Christmas fun will begin with a children's parade. Any child may take part in the one-block procession by joining the group on main street about 2:40 pm. They may wear cos-

tumes, ride trikes, bikes, or just walk. The parade will begin at 3 pm and continue down the block to the Gazebo. Ribbons will be given in several age categories.

Any business that chooses to participate may start customers registering for prize drawings. Each can bring their box to the sidewalk near the Gazebo for the drawing following the parade. The WCC-CD will also give away cash gift certificates to be used at Robert Lee businesses. Winners must be present to win.

Adding to the holiday air will be a group of carolers. Various people are making plans to sell food downtown. Businesses are urged to "dress up" for the Christmas Party.

A special event, in conjunction with the Christmas Party, will be the announcement and awarding of cash prizes for the outdoor decoration contest, also being sponsored by the West Coke County Community Development.

A 5-member panel, including D'Ann Eubanks, Peggy Davis, Wanda Smith, Cathy McGinley, and Bobbie Allen will judge the outdoor decoration entries on Thursday, Dec. 8, in order to announce the winners at the Christmas Party. 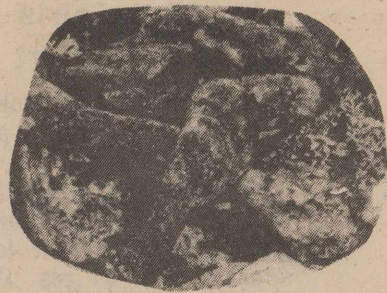
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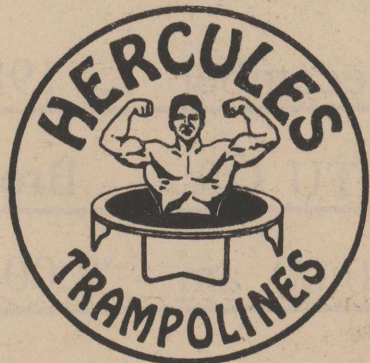

