Letters . . . From Our Readers

Tribute to Class Of '98, U. of T. Medical School

"The passing of the old boys who were once the very young and hopeful boys"—the 1898 Medical Class of the University of Texas, Galveston, Texas.

The shadows are lengthening, the sun is going down. Some of the old boys are hanging on, many have already gone. Some are reasonable active, some only sit and reflect. They have their aches and pains, and their recollections—many good—many melancholy. The companions of many who are living have passed, those are lonely and badly adjusted. Many have children living, some have grandchildren—man's greatest, and most satisfying gift.

The oldsters reflect on their school days, especially the days spent in Medical School, the days of plodding, cramming, wondering if they were going to pass. Days, despite the trials of study and examination, of clean fun and camaraderie. Days when ties were formed that remained as long as memory lasted. They recall incidents in school of the perversity, to them, of the professors, the peculiarity of some of the fellow students, the slow passing of time.

In their minds they can see days of anxiety, of hard labor and the final accomplishments when they were notified that they were sure enough graduates and had the right, notwithstanding their lack of medical knowledge, to have the sign M. D. affixed to their signature.

They recall the toilsome days of waiting for a practice, of many painful and some ludicrous incidents in the field of medicine. Then the days of greater confidence when they were accepted as Doctors, then they lived the life of Doctors and took their place in society.

They had arrived, were accepted, and slowly time slipped and soon they were to realize that they could not carry on as before. Their sight for some reason was dim; their reflexes did not respond as before; a painful necessary adjustment had to be made; they were reminded of the saying of the Biblical character who spoke "Of the days when the keeper of the house shall tremble and strong men shall bow themselves, and the grinders shall cease because they are few, and those that look out of the windows be darkened." They could well say with the poet:

"If I should live to be the last leaf on the tree,
In the spring,
May they laugh, as I do now,
At the old forsaken bough,
Where I cling."



The entrance hall was decorated with spurs and antique saddle iron lamps typical of days long ago in Texas and of kerosene lamps of cowboys. The background scenery was typical of pioneer days, consisting of paintings, samplers, and blankets.

The fringed red oil cloth for the table was a setting for miniature covered wagons and horses, burrs and other relics of the heritage of the Lone Star State.

Adding to the spirit of the occasion, a campfire glowed in one corner of the room, with the large camper's coffee pot brewing with the aroma of delicious coffee, and the old iron stew pot which no Texas cowboy corral could do without. As Lamar said, "Let's corral around awhile and hear the tall tales about Texas," which was the roll call of members.

"Texas, Our Texas" was the opening number, sung by the club. Mrs. Nina Cook sang the nostalgic song of Texas by a Texas composer, "The Hills of Home."

The director introduced the First District President of the Federation of Music Clubs, Mrs. W. J. Gearhart of Albany and Dr. Gearhart, who is his wife's secretary of the federation. Mrs. Gearhart's talk was on "Federation" during which she stated that the organization was founded in 1898, and is the largest music organization in the world consisting of 8,000 clubs with over one-half million members in 48 states, Canada and Mexico.

"It is a non-profit affair, existing to bring good music to all mankind, promoting musical youth and helping launch them on musical careers," Mrs. Gearhart said.

Veterans are also recipients of its music service, the speaker explained, with the federation helping them to reestablish new lives in musical therapy.

The federation also aids in pushing legislation helpful to musicians. The "IMR"—International Music Relations—has as its purpose to further understand other nation's music and composers. The first District has 25 senior clubs, 26 junior clubs and six student clubs.

Music relieves the strain of everyday living, Mrs. Gearhart said, and peace and abundant living can be brought by music. She quoted, "One small note, despair, but joined with others, sweet music fill the air."

In closing, Mrs. Gearhart urged her audience to "Do club work as you plant a garden."

Plant five rows of Peas—Presence, promptness, persistence, purpose, privilege.

Plant three rows of Squash—Squash gossip, squash indifference, squash criticism.

Three rows of Lettuce—Lettuce be faithful, lettuce be loyal, lettuce us be unselfish.

Five rows of Turnips—Turnip at every meeting, turnip with enthusiasm, turnip with a new member, turnip prepared, turnip to do your best.

Dr. Gearhart stressed the fact that the music should be interpreted, its musical value and suggested that the music should be interpreted.

"Deep in the Heart of Texas," and "The Eyes of Texas" were sung by the club with Mrs. O. E.




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
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
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Programs, Donations Raise Funds to Pay For Central Ward Uniforms, Equipment

During his pastorate in Denton the church received more than 700 members each year; baptized an average of 85 per year, paid a \$41,000 debt; and left \$150,000 available for buildings.

Weedon has held an average of four revivals each year outside his church and has had many invitations he could not accept.

He spent the summer of 1934 touring Palestine and other Near East, and European countries. He returned to Europe in 1955 to attend the Baptist World Alliance and direct a party in touring the Bible lands.

His Alma Mater conferred on him an honorary degree in 1936.

Why parents neglect to cooperate with their children and teachers is a question that even they can't answer, unless they choose to use the excuse such as "that's my wash day," "I need a baby sitter," etc. The same excuses they use year after year.

Regardless of the teacher children are sent to every day, parents must remember that they are committed to them, that all their interests are put into their hands, that to train them up to virtue and usefulness, and to reverential love and obedience is ordinarily the chief duty required of them.

If parents neglect this duty, they shouldn't expect their child to accomplish a worthwhile grown-up life. If necessary attention and encouragement is not given to the child, what can be expected of them but to become the associates of evil companions and victims of unbridled passion, the slaves of unrestrained and low propensities, the source of annoyance and unhappiness in families and neighborhoods.

Parents should also remember that childhood is the seed time for all good; the season when every desirable impression is most easily made; the time when all that can be done for a child is to be done.

Parents and teachers should be partners. A realization on the part of parents and teachers that they are co-workers in this great field of human achievement. Advancement should be made, and an inspiration to greater efforts put forth. Through home and school are co-workers in the educational process, yet in the division of the educational field, the parents work is seen to be more important.

Public School Week is an excellent time to observe your child for possible defects. It is a time to become acquainted with the school staff and note what progress has been made toward developing of the school as well as your child.
