#### 29 Years Ago—April 9, 1906

Two weeks to the day from the time the three-story Haskell High School Building was ravaged by fire, the \$25,000 plant of O'Brien High School was almost totally destroyed by fire. The blaze broke out during the noon hour, on the second floor of the structure. The building, comprised of 13 classrooms, an auditorium and several offices, was erected in 1923.

A record number of 922 votes was cast in the city election Thursday, when F. G. Alexander was elected Mayor, Sebo Britton City Marshal, R. A. Coburn City Secretary, and John V. Davis, J. W. Gholson and Ben Bagwell as Aldermen.

A new telephone directory for the Haskell and Weinert exchanges will be issued within the next week or ten days. Roy Killingsworth, manager of the local exchange, has announced.

Judge Chas. M. Conner and County Superintendent Matt Graham made a business trip to Austin during the weekend.

D. H. Persons and W. M. Cass were re-elected, and Server Leone was named to the unexpired term of E. L. Christian in the school trustee election held Saturday. Voting was light, with the three names on the ballot.

Open games of the four-club Wichita Valley Baseball League have been scheduled for Sunday, April 19. Four towns, Haskell,

Munday, Hamlin and Anson, comprise the league. Haskell will play at Anson in the opener.

30 Years Ago—April 8, 1906  
In the city election held Tuesday, T. C. Cahill was elected Mayor without opposition. Other officials elected were W. E. Welsh, city marshal; Marvin Post, city secretary and treasurer; M. F. Spurlock, N. I. McCollum and A. H. Wair, Aldermen.

Al (Dutch) Jordan of this city was seriously injured Friday in an accident which occurred in the oil field near Albany, where he was working. He was carried to a Breckenridge hospital, where physicians say he has a good chance for recovery.

In the school trustee election Saturday, Courtney Hunt was elected to succeed Dr. L. F. Taylor on the school board.

A rabbit drive has been scheduled in the territory east of Haskell along the Throckmorton road Wednesday, April 14. Hunters are asked to meet at Buffalo Bridge at 8 a. m., to organize the drive, according to J. N. Lusk who is helping plan the affair.

The Haskell National Bank has awarded contract to J. R. Horn & Son of Abilene, for remodeling and enlarging the bank building. New fixtures will be installed when the modernization program is finished, bank official stated.

The farm home of W. S. (Seaton) Cox in the Howard community was destroyed by fire around noon Saturday. Some furniture and personal effects of the family were saved by Mr. Cox and neighbors who came to his assistance.

Olma Harvey, a young lady of the Howard community, suffered fractures of both legs and internal injuries in an accident on the Harvey farm last week. She was helping her father haul hay, when the team she was driving became frightened and ran away, throwing her from the wagon, which passed over her body. Physicians state the young lady has an excellent chance for recovery.

He says he will total up 50 bales, made on 100 acres by himself and family and one hired hand. He says there is quite a bit of cotton over the country remaining to be picked.

Some 65 million Americans who get sick are cared for at home every year by Red Cross trained home nurses.

