Nursing Home opens new wing

West Coke County Hospital District Nursing Home opened its doors to the west wing expansion of the nursing home facility at ten a.m. Tuesday morning. This wing will add 32 beds to the present 53 beds in the east wing. Four residents were transferred into the newly decorated west wing, formerly the West Coke County Hospital, Mrs. Parker, Calla Mae Cargile, Nell Pruitt, and Merritt Smith. Prospects on the waiting list are being contacted and need to come in or call the administrator to confirm their need for admittance.

At admission, the facility must obtain proper information from the patient's physician, and evaluate the immediate and long-term needs. The evaluation is based on the patient's medical history and physical examination, which is conducted within 48 hours of admission and must be a part of their record upon entrance into the nursing home. At admission, the facility must obtain recipient-patient information from a physician, including current medical findings, diagnoses, orders for immediate care, and the patient's discharge and rehabilitation potential.

The attending physician must see the resident whenever necessary, but at least once every 60 days.

West Coke County Nursing Home has been granted a "superior rating" from The Texas Department of Health for the past three years. The very best of nursing care is provided by a stable, caring staff. The facility has a program of rehabilitative nursing care that is an integral part of nursing service and is directed toward helping each recipient-patient to achieve and maintain an optimal level of self-care and independence. Social and religious activities are available daily.

A West Coke County Hospital District Nursing Home Auxiliary is being formed and all interested persons who have a desire to volunteer their time are encouraged to contact the facilities Activity Director, Mrs. Joyce Wilson.

"Open House" is scheduled January 25th, 2:00-4:00 p.m. The public is welcome anytime to come by and view the nursing home or visit with the residents. "We love the family atmosphere that exists in our facility," stated Administrator Jeanene Andrews Baucum.

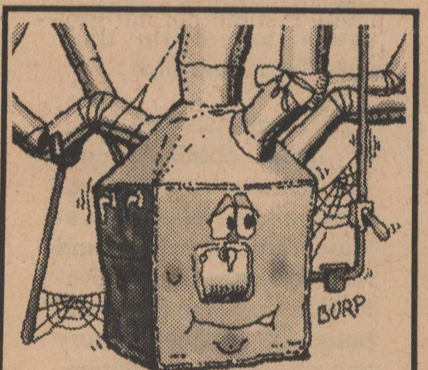
Funeral services were held last Sunday at 2 p.m. in the First Methodist Church. Burial followed in the Rotan Cemetery.

PROBLEMS IN CATTLE ON SMALL GRAINS

A lot of cattle are now grazing small grains, and cattlemen need to be aware of three potential problems that might develop.

Nitrate poisoning, grass tetany and bloat are three major problems that afflict cattle grazing on small grain pastures.

Nitrate poisoning occurs mainly during cloudy, overcast conditions. Under such conditions, nitrates accumulate in plants instead of being converted to protein. Plant stems contain more nitrate than leaves, so nitrate poisoning is more of a problem on heavily grazed pastures.

Hay or grain supplements enable cattle to tolerate higher levels of nitrate than those on pasture only. Splitting nitrogen fertilizer applications may also help prevent nitrate poisoning on small grain pastures. But the safest way to protect animals is to remove them from problem pastures until plants resume normal growth.

Grass tetany is more of a problem in older cows during early stages of lactation. The condition is associated with low blood magnesium. High levels of protein and potassium that are common in small grain pastures may

either depress an animal's digestion of magnesium or increase its excretion of magnesium, resulting in inadequate blood magnesium levels.

Grass tetany occurs more frequently on heavy, high potassium soils, so producers should avoid applying excessive amounts of nitrogen and potassium fertilizer. Fertilizing with magnesium to increase the magnesium content in plants is not practical. The most practical step to prevent grass tetany is to supply a palatable mineral containing 6 to 14 percent magnesium.

Bloat occurs when an animal cannot rid itself of gas produced in the rumen during normal digestive processes. Normally, bloat is not as much of a problem on grass pastures as it is on legumes, such as alfalfa. However, young, fast growing grasses high in protein and low in fiber also can cause bloat.

