Junell to sponsor ASU scholarship

Coke County high school seniors who plan to enroll at Angelo State University and major in the field of education may be eligible for a \$1,000 freshman scholarship, sponsored by 66th State Representative Robert Junell.

Like his father, long-time San Angelo banker Frank Junell, freshman State Representative Robert Junell sees that an investment in higher education is an investment in the common good of the State of Texas.

The younger Junell, a San Angelo attorney who was elected to the 66th District State Representative seat in November, pledged his personal financial support for higher education at Angelo State University during his campaign. And now he's putting his money where his mouth is.

The San Angelo attorney is creating a scholarship fund for students from his home district that includes Tom Green, Sterling, Coke, and Mitchell counties of Texas. The scholarships will be awarded to students from these counties enrolling at Angelo State Uni-

versity.

Education again stays in the forefront of his usual commitment. The students applying for the scholarships must have the intent to pursue a career in the education field. Many of the students will become future teachers and leaders in the public schools of the 66th District.

What makes Junell's scholarship fund particularly unique, however, is where the funds will come from.

Junell is contributing his State Representative salary of \$5,400 during 1989 and will increase that amount to the \$7,200 which he will earn each year in the future to endow the scholarships as long as he is the State Representative for the 66th Legislative District.

High school seniors in the district who plan to enroll at Angelo State University and major in the field of education are eligible for the \$1,000 freshman scholarship sponsored by Junell.

One scholarship will be awarded during 1989-90 to an entering freshman from each of the four counties (Mitchell,

Tom Green, Coke, and Sterling) in the 66th District. The scholarships shall be for one year only with need being one of the criteria for the selection of the recipients.

Students from the 11 high schools in the district are eligible to apply for the scholarship. Interested students should contact the Office of Student Financial Aid at Angelo State University (915) 942-2246.

Junell is in his first term as State Representative and is a native of San Angelo. He graduated from Texas Tech University School of Law with honors in 1976. He received the B.S. degree in Education from Texas Tech University in

1969 and the M.A. degree in Political Science from the University of Arkansas in 1974.

The families of Frank Junell and Robert Junell earlier this year established the Frank Junell Law School Scholarship in honor of the elder Junell for Angelo State University graduates enrolling at the Texas Tech University School of Law.

Frank Junell served terms on the Board of Regents of Texas Tech University, the Board of Trustees of Hardin-Simmons University in Abilene, and has been a strong supporter of local efforts involving Angelo State University.

WCCCD slates activities

The West Coke County Development met Monday, March 6 in the Coke County Courtroom, with 42 present. Minutes of the preceding meeting were read and approved and the treasurer reported a balance of \$1302.31.

Leigh Ann Runion, chairman of the committee on Youth, Entertainment, and Industry reported the committee had met to consider these three. After discussion they had decided to check with the youth of the community concerning their needs and interests before proceeding further on plans. The committee urges parents of our youth to come forward with suggestions for activities. On entertainment, the committee agreed to help with the extravaganza being planned to assist with a special supper during the Coke County Pageant. They had discussed the need for new business, and/or jobs in the county and had decided to seek aid from other sources available for this. The need for jobs in the county was recognized to keep Robert Lee a thriving community. Those present by show of hands agreed to support this effort and to proceed, with help of A. L. Brasuell, to make plans as necessary.

Bill Helwig, chairman of the Extravaganza being planned and also chairman of the

Adopt-A-Highway cleanup plans, sent reports that plans for our first clean up and future ones were discussed. The first clean-up day has been set for Sat., April 8 at 8 a.m. Further information will be printed at a later date. Suggestions were to assign specific groups for a clean up each year, as well as doing it ourselves.

The committee for helping the EMS and the Fire Department reported they will meet soon.

Grace Ditmore reported on the business directory being prepared. The group agreed that each business should be contacted before printing the directory to give the businesses and professional services of Robert Lee proper representation.

Elane reported a request suggesting a joint meeting of the West Coke County Development group and the Bronte Chamber of Commerce members. Those present agreed this might be done at some future date.

EMS representative, Lou Wright, reported that the service station at 158 and 208 might be used to house the ambulances. Use of the station was generously donated by the Allen Family. She reported that a cleanup was being planned for March 18 and asked for manpower for this project. The WCCCD agreed to help publicize this

as well as contribute labor.

Lucille Bryan discussed Coke County Pageant with the group. She suggested that if a special barbeque, supper, or whatever was planned for one night of the pageant, possibly a Coke County Homecoming, that it be sponsored by a group outside the participants of the pageant. She reported various plans for the pageant, scenes, etc.

The EMS agreed to check with their board and with the members for a possibility of their assisting with the meal in connection with the pageant.

The subject of naming the county roads was discussed. Grace Ditmore reported that the roads in East Coke County had been named. She suggested everyone talk to their county commissioner to get the West Coke County roads named. The EMS is on the agenda at the next county commissioner's meeting to discuss this with them.

It was suggested that the radio stations be contacted for all day coverage during the pageant happening or the extravaganza.