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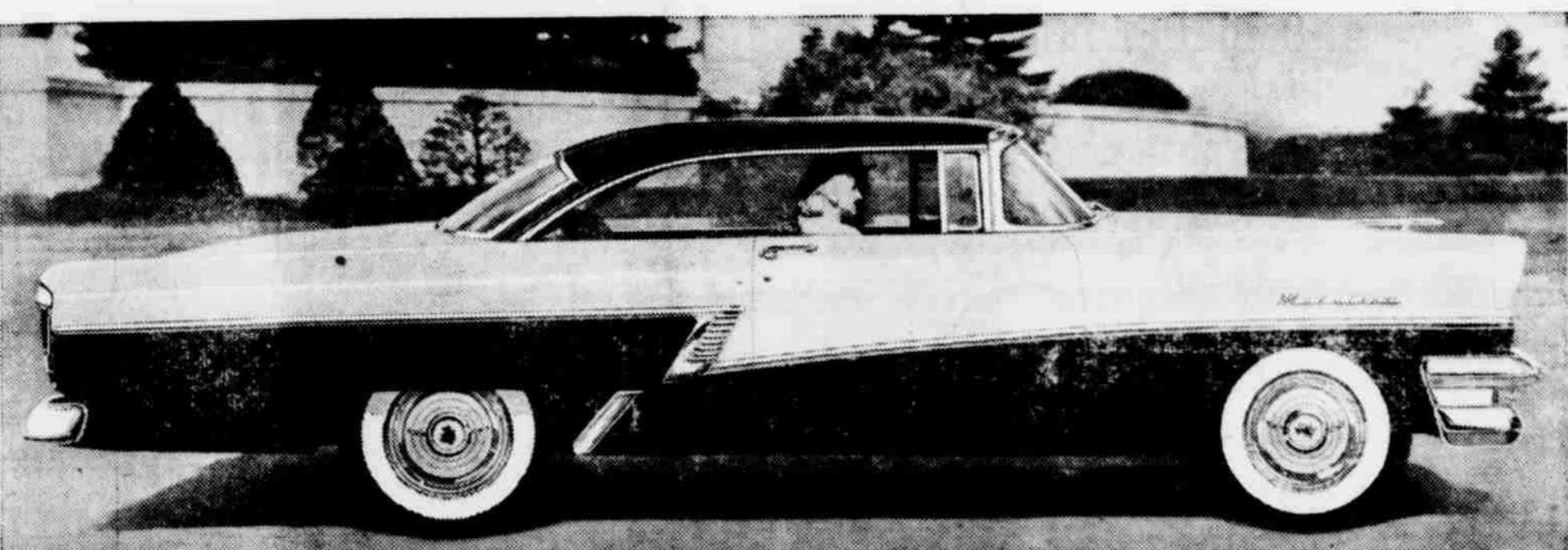
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## Haskell Man Recalls Trip to Abilene 60 Years Ago When Town Had 7 Saloons

The first time I ever saw Abilene was 60 years ago, when I was 17 years old. I remember we had to go through pastures and lanes, there weren't any graded roads at all," reminisces M. C. Franks, Haskell farmer.

The Haskell man came to The Free Press office to pick up his Rice Springs Rodeo tie and began to remember the "good old days," albeit with some nudging by bystanders.

"Abilene wasn't a very big place but it was spread out all over a section of land. They had 7 saloons, not that I was ever in one of 'em," he hastily reassured his listeners. "There was an old hitching rack where the post office is now. Law, it's nothin' like it is now!"

As a young boy, Mr. Franks was employed as a cowboy on the P. L. White ranch ("That was the Cross W brand") east of Cedar Gap. The two men "backed" on the ranch while the White family lived in Abilene. They did their own cooking over an open fireplace and then sat on the floor to eat. P. L. would invariably say, "This has always been my way of livin' and I like it. If I get a couple of eggs and a hot skillet, I'm happy," Mr. Franks says. "In those days, I earned \$20 a month and room and my horse was furnished. We had lots of horses, it being a horse and cattle ranch."

"Once a stray steer came to a neighboring ranch. They'd dogged him and ran him out, but he still came back. Boy, he was one of those mean longhorns. His old tail would just pump the air and he'd snort and paw the ground. Anyhow they got me to come over and help them get him out. We went over and I mean he had jumping fences all day long! Finally two of us roped him. We took him over to a cedar tree on the side of a mountain, and tied him there. I went home with the others to spend the night and all night long I could hear that steer pawing and snorting trying to get loose. By the time we got over there the next morning, he'd already broken one rope. A Spaniard by the name of Lucerne went over to undo the other knot and away they went. That was the wildest steer I ever saw," he concluded.

Mr. Franks, 77, a native of Hunt County, Texas, was the oldest rider in the Haskell Tramps segment of the Diamond Jubilee Parade in Abilene Monday. However, he first had to arrange for transportation over there for his horse. "A fine thing for a man who used to ride from O'Brien to Abilene and think nothin' of it." Before leaving he had to tell

the paper staff one more story. "Once we were loading some cattle in a wagon. We had gotten the cow in, but the little 4-weeks old calf was giving us trouble. I roped at him and missed. I saw that he was about to get in the brush and get away so I just grabbed his tail, dragged him over to the wagon and put him in without every gettin' off my horse. When it was all over, P. L. came rushing over and said, 'Good horse, good horse.'"

son and his world-famous trained mares Tom and Virginia Hadley in exhibitions of black-light trick roping performances, and Bobby and Gene Clark, bull-fighting clowns who also appear in specialty acts.

Election of officers and other important business will be transacted at that time and reports of all committee chairmen will be given. Members are urged to attend.