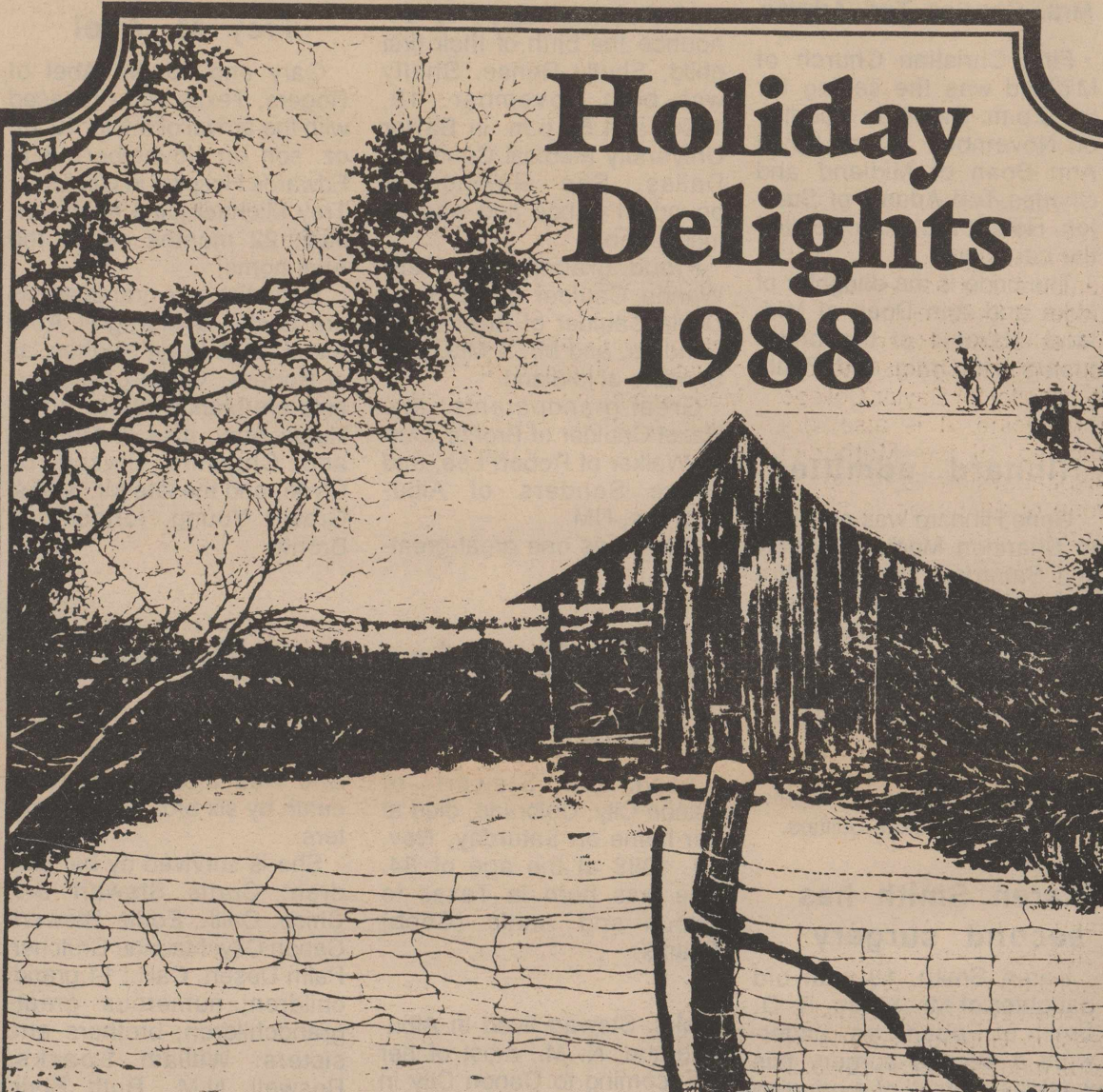
Robbins hosts UMW

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Methodist Hospital "special" to RL

In the October 21, 1988 issue of "The United Methodist Reporter, Southwest Texas Conference Edition," Associate Editor, Cynthia Astle, wrote: "Welcome to The Methodist Hospital, where there's only one word to describe what goes on: excellence." Astle continues:

"The Methodist Hospital, a health and welfare ministry of The Texas Annual Conference, is a 1,218-bed tertiary care complex, serving 40,000 in-patients and 200,000 out-patients each year. They come from all 50 states and 70 foreign countries.

"It is so outstanding that the 'New York Times' recently listed it as one of the top hospitals in the United States.

"And it's huge - the fourth-largest not-for-profit, non-governmental, acute-care facility in the United States.

"It employs 5,500 physicians, nurses, administrators, technicians and other staff members and has an annual budget of \$400 million.

"Methodist Hospital in Houston is the primary teaching hospital for Baylor College of Medicine. It is also the "flagship" of the Methodist Hospital system, a non-profit group of 32 hospitals in the United States, Mexico, Guatemala, Venezuela, Peru, Italy, and Turkey that have historic ties to the United Methodist Church."

Many Coke County citizens have been patients in that fine facility and have experienced its commitment to medical excellence. All have profited by the staff's diligence to a special service: "seeing to the physical, emotional and spiritual needs of its patients," a feature "which has made The Methodist Hospital genuinely a world-class hospital facility."

Robert Lee has a special interest in Houston's world famous medical center, of which Methodist Hospital is a part, because one of its doctors is a native son, - Ronald E. Sims, M.D. (son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Sims of Robert Lee), better known locally as "Ronnie".

Having attended Robert Lee's public school all of his school years, Ronnie graduated in 1964 with an outstanding record academically, and as a fine athlete, artist, and pianist. To his friends, it is not surprising that, as an adult, he has accumulated an enviable record in both medical and cultural activities.

Dr. Sims graduated from Rice University and the Uni-

versity of Texas Medical Branch, Galveston. He did his internship at St. Joseph's Hospital, Houston, and his residency at Baylor College of Medicine Affiliated Hospitals, of which Methodist Hospital is a member. There he specialized in internal medicine.