The West Coke County Community Development is a non-profit organization made up of concerned citizens of the community. Their goal is the promotion and betterment of Robert Lee. Any persons interested in their community are invited to attend the monthly meetings. Watch the "up comings" for the next date.

County retired teachers meet in RL

A luncheon at the First Methodist Church in Robert Lee started the meeting of the Coke County Retired Teachers Association.

One new member, Faye Roe and a visitor, "Doc" Rives, were welcomed by members Ronda Wojtek, Jamie Boren, Joyce Rives, Henry and Vera Raney, Jean Fancher, J. T. and Sybil Henry, Luther and Marie Guffy, C. B. and Wanda Barbee and Jack and Nina Brewer.

Volunteer hours given by RTA of Coke County to the Church, Education, Civic Organizations, Health Services and etc. were 4,826 for the year. This averages to 254 hours given by each member for the benefit of the community. A tribute was given to C. B. Barbee for the outstanding individual record.

UW board meets

The Coke County Underground Water Conservation District Board of Directors met this week to take care of district business and to make plans for the future. A report was given on the meetings and actions taken on legislative items so far this year. Teral Smith, who is Chairman of the House Natural Resource Committee, has met with representatives of the single county water districts twice and has made known his desire to develop minimum standards for water districts. In most cases, this would involve oversight of districts by some state agency. There are many people over the state who still think that the state should have control of the groundwater. The Coke County Water District Directors do not agree with this view. Representative Smith does agree that most of the water districts that have been formed in the past few years are doing a good job.

A public hearing will be held on the proposed district rules when a date can be determined that is satisfactory to the directors and their attorney. This should be sometime within the next three weeks.

A Management Plan was approved by the Board of Directors. This Plan gives overall guidance and direction for the district to help prevent contamination and waste of the groundwater in the district. Monitoring of the water quality will be the primary objective of the district.

Those attending the meeting were J. D. Harmon, Arch Mathers, Fred H. McCabe, Jr., Otis Smith and Eph Cummins.

President Marie Guffy discussed new legislative concerns and complimented the group for having 8 members present at the town meeting held by State Representative, Robert Junell.

Luther and Marie Guffy were elected as delegates to the state convention to be held in El Paso.

The meeting was closed by Vera Raney quoting from Shakespeare:




Among the actors will be Don Masters, former Old







NOTICE OF INTENTION TO CONDUCT WEATHER MODIFICATION OPERATIONS IN THE STATE OF TEXAS
DATE OF THE FIRST THREE WEEKLY PUBLICATIONS OF THIS NOTICE:

February 27, 1989

1. Notice is hereby given that Atmospherics Incorporated, 5652 East Dayton Avenue, Fresno, California, 93727, has filed an application with the Texas Water Commission for a

State permit to conduct weather modification operations to change or attempt to change the natural development of clouds for the purpose, objective, period, and by the method summarized hereinbelow.

2. Atmospherics Incorporated submitted an application for a Texas Weather Modification License on February 27, 1989.

3. The purpose of the weather modification operation is to increase natural precipitation over the drainage area feeding surface reservoirs and tributaries which provide the municipal water supply of San Angelo, Texas. The period of the permit is from April 15th to October 15th in each of the two successive years 1989 and 1990.

4. The proposed weather modification operation is to be conducted for and on behalf of the City of San Angelo, P. O. Box 1751, San Angelo, Texas, 76902.

5. The proposed weather modification operation is to be carried out in both an "operational area" and a "target area" to cause the intended effects to occur only in the target area. This operational area of about 8,000 sq. miles is bounded by the following points.

Beginning at the southeast corner of Schleicher County due west to Ozona in Crockett County, thence northwest to a point three miles west of the southeast corner of Upton County, thence due north to a point three miles west of the northeast corner of Midland County, thence due east to the Colorado River at its intersection with the northern boundary of Coke County, thence southeast to a point three miles due south to its intersection with Highway 67, thence due east to the northwest corner of Concho County, thence due south to the point of origin at the southeast corner of Schleicher County.

6. The area to be affected by the proposed weather modification operation is the target area. The target area is an area about 4,700 sq. miles with boundaries parallel to and 10 miles inside the boundaries of the operational area noted above.

7. The methods and materials to be used in conducting this operation are summarized herein:

A licensed meteorologist will select cumuliiform clouds for cloud-seeding using a weather radar display, standard meteorological analyses, forecast techniques,

observations, and pilot reports to direct an aircraft equipped to dispense the seeding particles, silver iodide crystals, into the updraft air near cloud base or while flying at an altitude where the ambient air temperature is in the range of -10 Degree C to -12 Degree C.

8. Persons interested in knowing more about the technical aspects of the proposed operation should contact the applicant or the Weather and Climate Specialist of the Commission.

9. A public hearing on this application may be called by mailing a petition that requests a hearing to the Executive Director, Texas Water Commission, P. O. Box 13087, Captiol Station, Austin, Texas, 78711. The petition must contain (1) the signature, full name, address and phone number of each person requesting; (2) a statement that each person is at least 18 years of age and resides or owns property in the operational area; and (3) a description of each person's interest and how that interest would be adversely affected. Requests for hearing must be received by the Commission within 30 days of the date of the first publication of this notice.
