight must be 40 lbs. Legal broad-head arrows are required for all game animals except squirrels and turkeys. An archery stamp is also required for the designated season and must be attached to the hunter's valid license. All other regulations and information on archery are in the

1986-87 Texas Hunting & Fishing Guide, free for the asking wherever license are sold.

Dove hunting has been better in the county this year than in the last 4 or 5 seasons. Grass and weed seeds along with grain crops, and plentiful water have kept nesting pairs in the area. Hunting is spotty but a

number of shotgunners have reported getting their 12-bird limit near planted, harvested fields.

The beginning of October signals hunters to prepare for the various seasons coming up. Equipment needs to be checked and leases contracted for, as well as other plans made to avoid the last minute rush.

Spence bass tourneys

Two bass tournaments are coming up on Lake Spence.

The Coca-Cola Bottling Company will be the sponsor for a Striper Quest Striped Bass Tournament on Saturday, October 4, to be headquartered at Paint Creek Marina. Prizes include a \$3,000 first prize, \$1,000 second prize, \$600 third, \$400 fourth, \$200 fifth, and \$100 for each remaining spots through 15th place. A big-striper prize of \$100 will be given hourly from 7 a.m. to 3 p.m. Entries until the kick-off on Saturday morning are \$55.

On October 11-12, the annual Open Bass Tournament, hosted by the Concho Valley Bass Club, will utilize four area lakes for their tourney. Lake E.V. Spence near Robert Lee will be one of these, along with Nasworthy, Twin Buttes and O.C. Fisher in San Angelo. Entry fee for the 2-fish, 14 inch minimum black bass contest is \$40. The tournament will pay \$1,500 for 1st place and a \$750 second as well as other cash and merchandise prizes. More info is available at the Mike Brauns Memorial Bldg., Mary Lee Park, Lake Nasworthy.

Applications accepted

Congressman Charles W. Stenholm is currently accepting applications from young men and women in the 17th Congressional District, who are interested in attending one of the nation's service academies.

In the spring, Congressman Stenholm will have the opportunity to nominate area citizens to the four U.S. academies: the Air Force Academy in Colorado Springs, CO.; the Military Academy in West Point, N.Y.; the Naval Academy in Annapolis, MD.; or the Merchant Marine Academy in Kings Point, N.Y.

Persons interested in the possible nominations should contact the Congressman's Washington, D.C., office as soon as possible. The deadline for completed application files is Dec. 1, 1986.

To be eligible for an appointment, the applicant must meet certain requirements. They include: American citizenship; good SAT or

ACT scores; outstanding high school record; leadership potential; and good physical condition, including excellent eyesight. There is a very limited number of waivers for non-pilot candidates whose eyesight is less than 20/20.

Aside from academic achievement, strong emphasis is placed on moral character, church and community involvement and extra-curricular activities and/or part-time employment. Applicants must be single with no dependents, at least 17 years of age, but not past their 21st birthday upon admission into the academy on July 1, 1987.

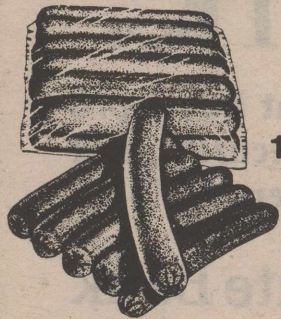

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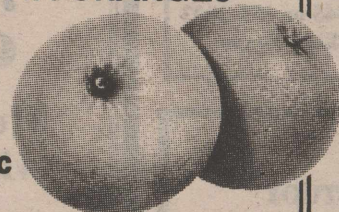
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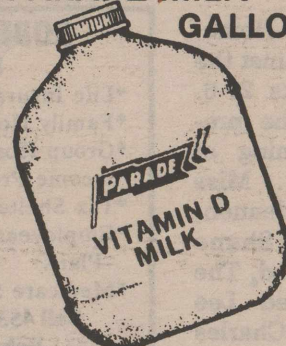

1st Quarter

Robert Lee received the opening kickoff with a return

to the RL 27. RL made a quick 1st down on a 19 yd. run by Runnion. GC then intercepted a Steer pass and they had 1st and 10. 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District election set

An election for directors to serve in zones 1 and 2 on the Coke County Soil and Water Conservation District Board is scheduled for October 10th at 10 a.m. in the Coke County Courthouse, announced Joe Rawlings, chairman of the board.