Since 1984, Sims has been on the active Medical Staff at Methodist Hospital, the Courtesy Staff at St. Luke's Hospital, and the Teaching Staff at Ben Taub Hospital, Houston, one of the largest trauma centers in the world. He was Clinical Instructor at Methodist Hospital 1984-'85, and became Associate Clinical Professor at Methodist Hospital in 1985, a position he still holds.

In 1984, Sims became a member of Methodist Hospital's Health Committee, and in 1987 was appointed a member of the Product-Standardization Committee, positions he still holds.

Dr. Sims holds memberships in Harris County Medical Society, American Medical Society, Texas Medical Association, American Medical Association, Houston Internal Medical Society, and American Internal Medical Society.

Two partners, Michael J. Feltovik, M.D., and Thomas Baxter, M.D., share offices with Dr. Sims in Scurlock Tower adjacent to the Medical Center.

Needing an occasional change of pace, the Doctor is a board member of the prestigious Houston Symphony Orchestre and serves on several of its committees. Even with his busy schedule, and having played professionally for several years, he still takes piano lessons, performs with a popular "Doctors' Band", and plays piano for numerous charitable functions, activities at which he excels, and whose audiences he enjoys.

"However", the Doctor is quick to add, "perhaps my favorite audience is the congregation of my beloved United Methodist Church in Robert Lee. Most of those people nurtured me from

boyhood, giving friendship, encouragement, and eventually a generous scholarship." When he visits "back home," his friends anticipate his playing for Sunday's service as he gives back some of the love and concern he has experienced, of which he says, "Without it, my family and I would not be where we are today."

Having bought a beautiful home from another former R.L.H.S. graduate (Robin Holland, prominent Houston lawyer, son of Pauline Holland, Robert Lee), "Ronnie" lives with his wife, Kenny (daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. C. Sawyer, Robert Lee), and their two daughters, Penne and Kelly.

Penne is working toward her doctorate degree in neuropsychology. She is doing clinical work and research in the Medical Center, with special emphasis on Alzheimer's disease.

John Sterling Meyer, M.D., and Karl F. Mortel, Ph. D., Director and Associate-director, respectively, of CBF Laboratory of the University of Houston, have written of their student, "Penne is a very bright and gifted pre-doctoral neuropsychology student at the University of Houston. She is one of 25 doctoral students who have worked at this laboratory in the last 15 years. We consider her one of the best."

When Penne completes her Ph. D next year, she will

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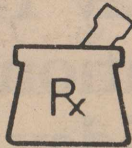

