First cold front drops temperatures

When the first frigid Canadian cold front of the season dropped the bottom out of thermometers over the weekend, it proved the weather is still boss in Texas. Skies were overcast most of Saturday locally with temperatures reaching 85 degrees. When high north winds struck in late afternoon, it was downhill from there. By early Sunday morning it had dipped to the upper 30s. The norther brought high wind, low 30's, and snow flurries to the Panhandle as far south

as Lubbock. Eagle Pass on the Mexican border reported 42 degrees. Overcast skies apparently delayed the first frost for our immediate vicinity. However, some Blackwell residents near Oak Creek reported a light frost on Sunday morning.

By Tuesday morning, the low had risen to the low 40s as the frontal system passed. The air mass arrived about a month ahead of the average cold spell for our area, perhaps due in part to the extended rainy period.

Dear Editor,

Since 1979, emergency medical services for Robert Lee and western Coke County has been supplied by a dedicated group of volunteers. This group has provided ambulance service to an average of 130 patients per year. In addition, they sponsor a blood pressure clinic monthly, one of their newest members takes blood pressures at the commodity dis-

tribution each month, they have taught CPR courses, sponsored a defensive driving course and taught ECA, EMT and EMT-Special Skills courses within Robert Lee.

It is, therefore, very distressing to hear people questioning whether Robert Lee has an ambulance service, whether the volunteers are doing a good job and whether they are willing to help

their fellow citizens.

The currently active 13 members are covering an on-call emergency/transfer ambulance unit seven days a week, 24-hours a day. They respond to any call and provide up-to-the minute emergency care regardless of who the patient is or whether or not he can pay for the service. There are four EMT-Special Skills available for the service and nine basic-EMTs plus three volunteers who "drive-only" although these volunteers are also there to assist the EMTs as needed.

A new ECA class (emergency care attendant) class is registering in Robert Lee on Monday, October 29th. The course involves only 40 hours of in-class time and enables the student to work on an entry-level basis for the ambulance. It also provides more people to respond quickly to life-threatening emergencies such as heart attacks, etc. Won't YOU consider helping your neighbor and sign up for this class. The training provided will enable you to assist the sick or injured which may include a member of your family. Persons involved with children especially need to consider taking this class. **THE TOTAL COST FOR THIS CLASS IS \$25** for the textbook. Those who successfully complete the course and then volunteer on the ambulance for a year will have this money refunded to them. You can't beat a deal like that!

This is a proud and dedicated group. Robert Lee won the Basic Life Support Unit of the Year award in 1983 and volunteers have earned other honors. Won't YOU help us **HELP YOU??**

On Tuesday morning, October 14, 1986, W.C. (Bill) Reed of 512 East 18th St., San Angelo went to be with his Lord. He passed away at the Shannon Hospital after succumbing to a massive heart attack which he had on October 5th. He was buried at the Terry Memorial Cemetery 12 miles west of Robert Lee at 10:30 on Wednesday, with the Rev. L.C. Messer officiating from the Full Gospel Assembly of San Angelo, where Bill was a member.

He is survived by his wife Lovlis and four daughters: Mrs. Dale (Frances) Smith; Mrs. Joe (Mary) Lyons; Mrs. H.R. (Betty) Adkins; Mrs. Walter (Joyce) Mange; two sons: Jimmy Reed and Danny Reed; 14 grandchildren and 13 great-grandchildren. Bill has two brothers of Sweetwater, TX.; A.J. (Audley) and J.E. Bill was a native of Coke County and was born at Old Edith on April 28, 1909. He lies at rest on the old Reed ranch where he grew up as a child. Nature surrounds him with the hills, the pasture lands, and the Pecan Creek where he roamed hunting "possums", fishing and swimming, and gathering wild plums. Friends and loved ones surrounded by nature and sitting at his graveside on Wednesday listened to a favorite and appropriate song: "The Hills Are Calling Me Home".

Bill was a dreamer and was obsessed by an intuition that convinced him that "The grass was a little greener on the other side of the hill." This inborn trait led him away from home at an early age, going here and there seeking adventure. He joined a Wild West Rodeo and was dubbed, "The

Rambling Kid" in Oklahoma. After tackling sursingle, he tried his hand at saddle bronc riding and lucked out in Cheyenne, Wyoming, where he was awarded the coveted Silver Buckle as Grand All-Around Champion.

Getting married and having a family did not deter this gypsy nature of his. He worked on ranches here and there, did prospecting on many creeks and river banks, traveling from one state to another. His last permanent job before retiring was joining the Reed Brothers Construction Company in Judsonia, Arkansas. His great sense of humor led him to say just one year before his death: "I was born "Wild Bill", but now with both legs gone, not able to kick around or dance any more, I am called "Tamed Willie". He added that, "No more a Gypsy, my wild heart broken, I now associate with Christians, a better brand of people."
