## County spells drought relief G-I-L-B-E-R-T

It is a tragedy that death and devastation can bring benefit to others. It's hard for a family who has lost everything in Hurricane Gilbert to find any appreciation for the much-needed weekend rains Texas received. Nevertheless, the West Texas region is rejoicing over the 3-6 inches that fell slowly, without wind or damage.

Farmers are elated; they can begin to get ready to plant small grains. Ag people have said most cotton in the area was not damaged by the rains because bolls had not fully opened. Harvested stubbles are expected to furnish good

grazing while fall weeds and grass are making. Stock water is still low for some because of little runoff but the benefits are many for the area.

County rainfall reports include 3 inches around Bronte, with 4 inches gauged north of town. Maverick reported 3.9 inches. The west side of the county fared better; Wilbern Millican reported 5.7 at Pecan; Union Texas Gas Plant had over 6 inches; T.K. Whiteside measured 4.5 on the Divide; the I.A. Bird ranch received over 5 inches. Three inches were general around Robert Lee.

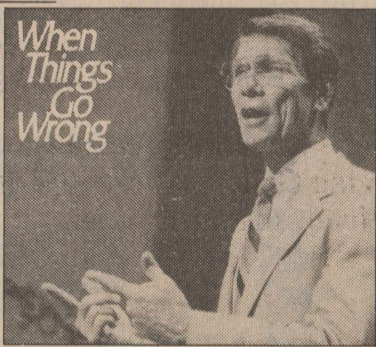

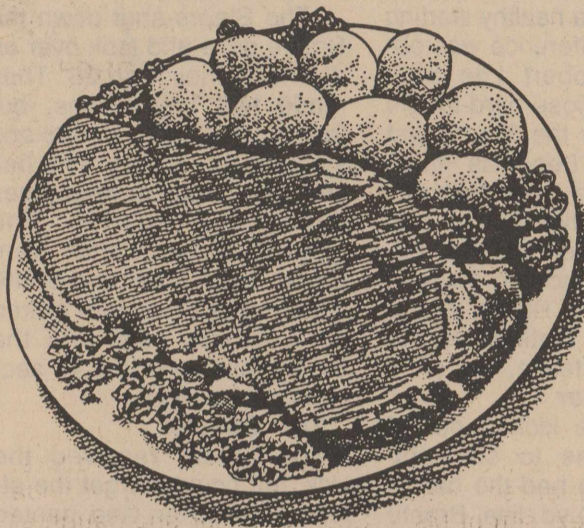

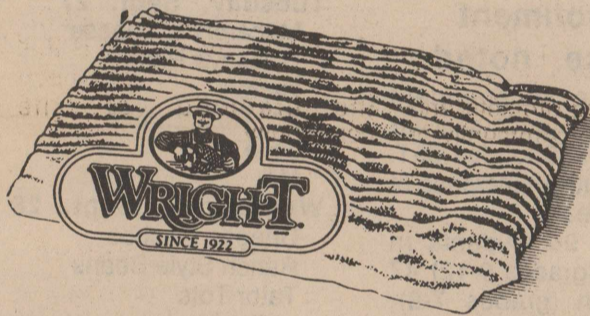

## Steers post first season win over Horns

This was the first game of this young season that Robert Lee has had a healthy starting team. The difference was obvious as Robert Lee beat Bronte in a close hard-fought ballgame, for the Steers first win. Robert Lee was much improved with Cody Anthony, Bill Grigg, Clint Smith, and Michael Lee leading the way on offense, and Jon Rogers, Jody Tavarez, Rickie Wheat and Randy Watkins taking charge on defense.

### 1st Quarter

The Steers kicked out of the end zone to start the game. Bronte had the ball at the Bronte 20 yd. line. Bronte could not get a first down and punted to the Steer 42 yd. line. The Steers went to work and got a 1st at the Bronte 46, then another at the Bronte 27. Then with 6:55 left in the first quarter, Anthony hit Wes Horn for a 23 yd. TD. The PAT failed and Robert Lee was ahead by 6 pts. As it turned out this was all Robert Lee needed to win the game as there was no more scoring in the game. Bronte ended the 1st quarter with a good drive

### RL enrollment increase noted

Robert Lee Independent School District enrollment for September 1988 totaled 351. This represents an increase of 19 from last year.

There are 96 students in high school (grades 9-12) 47 in junior high (grades 7-8); and 208 in elementary (grades K-6). A breakdown in elementary figures includes a large increase over recent years' figures. Kindergarten has 29 enrolled; 34 in 1st grade; 2nd grade, 36; 32 in 3rd grade; 27 in 4th grade; 5th grade, 28; and 6th grade has 22 students.

