City payments down

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday sent checks totaling \$48.5 million in local sales tax to 1,038 cities that levy the one-percent city tax. Bullock said that the first payments for 1987 were down almost 9 percent as compared to last year's first payments.

Houston's check for \$7.6 million was the largest, down 8 percent from last year's payment of \$8.4 million. Dallas' payment was \$6 million, a 6 percent decrease from last January's payment of \$6.4 million.

San Antonio's payment of \$2.9 million down 11 percent from 1986's figure of \$3.3 million. Austin's check for

\$2.5 million was down 2 percent from the \$2.6 million payment made in January of 1986.

Fort Worth's first payment in 1987 was \$2.1 million, a 10 percent decrease from \$2.3 million in 1986. El Paso's check for \$1.4 million was up 8 percent from January of 1986.

Coke County's sales tax revenue followed the overall state picture, showing a 16.71% decrease in revenue at Bronte while Robert Lee's receipts were down 19.66%.

January checks represent taxes collected on sales made in November and reported to the Comptroller by December 20.

Clam trap reduces debris

E.L. (Champ) Champion of Bronte has found that life doesn't end with retirement. After retiring from WTU. Mr. Champion has put his full efforts into The Champion Clam Trap. The Clam Trap was invented by Mr. Champion and is patented. He also does his own marketing which in recent weeks has proven most promising.

The clam trap is a cylindrical molded polypropylene strainer unit with thirty 5/16 inch openings designed to allow a friction fit in the tubes of condensing units. Asian Clam Shells as well as debris have been an increasing problem for Power Plants. The shells as well as debris around the condensing tubes reduce flow into the unit. Costly cleaning is then required. The Champion Clam Trap eliminates much of the cleaning and reduces the time required for

cleaning and therefore the cost.

Traps have been installed in WTU's Oak Creek Power Station, Fort Phantom Station, and the Paint Creek Station. At the Fort Phantom Station the trap reduced annual cost by some \$56,000.

The trap is manufactured in Illinois and sells for around fifty cents each. Mr. Champion has received considerable acclaim and was the subject of an article in December's issue of Electrical World Magazine. Mr. Champion also presented a paper describing his clam trap at the Electrical Power Research Institute in Lake Buena Vista, Florida in June of 1985. Calgon Cooperation is deliberating about including the clam trap in its product line. Calgon is now referring their customers who have clam shell problems to Mr. Champion.

Smith receives naval award

Captain Rasler Wallis Smith, United States Marine Corps, son of Eugenia Davis (1939 graduate of Robert Lee High School and her husband George Raymond Smith, Carlsbad, N.M.), was awarded the Navy Achievement Medal by the Secretary of the Navy and the Commander of the Sixth Fleet for superior performance of duties while serving as Airframes Division Officer of Electronic Warfare, Squadron, #2, USS America, while deployed to the Mediterranean.

After 12 days at-sea experience, his division was called upon to provide 100% mission-capable aircraft for operation off the coast of Libya. The success of these operations was due in large measure to his professional performance. He consistently performed in a manner seldom seen in others of equal rank and experience, and he provided superior results against a sophisticated integrated air defense system. Captain Smith's exceptional professional ability, initiative and loyal devotion reflected great credit upon himself, the Marine Corps, and the United States Naval Service.

Captain Smith is the grandson of Vela Plumlee of Robert Lee and brother of Raymond E. Smith, also of Robert Lee. He has numerous relatives in Coke and Tom Green Counties.

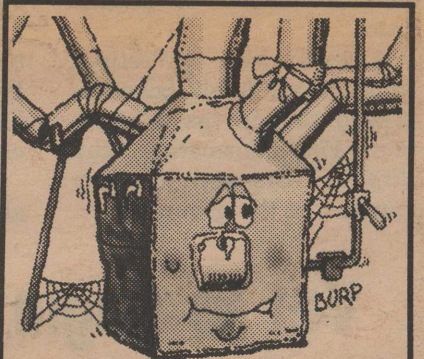



WTU adds Vernon plant

With its new Oklaunion Power Station in commercial operation, West Texas Utilities Co. is again capable of generating all the power its customers will need during the peak usage period of hot summertime.

The peak demand for electricity exceeded the capacity of WTU's installed general stations several summers ago and additional power had to be purchased from neighboring utility companies.

