Democratic candidate Woodie Jones of Austin, Texas, visited in Robert Lee last week. Jones is a candidate for the Third Court of Appeals, and is opposed by incumbent Jim Brady.

In his quest for the position, Jones, an Austin lawyer, called for "a new commitment to the highest standards of integrity in our judicial officials." This comment was made in response to questions concerning his opponent Jim Brady's public reprimand by the state Commission on Judicial Conduct.

Jones concluded by stating, "There is no room in our state's courts for a judge who does not comply with the highest ethical standards of behavior, as prescribed by the Code of Judicial Conduct."

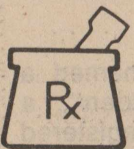

form and a \$5.00 filing fee may be returned to the polling places or may be forwarded directly to the Concho Valley Area Agency on Aging, 5002 Knickerbocker Road, P.O. Box 60050, San Angelo, Texas, 76902. All petitions accompanied by the candidacy form and the \$5.00 filing fee received by the Area Agency on Aging or postmarked on February 29 will be accepted.

Any Texan who is 60 years of age and over prior to January 1 and is a registered voter living in the area from which he or she is applying for candidacy may run for the Silver Haired Legislature.

The Concho Valley Region has been divided into 3 areas: Tom Green; a Northern Region (Coke, Concho, Irion, McCullough, Reagan and Sterling Counties); and a Southern Region (Crockett, Kimble, Mason, Menard, Schleicher and Sutton Counties). Candidates will campaign in their respective regions.

Dear Coke County Citizen,

We have experienced a loss of revenue in mineral taxes over the past few years. To help make up for the loss without having to raise taxes, your county tax office has worked hard to offer services in the area of vehicle registration to bring in fleet truck registration to Coke County. This business could be conducted in any county these trucks pass through, but by making it convenient and expedient for the companies to bring their business to our county, we have pulled in needed revenue. Any reduction in our abilities to provide these services could result in the loss of this revenue. The loss of just one company's registration would mean an average loss of \$9,500 per year.

Another area of revenue comes from the two car dealerships in Coke County. We have concentrated efforts to make it convenient for these dealerships to process the paperwork for units sold through our county tax office. Our services, in turn, enable them to offer extra services that make it convenient to out of county clients to have their tax, title, and license processed through this office instead of taking this money back to their county. The loss of our percentage of sales tax alone from these businesses would average \$19,165 per year. This figure does not include the possible loss in initial registration fees for each unit handled through our tax office.

Oil revenue is still going down, and we in County government need to reduce our expenditures and cut wherever possible. At the same time we must consider carefully the most efficient and cost effective ways to reduce government spending without jeopardizing valuable sources of income.

Although consolidation of offices is not legally possible, consolidation of all tax collection functions in one office is. Consolidation of all tax collecting in your county tax office could result in a savings of a minimum of \$23,500 per year without possible loss of revenue.

I am dedicated to increased efficiency and reduced spending in County government as well as the preservation and possible increase of revenue from outside our county. At the same time, I am concerned about serving you, the citizens of Coke County, and with keeping your best interests in mind and your voice strong in your County Tax Office.

I feel that my experience and familiarity with all phases of tax collection, vehicle registration, and voter registration qualify me as a valid candidate for the office of **County Tax Assessor/Collector.**

Your vote and support would be greatly appreciated.

February is the month for hearts - red paper hearts, candy hearts and real flesh and blood hearts. It is the month that the National Heart, Lung and Blood Institute tries to draw attention to the risks of heart disease.

How much do you know about having a healthy heart? Here are some true or false questions that will test your knowledge of heart disease and how to reduce the risk of developing it.

1. True or False. A heart attack or stroke is often the first symptom of high blood pressure and/or elevated blood cholesterol.

True. There are often no signs at all that might signal these conditions. To find out if you have elevated blood cholesterol or high blood pressure, you should be tested by a doctor. The blood cholesterol test requires a laboratory analysis of a sample of your blood.

2. True or False. A food product labeled "no cholesterol" is a safe choice for people with elevated cholesterol levels.

False. A food product can contain no cholesterol and still be high in saturated fat which will raise your blood cholesterol. Examples are commercial baked foods made with coconut oil, palm oil or a heavily hydrogenated vegetable oil. As you shop, check labels for a listing of the amounts of saturated and polyunsaturated fat. Your best choice is a product that contains more polyunsaturated fat than saturated fat, since polyunsaturated fat will lower blood cholesterol.

True or False. Cigarette smoking by itself will increase

Hunting season continues in county

Fall and winter hunting season has come and gone and all that remains for hunters is the finish of the current quail season and a short spring turkey gobbler hunt.

Quail season will run through Feb. 28 statewide. Shooting hours are one-half hour before sunrise to one-half hour after sunset. Bag limit for quail is 16.

The spring turkey season is set for April 2-24 and 2 gobblers are allowed if two turkey tags remain on the hunter's license.

Game animals and birds exceeded all expectations in numbers this year. However, antler development was not up to par in some Texas areas and many deer were small, yet fat enough. Turkeys were plentiful and quail numbers remained excellent until recent weeks. Coveys have thinned out and scattered making observation more difficult. Sleet and snow may yet affect numbers.

Some range experts agree that we must take the bad with the good. An overabundance of rain has caused fast growth of grass and browse, causing a low protein content. Cattle (and therefore deer) have not thrived this year as expected.

Regardless of ups and downs in different locales, the harvest of game overall is predicted to be record-setting.

True. Smoking is a definite and strong risk factor for heart disease. The heart disease death rate among smokers is 70 percent greater than that of nonsmokers. Heavy smokers are at even greater risk, and smokers with elevated blood cholesterol or high blood pressure increase their chances of heart disease dramatically.