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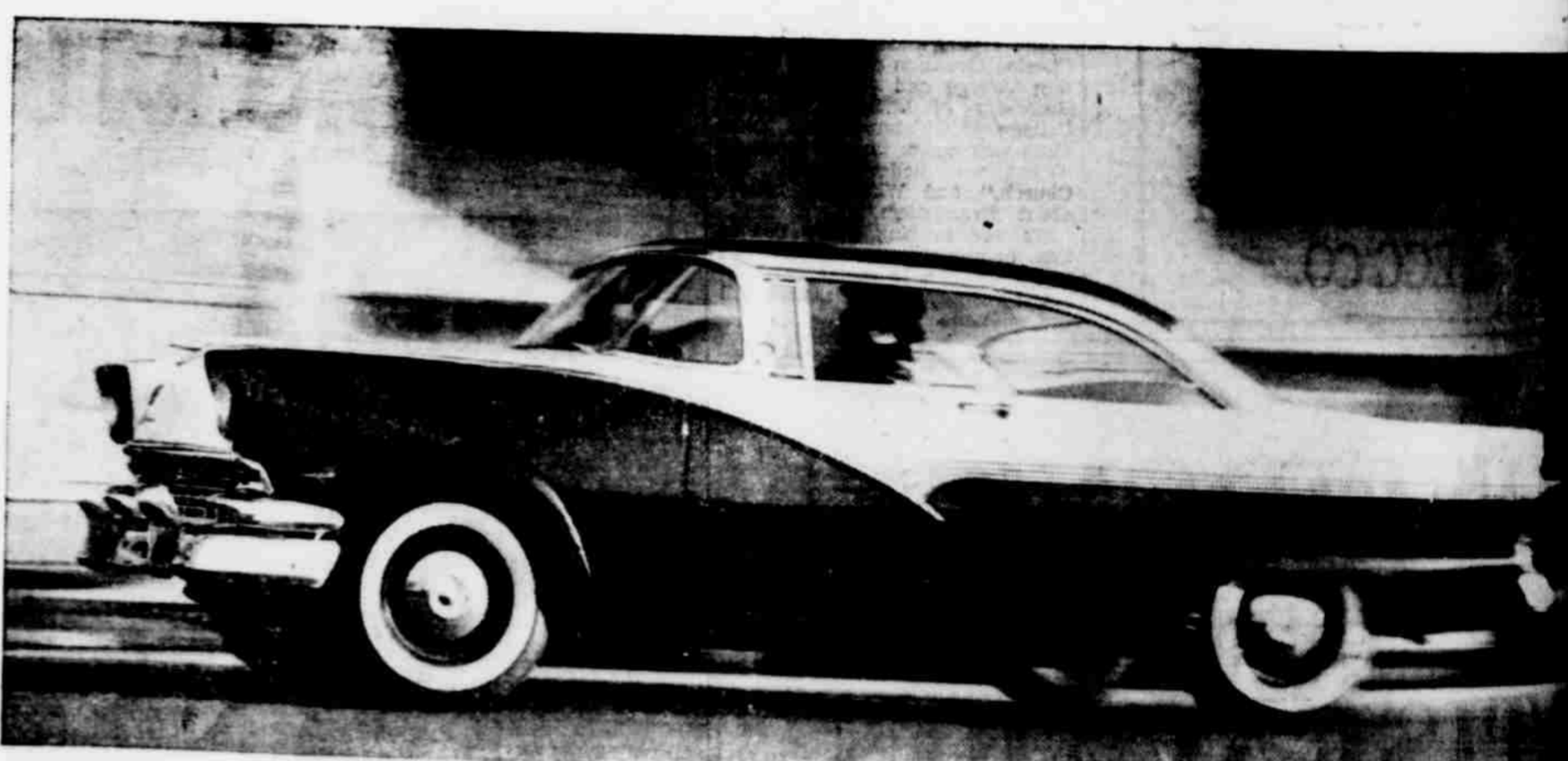