"This means that we literally have grown into this new power plant," explained Walter Meller, WTU's manager of system production.

"Often, when a new plant is brought on line it creates an immediate huge surplus of general capacity. In our case, completion of Oklaunion was timed to coincide with our needs."

The coal-burning Oklaunion unit eight miles southeast of Vernon has a net rated capacity of 665 megawatts, which is more than half the 1,070 megawatt capacity of all of WTU's gas-fired plants. WTU owns 54.69%, or 370 megawatts, of the new plant, which is the first jointly-owned unit in the Central and South West System. Other owners are Public Service Co. of Oklahoma and Central Power and Light Co., both members of CSW; the Oklahoma Municipal Power Authority and the City of Brownsville.

The new plant was officially declared commercial De-

ember 24. The power is under control of a central dispatcher in Abilene, who economically loads the various generating units in the WTU system.

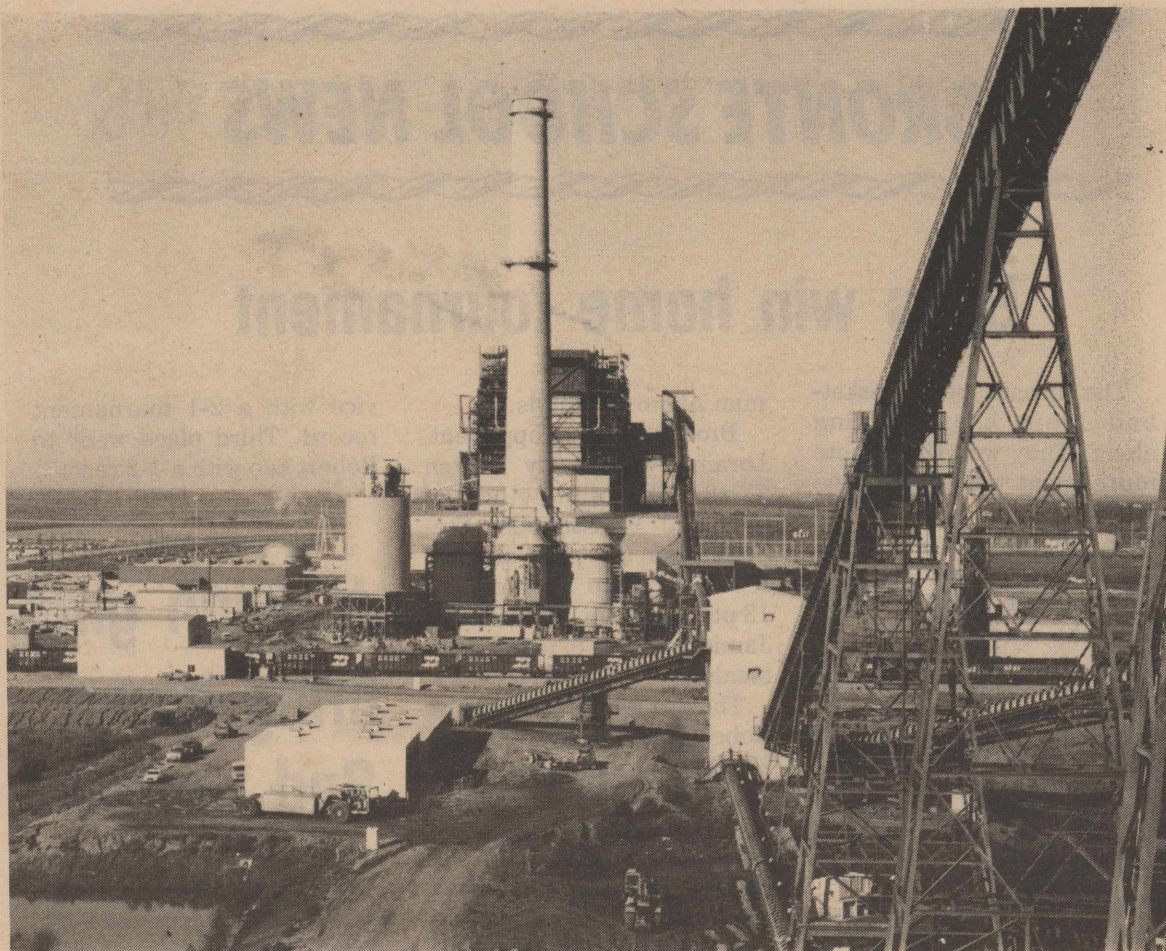
As Plant Manager Chuck Adami of Vernon explains it, "When the load increases, the unit that can make the next kilowatt the cheapest is the one that is brought on line."

