Bronte man arrested for drugs

In a felony marijuana arrest last Saturday, Coke County law officers took a 33-year-old Bronte man into custody. Jimmy Rex Freeman was arrested at his home at 625 NW Railroad Saturday afternoon on felony possession of marijuana charges.

According to Sheriff Marshall Millican, he and deputies J. Lee Ensor, Jeff Barnes and Wayne Peters, resident deputy stationed at Oak Creek, went to Freeman's home on a tip that marijuana was being grown inside. They were granted permission to search the residence by Freeman. The law officers confiscated 6 growing plants, drug paraphernalia, and over 4 ounces of dried marijuana.

A female subject present was arrested on an outstanding misdemeanor warrant from Tom Green County.

Freeman is free on a \$5,000 bond.

Coke County Sheriff Marshall Millican urged the public to report any suspicious activities which could lead to arrest and conviction of known drug users and distributors.

Robert Lee city ballots set

Upcoming Robert Lee elections to be held on April 4 are drawing interest from local voters.

The Feb. 19 filing deadline for the Robert Lee city council has passed. Four have filed for three places on the ballot. Candidates are J.A. Dunklin and F.W. Prentice, both incumbents, and Richard Johnson and Keith Eubanks. Incumbent Jody Rodriguez did not file for re-election to the council.

Only one candidate had presented a 25-signature petition to appear on the West Coke County Hospital District ballot. Johnny Sevier filed on Monday for one of the two vacant positions on the board. Deadline to file a petition at the district office is March 10.

Filing deadline for the Robert Lee School Board of Trustees is March 4. Appli-

cations are available at the superintendent's office for filing. Two positions will be decided in the April 4 election. At press time two candidates, Bill Burns and Lane Shandley, had submitted their names for the ballot.

A notice of candidacy may be filed until March 14 for the board of directors of the Coke County Underground Water Conservation District. Two vacancies exist on that panel. One director will be elected from Precinct 3 and one from Precinct 4. Forms for filing are available from Arch Mathers or Eph Cummins. No filings had been reported to the Observer/Enterprise at press time.

Those who have not registered to vote and want to cast a ballot on April 4 still have until March 4 to register.

Bronte city ballots set

Names for the April 4 election of Bronte City Aldermen have been set. Two positions are open and both positions have only one candidate running. Running unopposed are Dorris Saunders and E.G. (Corky) Collins. However, voters still have the option of writing in

candidates.

Registration for voting must be done 30 days prior to an election therefore in order to vote April 4th, you

must register by March 5th. Your vote does count! Talk to the candidates and take the time to vote on April 4th.

Kletter speaks to seniors

Dr. Guno Kletter addressed the senior citizens in Robert Lee at their monthly luncheon this past Friday. He discussed the need for sodium and potassium salts in the diet and the need to be careful about getting too much salt. He also advised the group that many over-the-counter medications are high in salt. So read the label or ask the pharmacist for assistance. Dr. Kletter next discussed the relationship between drugs and depression, explaining that many medications for high blood pressure, heart conditions

and excess fluid can increase depression, so he prefers to use such drugs conservatively. He stressed that it is important to be an active patient by asking questions of your doctor and making him explain your illness and treatment to you. Dr. Kletter concluded by encouraging the use of mammography for

the early detection of breast cancer.

Dr. Kletter is at the West Coke County Family Clinic from 8-1 Monday through Friday. Call 453-4519 for appointment.