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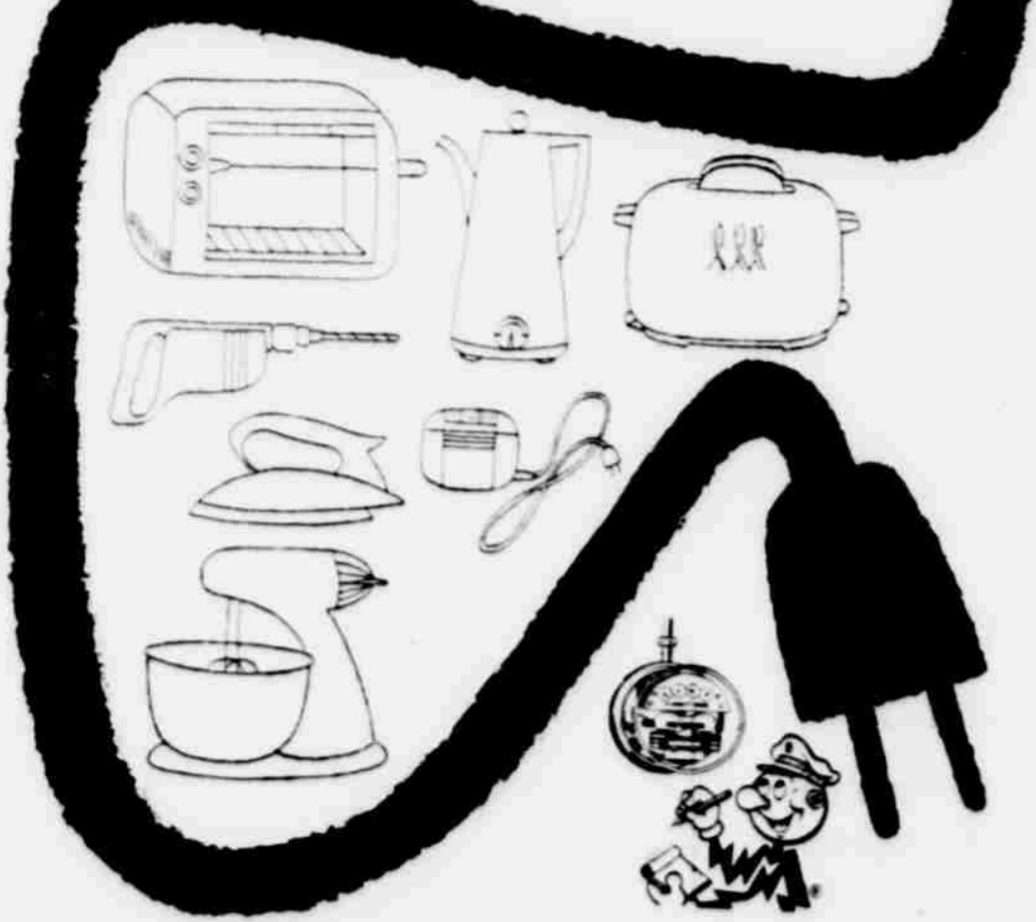

### Austrian Farm Customs Told by Exchange Student on Magazine Club Program

Dear Boss:  
Pardon my polka and pass the German manual, I'm going to Austria. I decided after attending the Magazine Club program Friday afternoon in the Methodist Church. The speaker was Bob Ross, Willis, Texas, an exchange student to Austria during the summer of 1954.

The above mentioned young man caused some consternation among the FFA and FHA students present. Apparently they thought his costume was the coming trend among the younger set. Personally we thought it rather fetching. I mean, how often do you see fellows walking around dressed in leather knickers (at least that's what they looked like), long woolen stockings, gray coat trimmed in black, lined with maroon colored material and a Tyrolean hat? What really got us was the coat with the pleat in back. There's no getting around it, the men just have more style in Austria.

But to get back to Mr. Ross, the reason he was here in the first place, some of the Magazine Club members heard him speak in Vernon and decided they just had to ask him to come to Haskell. So they did and he did.

During the four months he was in Austria, the young East Texas farmer, a graduate of Texas A. & M., lived with families in Tyrol, East Tyrol, and Salzburg. (Know any more than you did?) Anyhow they found themselves in hot water shortly after arrival. In Austria everybody speaks German and the three American students didn't, except for a few phrases, but it's one thing they found, to be able to ask something in German and quite another to understand the answer.

The first job on the farm was to cut grass for the cattle. Seems in Austria they haven't the wide open spaces we boast about in Texas. Consequently the cows have to be kept in barns all the time. The farmers every day must go out and cut a wagon load of grass for them. They cut it with scythes and Mr. Ross

said, "Somehow I never quite got the hang of it. I either cut through the air or into the earth, but never in the right place." There the barn is connected to the house. "Because," he explained, "the snow in the winter-time gets 5 or 6 feet deep for several months and yet they must feed the cattle."

