New RL grocery store opening anticipated

With an anticipated opening date of August 31, the recently constructed Super H I.G.A. holds promise of initiating the economic turnaround that Robert Lee residents have hoped would spark the local economy.

With approximately 7,600 square feet of floor space, the new Super H I.G.A. will feature a full-line grocery store, with take-out service and a delicatessen. The new store will initially employ fourteen or fifteen local residents.

Owners Dave and Betty Hughes are no strangers to the grocery business. Dave has worked in the grocery business for thirty years, beginning at age 13, when he began his career working for

Piggly Wiggly in Snyder. He then worked his way through McMurry in Abilene, taking a BBA degree, and holding down a job with A & P. He also spent eighteen years with Super Duper in Abilene, and moves to Robert Lee with his family from Odessa, where he was Vice-President in charge of operations and part-owner of four Foodway stores.

Concerning his lengthy retail grocery experience, Dave quips, "After thirty years I'm thinking about making a career out of it (the grocery business). We'll see how it goes."

The Hughes couple has three children, son Gary, 27, who works for Skaggs in

Odessa; daughter Debbie, 23, now living in Kansas; and son Dant, 15, who will attend eighth grade in Robert Lee. They also have four grandchildren.

Fleming Foods, headquartered in Lubbock, Texas, and the major supplier for the new store, is the largest grocery wholesaler in the U.S. They also supply Albertson's, Skagg's, and other independents coast-to-coast in thirty-seven states.

As a final note, Mr. Hughes stated, "We are proud to be in Robert Lee, and hope to bring the community good quality products at competitive prices to the San Angelo market."

BISD to celebrate 100th anniversary

The Bronte School will celebrate its 100th Anniversary Sept. 16th and 17th. Activities will include the homecoming football game and a dance Friday night.

Saturday's activities will include a vehicle parade. Each class or group of classes are urged to locate a vehicle from their era to enter and repre-

sent them. Following the parade will be Decade Reunions at the school for the 20's thru the 80's with each decade having a separate room for visiting, memorabilia and class reunions. Following will be a catered supper and music.

The first schoolhouse, a one-room frame building, was recorded as "Oso". It was also

reported to have been "Bronc" or "Bronco". The name changed to Bronte with the building of the Bronte Post Office. The school was actually built several months before the organization of Coke County in April of 1889, while still a part of Tom Green County. Earliest records burned, and the first available records, 1891, show the school as Dist. 4, Coke County.

"Oso" was built, not with bonds or taxes, but with donations of lumber and labor from local citizens. It was located on the East Kickapoo Creek near where Hwy. 277 crosses. The 3Rs were studied and little else. Students learned from whatever texts were available.

Madison McCutchen was the first teacher followed by J.N. Bullard, J.A. Carter, W.B. James, F.K. Popplewell, and J.D. Jowers.

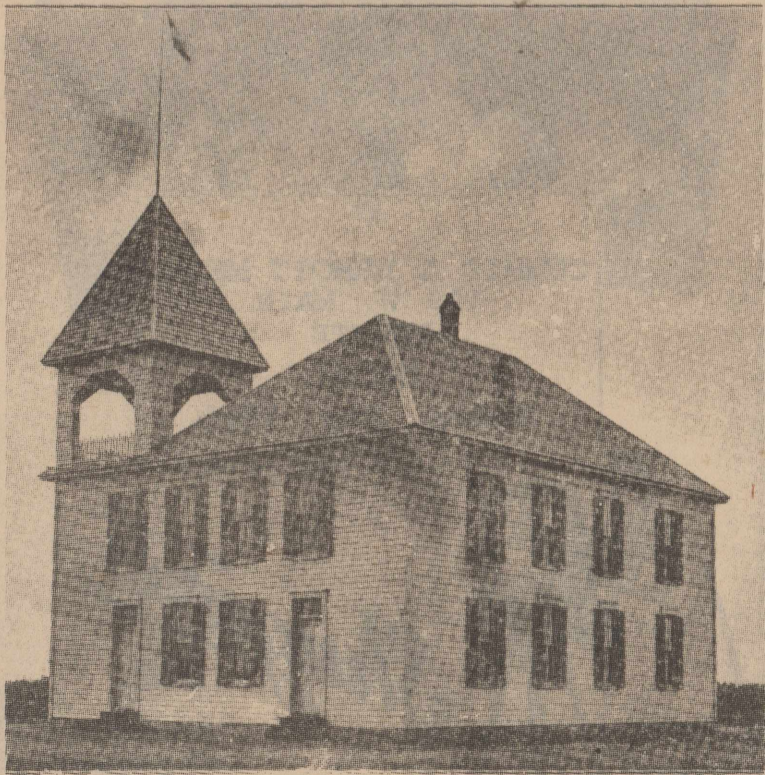
In 1890, the school was moved to a site slightly west of the present school. Geography, grammar and history was added to the curriculum.