State law decrees that to be eligible to vote in a soil and water conservation district director's election, a person must own agricultural land within the district. The person must also live within the district and the voter must be 18 years of age.

Legal qualifications state that a candidate for the office of a soil and water conservation district director must own land in the zone he represents, be 18 years of age and be actively engaged in farming and ranching. He must also live in the conservation district.

Zone 1 of the district includes an area in the

north-west part of the county to east of Sanco. Wilbern Millican is the current member of the board who represents Zone 1. Zone 2 is the area of the county north of the Colorado River and the north-east part of the county. Royce Fancher is the current member of the board who represents zone 2.

SWCD directors are to help promote sound soil and water conservation programs on farm and ranch lands within the district and to serve as a voice for farmers and ranchers on conservation matters and other issues affecting private property rights of landowners.

The district board of directors coordinates efforts of various local, state and federal agencies and private concerns to carry out its objectives. All conservation programs managed by the district are of a voluntary nature to the landowner or operator.

Besides the fun of getting together, the crowd celebrated two birthdays and two wedding anniversaries which several members had observed within a few days of each other during the week.

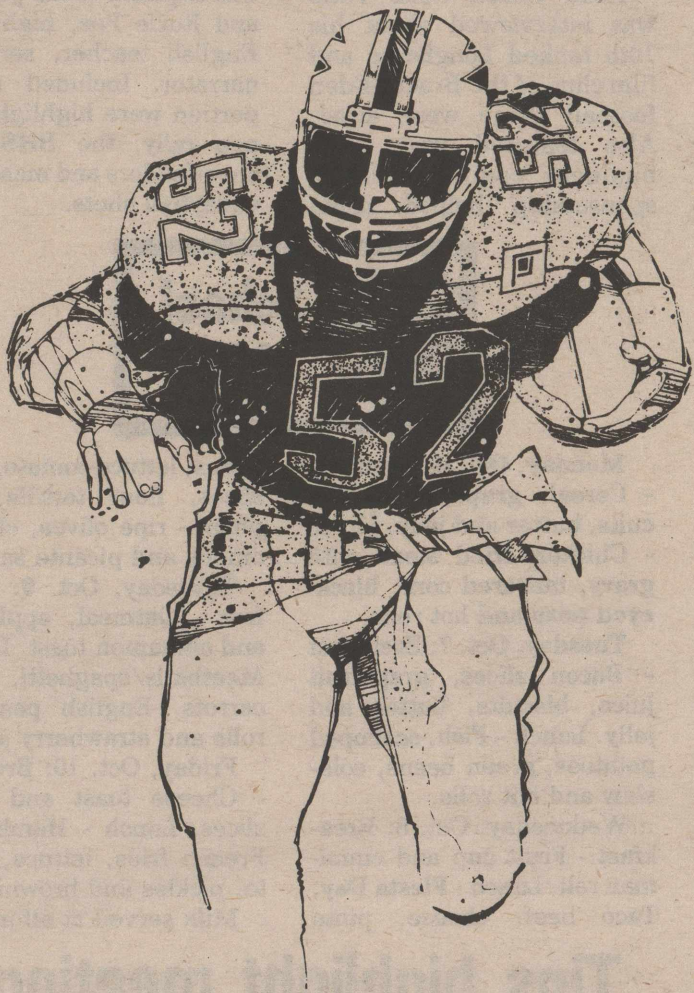

Horns win dogfight against Eden

Bronte traveled to Eden last Friday and found themselves in a real dogfight. Eden did manage to score against the Longhorns. The only team to do so this season. Bronte controlled the game, but had to dig deep into their offensive bag to find a combination that worked. Late in the first quarter Bronte took an Eden

punt on their own 30 and twelve plays later Joel Sanders took it in from the 4 for Bronte's first TD. Pete Puentez kicked the PAT. It was 7-0 Bronte at the end of the first quarter. Bronte threatened at the end of the first half, but were unable to cross the goal line and missed the following field goal try.