Adami's staff includes 126 employees, who work in shifts to keep the plant running 24 hours a day. Most of the staff has been on the site for several months involved in training and start-up operations.

Construction at Oklaunion was begun in May 1982, and almost all the news regarding the plant since then has been good. The best news is that it was completed on time and under original cost estimates.

The plant will provide over 25 percent of WTU's operating capacity and will end the Company's almost total reliance on natural gas as boiler fuel. The low-sulphur coal comes by rail from Wyoming. Each delivery averages from 100-115 cars, with each car holding 100 tons of coal. About 300 tons will be burned an hour when the plant is in full operation.

The plant is one of the most modern in existence. Equipment includes the most up-to-date pollution control facilities and complies with all air quality control requirements.

Exercise can help patients

A regular exercise program can help Alzheimer patients avoid health problems that often result from a sedentary lifestyle, according to the January issue of Texas Medicine.

Although persons with Alzheimer's disease are obviously limited, Dr. Berry N. Squyres writes that risk factors can be reduced with low levels of stretching and aerobic activity. Psychological benefits to exercise include reducing tension and decreasing the chance of becoming depressed, writes Squyres in the official journal of the Texas Medical Association.

The author recommends 15 to 20 minutes of exercise at least three times a week or perhaps daily because of the lower level of activity. The program should begin with stretching and progress to exercise that may include walking, stationary cycling,

or extension and rotation of the arms and legs. This should be followed by a cool-down period including stretching for flexibility, according to the author.

Other benefits of such a program include reducing muscle fatigue and, treatment and slowing of osteoporosis, a condition where the bones become brittle and can break easily.

According to Squyres, who is with the department of family medicine, Texas Tech University, Lubbock, an exercise plan for Alzheimer patients can aid in the treatment of other illnesses the person may have and provide an environment that will enhance the patients ability to function.

Home Economics Hints

CLEAN MICROWAVE OVEN FOR EFFICIENT USE -- Compared to cleaning a conventional oven, cleaning a microwave is easy -- so easy that many people don't do it often enough. According to a Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service home economist, infrequent cleaning can impair the efficiency of a microwave oven. "Microwaves are absorbed by food, whether that food is on the walls of the oven or in a dish," says Dr.

Susan Quiring, "so a build-up of food particles on the oven surfaces can slow the cooking process." She says that food soils around the door or the frame may also interfere with the door seal or even prevent the oven from starting properly. Ideally, the microwave should be cleaned after each use with a paper towel or sponge dipped in a mild detergent and warm water solution, Quiring says.

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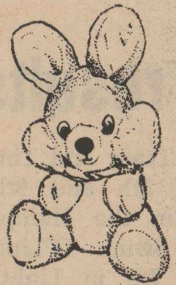

Mobile cancer unit slated for Robert Lee

According to the American Cancer Society, one in every 11 women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime during her lifetime. Every year, over 37,000 women die as a result of breast cancer which is the number one cancer killer of women.

In an effort to find cancers at the earliest possible stage and to prevent unnecessary deaths, West Coke County Hospital, Robert Lee, will sponsor a mobile breast cancer detection unit at the hospital on Monday, Jan. 26, 1987.

Hospital Administrator Steve Goods said the unit is an extension of the Breast Imaging Center at St. John's Hospital & Health Center in San Angelo.

The unit will be parked near the hospital that day, and women who wish to have a screening mammogram should call the West Coke County Hospital at 453-2511, before that day if possible to schedule an appointment.

Mr. Goode said the test will cost \$55 cash and the results will be sent to the patient's physician who will go over the results with the patient.

According to a spokesman from the Breast Imaging Center at St. John's Hospital in San Angelo, "the death rate from breast cancer could be drastically reduced if women would have mammograms done before a problem exists."

By using modern states of the art X-ray equipment, breast cancers can be found when they are about the size of a grain of rice and well before the cancer can be felt. A woman who is diagnosed with breast cancer at this early stage has a 90-95 percent survival rate. However, a woman who is not diagnosed until a lump can be felt has approximately a 50 percent survival rate in five years.