Chew

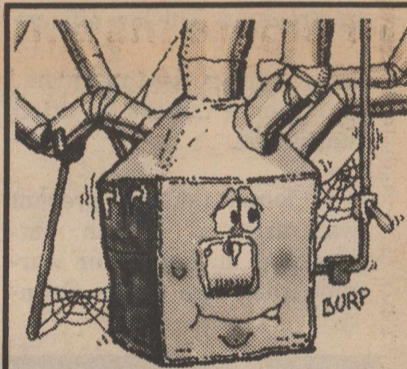

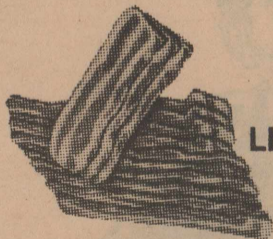

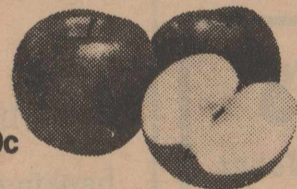

Team members are Randy Gartman, Wes Hood, Stevie Ebenstein, Jason Herring, Robert Runnion, Curt Gardner, Kelly Tomlinson, Jesse Powell, Cody Anthony, and Joel Herring.

Scoring in Tuesday's bi-district game was distributed among 7 players. Wes Hood was the leader at 14, Ebenstein had 12, Gartman added 10, Gardner scored 9, followed by Jason Herring 6, Anthony 6 and Runnion 2.

Letter to the editor

To the Enterprise:

Right after the war was over, we came back to Texas, and resumed life in San Angelo, where we were born and raised, and my grandparents had had their big ranch in Water Valley, later known as the Mims Ranch.

Learning that the Bronte paper was for sale, my Dad suggested we go see about it, and maybe we could see about buying it, for I had had a good deal of experience in the writing business.

So we got it, in late 1945, and I started in as an owner and editor. It was exciting and a great experience. Names make news, & we had it going and coming. Looking back now, I wonder how I escaped as far as I did. Ha.

Names make news, and they were full in the Bronte paper. I recall that we needed a fire truck, or so, and the present one was in great need of repair. We went before the City Council, asking for help, and it was debated at some length. Finally I agreed to be the fire chief, IF the council would back us up, and they did. I still have the original page, wherein they agreed to provide the money if we would be chief, and that is the way it came along, and we still have that paper, setting up the new deal. This was done in spite of the fact there had been no fires for a long time, and it was only money gone down the drain.

But a short time later, there was a fire, then 2 or 3 more, and the truck did its work. We used to drive it up and down the main street, with the water shooting out. Some did not like it, was showing off, with water spouting high, but the idea was to let the people know we DID HAVE A FIRE TRUCK, AND IT WORKED!!! Thank goodness.

And when a fire came, the water man rushed to the river to turn on pumps, and the fire got put out.

Often a desire to make conditions better, it was suggested that we had enough to worry about, sani-

tation, paving, and so on, and there were times when we wondered if we should see daylight on the following day, but we did.

It was fun to sit in our office on a Saturday night, here came the crowds, to do their shopping and chatting away, and we got a full view of what happened, and it was to be found in next week's paper. It was real fun. We had a civic club too, or more, and it got so rough the way food was chunked at one another, who could resist that, or come out soaked. No problem, just good fun. The former owner did not always approve of my contents in the paper, and was going to make another paper, but it never did but a page or two. Having no facilities in Bronte, the paper was printed by Exton Talley in San Angelo, who was my partner in the paper, he did the printing, I did the work putting it together on Thursday night, so it would be on hand first thing Friday morning. A lot of things did happen, games, parties, lots of town visiting on Saturday night, where it all got settled as to who did what and how come, and should it be or not be in the paper next week.

We always had a church column for all those who wanted to put in a piece of news on what to expect the following Sunday, and we remember one young lady whose daughter was upset she had not had her name in the paper. But it was in the next week, at her request. It was fun, we enjoyed it all, and did sell out later to Ben, who had come in and wanted to buy it, and did so. I think my subscription is about to run out, but it has been a pleasure to have it for a year again, and to one and all, God bless you every one, and praise the Lord.