The chemical agent poloxalene provides effective bloat control if animals eat it in adequate amounts-- 1.5 to 2 grams per 100 pounds of body weight. However, the supplement used should contain no nonprotein nitrogen such as urea and little natural protein since this will only aggravate the bloat problem.

One effective way to deal with bloat is to remove cattle from bloat producing pastures and to feed hay or a combination of hay and grain until pastures can grow and become more mature.

Newton Smith County Health Department in Fayetteville, North Carolina for one year. Then he returned to San Angelo where he filled the position at the Shamrock Clinic in Bronte.

He and his wife Dianna have two daughters, Amanda Marie, age 7 and Michelle Lyn, age 4.

Dr. Emerson plans to remain at the Shamrock Clinic in Bronte indefinitely. He says he enjoys working in a small town like Bronte, but prefers living in San Angelo where there is more to do.

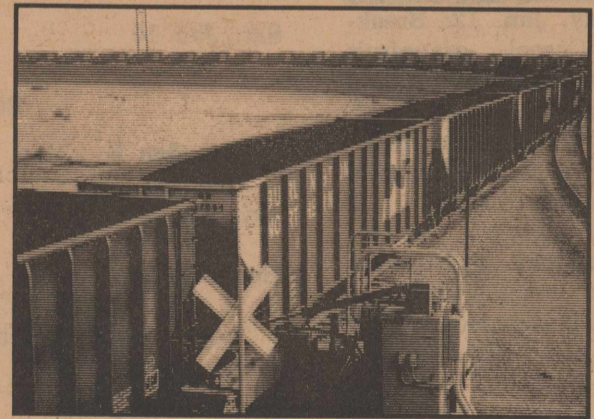

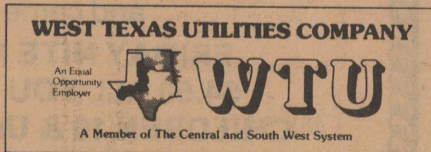

Roundballers are undefeated

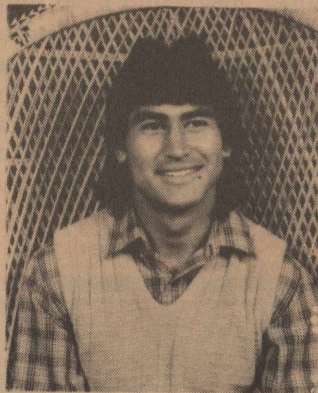

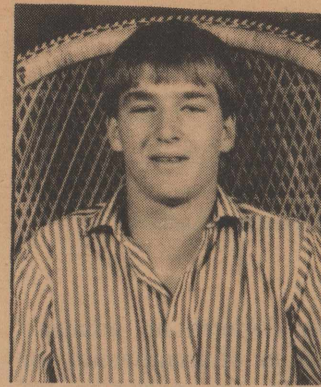
The second game was against Highland with Bronte winning 63-50. John Mor-

for taxable years beginning on or after July 1, 1987.

• Corporations will be taxed on most liquidating sales and distributions of appreciated property, subject to certain transition rules.

• In 1987, the long-term capital gains of individuals will be subject to a top tax rate of 28 percent.

• Tax shelters will be prohibited from using the cash method of accounting.

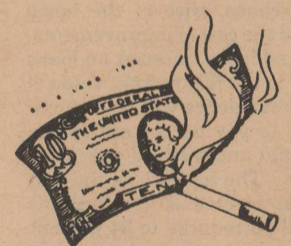

Clinic is now open full time

The Shamrock Clinic, 509 State Street in Bronte is now open full time with a full range of services. Thomas Alexander, president of Shannon West Texas Memorial Hospital, says that Shannon Hospital backs the clinic and plans to continue its operation. He also stated that it would be operated in a first rate manner with the most modern methods available.

Clinic hours are 8:30 to 12:00 and 1:30 to 6:00 Monday thru Friday. Dr. Tim J. Emerson will be at the Clinic five days a week as opposed to his recent four-day schedule with Dr. Bass filling in on the fifth day. Dr. Bass, who was director of the Shamrock Clinics, has been replaced by Dr. Wayne Williams. Dr. Williams is stationed at the College Hills Shamrock Clinic in San Angelo.