With 4:53 left in the 3rd quarter the Longhorns struck again. The drive was started by recovering an Eden fumble on the Bronte 43. Good runs by Joel Sanders and Corby Kelso and a pass to Cody Hartman brought the ball to the 6. Stephen Lee passed to Hartman again for the TD. PAT was good by Puentez and Bronte appeared in complete command. In the fourth quarter punts were swapped. Eden however ran the punt all the way for an apparent TD. But it was called back. The runner had stepped out of bounds at the Eden 23 yard line. The Bulldogs were still alive. They immediately threw a 35 yard pass to the Bronte 42. Adam Minjarez showed his speed by chasing down the

Eden receiver to save the TD. Eden pushed on down to 17 yard line where the Longhorn defense dug in and held till it was fourth down and four to go for a first. Eden called time out to consider the situation. They came back and threw a pass down the middle to the three where the Longhorns knocked the Eden receiver loose from the ball. The receiver stopped but the ball rolled on into the endzone and was recovered by Eden for the TD. The PAT was good but Bronte was called for off-sides. Eden decided to forego the sure one point and go for two. They ran it across and the score was 14-8 with 5:06 left to go in the game. Suddenly Bronte was in danger of even losing the game should Eden get the ball back. But the Longhorn offense said "enough of that" and even though they were tackled at their own 4 yard line on the kick-off they ran the clock down and out winding up on the Eden 17. Bronte standouts for the game were fullback Corby Kelso with 22 carries for 135 yards and Joel Sanders for 86 yards. Quarterback Stephen Lee was six for 14 for 86 yards. Bronte has an open date this week and plays Water Valley at home Oct. 10. See you there!

Theories about the South

Why is the south called Dixie? It is not certain but here are a few theories.

Before the Civil War, the Citizens Bank of Louisiana issued bills with "DIX" inscribed on the back of the ten dollar bills. Dix meaning ten in French and therefore the land of Dix and later lengthened to Dixie Land.

Another theory is that the Negro slaves started calling it Dixie in memory of a kind hearted slaveholder named Dixie who lived in New York during the late 1700s. The

slaves, most of whom were transported south supposedly sang of their old home until finally the use of the term spread across the south.

Still another theory is simply that after the establishment of the Mason Dixon Line which was surveyed by two British astronomers, Jeremiah Dixon and Charles Mason, people shortened it to "Dixon" or "Dixie".

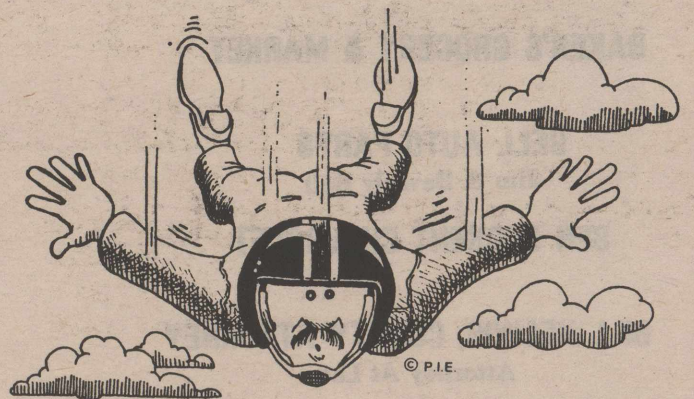

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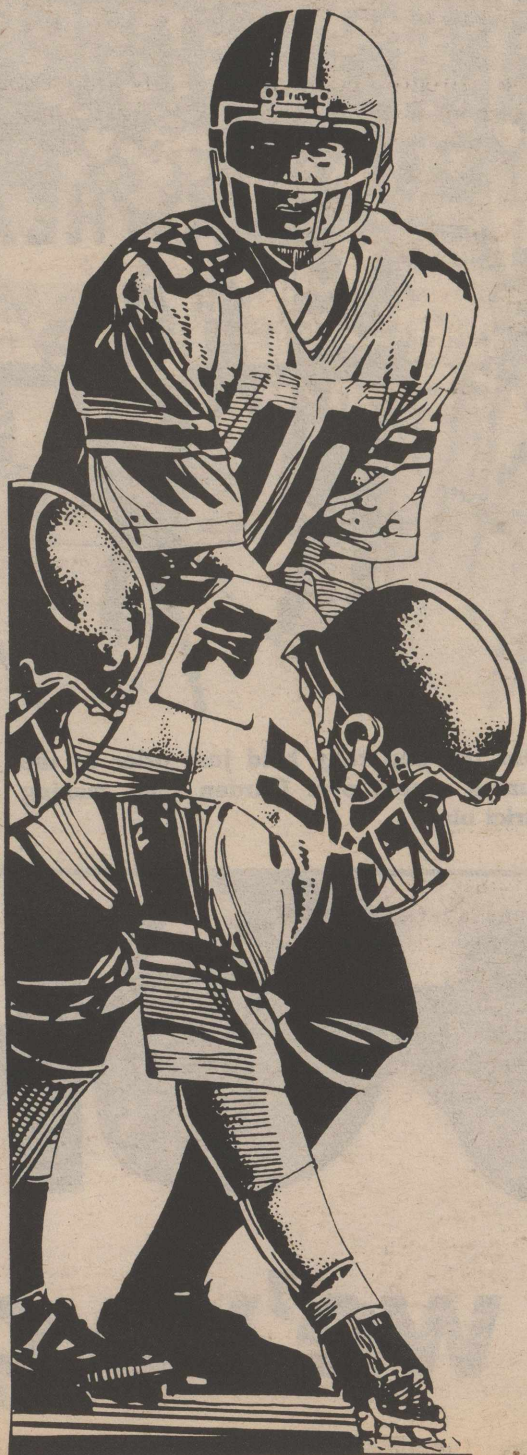