### 2nd Quarter

The Steers shut down the Bronte drive and took over on downs at their own 28. They made two first downs, but Bronte intercepted a pass and stopped the Steers. The ball changed hands several times during the quarter. The biggest threat came from Bronte toward the end of the quarter, but Wes Horn picked off a Bronte pass and the Steers killed the last 16 seconds on the clock.

### 3rd Quarter

The Steers received the kick, but could not get the offense untracked and punted

to the Bronte 42. Bronte made 1st downs at the Steer 47, 36, 22, and 8 yd. lines, before Bill Griggs forced a fumble that was recovered by Anthony. The ball changed hands again as the defense took over and the quarter ended.

### 4th Quarter

Bronte put Robert Lee on the defensive again toward the end of this quarter. The Steers came through again as Joel Herring intercepted a Bronte pass and the Steers ran the clock out.

The Steers rest on the 23rd and Homecoming is the 30th against Sterling City.

Shashey is the daughter of Mrs. Ethel Hinnard. Mr. and Mrs. Tony Smith are Clint's parents.

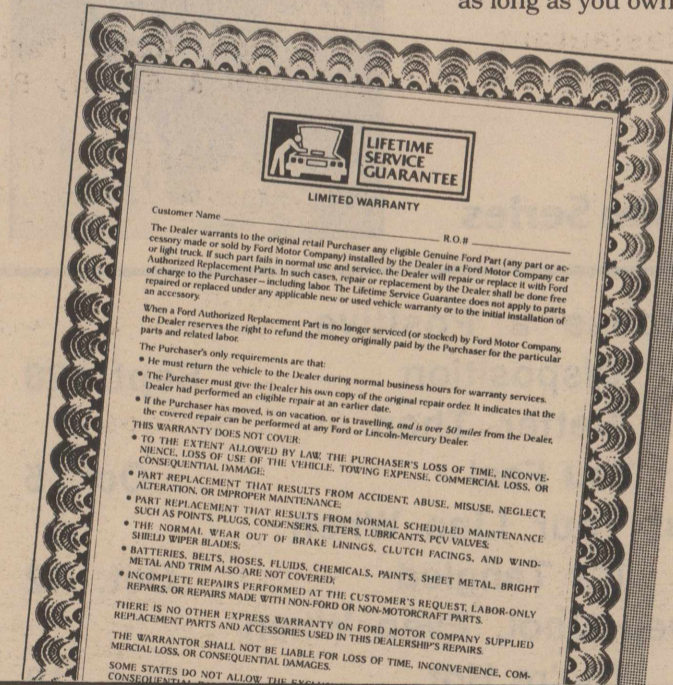

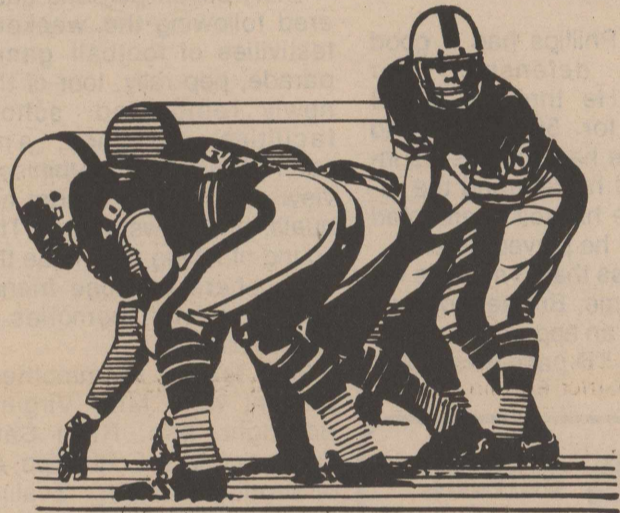

# BRONTE SCHOOL NEWS

## Horns lose close homecoming contest

The Bronte Longhorns lost a heartbreaker to the Robert Lee Steers in Bronte's homecoming game last Friday night. Final score was 6-0 Robert Lee.

Conditions were perfect for the game. An east wind of ten to fifteen miles per hour generated by Hurricane Gilbert, kept things pleasantly cool. Clouds from the storm could be seen approaching from the south and east. However, the rain held off until the early hours of Saturday morning.

A large crowd attended the game and enjoyed the homecoming festivities.