One of their—er—quainter customs was that everyone ate from a common dish. "The first week they gave me a little white dish to eat from. All week I kept arguing with myself, 'Should I eat with the family or from the little white dish. Finally I discarded the dish and dug into the big copper bowl with the rest of them. It's surprising the difference it made in their attitude toward me."

In the springtime the younger cows and those not giving much milk are taken to the upper levels of the mountains to graze for the summer. Then in the fall the people have a festival when the cows are brought down, with ribbons tied to their horns and bells on their necks. "However, if a cow has died or was killed during the summer, then they will not celebrate," he said.

After a month, I went to East Tyrol where much of the country's barley is grown. It's very interesting the harvesting of the grain. Before throwing it onto a wagon, a canvas is placed beneath the wagon so that any grains which fall off can be gathered and fed to their chickens. They are never able to grow sufficient food for the population and so are a very conservative people."

In concluding he told of their end of harvest festival comparable to our Thanksgiving. "They build a crown of grain and carry it through the streets to the school house. There it remains for a year when, if the harvest is good, another of these huge crowns is made."

The program was illustrated with colored slides and refreshments of cookies and punch were served to guests (there goes the diet again.)

Wonder if we could work our way over on a cattle boat? travel smitten cub.

### TAX ESTIMATES

You must file a declaration of estimated tax if you have an income of more than \$5,000 a year—\$10,000 for heads of a household and married couples filing a joint return. Also, you must file if you have more than \$100 in income not subject to withholding—provided your total income for the year is more than \$400 larger than the amount that results from multiplying \$600 by the number of your exemptions.

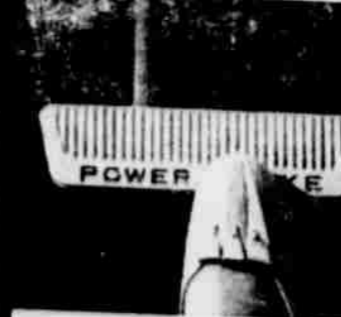

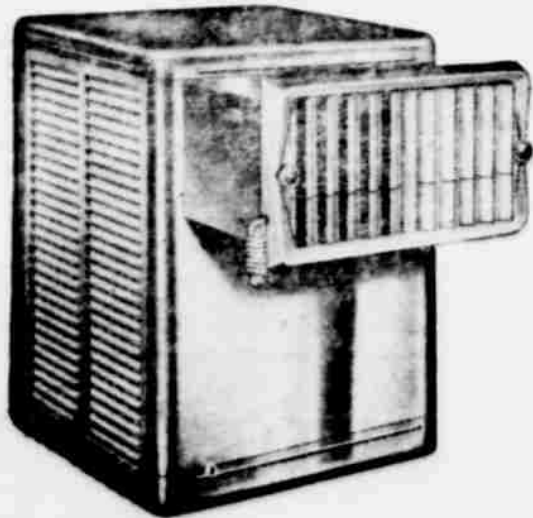

**Fishing Season Brings Warning Of Boat Danger**

Deaths of several persons as the spring fishing season got underway prompted the Executive Secretary of the Game and Fish Commission to caution persons about fishing and other lake hazards.

A man and his wife, both elderly, perished from exposure and shock after they had been taken from the waters of a West Texas lake where they had fallen after their boat was upset. A north Texas man drowned when his boat was capsized in a storm. A companion was barely rescued. Only super-human effort by a Central Texas father spared his son himself and his wife after the boy fell from a boat into deep water and after both parents jumped to the rescue. Timely arrival of some fishermen prevented a multi-tragedy.

The Executive Secretary pointed out that many persons are unaccustomed to some of the speedy new water craft and also that another common error is to equip comparatively small boats with large outboard motors. He suggested that the combination frequently caused the crafts to sink. He urged all to have life preservers handy.

“We are having a substantial and stimulating boom in the pleasure boat business,” said the executive secretary. “That means more folks are getting out of doors and more are becoming fishermen. But the activity naturally increases the hazards.”

He suggested fishermen and boaters generally become more weather conscious for safety purposes and also as an enhancement of fishing and general recreational opportunities. The executive secretary said the weather angle is vital for persons using the larger lakes as well as those fishing along the coast, especially landlubbers venturing out in small boats into waters that may become suddenly and violently rough.