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

Senses affected by age

The sense of taste and the sense of smell are both affected by the normal process of aging. Because these senses are so closely tied to the enjoyment of food, older adults may find it difficult to maintain a healthy appetite.

Taste buds decrease in number and sensitivity with age. The average 70-year-old, for example, has one-sixth the taste buds of a 20-year-old.

Studies show that the taste receptors to identify sweet and salty flavors are the first to atrophy while those that sense bitter and sour flavors tend to function into old age. That is one explanation for why some elders report that "nothing tastes good". Other older adults may eat excessively to try to capture the taste sensation.

The sense of smell may begin to decline in the late thirties. By age 80, about 40% of people have difficulty in identifying common substances by smell. Because

two-thirds of the taste sensation depends on the ability to smell, this can also affect an older person's appetite.

Smoking, poor dental hygiene and medications also contribute to a decline in the taste of food. When appetite is a problem, the older adult may want to stop smoking, improve dental care and discuss a change in medication with a physician.

To increase their enjoyment of eating, elders need attractively prepared and served meals. Distinctive and varied textures, colors and temperatures will add to the identification and enjoyment of foods.

Spices can be used to enhance food flavor and artificial odor will also improve flavor for some older persons.

Even as the ability to taste fades, the memories associated with certain foods can be quite pleasant and may be one way for elders to continue eating with satisfaction.

