Gospel Singing

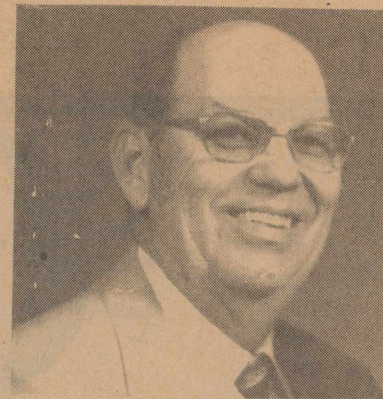
The monthly Ole Fashioned Gospel Singing will be held from 2-4 p.m. on Sunday, Jan. 4 at the Bronte Senior Center.

Eph Cummins, of Robert Lee, is retiring from his position as District Conservationist for the Soil Conservation Service, USDA effective Jan. 3, 1987. Cummins has 33 years with the federal government including his time in the Navy. Twice Cummins has received awards from the agency for his outstanding work with ranchers.

Cummins worked briefly as a student trainee with the S.C.S. in Robert Lee in 1953, then full time in San Antonio and Johnson City where he was promoted to District Conservationist. In 1972, he was transferred to Robert Lee where Eph and his wife, Dovie, raised and educated their two daughters, Sheila and Debbie.

The Cummins' plan to retire in Robert Lee where he will start a new job as part-time Director of the Coke County Underground Water District and she will continue working in the County Auditor's office.

Mike Mecke, of Bronte, who has been Range Conservationist in the Robert Lee office since 1981, will be the acting-District Conservationist until a new appointment is made.

Sales tax increase slated

State Comptroller reminded Texans this week to be aware of the increase of the state sales tax rate that begins on New Year's Day. Only the rate has changed; what is and is not taxable under the 1986 sales tax law remains the same.

In Robert Lee and Bronte the new tax will be 5 1/4% + 1% city tax. The new increase in taxes, made necessary by a shortfall of tax revenue caused by the oil price collapse, includes a motor fuel tax increase of 5 cents, from 10 to 15 cents a

gallon.

Businesses are advised to make necessary accounting changes and personnel training to collect the new tax. The "temporary" increase will expire Aug. 31, 1987 and could be dropped back if the Legislature feels the economy has recovered sufficiently to take care of the present revenue shortage. State revenues are expected to rise by \$500 million due to the tax increase.

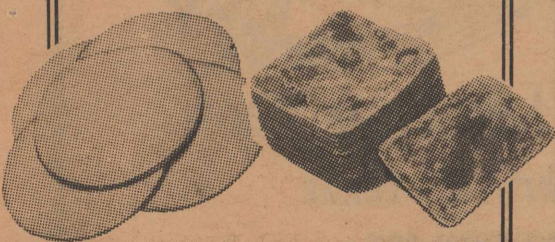

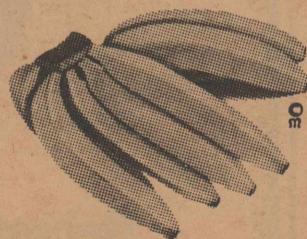

You probably know Social security pays full retirement benefits at 65 or a permanently reduced amount as early as 62. But, did you know you can get an extra "bonus" if you decide to delay retirement past 65?

Here is how you earn delayed retirement credits if you will soon be 65. You earn a credit of 1/4 of 1 percent for each month from 65 through 69 that no benefit is paid due to your work. This amounts to 3 percent a year. Your benefit will be permanently increased by that percentage when it is finally paid.

The current maximum credit is 15 percent for someone who gets no benefits at all until 70.