The first trustee election was the first Saturday in June 1891.

In 1899, two rooms were added across one end of the still one-room school making it a T-shaped building.

A fire wiped out the old frame building in the early 1900s and bonds were sold

THIS 28' BY 48' two-story building was built in 1900 by the sale of stock in the Bronte High School Company for \$25 per share. It replaced the previous three-room school which was destroyed by fire. Upstairs was the high school while primary and intermediate school was held downstairs.



McSwain promotes book

Ross McSwain visited Bronte last Friday morning promoting his recent book "Out Yonder". He and his wife Jean Timmons McSwain, who is an ex-Bronte native spent the morning in Cumbie & Arrott Mercantile.

"Out Yonder" is a collection of articles and stories from past editions of newspapers which McSwain has updated and rewritten. It covers the West Texas area served by the San Angelo Standard Times. McSwain is the Regional Editor for the Standard Times. His job is to gather and coordinate area news from the 47 counties served by the paper, an area larger than the state of Ohio.

Added to the old articles are McSwain's personal experiences from his travels across West Texas.

A native of Brady, McSwain moved to San Angelo and first worked for the Standard Times in 1958. From '58-'68 he served as Farm and Ranch Editor and did general assignments. In '68, he left the Standard Times and became

Assistant to the Mohair Council of America. In 1978, he returned to the Standard Times and says he loves the job. It has gotten in his blood.

McSwain's wife, Jean Timmons McSwain is a 1954 graduate of Bronte High School.

"Out Yonder" is published by Mulberry Publishing of San Angelo and sells for \$16.95. It came out in February of 1988 and McSwain says sales are doing very well. The book is 99% fact and the names were not changed. Since the book deals with history of the area McSwain felt many of the elder citizens would be interested in the book. Therefore, he had it published in a larger, easier to read typestyle and says the book makes a very good gift.