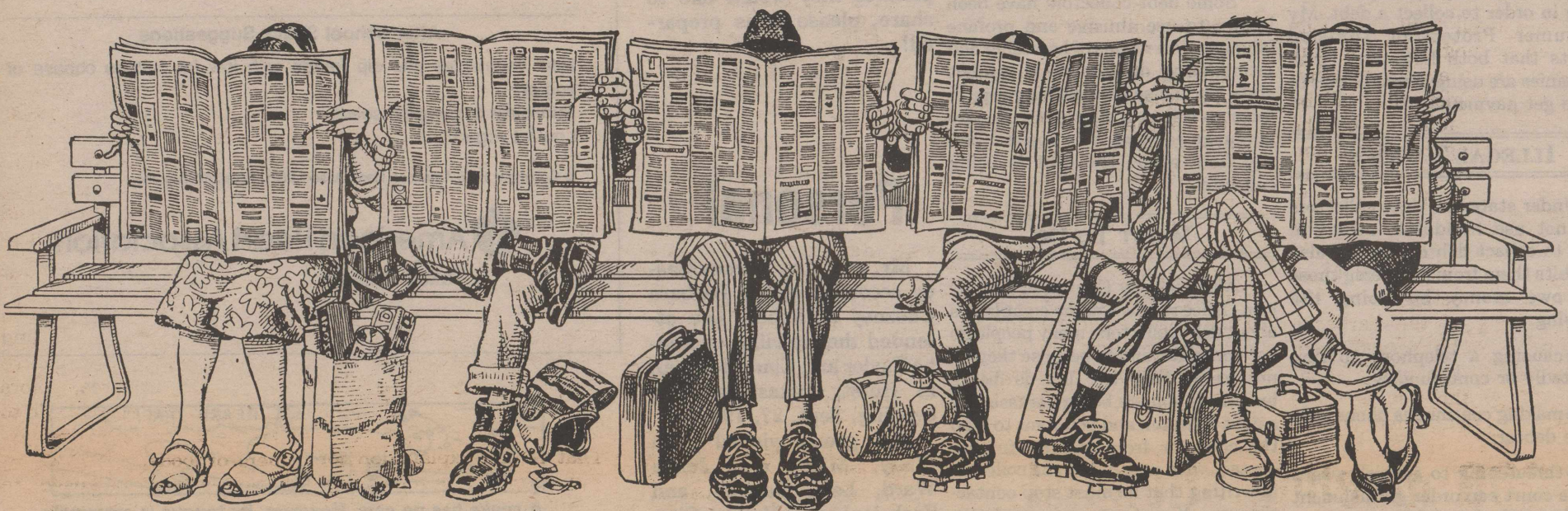

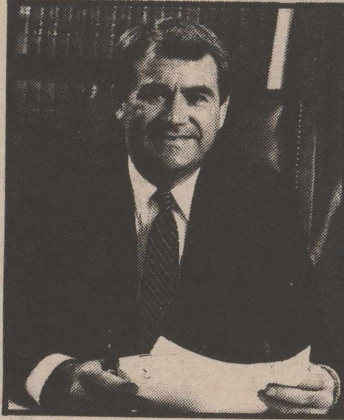

Debt Collectors Don't Have A License To Abuse

The downturn in the Texas economy has left many people unable to pay their bills on time. While creditors have an indisputable right to ask for payment, there are some methods that they are barred from using in order to collect a debt. My Consumer Protection Division reports that both large and small companies are using illegal tactics to try to get payments.

ILLEGAL TACTICS

Under state law, debt collectors may not use fraudulent means in order to collect debts. The law also prohibits them from harassing those who owe money by doing the following:

- causing a telephone to ring repeatedly or continuously;
- making continuous phone calls to the debtor;
- threatening to garnish wages (only a court can order garnishment and then only for child support);
- representing that a debt is being collected by an attorney, when in fact it is not;
- telling a debtor that attorneys' fees will definitely be added to the total before a case has gone to court;
- sending documents to a debtor which appear to be from a court or other official agency when in fact the papers are those of the creditor.

It is also illegal for a debtor collector to use a false name while trying to collect a debt or to misrepresent the status of the debt before any governmental agency.

PROFANE LANGUAGE

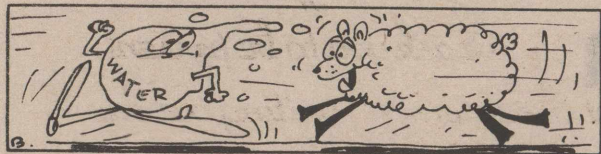
Some debt collectors have been known to use abusive and profane language as a means of harassing and intimidating debtors. It is against state law to use profane language in order to collect a debt or to use any language calculated to abuse a person from whom the debt is being collected.

WHAT TO DO

Although my Consumer Protection Office receives many complaints about debt collectors, many people do not complain simply because they do not know that the law is being broken. If you are being harassed by a debt collector, and you want to stop the collector from making further contact with you, notify the collector in writing that he must stop contacting you. Keep a copy of your letter and send the one to the debt collector by certified mail.

FOR MORE HELP

If you have questions about debt collection or any other consumer problem, contact the Consumer Protection Office nearest you. The offices are in Austin, Dallas, Houston, San Antonio, McAllen, Lubbock and El Paso. The Attorney General's Office is the people's law firm. We're here to help you.



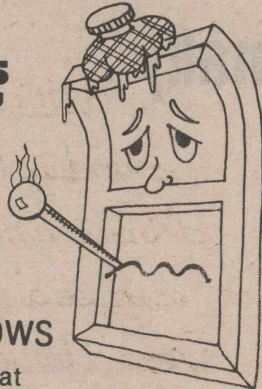

Bird honored by Senate resolution

[Editor's Note: Mrs. Ulmer Bird of Sanco notified the O/E this week of a letter recently received from State Senator Bill Sims. In it, he advises Mr. and Mrs. Bird that Ulmer has been honored by a resolution on Sept. 2, 1986 in the Senate's special session for his literary contributions and poetry. Dr. Luther Hagard was instrumental, in part, for getting the resolution drafted.)

