Justices attend seminar on new legislation

A total of 98 justices of the peace, including Opal I. Jacoby of Coke County, Robert Lee and Frances Kemp of Bronte, Coke County Precinct 2, attended a 20-hour seminar May 24-27 in San Angelo conducted by the Texas Justice Court Training Center headquartered at Southwest

Texas State University in San Marcos.

The seminars are held in compliance with Article 5972, Section B of the Texas Revised Civil Statutes. Topics covered include a review of new legislation impacting the justice court system passed by the 70th Legislature, Civil

Law, Code of Judicial Conduct, Criminal Trial Procedure, Forcible Entry and Detainer and Lease Agreement Laws, Contracts and Torts, Justice Court vs. Small Claim Court Jurisdiction, Regulatory Law Review, Inquests, Autopsies and a review of the Penal Code.

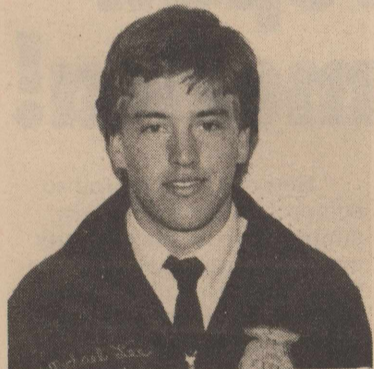

The T.A.Y.C. is sponsored by the Texas Department of Agriculture and will be held at the Jester Center on campus at the University of Texas in Austin. Congress dates are June 28 - July 1.

He was born Oct. 11, 1909 in Sikeston, MO. to Schuyler Everett Reed and Dora Stark Reed. He graduated from Sikeston High School and attended Oglethorpe University in Atlanta, GA.

In Sikeston, he was employed as a county grain inspector. In Monroe, LA., he worked for Interstate Gas Co. Later, he was employed by Sun Oil Co. While with Sun Co. he was assigned to Delhi, LA., Delmita, Texas and Robert Lee. He was with Sun 23 years, retiring in 1971.

Smith

Colonel Jack H. Smith, Senior Army Advisor to the Texas Army National Guard died in a traffic accident in Austin, Texas, June 9.

Col. Smith was a native of Midland, and is survived by his wife, Betty, a son, Craig of College Station, a daughter, Sandra Smith of Georgetown, a sister, Sylvia Merritt of Midland, and his father, G.J. Smith of Robert Lee.

A memorial service was held at the Texas National Guard All Faiths Chapel at Camp Mabry, in Austin, on Wednesday. Col. Smith was buried at Ft. Sam Houston National Ceme-

tery in San Antonio with full military honors.

Col. Smith's distinguished Army career began in 1960, following his graduation from New Mexico Military Institute. He served in a wide range of assignments including two tours in Vietnam and Germany, one tour in Thailand, and command and staff positions in the U.S.

Smith received a bachelor's degree from the University of Texas, El Paso, in 1962, and a master's from Auburn University, in 1972. He also was a graduate of the Armor Basic and Advanced Course, the Command and General Staff College, and the U.S. Army War College.

Col. Smith spent the last years of his career in his home state as an advisor to the Texas Army National Guard's 49th Armored Division, then as senior advisor to the Adjutant General of Texas.

While in the military, Col. Smith was awarded numerous decorations, including the Legion of Merit, the Meritorious Service Medal, the Bronze Star Medal, and the Vietnam Honor Medal.

Friends and colleagues of Col. Jack Smith will remember him as a man of unquestioned integrity who based his life on honesty, truth, and love of family and country.