Robert Lee scored on a 27 yard pass play early in the 1st quarter for the only points. A bad snap from center caused the extra point try to fail. Bronte dominated on defense and stats for rushing and passing were in Bronte's favor.

Justin Phillips had a good evening defensively for Bronte. He threw 4 of 18 passes for 58 yards and though he had two passes intercepted he returned the favor as he himself intercepted two while he played defense.

With less than 3 minutes left in the game, Bronte mounted a drive to an apparent score. A four yard TD pass was called

back for illegal motion. The score would have tied the game and the extra point, if successful, would have won it. However, it was not to be as Robert Lee intercepted on the one yard line and ran back to the forty. They were able to run out the clock.

Bronte had two scoring opportunities inside the ten yard line during the game but both ended in lost fumbles.

The Longhorns travel to

Cross Plains this week to battle the #9 ranked team in the state. Cross Plains was ranked 5th but several key injuries over the last few weeks have dropped their ranking.

Plans are being made for a 40th reunion next year.

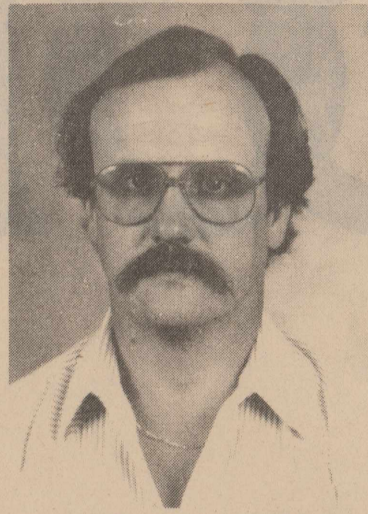

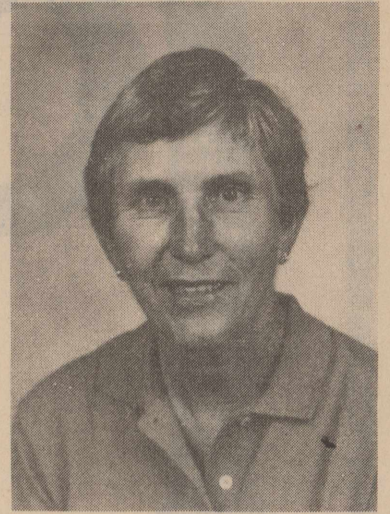

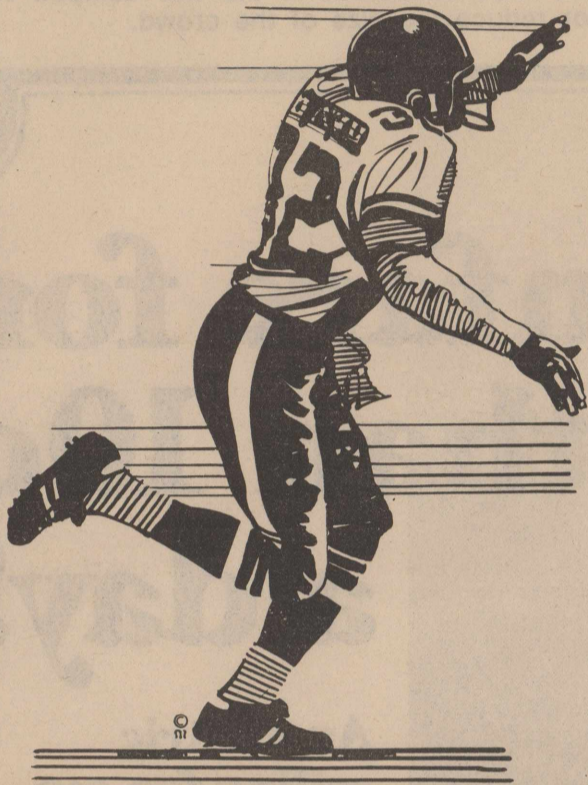

Last, but not least, give them the monetary support when we can, for needed equipment. Give them support with our time and join them to cut down on their hours of duty.