SENATE RESOLUTION NO. 86

WHEREAS, In the small community of Sanco, about eight miles from Robert Lee in Coke County, there resides a Texan, Ulmer Bird, age 85, who is truly among the state's most treasured assets and is especially deserving of legislative recognition; and

WHEREAS, Ulmer Bird has been a cowboy, newspaper editor, teacher, and preacher, but only since his retirement has he been able to devote all his time to his favorite endeavor, poetry; and

WHEREAS, Born and raised in Coke County, Ulmer Bird attended Princeton, married his lovely wife, Josephine, and preached in Methodist pastorates before volunteering to serve as a chaplain in the United States Army in 1944; he served in an anti-aircraft unit in Europe and his unit saw action in the Battle of the Bulge; and

WHEREAS, After the war, he returned to his native Sanco; and preached in the Methodist Church before retiring to study and write; this year, 35 of his

poems were collected and published under the title of **OUR PEOPLE**; and

WHEREAS, The title **OUR PEOPLE** is a translation from the names of the Indian tribes that populated the watershed valleys of the Concho River during Coronado's exploration of the area and includes poems Mr. Bird wrote while attending college in the East and those written in succeeding decades about the Indians, early settlers, cowboys, and current inhabitants of his beloved country; and

WHEREAS, An accomplished writer of prose and poetry when the centennial of the state was celebrated, it is truly fitting that the Texas Senate pay tribute in its sesquicentennial year to Ulmer Bird, Texas poet; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the Senate of the State of Texas, 69th Legislature, 2nd Called Session, hereby commend Ulmer Bird on his beautiful and touching poetry; and, be it further

RESOLVED, That a copy of this Resolution be prepared for him as an expression of gratitude from the Texas Senate for his contributions to enhancing the quality of

life of all who read his poetry and as an expression of best wishes for many more happy and productive years.

BEWARE OF RABID ANIMALS -- Rabies remain a threat to both humans and domestic animals in Texas due to the large number of confirmed cases in wild animals, says a veterinarian with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System. Some 700 cases of rabies are now confirmed annually in Texas, and most of these are in wild animals. For instance, rabies have declined in dogs and cats but have increased in skunks and bats. As the incidence of wild animal rabies increases in a given area, the risk of exposure for domestic animals increases. This means that all dogs and cats should be vaccinated annually and should be kept away from wild animals. Unvaccinated dogs and cats that are bitten by a rabid animal should be destroyed immediately or isolated for six months. Vaccinated dogs and cats that are bitten should be isolated three months.

BEWARE OF SLOW MOVING VEHICLES - Motorists throughout Texas should be on the lookout for slow moving farm vehicles and equipment on highways and other public roads, particularly with spring farming operations in full swing, cautions a safety engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System. Motorists need to recognize such slow moving machinery and to be aware of tool bars and axles extending into the oncoming lane. Protruding steel beams are often difficult to see, particularly at dusk and dawn and other times of poor visibility. Tractor operators should use flashing lights, reflectors, flagging and the Slow Moving Vehicle emblem on the rear of the machine to alert motorists.

Vestula, Hubbard wedding

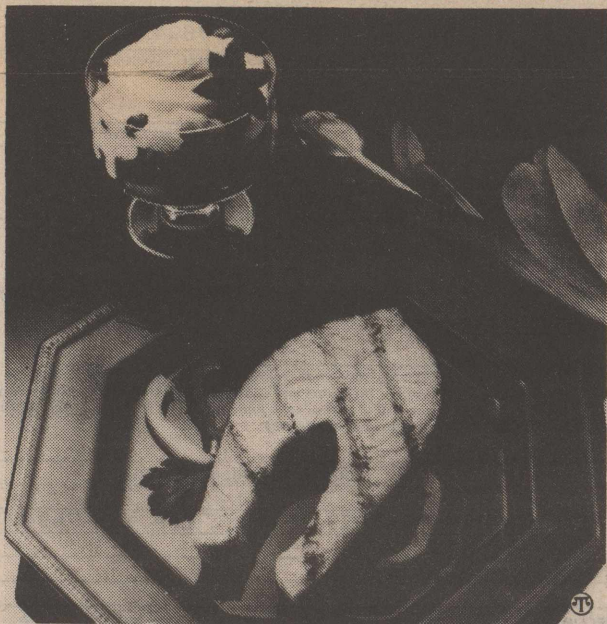

Remove from heat and let cool. Meanwhile whip cream until soft peaks form. Fold into egg custard. When ready to serve, spoon fruit into stemmed glasses and top with cream. Garnish with mint sprig. Makes 6 servings.