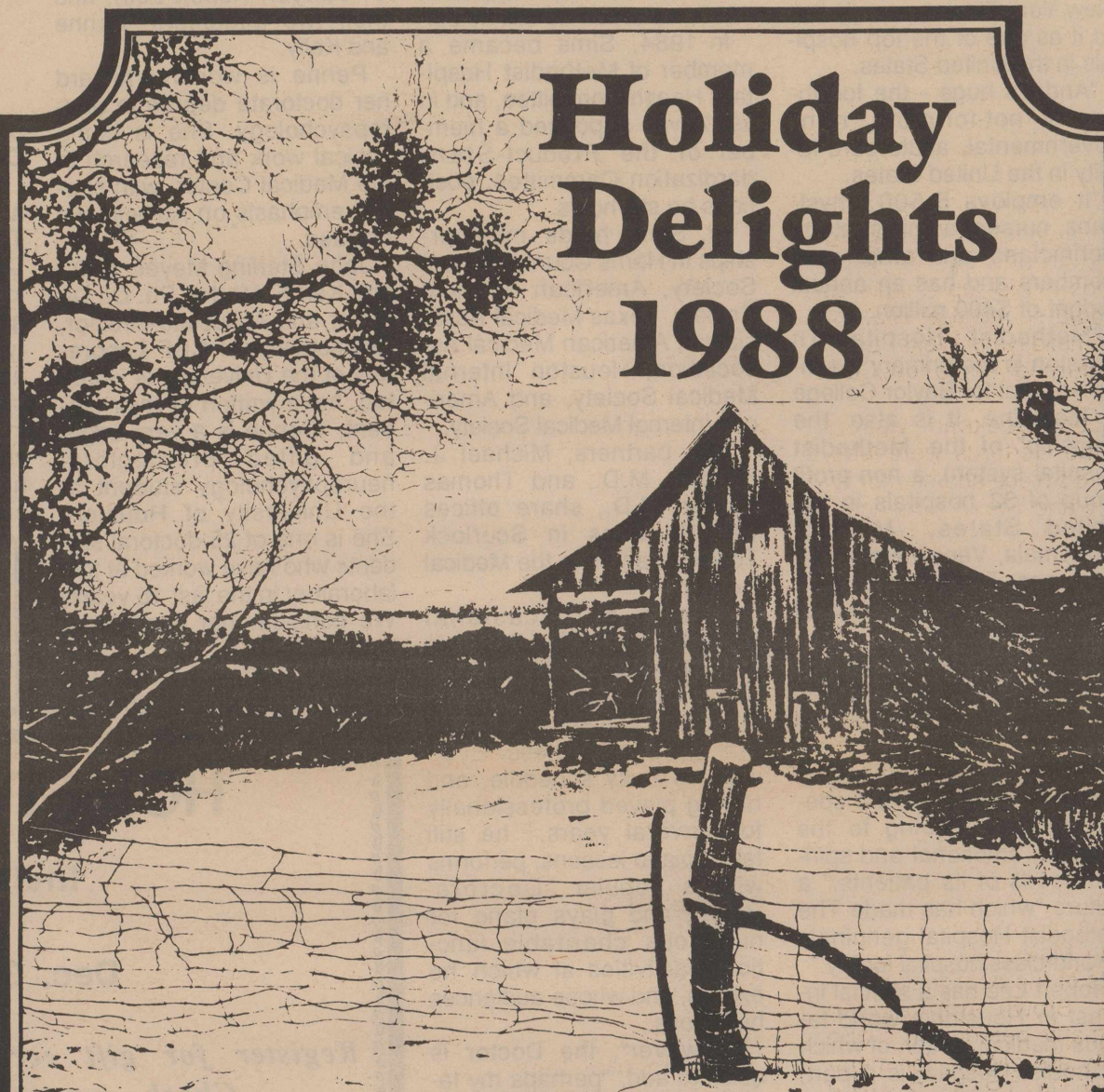

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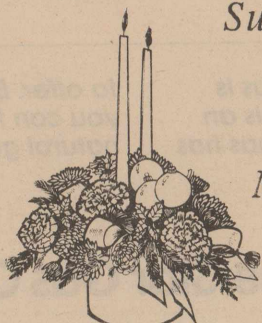

Christmas in Old Fort Concho slated

San Angelo-- Fort Concho National Historic Landmark will be filled with costumed entertainers, merchants, craftsmen, food vendors, and shoppers during the seventh annual Christmas at Old Fort Concho celebration, Dec. 2, 3, and 4.

The festival is one of the largest Christmas heritage celebrations in Texas and Fort Concho's biggest public event during the year. Officials expect 37,000 visitors from across the nation to attend.

Adults are charged admission to the forty acre site. Children under twelve are admitted free.

Fort Concho was a U. S. military post from 1867 until 1889. It is considered one of America's best preserved

western frontier forts.

During the three day festival, the fort's twenty historic buildings are decorated to celebrate the diverse ethnic backgrounds of area residents. The glow from flickering luminarias and campfires tented by soldiers, cowboys and Indians light the grounds at night.

Inside the cut limestone buildings, more than 100 merchants and artisans from San Angelo and across the Southwest will offer items for sale, some available only at this event.

Buildings decorated in ethnic themes include the English Victorian House, Mexican House, German House and Early Texas House.

Additional festival highlights include religious services in the fort chapel, sampling of ethnic foods, featured events, craft demonstrations, marching and rifle drills performed by the Fort Concho Memorial Infantry, Cavalry and Buffalo Soldier Units, visits with Santa Claus, wagon rides, a living Nativity scene, and exhibit of hand-woven rugs and blankets from New Mexico at the San Angelo Museum of Fine Arts, performances by a wide range of singers and dancers, and the presentation of an historical pageant featuring more than 150 costumed actors,

singers, and dancers.