Women should report approximately 15 minutes prior to the appointment time for registration. Typically, the exam takes less than 30 minutes. A female technologist will perform the examination.

The films will be returned to the Breast Imaging Center at St. John's Hospital & Health Center where they will be interpreted by a radiologist and a report sent to your physician.

Registrants reach milestone

The Selective Service System has announced that men who will reach their 26th birthday in 1987 are reaching an important milestone.

Beginning on Jan. 1, 1987, men who were required to register with Selective Service in 1981 will be turning 26. Selective Service does not have the authority to accept registrations after age 26. By failing to register before turning 26, a young man will have permanently forfeited his right to certain benefits including federal student aid, job training and federal employment. In addition to these federal benefits, some states require registration for state student aid, entrance to a state supported college or university, state employment and permission to practice law.

Many of the 25-year-olds who have still not registered may be unaware of the requirement or do not understand the importance of the obligation to register. Some may even have served in the military but failed to register

either before entering the Armed Forces or after leaving active duty. Others may have been institutionalized or incarcerated at the time of their 18th birthday and not realized that they were required to register if released prior to age 26.

For those men born in 1961 who have registered, 1987 also marks the year that ends their eligibility for selection for induction under present law should there be a return to the draft. Over 17 million men, age 18 through 25 have registered with Selective Service since registration was reinstated in 1980. These men comprise over 97 percent of those required to register.

Men age 18 to 25 who have not yet registered still have a chance to avoid risk of prosecution and loss of benefits by registering promptly at any local post office. Failure to register is a felony punishable by a fine of up to \$250,000, up to 5 years in jail, or both.

Ranch traps antelopes

A pronghorn antelope roundup was completed in December at the Rocker B Ranch in Irion County near Mertzton.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department trapping crews used a helicopter to herd 297 pronghorns into corral nets. Some 109 of the animals were shipped to Arizona in exchange for desert bighorn sheep brought to Texas in 1983, the remaining 188 pronghorns were transported to release sites in Briscoe, Martin, Mitchell and Reagan Counties. "These sites all have good pronghorn habitat but no pronghorns," said Charles Winkler, big game program director.

Winkler added that 10 antelope were released at Caprock Canyons State Park near Quitaque in Briscoe

County.

Pronghorns were almost eliminated from the state by the 1920s, and the estimated number in 1925 was slightly over 2,000 animals. Now about 25,000 are found in West Texas and the Panhandle, resulting at least in part to approximately 6,000 antelope stocked by the department since 1938, Winkler said.

ORDINANCE #229

Ordinance Amending
Water Rate Ordinance #223
BE IT HEREBY ORDAINED
AS FOLLOWS, TO-WIT:

Ordinance No. 223 of the City of Bronte, dated January 14, 1986, is hereby amended as to Section 3b and Section 3c to read as follows, to-wit:

SECTION 3b: That in addition and being a part of this Ordinance, the water deposit shall be the sum of \$25.00 per residential connection and, in the event there is additional connection for commercial offices, barns, buildings, and/or trailer houses, there shall be an additional water deposit of \$25.00 required per additional hookup for such commercial building, commercial barn, and/or trailer house. It is the intent of the City Council that the additional connections for which the deposit shall be required shall pertain to those buildings and/or barns being used for commercial operations, not as part of the residential structure. The secondary hookup shall apply to each trailer house used as a residence and/or commercial building.

SECTION 3c: In the event there is a resident of the City of Bronte who applies for a water connection pursuant to the provisions of this Ordinance and, at a time prior, said resident has left the City of Bronte having an unpaid water bill and/or statement, the water deposit required of such party having unpaid bills and/or statements shall be the sum of \$50.00 per connection, and, the City shall have the right to require payment of any and all unpaid water bills to the City prior to the time that such connection is made.

It is FURTHER ORDAINED that said Amendment shall be effective as of the 20th day of January, 1987.

Because of the emergency nature of the Amendment to the specified Ordinance, said Amendment was read, considered, and passed at first reading.

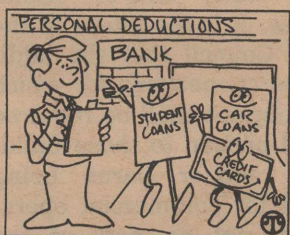