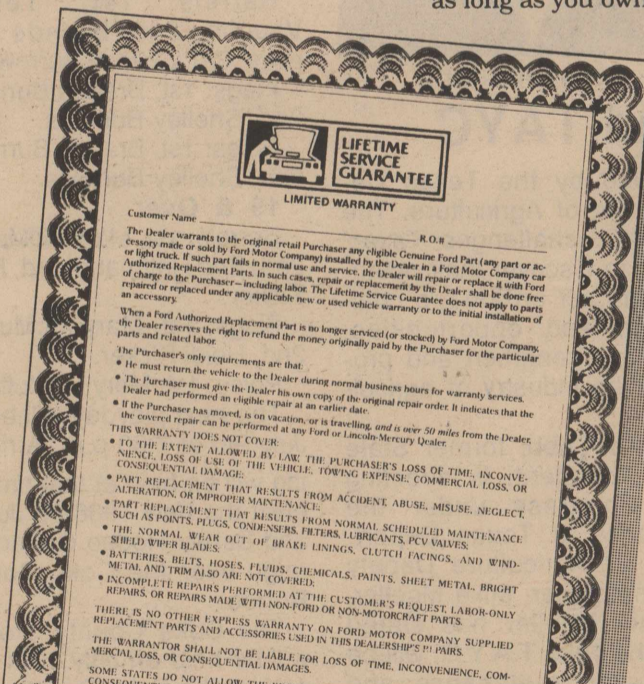
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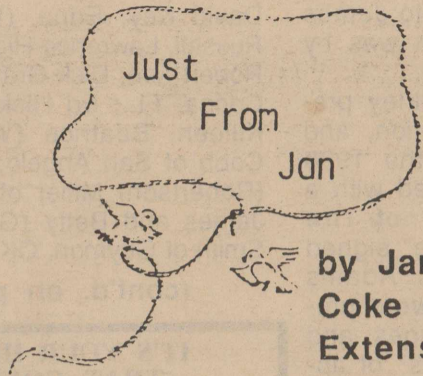

WHEN TEEN STYLES CAUSE FAMILY FRICTION

Some of those same people who fought with their parents about wearing long hair and short skirts in the sixties are now arguing with their own children about spiked hair and acid-washed jeans.

The way teenagers dress and wear their hair has been a source of conflict for generations -- and for good reason.

Establishing independence is a normal part of development in adolescence. During the teen years, youngsters start to see themselves as separate from their parents and families and want to form bonds with new groups. Changing appearance and adopting the styles valued by their friends is one way for teenagers to express this change.

During this period parents should question whether a teenager's choice of clothing

and hair style is worth a family fight. Although it's easy to focus on visible things, other issues are far more important than a strange haircut.

Try to focus on the underlying issues of how your teenager is developing as a person. Is he or she growing in reliability, honesty, self-confidence and respect for others?

When a radical change in appearance is accompanied by extremely negative behavior changes, such as school problems, withdrawing, drugs or drinking, parents have to deal with the total adolescent, not just appearance.

But for most teenagers, "weird" hair or clothes simply express a desire to be their own person. By responding with love and warmth, regardless of your opinion of current styles, you can build a stronger parent-teen relationship.

Skin cancer on the rise

Two years ago Christine Carr noticed a dark spot on the right side of her leg.

"Almost overnight I noticed it, but I'm sure it had been there for eight or nine months. It was dark, oblong, rough and uneven in its layering," described the fair-skinned, redheaded Carr of her mysterious growth.

A biopsy at The University of Texas M.D. Anderson Cancer Center revealed malignant melanoma, a dangerous type of skin cancer.

While a relatively rare disease, melanoma is increasing at a rate of 3.4 percent a year. The American Cancer Society estimates that melanoma will strike 27,000 Americans this year.

Melanoma can be successfully treated with surgery if detected early, but can be deadly if it spreads to the lymph nodes or other organs in the body.

Doctors at M.D. Anderson Cancer Center are studying new treatment options for patients with early and advanced melanoma and note that the results seem encouraging.

Patients with early melanoma of one millimeter or less in thickness are benefiting from conservative surgery that doesn't require skin grafts or leave them with large disfiguring scars.

Clinical studies in immunotherapy also showing promise over traditional chemotherapy for patients

with advanced melanoma. One of these involves a vaccine, which appears to boost the body's defense against the invading cancer.

"Chemotherapy hasn't been that successful for patients whose cancer has spread to their lymph nodes, so we are encouraged by this vaccine. We think trying to get the person's own body acting as a war front against melanoma would be a better treatment than chemotherapy," said Dr. Singletary.

However, a study involving a combination of drugs and another study, using Interleukin-2, a synthetic hormone that boosts the body's immune system, are showing successes in clinical studies.

In the meantime, Dr. Singletary noted that evidence is strong that the sun is the culprit in many melanoma cases. The best defense is still to avoid excessive exposure to the sun by wearing protective clothing and sun block. Any change in color or size in a mole or patch of skin should require a visit to a doctor.

Research shows that melanoma occurs more often in middle-aged people than in younger people, indicating that melanoma takes years to develop.

Carr was lucky. Her melanoma was caught early and today she has only a small scar to remind her of the dangers of the sun.



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
