Biologists do not expect the recent low temperatures to affect area birds since the hard freezes were dry. They predict last week's rains will save existing pairs for breeding with new growth of green weeds and grass.

Flower show meeting set



One of them said he had heard of a place just a short distance away, but didn't know for sure about how good it was. So they decided to go ahead and go. When they got there, they all jumped out, ran to the ledge over-looking the water and dove in head first. Problem was the water was only a foot deep. The morale of the story of course is to look before you

It may be well to keep this in mind as far as solutions to the disposal of trash is concerned. One of our small nearby towns has already jumped off the deep end by prematurely closing their land-fill and are now faced with finding a suitable alternative quickly (and also affordable).

They should not have been so quick to have made this decision since time is not of the essence because the E.P.A. mandates will not take very likely before that time there is going to be some variances amended that will take into account the adverse and (in a lot of cases) disastrous consequences to the

large number of towns in West Texas that cannot comply to the letter of the law as written. There is already some action being instigated in the legislature about this very thing. I have heard of figures ranging from \$12.00 to \$20.00 per month as the cost per household for trash disposal. These costs in towns like Robert Lee, Bronte, Miles, Sterling City, etc. and on and on are ludicrous at best. There are way too many people in all of these places that, because of their income, can not afford that much of a cut out of already strained budgets.

I do not believe that the legislature can, or will, be oblivious to the special problems that have been created by all of this and will come up with something to offset these things. In the meantime, it would be prudent to not get too carried away and make some decisions that could do more harm than good. This is not to say that we should not look into alternatives to what we have effect until March 1991 and and to explore the possibilities by any means. As the moral of the story says, we better look and look good to be sure just how deep our swimming hole is.