Dr. Emerson sees an average of 25 to 30 patients a day. Any health care, even the most serious, can be initiated at the clinic. Patients requiring continued care or who may need special care will be directed to the proper facility.

Social Security

Medical insurance payments under Medicare can be made in two ways -- either directly to the doctor or supplier, or directly to you, the patient. If the payment is made directly to the doctor or supplier, it is called an "assignment".

The assignment method of payment can save you time and money. Under this method, the doctor or supplier agrees that his or her total charge for the covered service will be the charge approved by the Medicare carrier.

Medicare pays the doctor of supplier 80 percent of the approved charge after subtracting any part of the \$75 annual deductible that you have not met. You are responsible only for that part of the \$75 deductible that has not been met, and for the remaining 20 percent of the approved charge.

If payment is made directly to you, the doctor or supplier can bill you for the actual charge even if it is more than the amount approved by Medicare.

Each year, doctors and suppliers are given the opportunity to sign agreements that make them "Medicare-participating" doctors and suppliers. If they do sign such an agreement, it means that they have agreed in advance to accept assignments on all Medicare claims.

The names and addresses of "Medicare-participating" doctors and suppliers are listed in the "Medicare-Participating Physician/Supplier Directory". The directory may be reviewed at all Social Security offices and at State and Area offices of the Administration on Aging.

Soil Conservation News

A list of highly erodible and potentially highly erodible soils was released this week by the USDA Soil Conservation Service as mandated by the Food Security Act of 1985.

The list revealed that nearly 42 percent of the land in Coke County is highly erodible and 12 percent is potentially highly erodible.

The conservation compliance provisions of the Act denies most USDA farm program benefits to farmers who farm highly erodible land unless the land is being farmed in accordance with a conservation plan approved by the local conservation district.

The Act allows a grace period for those who are not using a conservation plan. They have until January 1, 1990 to develop and begin actively applying a plan. They have until January 1, 1995 to have the plan fully in effect.

The provisions will have no effects on farmers who are using up-to-date conservation plans. If you are farming highly erodible land with a conservation plan, check with your local Soil Conservation Service office to find out if it meets conservation compliance provisions.

Onsite field visits will

be needed on land classified as potentially highly erodible to determine if it is highly erodible. Actual steepness of slope and length of slope will affect final determinations. If the land is not highly erodible, a conservation plan will not be required to continue receiving farm program benefits.

Highly erodible soils in Coke County are Bronte, Brownfield, Cobb, Cosh & Cobb, Cobb & Cosh, Cosh & Latom, Cottonwood, Kimbrough, Mereta, Mereta-Nuvalde complex, Miles loamy fine sand, Spade, Stony Steep Land, Tivoli and Vernon-Badland complex.

Potentially highly erodible soils are Tarrant soils and Weymouth loam.

"We are ready to help anyone prepare a conservation plan that doesn't have one," Mike Mecke, acting district conservationist for the Soil Conservation Service at Robert Lee said. "We will do our best to try to help people figure out how to apply enough conservation practices to keep them in compliance with the 1985 farm bill."

Farmers with highly erodible land may also want to consider placing it in the conservation reserve, Mecke said.

Facts about catching colds

Catch a cold and you're also likely to get a lot of advice - much of it misinformation. The medical experts don't know how to prevent the common cold, but they tend to agree on the following facts that we should all keep in mind:

- Colds are caused by specific viruses that appear primarily in winter.

- You don't catch a cold from getting your feet wet, being chilled or sitting in a draft. The only way to catch a cold is to pick up a virus through contact with another cold sufferer.

- Most people pick up colds from touching surfaces that have been contaminated with cold viruses by someone's sneeze or cough. These viruses can survive up to three days on hard sur-

faces, some fabrics, and even the skin.

- Children are more likely to catch colds than adults because they have not yet built up immunities.

- To help avoid picking up viruses, wash hands frequently and keep them away from your eyes, nose and mouth.

- Once you get a cold, over-the-counter medications can alleviate cold symptoms, but won't cure the cold.

- According to the National Institutes of Health, there is no hard evidence to verify that vitamin C will help prevent or cure a cold.

- Grandma's advice to drink plenty of liquids and stay in bed is probably still the best remedy.