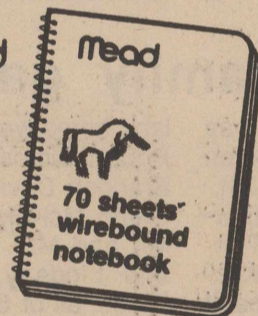

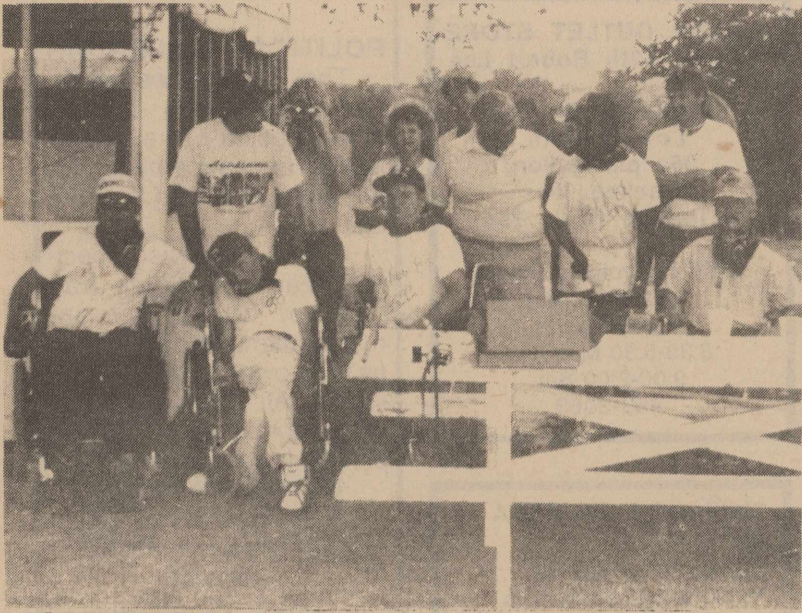

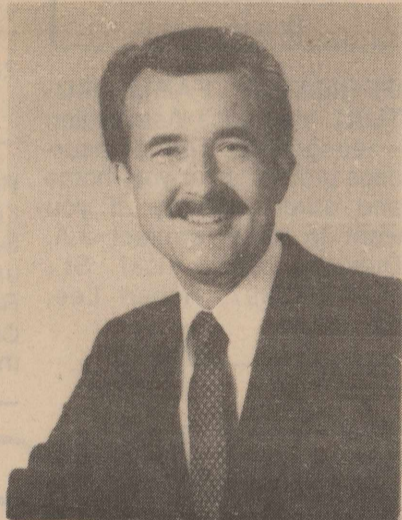
The camp is designed to encourage Rehab patients to be more independent and to learn to do things for themselves.

The couple is at home in San Angelo where both are students at Angelo State University.

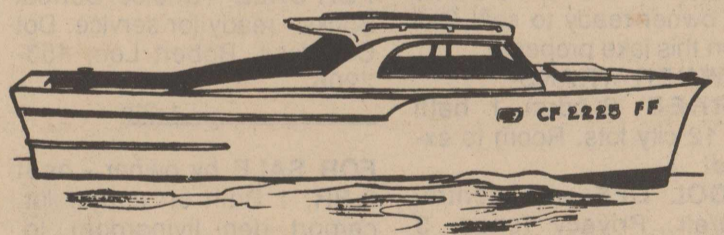

Children from households whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free or reduced price meals.

Application forms are being sent to all homes with a letter to parents or guardians. To apply for free or reduced price meals, households should fill out the application and return it to the school. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school. The information provided on the application will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility and may be verified at any time during the school year by school or other program officials.

For the school officials to determine eligibility, the household must provide the following information listed on the application: Names of all household members; social security numbers of all adult household members or a statement that the household member does not possess one; total household income or the household's food stamp case number, AFDC case number if they currently receive food stamps or AFDC case number if they currently receive Aid to Families with Dependent Children and the signature of an adult household member certifying that the information provided is correct.

Applications may be submitted at any time during the year. Under the provisions of the free and reduced price policy the Bronte ISD Superintendent Michael Hartman, will review applications and determine eligibility. Parents of guardians dissatisfied with the ruling of the official may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on an informal basis. Parents wishing to make a formal appeal may make a request either orally or in writing to Superintendent Michael Hartman, Bronte I.S.D., Box 670, Bronte, Texas 76933, 473-2511 for a hearing on the decision.

Households are required to report increases in household income of over \$50 per month or \$600 per year and decreases in household size. Also, if a household member becomes unemployed, or if the household size increases, the household should contact the school. Such changes may make the children of the household eligible for reduced meals or for free meals if the household's income falls at or below the levels shown above.

In certain cases foster children are also eligible for school meal benefits. If a household has foster children living with them and wishes to apply for them, the household should contact the school for more information.

The information provided by the household is confidential and will be used only for purposes of determining eligibility and verifying data.

In the operation of child feeding programs administered by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, no child will be discriminated against because of race, color, sex, national origin, age or handicap. If any member of a household believes they have been discriminated against, they should write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.
