Conservation sign-up is near

Farmers who want to bid to enter their highly erodible cropland into USDA's 10year Conservation Reserve Program may do so during the program's fourth signup period from February 9 through 27.

The criteria for determining highly erodible land, however, will not be available until the Final Rules are published, hopefully before February 9.

USDA has also announced a one-time, one-year "bonus" for the 1987 crop to be paid in the form of an increased annual payment. The bonus will be equal to \$2.00 times the farm program payment yield for corn times the number of acres of corn base designated for

The bonus will be payable in the form of generic commodity certificates when a 1987 CRP contract is accepted.

During the signup period, producers will be given the option to enter into a CRP contract beginning with either the 1987 or 1988 crop year.

Under provisions of a recent amendment to the legislation authorizing CRP, alfalfa and other multiyear grasses and legumes in rotation during the years 1981-1985, as approved by the Secretary of Agriculture, will be considered to be "agricultural commodities" for the purpose of determining eligibility of land to be placed in CRP.

Annual payments for 10 years will compensate farmers for retiring highly erodible land from crop production. The amount of the payment is determined by the accepted bid per acre and the number of accepted

Participants will also receive cost-share assistance for establishing grass, tree, or wildlife plants on the acreage placed in the reserve. Hunting is allowed on the land but no crops can be harvested while it is in the reserve.

For information about the reserve, contact any local office of the USDA Soil Conservation Service, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, or the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.





Florida has become a haven for unwelcome wildlife from other countries. according to National Wildlife magazine. These "exotic" species include rhesus monkeys descended from the stars of early Tarzan movies filmed in the state. Many exotic parrots and parakeets dine on the state's citrus and other crops. Among the most bizarre species is a giant South American marine toad that secretes a strong poison and likes to lay its eggs in swimming pools.

Frustrated by coyote raids on their sheep and goats, some Texas ranchers are turning to an unlikely ally -the jackass. National Wildlife magazine reports that

while donkeys won't kill coyours, they do chase them way. So far, at least 100 ranchers have decided to give them a try. Still, only females need apply. Male donkeys are apparently too ornery to be trusted, and might even attack the animals they're supposed to guard.



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





Tips on planting your pecan trees properly

PLANT THAT PECAN TREE PROPERLY

One of the keys to growing pecans, whether in the back-yard or in a commercial orchard, is to plant the trees properly so that they get off to a good start. Tree planting time is at hand -- January and early February are the best times to start.

To begin, select a tree 4 to 8 feet tall as soon as nurseries get supplies. Plant as soon as possible, using care not to let roots dry out or freeze.

Dig the hole only as large as the tree's root system. If

the hole is too deep, the tree will settle and this can cause poor growth or death.

The taproot should sit in the bottom of the hole. If the hole cannot be as deep as the length of the roots, cut back the taproot to fit the hole. If the hole cannot be as deep as the length of the roots, cut back the taproot to fit the hole.

Pack original soil around roots as tightly as possible. Packing the soil in 2 to 3-inch layers is better than watering to pack the soil. Use adjacent soil to complete filling the hole, not light soil,

sand or potting soil. The tree can drown in rainy weather if light fill soil is used on clay land.

Plant the tree at the same depth it grew in the nursery row. Look at the colors to determine the soil line: the bark is grey and the root is dark brown.

Cut off the top half of the tree at planting to balance the stem and roots and to force growth close to the soil line.

Wrap the lower 18 inches of the trunk with aluminum foil to prevent side shoots, sun scald and rabbit damage. On large plantings, use a mixture of white latex paint and water (one part paint to three parts water).

Build a basin around the tree to hold water and give each tree five gallons of water immediately after planting. Make sure trees do not go longer than 14 days without water.

These are some basic steps in planting pecan trees that can lead the way in getting them into production in a few years.



NEXT CONSERVATION RESERVE PROGRAM SIGN-UP IS FEB. 9-27

Farmers interested in putting cropland in the government's Conservation Reserve Program will get another opportunity to do so during the February 9-27 Sign-up period.

Three sign-up periods were held during 1986, and almost nine million acres of highly erodible cropland across the nation were committed to the program, points out Dr. Bill Harris, soils specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

"Last year Texas farmers put more than a million acres in the program, which is aimed at curbing soil erosion while at the same time improving water quality and wildlife habitats," Harris explains.


Land accepted into the CRP must be kept out of production for 10 years and prescribed conservation practices must be followed. he points out. This includes planting the land to grass or trees to prevent wind and water erosion, with costs shared by the government.

Landowners must submit a bid on eligible land to their local Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service office during the sign-up period. Land eligibility is determined by the Soil Conservation Service. If the bid is accepted, landowners will be paid that price annually over the 10-year period provided they follow the prescribed conservation plan. The average acceptable bid in Texas was just under \$30 an acre during the last sign-up period.