Food and beverages will be served at three locations on the fort grounds, including the Arc Light Saloon, which celebrates San Angelo's wild West beginnings.

Postmaster Ponderings

The United States Postal Service operates seven Dead Letter Branches across the country. Each of the centers is continuously bombarded with "mail" both letters and parcels and items "loose in the mail". Mail which has a nonreadable address or items found loose with no identification is sent to the Dead Letter Centers. At these locations the mail or items will be forwarded to the proper persons if they are identified, or they will be held for 90 days before being destroyed or auctioned.

There are ways that you can keep your mail from ever going to the Dead Letter Center. Follow these tips to keep your mail alive and flowing:

* Always include a return address. On parcels, write outside and include it inside, too, in case the wrapping is damaged.

* Double-check addresses for accuracy, and make sure

adequate postage is attached. Include apartment numbers when applicable, and always use ZIP codes.

* If your handwriting is poor, print or type names and addresses.

* Write identification on photographs, film canisters and any other objects that could become separated from the packaging.

* Do not use felt-tip markers or pencils in addressing mail. The ink in felt-tip markers washes away if it gets wet.

* Do not overload envelopes. Find envelopes or containers adequate to handle the contents. Securely pad or shield objects that could break through the packaging.

* And finally, firmly secure any flaps or labels that could tear off.

These are but a few things you can do to insure that your mail does not end up in the "DEAD LETTER BRANCH".

Cancer Answers

by Guy R. Newell, M. D.

Q Does smoking low-tar cigarettes reduce the risk of lung cancer?

A The switch to low-tar filter cigarettes is a good first step for anyone who is determined to quit smoking. However, it is no substitute for quitting altogether.

The problem with low-tar cigarettes is that the nicotine content is lower too and that is what smokers crave. In order to get as much nicotine as before, you may end up smoking more cigarettes, smoking more of each cigarette, or inhaling more deeply. In that case, you have defeated your purpose.

Even if you smoke the same as before, there is no guarantee that you will reduce your risk of lung cancer. We now know that just breathing other people's smoke increases a nonsmoker's risk for this disease.

And, remember that all brands of cigarettes and all levels of smoking increase your risk of heart disease.

There are no ifs, ands or butts about it--all kinds of tobacco increase your risk of cancer!

Q How often should a woman have a mammogram?

A If you have no family history of breast cancer, you should have your first mammogram (an X-ray of the breasts) between the ages of 35 and 40. This gives your doctor a picture of the breasts in a healthy state that can be compared to future mammograms.

Between the ages of 40 and 49, you should have a mammogram every one to two years, depending on the findings in the first mammogram. After the age of 50, you should have a mammogram every year because 75 percent of all breast cancers are found in women in this age group.

A mammogram can pick up a cancer as small as one-fifth of an inch--much too small to feel. However, a mammogram should not replace physical examination of the breasts by a woman and her doctor. A small percentage of lumps can only be felt and will not show up on a mammogram because of their position or because of dense breast tissue.

Social Security Update

The most common reason for failure to receive a Social Security check is not reporting a change of address. A change of address may be reported to any Social Security office by phone or mail.

Some people apparently think that all they have to do to report a change of address is to notify the post office. However, the post office will forward mail to the new address for only one year, after which any mail that does not contain the new address is returned to the sender.

People who have their checks sent directly to their

bank and fail to report a change of address also risk having their checks interrupted. Social Security periodically checks to see if the proper person is receiving the checks and if there is no response to the mailed inquiry, the checks may be stopped.

In addition, direct depositors who fail to report a change of address may miss receiving important information mailed to beneficiaries that may affect their checks.

rainfall. The objective is to enhance the water resources of the City of San Angelo. The period of the proposed permit is March 1st through November 30th for a four year period beginning in 1989.

4. The proposed weather modification operation is to be conducted for and on behalf of the City of San Angelo, P. O. Box 1751, San Angelo, Texas 76902.

5. The proposed weather modification operation is to be carried out in a "target area" in a manner so as to cause the intended effects to occur only within that area.