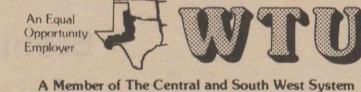

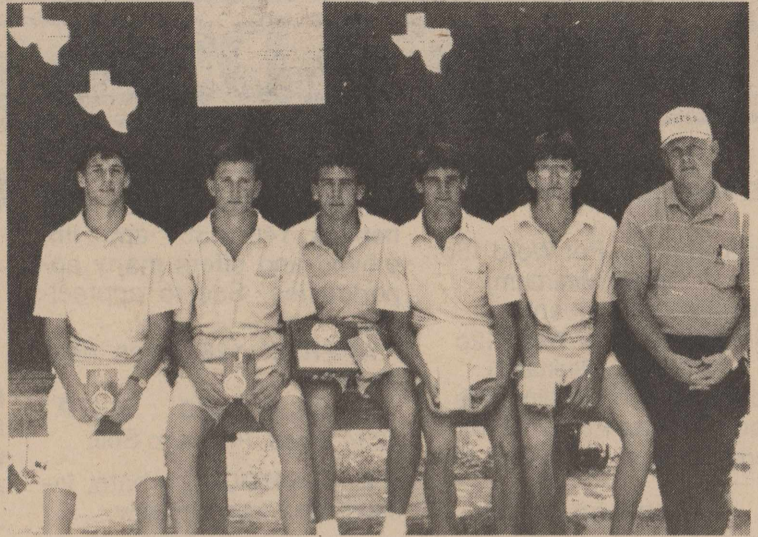

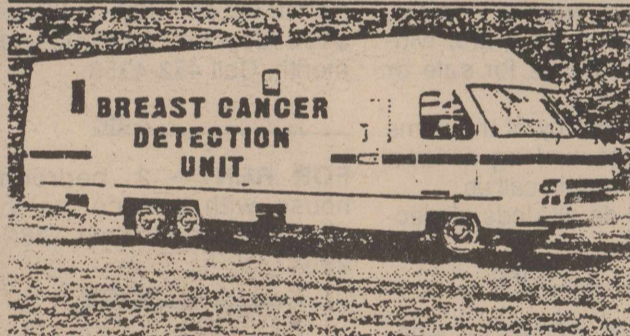

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer. Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate. A mammogram can detect a cancer this small ● even before it can be felt.

The American Cancer Society has established guidelines for mammography in asymptomatic women. (Women who have no symptoms of disease). Those guidelines have been adopted by the American Academy of Family Physicians, American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, and The American College of Radiology. Those guidelines are:

- I. 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.
- II. 40-50 years of age - A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.
- III. 50 years of age and over - An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.
- IV. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk

factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer. V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain. A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers. A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination. The charge for the screening mammogram is \$50.00. 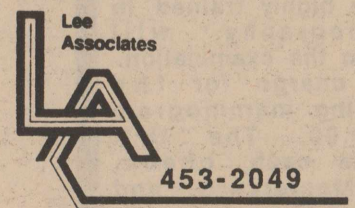

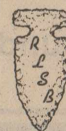

## CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

GENERAL ELECTION

NOVEMBER 8, 1988

### PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment providing that when the federal government reimburses the state for expenditures of state funds dedicated to acquiring rights-of-way and for constructing, maintaining, and policing public roadways, such federal funds must also be used for those purposes.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment and/or clarification providing that federal reimbursement of state highway dedicated funds are themselves dedicated for the purpose of acquiring rights-of-way and constructing, maintaining, and policing public roadways."

### PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 2 proposes a constitutional amendment to establish an economic stabilization fund in the state treasury. The fund would consist of one half of the unencumbered balance of general revenues at the end of a biennium and three fourths of the difference between the net oil and gas production taxes received in a fiscal year and the net oil and gas production taxes received in the 1987 fiscal year. During any fiscal biennium, the amount in the economic stabilization fund could not exceed 10% of the total deposited in general revenue in the preceding biennium.

The state comptroller and the state treasurer could decide to trans-

fer monies from the fund into the general revenue fund to alleviate a temporary cash shortage in general revenue. The legislature could make appropriations from the fund on approval by a three fifths vote of each house to make up the difference between anticipated general revenue and appropriations. On approval of two thirds of the members of each house of the legislature, the legislature could appropriate monies from the fund for any purpose.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment establishing an economic stabilization fund in the state treasury to be used to offset unforeseen shortfalls in revenue."

### PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 5 proposes a constitutional amendment that establishes the Texas growth fund. All investments of the Texas growth fund must be directly related to furthering economic growth and employment opportunities in Texas. At least 50 percent of the fund must be invested in equity and/or debt security for the initial construction, expansion, or modernization of business or industrial facilities in Texas. Not more than ten percent of the fund may be invested in venture capital investments. Of the funds available for venture capital investments, not more than 25 percent may be invested unilaterally, and the remaining investments must be matched at least equally by funds from other sources.