Circus slated for Angelo

[Editor's Note-- The following news release deals with 2 subjects -- The American Continental Circus, coming to San Angelo next week. (see ad in this paper) and the touting of a book by the late Arnold Samuelson, who came to Robert Lee in 1945 and died here in 1982. The book was turned into a publishable work by his daughter, Diane Samuelson Darby, of Anaheim, California. Diane was reared in Robert Lee, was a graduate of RLHS, and, perhaps spurred on by her part-time job at the Robert Lee Observer office, studied journalism at Texas Tech.).

Children dream of running away to join the circus to get out of washing dishes and making their bed and this dream has become reality for Diane Darby, Marketing Director of the American Continental Circus, coming to San Angelo Coliseum for 4 performances on Friday and Saturday, Feb. 13 & 14.

"I haven't washed a dish or made a bed in three years," said Darby, in town ahead of the Firefighters' sponsored circus to make arrangements. "My theme for the advertising is 'Where Your Wildest Dreams Come True' and I'm a great believer in dream fulfillment."

For almost a decade, Darby owned a successful advertising agency in the Los Angeles area where she represented such clients as Honey Baked Ham, Cask 'n Cleaver and jojo's restaurant chains, Crystaliner boats and many lesser known industrial accounts. "One of the last ad campaigns I created for Honey Baked Ham was 'There's a little ham in all of us' and I think that must have portended my circus career although I didn't go directly from my agency to the circus.

I reached a turning point in my life when I lost my father, Arnold Samuelson, in 1982 at the age of 70. The unfulfilled dream of his life had always been to share with others his 1935 experience with Ernest Hemingway in Key West, Cuba and the Gulf Stream as the author's only acknowledged protege. I fell heir to a cache of timeworn, faded Hemingway memorabilia and felt compelled to turn it into a publishable manuscript.'

This took a couple years of solid effort but the happy result was that Random House bought the book, titled With Hemingway in 1984. It enjoyed enormous critical acclaim capped by receiving Books-Across-the-Sea's 1985 Ambassador of Honor Award for its "outstanding contribution to interpreting the life and culture of the United States to the peoples of other countries."

"The book is available in paperback by Owl Books," said Darby, "Owl as in if you give a hoot. Once the paperback appears, hardcovers are typically remaindered but if anyone really gives a hoot, they can order a copy from me by sending \$18 postage paid to 211 S. State

College Blvd., Ste. 148, Anaheim, CA 92806."

After publishing her late father's memoir, Darby was casting about for a "career challenge", when she happened upon an ad for "circus advance person." "I was curious about what the inside of a circus office would look like," she said, "and this curiosity was apparently shared by hundreds of other advertising types in southern California where the show is based. I remember being offered a cup of coffee while waiting for the job interview -- a cup that read 'SAME OLD GRIND'. Somehow I didn't think so and to this day I'm convinced I got the job because the owner's

Doberman 'Wild Fling' liked me best.

I'm sure no one, myself included, realized I would have any staying power in what has always been a revolving door job. Living on the road and driving fifty thousand miles a year throughout the Western United States and Canada is an exciting but demanding lifestyle and few people in the 25 year history of the show have lasted an entire season. As she now swings into her fourth year, Darby is an anomaly even by circus standards.

"Leaving the circus before the season ends is called 'blowing the show'," Darby said, "and it's a challenge in itself to see how many shows one can go without 'blowing'! Actually, endurance is the least of it. The neverending, fascinating challenge for me is convincing all 'ladies and gentlemen, children of all ages' this is an experience they don't want to miss. To quote the man regarded by many as the greatest American writer of the 20th Century, Ernest Hemingway:

'The circus is the only ageless delight you can buy for money... It is the only spectacle I know that while you watch it, gives the quality of a truly happy dream'.''

FAT -- The Good, the Bad and the Ugly

Americans are getting their kicks out of health these days and fat is a dirty word. Before you go around kicking the fat, however, it's wise to bone up on the fat

facts. Fat is necessary for a healthy diet, since it is needed for the absorption, transport, and storage of vitamins A, D, E and K -- the fat soluble vitamins. These vitamins enhance vision, bone strength, fertility and blood coagulation. Diets severely limited in fat content can cause many problems. Fat is not all bad.

Excess fat, however, is bad and most Americans should worry about too much rather than too little. Today, 42 % of the calories in an average American diet come from fats. The American Heart Association recommends that fats make up no more than 30 to 35 percent of daily calories. AHA also recommends a 1:1:1 ratio of polyunsaturated, monounsaturated and saturated fats.

Polyunsaturated and monounsaturated fats are liquids at room temperature while saturated fats are solids at room temperature. Saturated fats are believed to raise cholesterol levels in susceptible persons, while polyunsaturated fats are believed to lower cholesterol