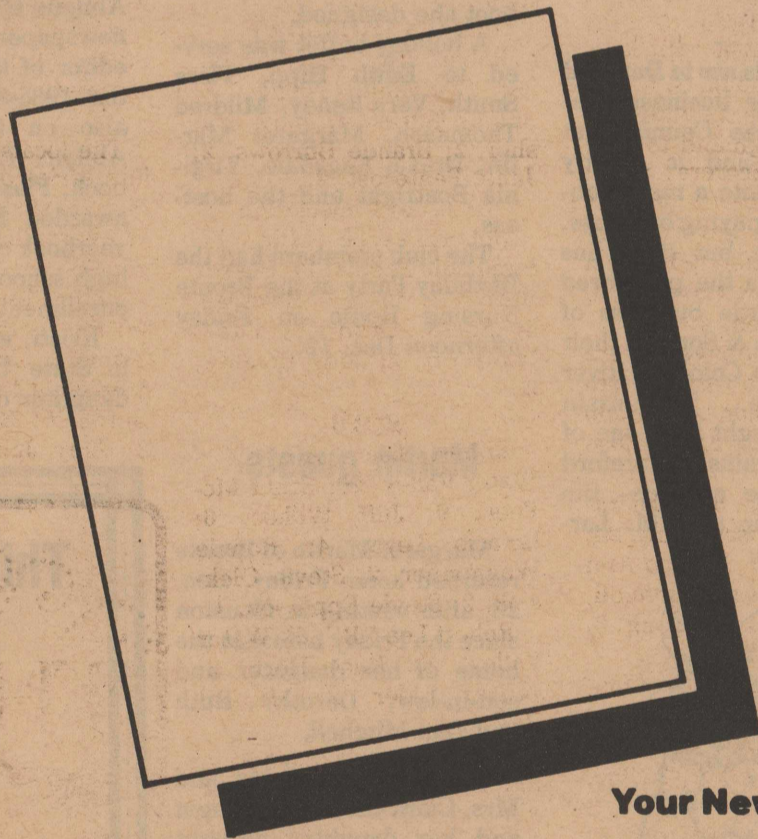

AFTER THE HOLIDAY FAMILY REUNION --

"Even a long-awaited holiday family reunion can leave you feeling down," says Dorthy Taylor, a family life specialist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service home economics program. She points out that family gatherings may require travel which leaves some family members tired and irritable. Even the most wonderful family reunion disrupts mealtime and bedtime routines and can overwhelm us with more people than we're used to being with at the same time. "Sometimes unresolved emotions among family members surface under the pressures of holiday tension, and lead to depression for those involved," explains the specialist. She advises trying to settle back into your usual routine as soon as possible. "Practice tolerance and forgiveness," she says, "since people say and do things under pressure that are not typical." Remembering the good things that happened over the holiday will also help cure the January blues, Taylor remarks.

Season to end

The 1986-87 fall hunting season on deer and turkey will end on Sunday, Jan. 4. It's been a boomer in most Texas counties including Coke. Although both species have not been as visible as in the past, due to heavy growth of vegetation after remarkable rains, most steady hunters were able to tag out. Deer have sported good antlers which caused many license holders to hold out for a trophy buck. Whitetails were in excellent condition for the season and an unusual number of small bucks with spikes and 4-point horns were seen in the field, leading officials to predict a good buck crop next year.

Quail hunting has generally been a disappointment in this area. Good bird harvest was spotty with quail not making the good comeback expected from drought and freeze damage of recent seasons. However, the season will remain open through Feb. 22 with a daily bag limit of 12. Legal shooting hours are 1/2 hour before sunrise to 1/2 hour after sunset.

Javalina hunting will also be open through Feb. 22 with 2 hogs allowed.

Upcoming is the Mourning Dove, 10 day winter season. It will be open in the Central Zone, including Coke County, from Jan. 3, 1987 until Jan. 12, 1987. A good number of doves have migrated to feed and water in our area and are good large birds. Bag limits and hours are the same as for the fall season -- 12 birds per day from 1/2 hour before sunrise to sunset.

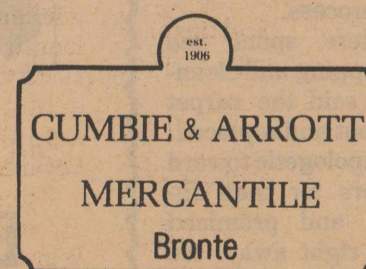

TREE PLANTING AT HAND

Tree planting time is at hand. Now is an ideal time for planting most ground covers, vines, shrubs, and trees. Here's why.

The most critical aspect of any transplant effort is for the plant to re-establish an effective system of feeder roots before it's subjected to severe stress. By planting in the fall, new plants have several cool, leisurely months during which to proliferate new feeder roots before the rigors of summer heat and drought set in.

In fact, research indicates that planting now will give plants almost a full growing season advantage over planting next spring. Furthermore, materials planted now will have enough feeder root development by spring to be able to effectively use an early spring application of fertilizer for even faster growth.