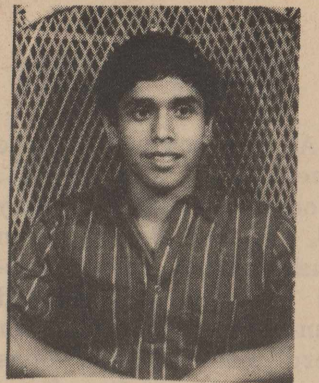

Immunization clinic scheduled

The Texas Dept. of Health in cooperation with the local health officials will hold a **FREE** immunization clinic at the Senior Citizens' Building in Bronte on Thursday, Mar. 5, 1:00-3:30. A parent must be in attendance in order to sign the proper permission forms. A card will be issued and the parent is encouraged to retain those records and present them to the school at the time of enrollment.

In view of the immunization requirements for child-care facilities and schools, parents are urged to start immunizations for their children early in life.

Immunizations for diphtheria, tetanus, pertussis (DTP) and oral polio should be started at about 2 months of age. Measles, mumps, and rubella should be given at 15 months of age. It is very important that all immunizations be completed and boosters given as needed. See schedule below.

Suggested Immunization Schedule Basic Series

- 2 months - DTP & Oral Polio
- 4 months - DTP & Oral Polio
- 6 months - DTP & Oral Polio.
- 15 months - Measles, Mumps & Rubella.
- 12-18 months - DTP &

Oral Polio.

Booster Doses

4-6 yrs. - DTP & Oral Polio.

14-16 yrs. - Td

Thereafter - Td every 10 yrs.

Texas School Law requires that all children attending a public school to show proof that they have been immunized according to the following schedule:

1. Polio - At least three doses of oral polio vaccine with one or more having been received on or after the 4th birthday.

2. Tetanus/Diphtheria - At least three doses of DTP and/or Td vaccine with at least one dose received on or after the 4th birthday and with the last dose within the

past 10 years.

3. Measles - All students must have received measles vaccine on or after the first birthday or provide a physician - validated history of measles illness.

4. Rubella - One dose of rubella vaccine is required. Rubella vaccine is not required past the 12th birthday.

5. Mumps - Mumps vaccine is required for all students through age 14 or provide a physician - validated history of mumps illness.

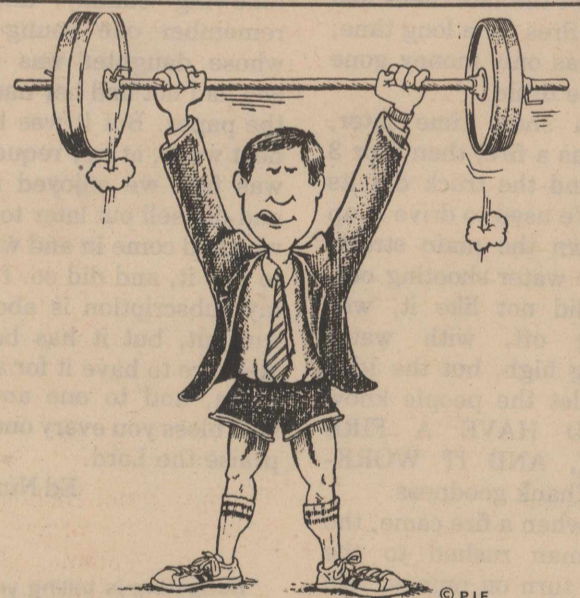

Social Security news

A husband and wife may require separate checks for their Social Security benefits if either requests this, Franklin H. Upp, Social Security manager in San Angelo, said recently. However, monthly benefits payable to a husband and wife who are getting benefits on the same records and are living at the same address are usually combined in one check made out jointly to the husband and wife.

This costs less and is usually more convenient for the husband and wife, Upp said.

Separate SSI checks are sent to all eligible individuals even if they live in the same household, Upp said. If one member of an eligible couple dies, any check that has not been cashed should be returned to the Social Security office. Any payments due the deceased member will be paid to the surviving member if they were living together.

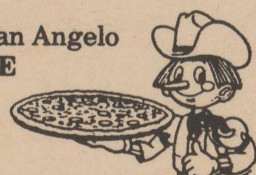

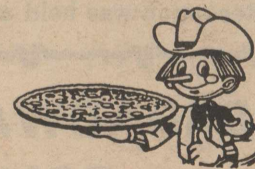