Finally, nursery and garden center personnel usually have more time now to answer questions and help

To get your landscaping project off to a good start, select some authoritative books on do-it-yourself home landscaping. Most homeowners don't realize how large many trees and shrubs can get and, as a result, they plant too many, too close together and thus dwarf the house.

Next, choose tough, low-maintenance, pest-resistant plants that are adapted to local environmental conditions.

Smart homeowners will avoid poorly-adapted, troublesome or pest ridden plants so common in today's marketplace. Arizona ash, sycamore, cottonwood, poplar, fruitless mulberry, umbrella tree or chinaberry, silver maple, tree-of-heaven, arborvitae and euonymus fall into this category.

When planting, dig generous holes, backfill with an open, well-drained growing mix, and mulch the soil surface with 6-8 inches of grass clippings, leaves, straw or other organic material to moderate soil temperature. Water regularly throughout the fall and winter.

To make your landscaping venture a smashing success, remember three things: enlightened planning, proper plant selection and lots of tender loving care.

As the bills for holiday expenses come rolling in this month, many consumers will be feeling a good case of "buyer's remorse".

That's simply a fancy term for the depression that follows overspending. For some of us, overspending may be an occasional problem, but for others it can become compulsive.

Compulsive spenders usually have the sense of being out of control and often hide their purchases out of embarrassment. A poor self-image is worsened by more buying because the underlying need for approval or excitement often is not met.

Impulse buying, or buying that is not a part of an overall plan, affects virtually everyone at one time or another. For example, have you ever gone to the grocery store to pick up a gallon of milk and walked out with two bags of groceries, personal care items, magazines or other merchandise? Impulse buying is not automatically "bad". But it does add up, and can mean that important items cannot be purchased because the money has already been spent in other ways.

If your New Year's resolutions involve improving your family financial management, examining spending habits can be a good place to start.

Avoid shopping for items you know are too expensive for you to afford.

you can't afford to buy everything you need or want at one time, a plan for buying one thing at a time over a certain period may help.

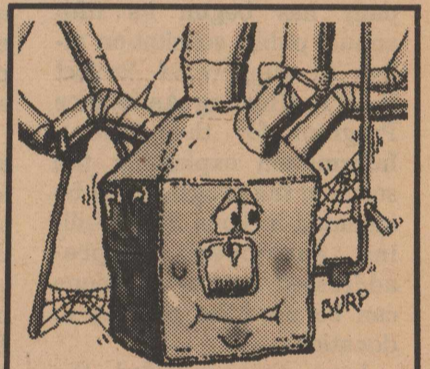
If you are angry and go shopping, leave your credit cards at home. Try window shopping to calm down and think through the buying decision before you make a purchase.

District directors name conservationist of the year

The directors of the Coke County Soil & Water Conservation District selected Gerald Sandusky of Bronte as the 1986 Conservationist of the year. Sandusky is the retired head football coach of Bronte High School. Born and raised in Coke County, Sandusky was a star fullback at Bronte H.S. who went on to play for Texas A&M University and Abilene Christian University. Ownership of the land which he operates is jointly held by Gerald; his brother Judge, a Hondo veterinarian; and his mother Ruth, of Bronte.

Sandusky has operated this stockfarm of 881 acres since 1968 and has consistently maintained an excellent grass cover on his 519 acres of rangeland while applying good conservation farming techniques to over 300 acres of cropland. Crops raised on the Sandusky farm were milo, small grains, forage sorghums and hay. The cropland is all of a very

sandy texture, highly inclined to blow - as any Coke County resident can readily believe. Therefore, Gerald has followed approved conservation farming and tillage methods to conserve the soil.

Approximately 150 acres has been rootplowed, about 400 acres seeded to grasses and about eight miles of terraces constructed and maintained. Pasture deferment and proper stocking has maintained in good condition several fields seeded to improved grasses during the 1950's - which is no easy feat in West Texas! Proper Grazing Use has been maintained, even through the last drought, by pasture rotation, use of forage crops, and the addition of needed watering locations.

Sandusky will be honored at a regional awards banquet in San Angelo on March 5, 1987 at Angelo State University, where he will be awarded a plaque by the District.

HAP'N effort announced
